Wards and Penneys Undergo Extensive Redecorating Jobs

Eisenhower continues to not have any more idea of where he wants to go than all these crickets that are hopping around town these days.

When the Civil Rights Bill was its first preliminary stages of discussion, Ike told the nation it was a very moderate bill and something the country couldn't possibly do without and he hoped to see it passed word for word and letter for letter, quick.

When somebody pointed out to him that the bill was all tied up with old post-Civil War laws that would enable the government to use troops to back up court orders in any and all civil rights decisions he began to blow cold on the subject and never did after that find out where he was or where he wanted to go.

James Marlow, news analyst for the Associated Press, said that in nine of his 17 news conferences on the subject, Ike had a different position every time.

Senator Douglas, one of the Northern Democrats fighting to put the bill over, including all its damaging clauses, accused Ike of sabotaging the bill himself because he couldn't make up his mind where he stood on it. "It is a very embarrassing position when the President pulls the rug out from under us," the senator said.

Now that the bill has almost passed the Senate with most of the objectionable features taken out of it, Ike is already trying in advance to get the House to kill it when it goes back for compromise, or at least that's what he thinks he wants done, as of today.

He took the same wishy-washy stand on Federal Aid to Education when that bill was up for voting the other day. After spending the better part of his entire administration talking about little else, he got so cooled off on the subject that his own party, the Republicans themselves, voted to kill the bill with the Democrats, most of them, voting in favor of it.

Now Ike comes back all of a sudden and tells the country that by George he'll try again next year because the schools can't get along without a Federal Aid to Education program and that the people have demanded it. What kind of pills he takes to bring on such dreams nobody knows, and certainly they must be brought on by some kind of dream-producing potent because the whole nation has told him time after time after time that the people don't want to have anything to do with a Federal Aid to Education scheme of any kind under any disguise.

We have before us a section of the Congressional Record as recorded on May 8, 1957 by the Hon. Ralph Gwinn, Representative from New York, entitled "The Voice of the People Against Federal Aid to Education."

In 1,300 pages of testimony before the House Education Committee thousands upon thousands of people have testified.

Cheaney People May Soon Get New Telephones

Residents of the Cheaney Community may be in line for a brand new telephone service if efforts of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce and other interested citizens work out as they have planned.

A representative of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce and the District Manager of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company recently contacted Rich Freeman of Cheaney in regard to installing the phones. The telephone company manager said if some 12 or 15 subscribers could be lined up he thought the service could be extended to take care of them.

Freeman then got to work and secured the signatures of 26 Cheaney residents who said they would take the service if available.

As a result the phone company is sending out an engineer to make a survey for a possible route for new lines, and the possibility of using existing poles in the area. Further developments are being awaited.

C of C Directors Volunteer For Road Hearing

Most all Chamber of Commerce directors volunteered Tuesday night to make the trip to Austin on August 29 when Ranger and Eastland citizens have been granted a hearing before the State Highway Commission on the proposition of turning into a farm-to-market road the strip of county road now running from Lone Cedar Crossing to Lake Leon Dam.

Rip Galloway said the Eastland County group had been placed second on the list to be heard that morning, and they would probably be heard about 9:30 a.m.

A big delegation of citizens from both Ranger and Eastland is expected to make the trip. If the state should designate the short strip of road as a part of the farm-market network, the state could go ahead and hard-surface it and maintain it.

Ranger is one of the few schools in the state to have a Driver Training Course, a course that many agencies hope to make compulsory as soon as possible.

Eastside Chapel Becomes Church Sunday Afternoon

When the Eastside Baptist Chapel is organized into a full-fledged church Sunday afternoon, it will climax almost three years of Mission growth and development.

The Chapel was organized by the First Baptist Church in 1954 in order to give the people in the eastern section of town a place to worship, and as a place to be used in the training of young preachers.

