## Pep Rally Is Tonight Between Halves At Cr. Plains - "B" Game

Along with Daniel's telegram, Governor Frank Clement of Tennessee, who was at Sea Island, Ga., at the Southern Governors Conference, wired Ike and proposed that a committee of seven Southern Governors get together with him to see if something could not be worked out to serve as a guide, or a course of action, for the future in order to avoid just such troubles as this again as the integration campaign intensifies in the Southern States.

And that is something that should be done. It is going to HAVE to be done, because the country cannot keep going blindly as it is in this process of integration. The country can't afford to have mobs forever and eternally forming in front of its schools because we must admit that it is bad publicity all over the globe. Neither can the country afford to be calling out the Armed Forces all the time to FORCE integration down the throats of the people.

## Bulldogs Face 60 Minutes Of Season's Best Football

### Full Schedule Junior College Games on Tap

For the first time since school started a full schedule of games is on tap this week for Junior College members of the Pioneer Conference, but none of them are conference games.

Two of the games will be played tonight, Thursday, as San Angelo goes to Victoria and Tarleton State entertains Kilgore's Rangers at Stephenville.

Arlington State opens its home schedule Saturday against Wharton in a benefit game for the Arlington Training Center for Detached Children. Loop leader Cameron is expected to get its most severe test of the young season Saturday at Tyler, and Ranger's Rangers will try for their first victory in three starts, meeting Navarro at Corsicana Saturday.

### Should Lick Bearkats If Heads-Up Football Is Played All 4 Quarters

The Ranger High School Bulldogs will be faced Friday night with the task of putting out 60 full minutes of the best football they have played this year if they expect to come out of the DeLeon Bearkat contest with another victory under their belts.

The Bulldogs are capable of giving the Bearkats an awful drubbing if they use all the weapons at their command, but they will have a terrible time winning the game if they spot the DeLeon lads 20-7 as they did the Jackboro Tigers last week and then try to make it up in the final 30 minutes of play.

The Bulldogs have a splendid running attack and they have a good passing attack, but until yet they haven't managed to get them both clicking at the same time in the same game.

In the opener with Merkel, Ranger had no trouble at all gaining yardage on the ground and the boys picked up 300 yards while making their four touchdowns, but they gained only 30 yards through the air.

In the 28-27 victory over Jackboro last week, the Bulldogs made less yards on the ground but their air game was clicking and they chalked up 117 yards over the aerial route.

Ground Game Clicked In the Mineral Wells game, the Bulldogs were able to pass for only 50 yards, or else they might have beat those mountainous Mountaineers. But only the ground game was clicking in this encounter and

they piled up more yards against the Rams than they did against Jackboro, making 227 in the Resort City.

Anytime the Bulldogs put the two together, practically no team in the state could beat them on that one particular night. If the Bulldogs can combine the running game they played against Merkel, with the passing game they played against Jackboro, the result would be a sight to see and sad, sad news for somebody.

In their game with Eastland last week, the Bearkats showed that they, also, knew a few things about passing, and gained 113 yards through the air on the Mavericks as they gave the County Serk boys a 20-6 licking. They gained 162 yards on the ground against Eastland.

Stingy Against Passes The Bulldogs have been especially stingy, however, in yardage they have given up to enemy passes. In the three games since the season opened this year, only 81 yards have been gained against Ranger through the air. Jackboro got 52 of them, Mineral Wells 29, and Merkel 0.

## United Fund Captains Named; Kickoff Is Set

City Manager Lester Crossley, who is head of the United Fund Drive in Ranger this year, today announced Group Captains for the 1957 drive and set the kickoff date for Tuesday, October 8.

Crossley said the drive would begin with a kickoff breakfast at Ranger College Cafeteria at 7 o'clock Tuesday morning, Oct. 8, and he hoped the goal of \$4840 could be raised in record-breaking time.

This amount of money is considerably less than the budget for the year just ended which fell short of its goal by something like one third, with a total of \$4,676 being contributed.

Participating in the United Fund drive will be the Boy Scouts, Red Cross, Salvation Army, Life Guard, Teen Town, Child Welfare and Camp Fire Girls. The U.S.O. was eliminated.

The participating agencies asked for a total of \$8,137 and this total was trimmed to \$4840 by the United Fund Board of Directors.

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## Daugherty Described As Father Of City

(Editor's Note: This is the 23rd in a series of articles taken from the book, "History of Eastland County, Texas," written by Mrs. George Langton in 1904.)

