Ranger Host To 150 Firemen At Convention Here

Ranger was host to 150 visiting firemen Tuesday night for the quarterly convention of the North Central Texas Firemen's Association which was climaxed with a turkey barbecue dinner at the new National Guard Armory.

During the afternoon, Eastland won first place in a six-man fire hook-up race with a time of 21.8 seconds, but they didn't match the pace set by Ranger firemen which was 20.6 seconds. Host firemen do not compete in the race, but always set the pace for somebody else to shoot at.

Mineral Wells was second with 25.3; Brownwood third with 25.7; Cisco fourth with 56.6 and Breckenridge and Comanche had no time.

(Editor's Note: This is 25th in a series of articles taken from the book, "History of Eastland County, Texas" written by Mrs. George Langston in 1904.)

E. A. Hill In Tennessee, on July 16, 1865, E. A. Hill was born. Seven years later his father died. Having been reared on a farm his education was limited to that afforded by the common schools and the Dresden High School.

At the age of 18 he entered the office of the Dresden Enterprise and there served an apprenticeship. In 1864 he came to Texas and entered the law office of Dayton, Porter and Conner as student, and was admitted to the Bar in 1885, at the age of 21.

Mr. Hill was elected County Attorney in November, 1888, and re-elected in 1890. He is a good lawyer, has a well equipped library and office on the north side of the square, is a ready speaker, a good story-teller, and an excellent entertainer. He served his fourth term as mayor of Eastland.

On Dec. 14, 1892, Mr. Hill was married to Miss Bessie, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Evans. Mrs. Hill died in 1894. He was again married to the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Farvin.

Mr. Hill enjoys in a marked degree the confidence of his fellow townsmen. The Eastland Chronicle, this creditable weekly Democratic paper owned, edited and published by Frost and Chastain, lawyers and devoted to "Science, Literature, Religion, Politics, and the Upbuilding of Eastland County."

Judge Frost was a member of a minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, was born in Chattanooga, Tenn., in 1849. When only 18 years old he engaged in teaching "with little education, but by hard study" he familiarized himself with natural sciences, and with the French, Latin, French and Spanish languages. He came to Texas from Illinois in 1872, and was admitted to the Bar to practice law in 1882. Judge Frost was a member of (Continued on Page Three)

Says 30-Year-Old Hix Due to Do It Again

Convinced, no doubt, that they wouldn't have a Chinaman's chance otherwise, Eastland football fans have dug up an old jinx upon which they are pinning their hopes for a victory over the Bulldogs Friday night, and they're working the jinx to the limit as gametime nears for the great annual clash.

"They have discovered that on those rare occasions when the Mavericks have managed to beat the Bulldogs, the year ended in '7' and they are pinning with great ceremony to the following: 1927—Eastland 7 Ranger 0 1937—Eastland 47 Ranger 13 1947—Eastland 6 Ranger 0 1957—Eastland 7 Ranger 7

This, they say, is the year when the "7-Jinx" will get the Bulldogs again.

Wharton Leads All Top Scorers

David Wharton, Ranger Bulldog Fullback, took over top position this week among the top 25 schoolboy point-makers in all West Texas.

Wharton's three touchdowns against DeLeon brought him a four game total to 60 points. Wharton is a dangerous broken-field runner and can score around the ends, through the middle, or by the pass route.

The County-Seaters have even gone to elaborate pains to point out other meaningful "sevens." "There's big Saul Pullman, their 'Great' fullback," they say. (And incidentally, Pullman hasn't run with the ball all this year—he "clumbers" with it, they are fond of saying.) Anyway, Pullman's jersey number is 16, and one plus six is seven. Halfback Larry Hollis weighs 142 and when you add that up you get seven. Players Johnny McMahon and Marvin Agnew weigh 160 and that makes seven. And on and on they go playing voodoo with their "7-Jinx" and hoping for a victory.

Here we might remind them that Ranger has 14 men on the football squad that's going to "kick 'em and that is seven plus seven, and also that seven times seven is 49 and that's about the number of points the Bulldogs are going to beat 'em.

Eastland, incidentally, is predicting a Maverick victory 19-12, a difference of "seven" points, naturally.

But seriously, when all is said and done, past records and jinxes have very little to do with Eastland-Ranger football games, just like they have little to do with Texas and Texas A&M football games. Neither is it hard and fast rule that the best team always wins. Just as in any other hard-fought encounter, the breaks of the game usually determine the score.

It is also a fact that both Eastland and Ranger perhaps play their best games of the year against each other. Both teams are thoroughly scouted by the other, hard work usually goes into preparation. (Continued on Page 8)

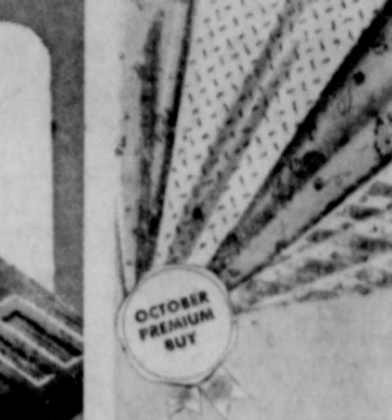

HOME MAKERS

Views and News

Beginning with this edition the home demonstration agents of Eastland County will present a weekly article of value to you as a homemaker. We will also feature Home Demonstration and 4-H Club news. Suggestions and questions from you would help us to make this column more meaningful.

The opening of school means a "fresh start" for most family members in one way or another. It's also the time when eating habits are re-established for the school and work days ahead. Extension foods and nutrition specialists say it's a fine time to establish good breakfast habits for every member of the family.