Rev. Jackie Heath and Rev. Charles Messinger were its first pastors, working together during the early months of the Chapel's development. Later, Rev. Messinger resigned to enter evangelistic work, and Rev. Heath remained until January of this year. Rev. J. T. Ferguson, who came to Ranger from Monahans, is the present pastor of the Chapel.

The program for organizing the Chapel into a Church is being planned by the First Baptist Church, and will be published in the Times Saturday.

L. H. Hagaman Rites At 4 p. m. Thursday

Funeral services for Leslie H. Hagaman, 61, were held at 4 p.m. today, Thursday, at the First Methodist Church in Ranger with the Reverends James Ellison, pastor, Bruce Weaver, pastor of the First Methodist Church at Hillsboro, and John Harvey Wylie of Ranger, officiating.

Burial was in Evergreen Cemetery under direction of Killingsworth Funeral Home with the Masonic Lodge of Ranger in charge of graveside ceremonies.

Mr. Hagaman was one of Ranger's most prominent, native born citizens. He was a member of a family whose history closely paralleled the history of the city in which he was born and lived all his life.

Mr. Hagaman died at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, August 6, in a Fort Worth hospital following surgery. He had been ill only a very short time and his passing was entirely unexpected. He was up and around Ranger all last week and in apparent perfect health.

He was a member of the First Methodist Church of Ranger.

Due to the universal popularity of the move last year both at home and abroad, and due to the widespread comment it brought about, directors of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce voted unanimously Tuesday night to ask Ranger merchants again this year to decorate and utilize the vacant show-windows on downtown Main Street during the Fall and Holiday Season.

Further, the Chamber of Commerce will ask that the windows be decorated by the First of September, which is the official beginning of the Fall Season, and then changed over to holiday windows somewhere around Thanksgiving.

Rip Galloway, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, is now obtaining permission from all the building owners to utilize the space again. Galloway said that Ranger merchants whose establishments were not on Main Street would be given preference for the windows and he has asked that all merchants desiring one or more of them to please call him and make their reservations.

Last year the beautifully lighted windows, filled with merchandise, made a show place out of Main Street and caused an endless amount of favorable comment. It was a tremendous spur to fall business, and during the holiday season the windows gave the business section of the city a sparkling holiday look.

Galloway said the Chamber of Commerce would call a meeting of the Trade Extension Committee, soon, or possibly a meeting of all the merchants, to lay complete plans for the fall and holiday season in order to take advantage of the many opportunities that are expected to present themselves when business gets into full swing.

Christmas Light Chairman Wilson Guest was appointed chairman of the downtown street lighting committee for the holidays. He will appoint his own committee members for the purpose of checking over all the lighting equipment to see if anything needs to be ordered to replace broken parts, and to string the lights and decorations when the time comes.

Woman's Red Shorts Prove Undoing for Four

A pair of bright red shorts worn by a young woman from California proved to be the undoing Wednesday of two young married couples from that state who tried to get away with \$4,000 worth of auto parts and a bunch of tools "borrowed" from Wheat Auto Parts on Highway 80 in Ranger.

Besides the red shorts, the police radio helped some, too.

The two couples, enroute to Florida, counted to a stop in front of Wheat's with automobile trouble. They went inside the parts company, selected some replacements for their car and borrowed some tools with which to install them. When they had finished their job, they took off down Highway 80 without bothering to pay for the parts or return the tools.

Weatherford complied but radioed back that the two couples denied ever being in Ranger. Reunion Held by Fisher Family

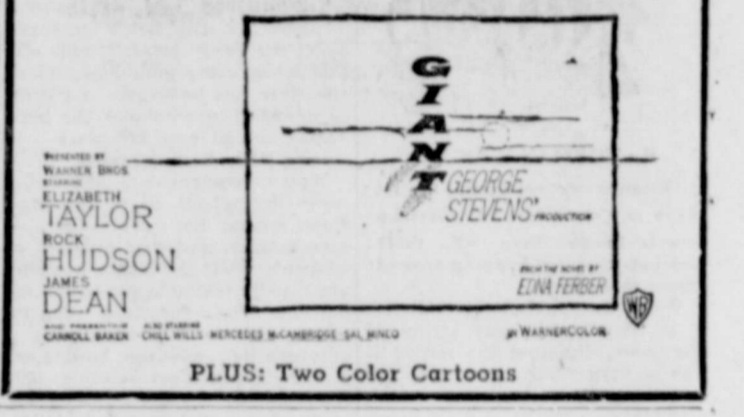
The G. W. Fisher family enjoyed a family reunion on the Leon River recently.

