Teen Town Closed Thursday

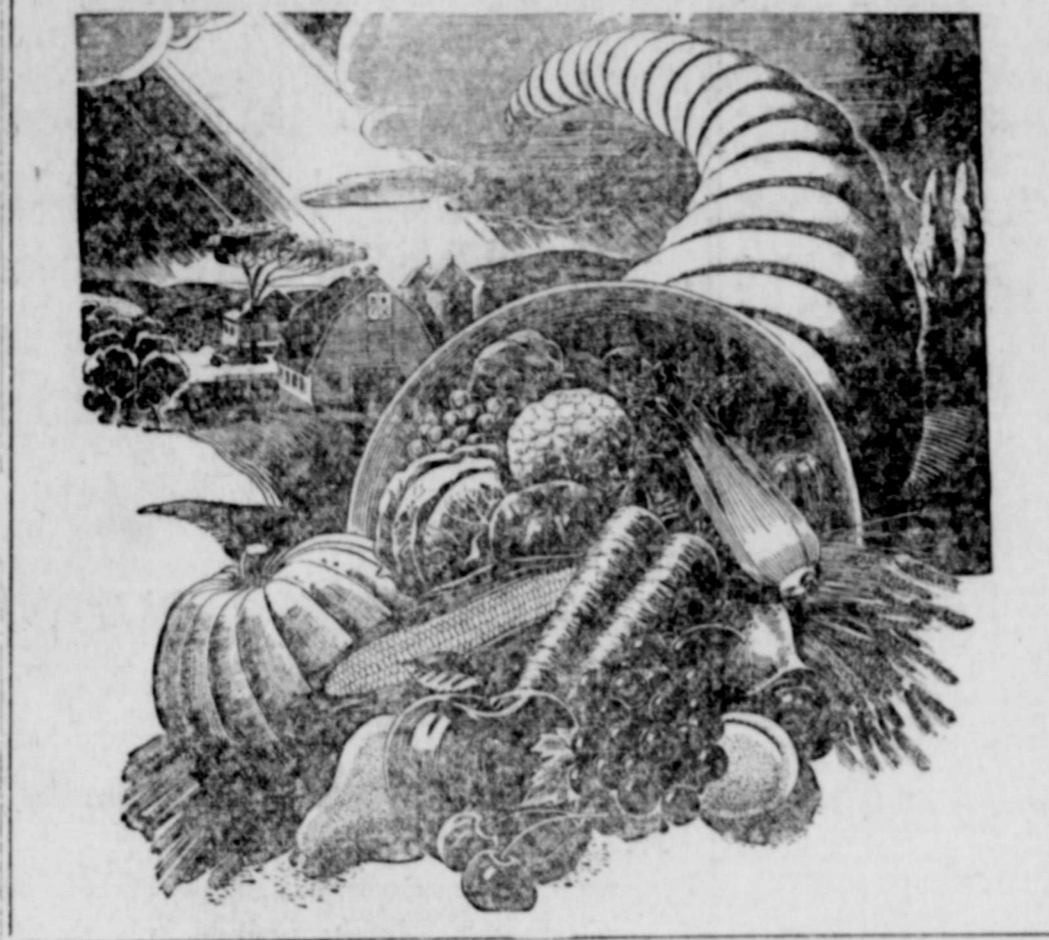
Homer Perry announced today that Teen Town would be closed Thursday so that as many students as possible could attend the Ranger-McCamey Football game Thursday afternoon.

Early Methodist Church History In Area Traced

(Editor's Note: This is the 47th in a series of articles taken from the book, "History of Eastland County, Texas," written by Mrs. George Langston in 1905.)

The Methodist Church in the county, of which there is anything known, was in the Allen neighborhood and was effected by Rev. William Monk, a pioneer preacher, who attended his first Texas Annual Conference at Tyler in 1854. In 1865 Mr. Monk was on the Palo Pinto Mission, which included Eastland County. With a few members he organized a Methodist church on the Allen and Davidson ranch. The members were Peter Davidson, wife and four children, Robert Newberry and Uncle Bobbie Martin, with their families.

Mr. Monk writes: "In 1872 I was presiding elder on the Stephenville District. In 1873 I attended a Quarterly Conference at McCough's Springs. Rev. Levi F. Collins was the missionary and had organized a little church there, which I suppose was the second organization in the county. The county was infested by Indians. We all went to church with our guns, not knowing what moment we would be attacked. Two nights before I went to McCough Springs the Indians stole my horse at Picketville in Stephens County. I made my way down there on borrowed horses, and from there to Comanche I went on a wagon, where I secured another horse."

