Bulldogs meet Eastland Friday Night

Ranger citizens who find a few moments of spare time on their hands should drive out to the Featherlight plant and take a look at what is going on out there. Beats anything you ever saw, and right here at home, too.

Visitors are always welcome to walk around and watch the operation, and nobody can go out there and stay any time at all and come back to town and say nothing is going on in Ranger. It is a busy place, and it gives the onlooker a feeling of being in the big middle of prosperity.

Not many people in Ranger actually understand what is taking place at the plant. Visitors, asking them, do not get very good answers. Some people have even been under the impression that Featherlight Corp. is making its Aggregate out of materials they dig from the abandoned coal mines at Thurber.

The plant, of course, gets its shale from the low, rolling hills surrounding it, and there is a lifetime supply of it out there. With the uses of Featherlight Aggregate increasing by leaps and bounds every day, and with such a bountiful supply of raw material, common sense indicates that the plant will one day be one of the biggest things in Ranger, with one of the biggest payrolls.

The shale, which the plant digs from the hills, is processed and cooked in the giant steel ovens low eight in number, and the finished product has the resemblance of small "pea" coal. It is used in the manufacture of reinforced concrete, replacing rocks and gravel, and in the manufacture of building blocks, and pilings for bridges and warfs, and it is said that even telephone poles can be made from it. Being much lighter than rocks and gravel, it has a wide use in the manufacture of pre-stressed concrete.

More and more every day in the building industry, prestressed concrete is being used. Huge slabs of many modern buildings are made of pre-stressed concrete and the buildings go up whole walls at a time rather than brick by brick or block by block, and in the manufacture of these slabs, Featherlight Aggregate is finding a wider and wider use because the slabs can be made lighter, yet just as strong as if they were made the old fashioned way with rocks and gravel.

It is interesting to visit the Featherlight plant and Ranger citizens should take advantage of the opportunity to do so. The plant is a good place to take visitors, also, because they would enjoy seeing it and they couldn't resist telling others about it, thus spreading some good news about Ranger in all parts of the state.

Also, if the citizens of Ranger do not believe that Ranger College is a bustling, busy place, they should go out there some time and attend some of the activities—a chapel program, for instance. The place is crammed with students, and even then most of them cannot be seen in the day time because they are not there, with most of them working at day-time jobs and attending school at night.

Just to get some idea of how many are attending school and actually live on the campus, all one has to do is to poke his head into the cafeteria at noon.

Featherlight Steps Up Production In Ranger

Kilns Nos. 7 and 8 Go Into Full Operation

Two huge new kilns, No. 7 and No. 8, which have been in the process of installation at Featherlight Corp. for the past two months or more, go into full production at the Ranger plant this week, increasing its output of Aggregate by at least one-third, according to Charles Bomar, vice president and retiring general manager of the company.

Bomar is being transferred to Lubbock for the purpose of installing a new plant there for the manufacture of glazed blocks, using Featherlight's new "Spectra-Glaze" process.

Carl Black of Dallas, has come to Ranger as new general manager of the plant here, and Charles Best of Beaumont, has moved here as assistant manager. Both men have a wife and two children. Best has already located his family here, and it is understood that Black is trying to buy a home.

Shipped 18,000 Yards
During the month of August, Featherlight shipped 18,000 yards of Aggregate using only six kilns, and it was necessary for the company to buy the entire output of the Eastland plant in order to keep up with the demands of its customers.

With the operation of the two new kilns here, it is said that production will be increased by at least one-third over August, and the plant will be better equipped to supply most of its current needs from Ranger operations.

Five new laborers have also been put on the payroll, bringing the total number employed here to more than 60.