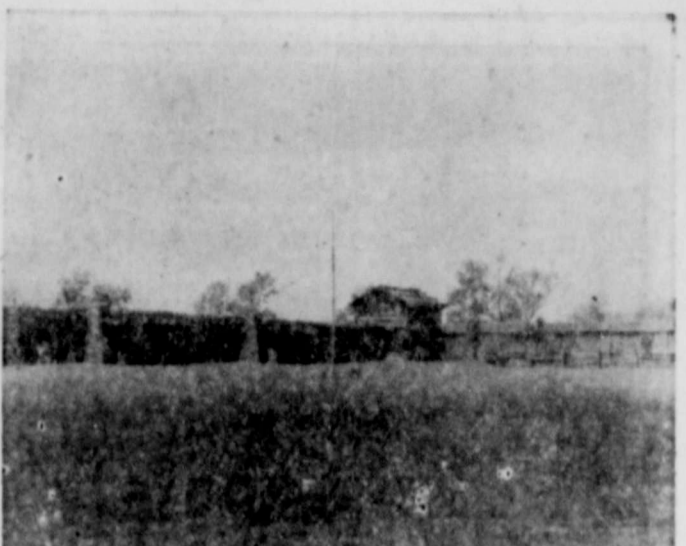

 sands of objections to the bill are entered by the people of this country from individuals on up to include what looks like to every existing organization of any responsibility in this country. Nowhere in the hearing did one single group appear in favor of the bill except the National Education Association and they've been trying to take over the schools for the past 25 years. In answer to Ike's statement that the people demanded his pro-

gram of Federal Aid for Education, Congressman Gwinn pointed out to Ike that he had asked for a bill providing \$500 million a year for four years, or a total of \$2 billion.

The Congressman then showed Ike where that much money, when divided among 60,000 school districts, would provide only one-sixth of a school room per district, or only about five seats. And then he asked Ike if he really thought the people of this country were dumb enough to ask for that kind of a program, or indeed, to demand it, as Ike said they did.

Said Congressman Gwinn: This legislation is, as it has been charged over and over; intended by the proponents to be nothing but a camel's nose in the tent. It amounts to dishonesty to talk about meeting an emergency, a shortage of classrooms, by any such proposed legislation.

Yet Ike contends that the nation demands it, and he is going to try again next year.

I GIVE YOU TEXAS

By BOYCE HOUSE

When I was police reporter in Memphis long years ago, it was he custom to "check" with the hospitals and undertakers for victims of accidents and shootings. I had difficulty in getting information from one hospital and so some thought was given to cause those in charge to be more cooperative.

It was the practice to mention the hospital to which an injured man was taken but, in the event of death, we wrote, "He died in a local hospital." I continued this procedure with all the hospitals except the uncooperative one. When a death occurred there, I would write, "He died in the Blank Hospital."

After a week or so, the newspaper editor protested to C.P.J. Mooney, the editor of the Commercial Appeal. "If these mentions keep on, people will soon think that our hospital is the gateway to the graveyard; we might as well announce where our entrance." "Abandon hope, all ye who enter here."

Mr. Mooney chuckled and replied, "I imagine Boyce will be glad to stop if he can just get the news when he phones." Thereafter, that hospital "played ball" just like the others.

If you are a young singer aspiring to fame, you are likely to succeed if you can get one good song and identify yourself with it. Think of Ted Lewis and you think of "When My Baby Smiles at Me." Fannie Brice's name is associated with "My Man." Nick Lucas became famous for two songs, "Tiptoe through the Tulips" and "Painting the Clouds with Sunshine."