Confederate Association One of the leading features of the historical, social and benevolent interests of Eastland County is the organization of this unchartered body. Its purposes have been so thoroughly and uniformly adhered to, and so pleasant and commendable that interest in its annual reunions increases.

At the suggestion of our well loved comrade, Dr. S. H. Stout, who now sleeps in the honored soldiers' grave, a preliminary meeting was held in County Clerk John T. Yeargin's office, Feb. 8, 1886. The Confederates present were Dr. S. H. Stout, Colonel George W. Shannon, John T. Yeargin, W. H. Day, Henry Hallum, J. T. Hammond, C. R. Johnson, Captain J. L. Steele and Jane Kimble. A committee consisting of Messrs. Hardeeman, Yeargin and Kimble was appointed to draft a constitution and by-laws, and a call made for a meeting, April 8, 1886.

The call was responded to by more than 100 gallant old Confederates who braved a storm for the welfare of their names. It was this roll of honor, which yet remains intact. The following of names were elected: Dr. S. H. Stout, president; Colonel George W. Shannon, vice president; June Kimble, secretary; John T. Yeargin, treasurer, and the Rev. Jack

## Citizens Buy \$59,772 Savings Bonds In August

A total of \$59,772 Series E and H United States Savings Bonds were purchased by the residents of this county during August. These figures were released recently by Gay Parker, Chairman of the Eastland County Savings Bonds Committee. Sales in this county during the first eight-months of this year totaled \$323,599 which is 54.9 per cent of the yearly goal of \$589,200.

Sales in Texas during the first eight months of 1957 totaled \$112,863,400, or 58.4 per cent of the 1957 goal of \$193,100,000. August sales in Texas were \$13,128,000.

"During the months of September and October, many schools throughout Texas are again installing the Savings Stamp program for their students. The School Stamp Program affords our young citizens an opportunity to learn the habit of thrift. In addition, they will develop a better understanding of our government and will learn to realize their responsibilities as citizens of this great land," Chairman Parker said.

Chairman Crossley said that all of the 1957 Captains had been contacted and all of them had agreed to serve. He urged that each Captain bear in mind the date of the kickoff breakfast and be there prepared to start their part of the drive.

All citizens of Ranger are asked to please begin consideration now of how much they can give. Everyone is asked to please give at least as much as last year and to please increase it by a small per cent if the drive is to go over at all. Everyone is also asked to please be ready to make their donation when first called upon so that the workers will not have to come back, because all of them are taking time off from their business and other duties to make the call, and they, too, are busy, and will appreciate the cooperation of everyone.

## I GIVE YOU TEXAS

Here's the story of how a lease was obtained on what proved to be one of the richest tracts in the history of oil:

One hot day, Ira G. Yates was rounding up drouth-stricken cattle to be driven to Rankin for shipment to market when Charles A. Hitt, in charge of land operations for the Transcontinental Oil Company in West Texas, accompanied by Oscar Greene, Transcontinental scout, and others with that company, paid Yates a visit to discuss an option for an oil lease on his ranch. He agreed to discuss the matter with them further at Rankin two days later—and there, sitting on top of a corral fence, he signed the papers for a consideration of one dollar.

The 60-day option was twice extended and had only a few days to run when Hitt received instructions to obtain a lease from Mr. and Mrs. Yates. The instructions came from the Transcontinental's headquarters in Tulsa, where A. M. (Jack) Hagan and other geologists of the company had filed highly favorable reports.

So Hitt and O. H. Kilpatrick, a geologist and engineer for the company, left San Angelo for the Yates ranch, 130 miles away. At Sheffield, they were joined by J. D. Miller, Jr., a land man for the company. They found a notary public milking on his stock farm and added him to the group.

There had been heavy rains and the Pecos was swollen, so that it was night when the four reached the ranch house. And there at 11 p.m., on Dec. 29, 1923, Ira and Ann Yates affixed their signatures to documents for a lease of 4,000 acres free and on an additional 4,000 acres for a dollar an acre and a yearly rental of twenty-five cents an acre.

The visitors started back that night so that the check could be placed to Yates' credit when the bank opened in San Angelo the next morning. En route, they returned the notary public to his home. When they asked how much they owed him, that functionary apologetically inquired, "Would \$2.50 be too much?" He was paid \$5.

## SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



### OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

Land is our basic asset, from both a local and national aspect. Soil erosion is a big menace to our prosperity and security. For these two reasons land owners are encouraged to take advantage of local conservation programs and apply conservation to their land. Local programs are designed to fit local needs in helping to keep soil and water on the land where it belongs.

Terrace systems have been recently completed by the following land owners: Fred Burfield south of Carbon, Homer Stiffler near Olden, John W. McAfee at Flatwood, and on the Wright estate near Eastland. Terracing is a popular and much needed practice in this area. Properly built terraces with adequate channels and supporting ridges across the slope will intercept excess runoff. Soil conservation technicians working with landowners run these lines on proper grades or fall and empty terraces on terraces on erodible ground, outlets. Terrace systems and contour farming do much to hold small flash rains, and during excessive or prolonged rain runoff is conducted to safe outlets with a minimum of erosion.

Diversion terraces have been recently built on the farms of J. G. Harlow, Waverly Massengale, Charles A. Clair, and Fred Burfield. Diversion terraces are large terraces constructed primarily above cropland to intercept outside water and prevent damage to lower areas. They are designed to carry runoff in excess of what could be carried by standard field terraces. They are also used for such other purposes as conducting

water into or away from farm ponds.

Farm ponds have recently been built for C. R. Rust, J. C. Seaborn, J. G. Harlow, L. I. Hartman, H. B. MacMoy, and W. E. Kirklin in the Eastland area. In the Cisco area the following have recently built ponds: Dean H. Perry, L. E. Booth, Leo Wells and Stewart Slatten. Land owners in the vicinity of Ranger who have constructed ponds are Wince Graham, J. L. Kroemer, W. H. Jackson and Owen Hamilton. Three landowners around Carbon have recently completed ponds, they are H. A. Tyrone, O. D. Quarles and Bob Brodner.

Land owners and Soil Conservation Service technicians assisting the district, worked together in selecting sites for these ponds. A good site for a pond has a suitable soil for holding water, and a drainage area in balance with the storage capacity. A location with high ground on both sides of a stream and a natural basin gives more depth and storage capacity to the completed pond. Wide flat spillways designed to carry flood runoff are an essential safety feature to all ponds.

The above practices are county A.C.P. practices as selected by the County A.S.C. Committee, Soil Conservation Service technicians, Soil Conservation District supervisors, county agricultural agents and Farm Home Administration supervisor. Land owners receive cost sharing assistance on these and other county approved practices.

