Viburnums are all-season plants, with white flowers in mid-spring. Beautybush shrubs grow 10 feet tall and produce pink weigelalike flowers in early June. Quince is

among the first shrubs to bloom in early spring. There are many good varieties, most of them thorny. Quince grows to six feet tall, and gives colors from waite to deep

Summersweet gives fragrant spikes of white flowers in midsommer, and grows to nine feet tall. It grows best in moist soil, Winged euonymus is a sturdy, easily grown plant that reaches nine feet tall. It shears well, and is valued for a brilliant fall color, he magazine says.

Very hardy is purpleleaf sand cherry, which grows to seven feet tall. Single white flowers blossom in May, but rich foliage is primary source of color. Sweetshrub, which grows to nine feet, gives deep, reddish brown flowers in May with dense, glossy foliage.