Al Jolson gained his early renown with "Mammy" though of course we remember him also for "Swanee," "California, Here I Come" and "April Showers." Eddie Cantor also is identified with a flock of hits, including "If You Knew Susie" and "My Baby Just Cared for Me." Pat Johnson and Cantor are exceptions; Cantor is not Jolson was, great all-round entertainers.

A band-leader named McCoy staked out "Sugar Blues" and DeWolfe Hopper, the renowned actor, when recognized in any gathering, was called on to recite "Casey at the Bat." So get yourself a tune or a recitation (remember Abbott and Costello's "Who's on First?") that will be like a campaign slogan for a candidate or a brand on a can of corn. Why did I have to say "corn"?

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

NO WILL? WHO INHERITS PROPERTY?

What will happen if you should die without executing a legal and proper will? Who will inherit your property? Your husband, wife, mother, father, children, yours wife's relatives? The best way you can say who will have it is to provide a will which will protect your rightful beneficiaries and dispose of your property in accordance with your wishes.

When a deceased has no will, or dies "intestate" as the law calls it, the property of that person is distributed according to a detailed formula fixed by law. In some cases this may be the way you yourself would divide it—but in many cases it is not.

The provision of the law concerning the distribution of the property of a person who dies without a will are rather complicated, and all of the possibilities cannot be covered by a general statement.

There are different rules for real estate and for personal property, for community property and for separate property, for all of the many possible combinations of surviving relatives. Each situation must be carefully studied to determine the correct distribution of the property.

For example, here is a general idea of how the community property which you and your spouse have accumulated will be divided if you do not make a will prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and there are no children, the surviving spouse receives all of the property.

If, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of deceased children, they would divide one-half of the property, while the surviving spouse would receive the other one-half.

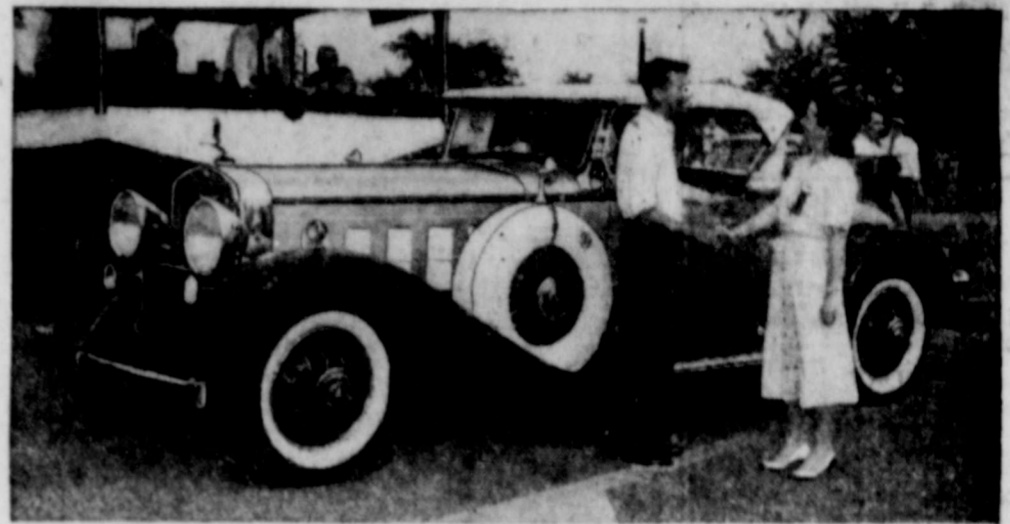
Of course, grandchildren do not share in the estate unless their parent who would inherit is deceased. And when descendants of previously deceased children do inherit, they receive only the portion that the child would have received, regardless of the number of such descendants.

An odd note, perhaps, is that the surviving spouse already owns one-half of the community estate prior to your death, and the law adds nothing to this share where there are children surviving.

When there are only children and their descendants surviving, they divide the entire community estate between them.
