County History Tells Of Pairs' Race With Indians

(Editors Note: This is the sixth in a series of articles taken from the book, "A History of Eastland County, Texas" written by Mrs. George Langston in 1904.)

In Steve Brandon's home every thing was going wrong. His wife had been ill for two days. The four or five grown boys could turn "flapjacks" and make "corn dodgers," but their big hands were clumsy when they tried to "put up" Ma's pillow, or give her a dose of medicine.

"I'm going for Mrs. Kohlen," Mr. Brandon announced after dinner. "She's over at Clayton. Keep a sharp lookout for the redskins, boys."

"You do the same, Steve," feebly called out his wife, as he bucked on his six-shooter and left the house.

The sun shone from a clear sky on that memorable afternoon, Dec. 15, 1860. Brandon was a brave man, but his heart was heavy with forebodings as he started on that fateful journey of five or six miles. As he went deeper into the wood, however, thinking of his sick wife and his own imminent danger (as it was thought of the moon) he realized perhaps unconsciously, that nature is capable of restoring one's sense of mind and calming one's fears.

Mrs. Kohlen readily consented to go, and for lack of any better way Mr. Brandon took her up behind him on his trusty black steed and started off in a smart pace for home.

When they had covered but half the distance they were most abruptly surprised of immediate danger. The air was cut by the

whiz of an arrow, which lodged in a tree directly in front of them. The noble animal knew as well as the riders that an Indian was behind them, and plunged wildly down the homeward path in a race for life.

The hiss and sight of the arrow lodged in the tree instantly restored to Brandon's mind the gloom that had rested upon his soul as he entered the woods from home. Glancing backward, he was filled with unfeigned horror, for not one Indian, but 20, swung in to view, and came yelling like demons, the arrow's playing about them thick and fast.

Brandon, leaning forward, loosened the reign and urged his horse onward. The woman's grip about him tightened.

"My God!" he thought, "She is shielding me! And as his gloom had been lifted by the sweet breath of nature in these woods a couple of hours before, so now, her responsibility for the life of his woman, on her errand of mercy for one he loved, thrilled him, angered him, lifted the burden from his soul, and in his restored sanity he thundered:

"Half-Wheel! The horse obeyed his master. The man fired twice in quick succession at the swartwinded Indians as they tumbled off their ponies into the grass. "Go, General, go!" shouted Brandon, and again the mad dash forward for life!

The Indians instantly recovered their ponies. On they came on, like a horde of devils, while their infernal yells and hissing arrows endangered their victims as with a general yell. The white man urged his horse forward. The air was cut with hideous sounds.

He gasped for a good breath of God's air. The Indians gained on him! The groom was again set upon by his soul, when Mrs. Kohlen cried out: "I am shot, Steve!"

Again was he angered, angered at the fiends seeking life. "Hold fast!" he cried, as he wheeled and fired. The Indians repeated their former movement with greater agility, and the race went on again. The man fired again and again. The woman escaped the lips of the women as she pleaded:

"Steve, my back is full of arrows; I am killed already. Think of your sick wife, and drop me and save yourself."

This appeal cleared the atmosphere for once and for all. How good was sweet nature's breath! With every barrel loaded, Brandon wheeled, and with a shout of defiance that startled the woman into tightening her hold, he sent six bullets on errands of fate. Hope surged mightily in his bosom, as he shouted:

"Forward, General, forward!" The gallant steed seemed to have caught his master's spirit, as, unflatteringly, he once more threw himself into the race with death. Brandon's cries now came as shouts of victory. He gained on the Indians, and coming in hearing of his home, he raised his voice and called loudly.

One of his big boys, out at the barn feeding the stock, for it must be done before night, heard the clatter of hoofs, listened, heard the yelling Indians, then his father's call. He rushed into the house.

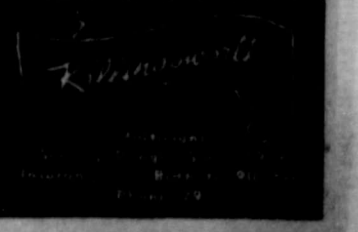

Drilling Activity Is Brisk Over County

Four new oil tests have been started in Eastland County in the last few days.