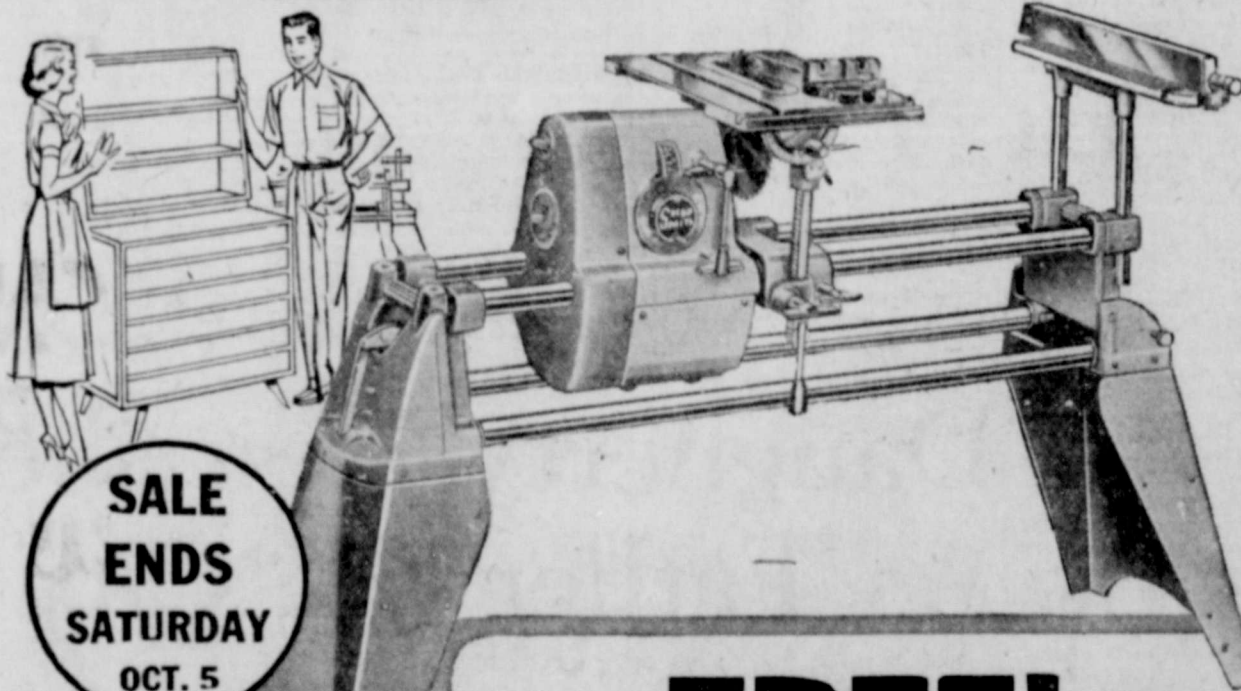

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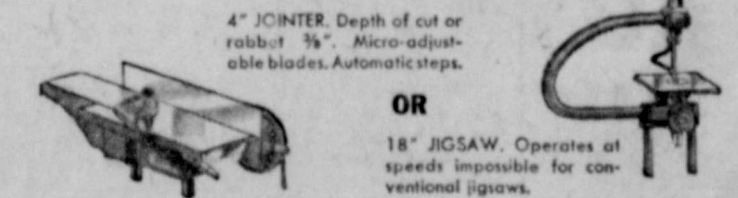

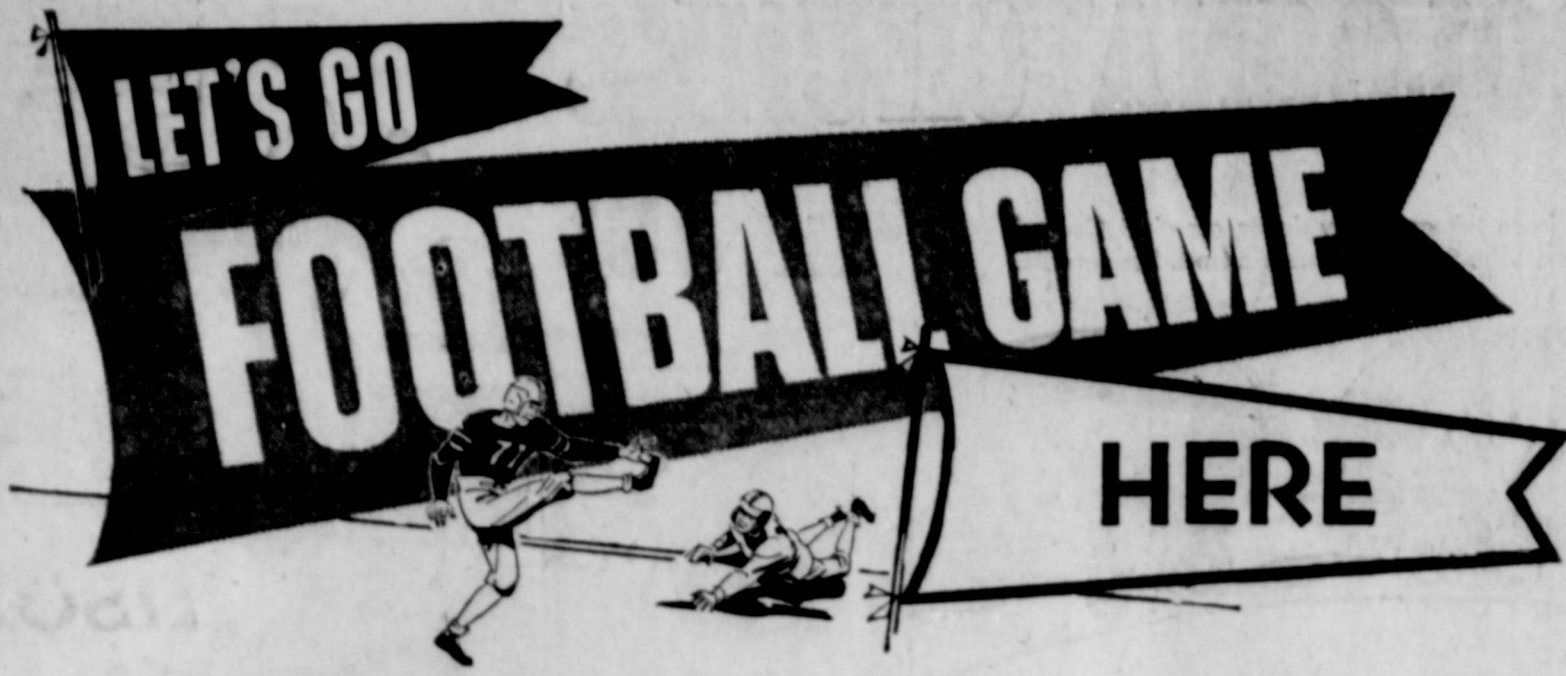

**IT'S THE LAW in Texas**

NEW LAW AFFECTS ELECTRIC CO-OPS

Under some conditions inhabitants of cities and towns can avail themselves of the services of rural Electric Co-operatives (Co-ops), according to a law passed by the Fifty-fifth Texas Legislature.

