Community Chest Budget Set at \$4840

Total Request of Agencies Was \$8137

After hours of agonizing work Thursday night the Board of Directors of the Ranger Community Chest finally adopted a budget of \$4,840 for the year 1958. The directors were faced with requests from all participating agencies that ran to a grand total of \$8,137 which, plus the customary 10 per cent reserve, would have amounted to \$8,940 if it had been adopted in its entirety. For a while it looked like an almost impossible task to compromise on a figure that might reasonably be expected to be raised. Last year the Chest raised only \$4,676.90, of which \$137.50 is still due in unpaid pledges.

Eastland's United Fund Budget Is Set At \$6,500

At a recent meeting of the Board of Directors of Eastland's United Fund the budget for 1958 was set at \$6,500 as follows:

This will be Eastland's second year to use the United Fund. The town went over the top with its 1957 budget which was \$300 less than the one above.

A Turkey Hunt

That same night two men, Joe Smith and "Bad Reese", working on the Flannagan Ranch, about 12 miles southwest of Brandon Ranch, went out to hunt wild turkeys, thinking there was little danger, as no Indians had been seen for some time.

The Lost Arrow Head

"On the 16th day of December 1860, Gols Flannagan and myself started in an ox wagon to Blair's Fort, 15 miles away, for some bread stuff. We had only gone a mile when we were waylaid by Indians, who opened fire on us at close range from a little ravine by the side of the road, which we were about to cross.

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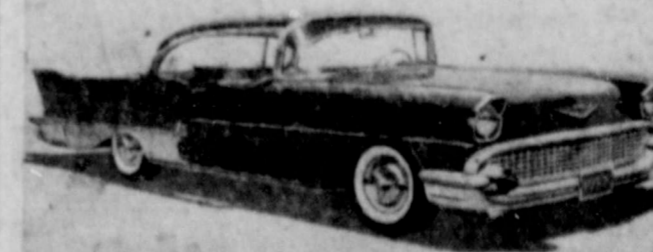