No. 1 L. R. Pearson is being drilled by John K. Shaw Jr. as a regular field try four miles north of Eastland on an 80-acre lease.

Location is 150 feet from the north line and 130 feet from the east line of Section 9, Block 4, H&TC Survey. Proposed depth is 2000 feet with rotary.

V&J Production Co. of Coleman has staked the No. 1 S. T. White as a wildcat try 950 feet from the north line and 330 feet from the east line of the southeast fourth of Section 23, Block 2, ETRB Survey, five miles northeast of Pioneer in the southwest part of the county. The try, scheduled to go 2200 feet with rotary to the Ellen sand, is 2 1/2 miles east of the old Pioneer field.

Another wildcat try, the No. 2 P. C. Frazier, has been spotted by N. T. Smith of Cisco. Location is 2300 feet from the south line and 1330 feet from the east line of Section 10, Block 1, H&TC Survey, six miles northwest of Gorman on a 160-acre lease. It is a re-entry into a failure for the purpose of testing the Strawn Sand Zone at 1900 feet and is one fourth of a mile southeast of a 3475 foot failure.

McElroy Ranch Co. of Midland has staked the No. 2 F. D. Wright 1350 feet from the north line and 1263 feet from the west line of Section 2, Block 3, H&TC Survey, three miles southwest of Eastland on a 237 acre lease. The Marble Falls test is slated to go 3049 feet.

Three shallow wildcats have been staked in Eastland County.

V. M. Gambelin of Cisco No. 1 Frances A. Cheney will be a 600-foot cable test eight miles southwest of Cisco, 2,310 feet from the west and 2,765 feet from the north line of Section 1, Block E. BBB & C Survey.

Frank Pritchard of Fort Worth staked two rotary wildcats five miles northeast of Putnam on the C. C. Phippen lease in Sect. 3171, TE&L Survey, both slated for 600 feet.

No. 1 Phippen will be 320 feet from the west and 1,870 feet from the north line of Section 3171. No. 2 Phippen will be 300 feet from the north and west lines.

A plug-back operation eight miles southwest of Eastland in the Day and Griffin (Upper Ranger) Field will be R. Blake Hawk of Cisco No. 1 A. N. B. Eaves, spotting 330 feet from the east and 2,310 feet from the north line of Section 29, Block 3, H&TC Survey. Proposed depth is 3,190 feet with cable tools. Old total depth was 3,559.

Plugged at 1,211 feet was H. R. Emerson of Cisco No. 2 C. V. Fox, wildcat six miles south of Ranger in Lot 28, League 2, McLennan C&L Survey.

Children Over 18 Now Eligible For SS Checks

Some disabled children over age 8 received their first monthly social security checks in February, according to C. M. Vaden, Jr., field representative of the Abilene Social Security Office who was in Eastland Wednesday.

Recent legislation provided for these payments to start for the month of January, 1957, he said. A number of applications have already been filed, and more are being received.

Under the new provisions, children who are disabled may receive social security benefits after they reach age 18, if they were disabled before age 18, are unmarried and dependent upon a deceased insured parent. The term "parent" includes natural parent, and in many cases, step-parent or adopting parent, Vaden pointed out.

"It is not necessary that the child himself have any record of work under the social security law to be eligible for benefits as a disabled child. However, he must have a disability severe enough to prevent him from engaging in any substantial gainful activity. The disability must be medically determinable," he explained.

"Disabled children over 18 who believe they qualify or persons caring for them, should inquire regarding benefits by writing the Social Security Administration, P. O. Box 1641, Abilene," Vaden advised.