As the name implies, these Co-ops are made up of customers and furnish services to their members on a cooperative basis. Persons residing in rural areas and unable to obtain electrical service from public utilities or municipally-owned plants (central stations) have been able to purchase electricity through such co-ops for a number of years. However, there has been some argument about non-rural customers.

Sometimes rural areas served by a Co-op become non-rural, due to annexation by an incorporated city

or town. Electric Co-ops have usually continued to serve existing customers, as well as others desiring service, within these annexed areas. But their authority to serve these people became questionable when in a recent law suit the Supreme Court of Texas indicated that such a practice might be illegal.

This decision led to the action of the Legislature in passing House Bill 547, amending our laws pertaining to Electrical Co-ops, as a precautionary measure. The Co-ops are now authorized to engage in rural electrification by any one or more of the following methods: If an area (rural or non-rural) being served by a Co-op is annexed by an incorporated city or town in which central station service is supplied by the municipality or by a public utility located there, the Co-op can continue to serve those persons who were members on the date of annexation.

Persons in such an area who were not members on the annexation date may become members of the Co-op and thereafter receive service, if they cannot get electric service otherwise through the municipality or a public utility.

Further, even though central station service is now available, persons living in an incorporated or unincorporated city or town (rural or non-rural) who have been receiving electricity from a Co-op can continue to avail themselves of Co-op service, provided central station service was not available to them when they began to purchase from the Co-op.

In addition, as in the past, Co-ops may furnish electric service to persons in rural areas who are not receiving central station service.

morning climbing a mountain at all possible speed with a group of European mountain climbers, they might make it to the top in a day, whereas it might take us a week to get there, yet we were both trying hard to do it with "all possible speed." It doesn't mean the same in any two places or in any two different sets of circumstances.

The Governors of the Southern States and the authorities in the Federal Government should sit down together right now and REALIZE this. How much better it would be than calling out the Armed Forces to invade the sovereign states like some foreign enemy and FORCING a matter on them.

Indeed, if the Federal Government wishes to assume a responsible role in the matter, it will carefully scrutinize a state's plans to integrate, or even the plans of a locality, and if the Government thinks they are doing it too quick, and that it won't work right at that particular time, they should be advised to hold off a while longer until things look better.

This business of marching an army of soldiers into a school district and saying "All right, let's get this thing done TODAY, right now, before dinner, and go on back home and keep your mouths shut..." that stuff has got to stop. And the only way that it can be done is for the government to realize that "All possible speed" means just what it says.

**Many Purposes Around the Home Shrubs Can Serve**

Shrubs can be excellent for backgrounds and screening purposes around your home, and they can provide a bright show of color.

Before you select shrubs, decide first what job you want them to do and when you want them to bloom, advises the September issue of Better Homes & Gardens magazine. Then you can get ones that match your requirements.

Good shrubs for backgrounds and screening are viburnums, beautybush, quince, summersweet, winged euonymus, purpleleaf sand cherry, and sweetshrub.

Viburnums are all-season plants, with white flowers in mid-spring. Beautybush shrubs grow 10 feet tall and produce pink weigela-like flowers in early June. Quince is

among the first shrubs to bloom in early spring. There are many good varieties, most of them thorny. Quince grows to six feet tall, and gives colors from white to deep red.

Summersweet gives fragrant spikes of white flowers in mid-summer, and grows to nine feet tall. It grows best in moist soil. Winged euonymus is a sturdy, easily grown plant that reaches nine feet tall. It shears well, and is valued for a brilliant fall color, the magazine says.

Very hardy is purpleleaf sand cherry, which grows to seven feet tall. Single white flowers blossom in May, but rich foliage is the primary source of color. Sweet shrub, which grows to nine feet, gives deep, reddish brown flowers in May with dense, glossy foliage.