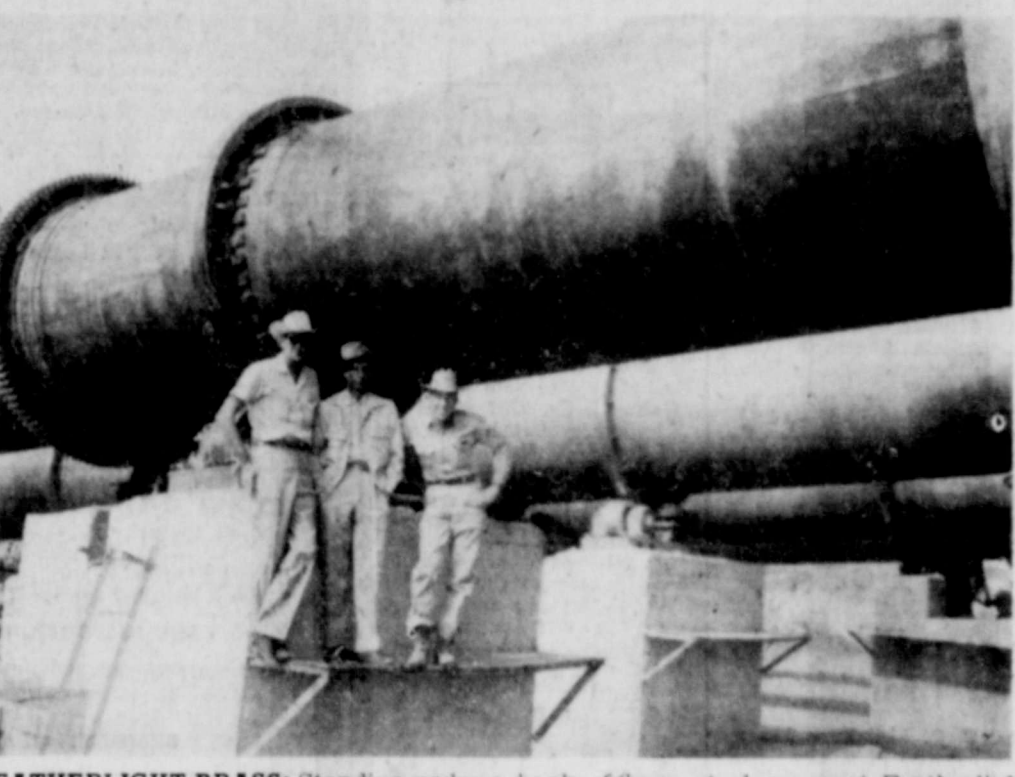
In explaining the new "Spectra-Glaze" process that is being installed in Lubbock, Bomar said the plant was originally intended for Ranger but would not go beyond that in saying why the plans were changed.

Glazed-Surface Blocks
The new plant will be engaged in the manufacture of light-weight aggregate building blocks with a glazed finished surface on one side of them. This glazed surface is a smooth, separate face that is fused onto the block, making the block and the face all into one piece. It will be offered in four solid colors and one greyish-blue color with a speckled finish.

The blocks will be used in schools, hospitals, gymnasiums, bathrooms and showers, public rest-rooms, and other places where a smooth, washable outside finish is desirable. Installation of the blocks will save at least one labor charge, in as much as the rough blocks are usually laid first, and then the finished blocks.

At some time in the future, Featherlight may get into the pre-stressed concrete work, of building slabs and other pre-stressed concrete.

Ike Prosperity Shows 272 Small Businesses Fail W'kly

More than 2500 small business enterprises have gone under in Texas during the last three years, according to Senator Lyndon B. Johnson in a news release from his office today, and such establishments failed at the rate of 41 per month in the first six months of 1957.

In the Nation, 10,000 small businesses have gone bankrupt so far this year, Senator Johnson stated.

"The national weekly average of business failures has increased to 272," he said. "That is far above the average of any year since World War II."

"Week after week, the largest percentage of bankruptcies is reported among companies with liabilities of between \$5,000 and \$10,000. These are small firms by any standard of measurement.

"Unless we can halt this trend and reverse it, we are going to be in serious trouble."

The most distinguished member of this noble family is the oldest son Truman H. Conner. L. S. Ross, and was three years later elected to the office. In 1898 Judge Conner was elected Chief Justice of the 2nd Supreme Judicial District of Texas, composed of 95 counties, including Eastland.