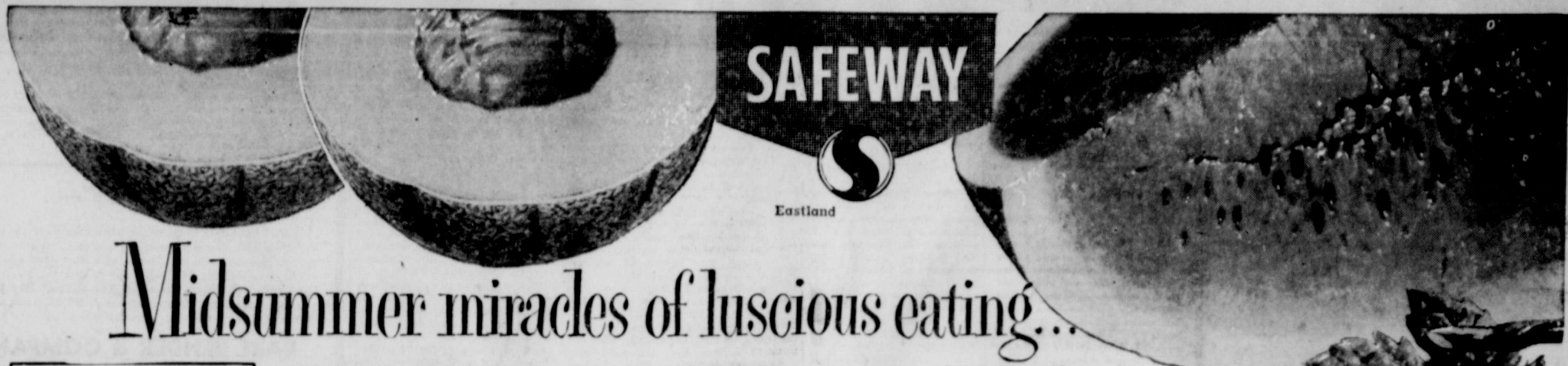

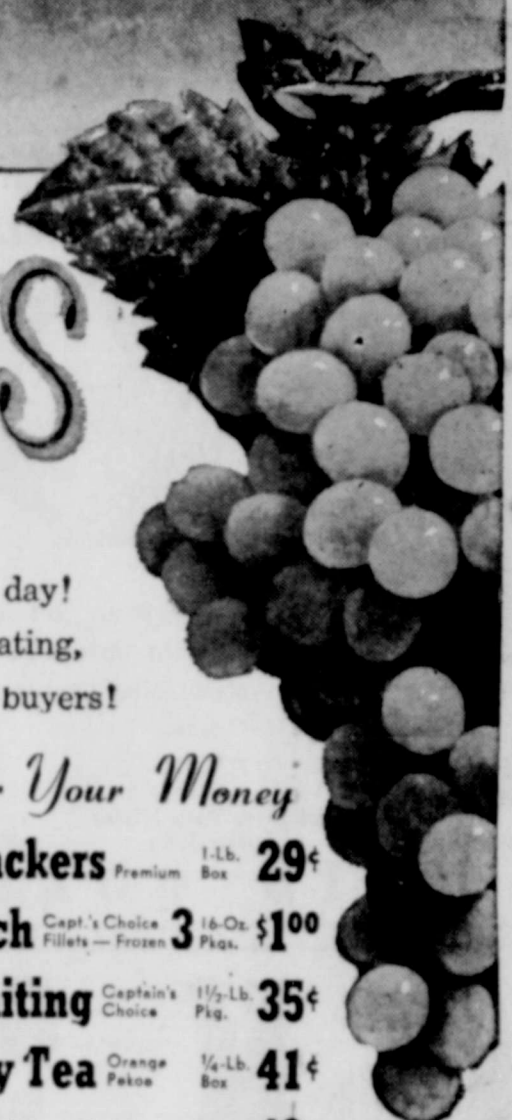

He pointed out that this district was composed of Palo Pinto, Jack, Eastland and Erath counties, and was so chosen because all four counties had the same drainage system into the Brazos river. Moore said there was a movement under way for the future to build some 30 or 40 dams on Palo Pinto creek to control the floodwaters of that stream and several of the dams would be in the vicinity of Ranger and Straw.