Eating a good breakfast pays off in efficiency, alertness and better health. There's lots of proof for that statement. Research has shown that breakfast-skippers

job themselves of potential alertness and efficiency during late morning hours, and that dieticians are wrong if they think missing breakfast is a practical way to lose weight.

Aim for a good adequate breakfast. That means one that will provide one fourth to one-third of the day's total food requirements in calories and nutrients. It should include these basic foods—fruit or fruit juices, cereal or eggs and meat, or both, whole or enriched bread, butter or margarine, and coffee. It's a better breakfast. Start with yourself and other family members to help improve breakfast eating habits of all age groups.

Now is the time to stock the freezer with a fresh supply of doves and other game birds. It's a simple process. Draw birds as soon as possible after they have been shot. If there isn't time to do a thorough job of cleaning and dressing, remove the crop and intestines. Chill promptly.

Plucking the birds is preferable to skinning them. Skinning causes dryness and some loss of flavor. Wash birds thoroughly before packaging. Wrap individually in moisture-vapor-proof material. Cellophane, aluminum foil, plastic, and different kinds of laminated wrapping papers are satisfactory. Seal with freezer tape. Label with name and date. To maintain top quality, store birds at 0 degree F. or below. From six to nine months is recommended storage period. Thaw birds before cooking.

Imaginative homemakers find cheese one of their best friends for adding taste appeal, color and extra nutrition to vegetable dishes. A cheese sauce, for example, can be used to top boiled potatoes, cabbage, onions, peppers, eggplants, tomatoes or other vegetables now in plentiful supply. Left-over dishes disappear faster, too, when converted into cheesy scalloped dishes. Simply pour the cheese sauce over the vegetable and cover with bread crumbs. Bake in a shallow dish until the crumbs are brown and the vegetables heated through.

Here's an easy recipe for making cheese sauce for vegetable dishes. Assemble these ingredients: 1 1/2 tablespoons butter or margarine, 1 1/2 tablespoons flour, 1 cup of milk, salt to taste, 3/4 cup grated cheese (or 3 ounces sliced cheese).

Melt the butter or margarine and blend in the flour. Add the milk, then stir and cook until the sauce is thick and smooth. Cook about a minute longer. Add salt and cheese and remove from heat. Stir until cheese is melted.

There was great rejoicing in this section of the county because of the development of the convention that would result. The settlements that followed, the building and maintenance of schools and churches, the cheapness of land (at that time from 50 cents to \$1) and develop the resources of the country.

The Texas and Pacific Railroad Co. was organized under an act of Congress, March 3, 1871, and the general railroad laws of the State of Texas. It acquired the properties of the Southern Pacific Railroad Co. of Texas in 1872, which operated the 60 odd miles of railway between Shreveport, Louisiana and Longview. The Southern Pacific Railroad Company was a consolidation of the Vicksburg, Shreveport and Texas Railway (chartered in Louisiana), and the

Southern Pacific Railroad, organized under the laws of Texas.

The New Orleans Pacific Railroad Company, (organized under the laws of Louisiana), was consolidated with the Texas and Pacific Railway Company in June, 1881. Early in the seventies the Texas and Pacific also acquired the properties of the Southern Transcontinental and the Memphis, El Paso and Pacific Railroads, both incorporated under the laws of Texas.

In those early days, the population of the State was, of course, insignificant in numbers as compared with the present time, and was confined mainly to the eastern and coast counties. West of the line drawn through say, Gainesville, Fort Worth, Austin, San Antonio and Corpus Christi, there was, then, scarcely a white population.

The charters granted by the State to the Memphis, El Paso and Pacific Railroad, and to the Southern Transcontinental Railroad, were the results of efforts

made by the people of the counties of Bowie, Red River, Lamar, Fannin, Grayson, Cooke and Dent to secure this great East and West Railroad.

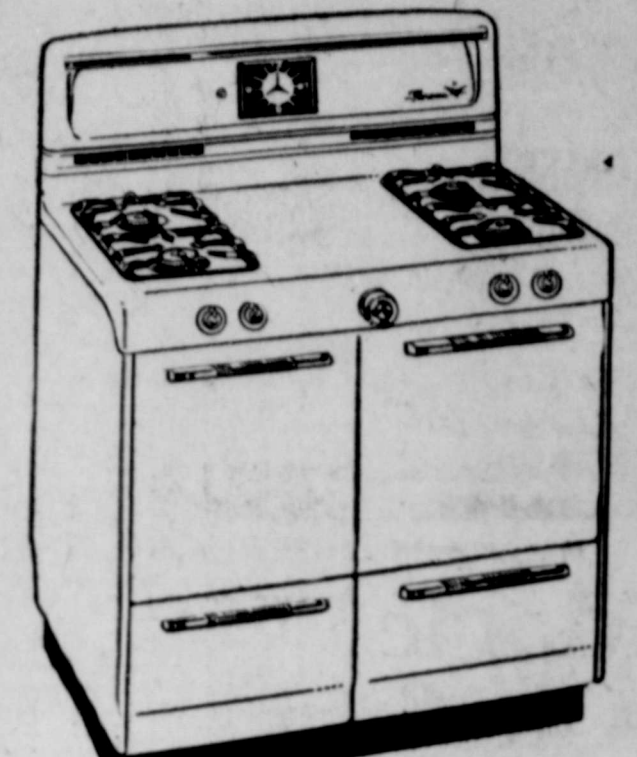

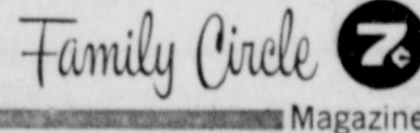
