

According to the information received by the County Agent the method of getting the prisoners after the contract has been completed is just the same as it has been in the past, and the working conditions of the prisoners are the same. After the officials at the camp receive the application of a farmer for labor, they will notify him and he can go to the camp and sign the contract. After the contract is signed the farmer or employer of the war prison labor must call the camp by eleven o'clock the day before he wants
