3 cups biscuit mix 1/2 cup granulated sugar 1 cup milk
2 gg, beaten
3 tablespoons melted butter
8 to 12 or more fresh Italian prunes, pitted and quartered

1/4 cup granulated sugar 3 tablespoons flour 1 teaspoon cinnamon 2 to 3 tablespoons butter

Prepare topping by mixing together the dry ingredients and working in butter until crumbly by using a broad-tined fork.

It has contracted with General Atomic Division of General Dynamics Corporation for a joint \$10,-000,000 four-year research program to be conducted at the John ay Hopkins Laboratory for Pure nd Applied Science in San Diego. The objective of this long-range

search program is to develop an nderstanding of the basic processes which may make possible the generation of electric power by

Hallock, who returned to the United States in June from Army duty on Okinawa, retired from the Army in August, in the grade of Colonel, after 20 years service. He was graduated from West Point in 1937, and after World War II returned there as an assistant pro fessor of physics. He was an in structor at West Point until ne noved to Fort Worth in 1951.
