Wilson Grocery Is Damaged By Fire

The Wilson Grocery and Market was badly damaged by fire fire which originated in, and conered at about 11:00 o'clock. Answering the alarm with both fire trucks, the Fire Department quickly extinguished the flames which had gained considerable headway in the northwest rear corner of the building. Stock throughout the large modern store, however, was badly damaged by smoke, with many of the unprotected items being completely ruined. Damage to the building, fixtures and stock was conservatively estimated at \$15,000. Little if any damage was sustained in the locker department, which is also located in the rear of the large store building.

It is believed that the fire was caused by an electric motor, part of the freezing equipment of the Plains Memorial locker plant.


Symbolic Trains Dramatize CROP
