

County Superintendent Pop Garrett made that point in Austin a short time ago when a group of Ranger and Eastland citizens appeared before the State Highway Board in the interest of getting the strip of road paved from Cedar Crossing to Lake Leon Dam, so it could be traveled in all weath-

Pop Garrett told members of the State Highway Department then and there that Olden stood the possibility of losing their school on account of it, and Pop's argument made a bigger hit with the Highway Board than anything else said all day. The Highway Board knows what a lick it is for a community to lose its school.

The State Highway Pepartment could fix the road, all right, if it were designated as a System, instead of a plain coun-ty road as it is now. But it takes the Eastland County Commissioners Court to give the pro-ject priority before the State will touch it That is something the County Commissioners have no intention of doing right now saying the State Highway funds (Continued On Page Six.)







250,000 tree seedlings will be available to Central and West Texas landowners for windbreak plantings in early 1958, Don Young, head, Forest Management Department of the Texas Forest

Service announced today.

"Landowners in critical areas should establish farmstead or field windbreaks to prevent wind eros-ica of their valuable topsoil,"

Austrian pine, ponderosa pine, Chinese elm, and red cedar will be evailable for the 1958 winter planting season. These seedlings, procured from the Oklahoma State Nursery at Norman and Boyd's Nursery at McMinnville, nessee, will be sold for \$3.00 per lundred. This price includes the cost of shipment to landowners.

Application blanks for ordering the seedlings can be procured from county agents and Soil Conserva-tion District offices in the Central and West Texas area. In addition order forms are available, upon request, from the Director, Texas Forest Service, College Station.