The following letter is self-explanatory and will be interesting to many old settlers:

"Treffell, Texas, October 13, 1903 -- Dear Sister Langston: You want to know what territory was included in the Palo Pinto Mission when I was pastor in 1865 and 1866. It included all of Palo Pinto County, all of Erath east of Stephenville and all of Johnson west of the Brazos River. Hood County was not organized then. I also had two appointments in Parker County, Big Valley, where your father then lived, and Kickapoo. I made the round and my work every four weeks, preaching under trees, in private houses, under brush, arbors and in little school houses. Our congregations would be from 20 to 100 people. We had some great revivals. I organized the first church at Big Valley and held a great meeting. When I traveled the Stephenville District in 1872, '73 and '74, it included all the territory west of the Brazos River, from Waco to Fort Belknap, Fort Griffin, San Angelo, Camp Colorado and Fort Mason. These were the outposts of the district. I made the round every three months on horseback, with my Winchester rifle hanging on the horn of my saddle, and my saddle in a pair of saddle bags. These were the happiest years of my life. I believe all the preachers that were associated with me then have passed away, except Levi Collins and Brother Smith of Stephenville. If I could see you I could tell you many things of interest, but can write but little."

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Locals Have Heard Same Song 4 Times

Ranger's Bulldogs headed west for McCamey today—a firm 13 point underdog.

That's nothing new for the charges of Coach Harold Barrett. His team was supposed to finish down in District 7-A. Instead, of first, and the Bulldogs certainly were not supposed to get by mighty Hamilton in bi-district play. But get by the Dogs did, in convincing fashion, in fact.

McCamey is undefeated and untied. They have a 13-game winning streak going, dating back from 1956.

The two teams have met twice before in the state playoffs, and the Bulldogs have twice slapped down the McCamey eleven. Ranger won the championship of Class A in 1953 after downing McCamey and the Dogs dropped out in the quarterfinals in 1955 after taking the Bulldogs.

Robert Veale, the Bulldog's biggest man at 195 pounds, will be out of the game. Veale received a knee injury in the Hamilton game and is on crutches. In his place will be David Russell, who has earned the respect of his fellow teammates with his hard play. McCamey boasts a backfield fast as greased lightning. The starting foursome are tabbed the "Four Terrors" out McCamey way. The Badgers, usually a strong defensive club, have come up with a high scoring eleven. This year, they haven't been held below four touchdowns per game except once this year, and they won that one 14-0.

The Bulldogs drew a bye in bi-district play, so they go into the game with a season record of 10 wins and no losses. McCamey opened against Comanche, winning 52-12. They beat Ector 35-14, Big Lake, 35-7; Sonora, 25-21; Wink, 56-24; Irma, 35-12; Crane, 28-12; Fort Stockton, 27-10; Seminole, 34-25, and Denver City, 50-27.

The backfield is fast and experts figure Ranger will have to outscore the Badgers to win. McCamey is hard to run against around end, where David Wharton loves to go, but the Ranger line is believed capable of handling them up the middle.

Johnny Nichols in the quarterback and does the passing. He has scored 78 points. Jerry Brown is top scorer and the fastest man in the backfield. He has made 121 points. Nelson Huffman, the strongman of the backfield, has 75 points to his credit and Mike Smith, another speed merchant, has made 36 points. Huffman has kicked 33 extra points.

Some 300 Ranger fans are expected to follow the Bulldogs to McCamey.

Traffic Control To Be Increased For Thanksgiving

"Increased traffic control will be put into effect over the Thanksgiving weekend," Capt. G. L. Monahan of the Department of Public Safety, said today.

Additional patrolmen will be placed on traffic duty as men from the Licenses and Weight and Motor Vehicle Inspection functions will join the Highway Patrol function in patrolling the rural highways in an effort to reduce motor vehicle traffic accidents. More radar units will be pressed into use both night and day in an effort to control speed violations which continue to be the leading causative factor in rural fatal and injury accidents.

Patrolmen will be on the alert for speed violations, drinking drivers, and other moving hazardous violations that contribute to the ever mounting traffic toll that is increasing daily on our streets and highways.

Amputees Will Play Cage Game In Ranger

The Fort Worth Amputees will return to Ranger Saturday, Dec. 7 to play a local team again. This time the game will be basketball.

The amputee team, headed by Barney Capshaw, agreed to play the game with all proceeds going to Teen Town. Mrs. Dave Pickrell, president of the Teen Town Mothers Club, announced.

Capshaw, in town to plan the game, said the object of the Fort Worth Amputees is to help convince employees and amputees that they are not useless to mankind. The club was organized in 1950 by Capshaw and 13 other charter members. Today there are 60 members in the club.

Capshaw himself is a former semi-pro baseball player. He conceived the idea of amputees playing ball in 1950 while watching a game. Prior to 1950 the handicapped were considered useless, he said, but since that time 2000 handicapped persons have been employed.

In 1957 the club played 28 baseball games, winning all but five. Last year they played 52 basketball games against stiff competition and won 80 percent of them. "We don't plan to lose to Ranger," Capshaw, who works as a fireman for the T&P Railway, said. The Amputees split a doubleheader here last year against Little League days. Proceeds from those two baseball games went to the Little League.

Mrs. Joe Nusselle announced that players on the Ranger team would be named in the next issue of The Times.

Quail Hunters Are Told Crop Is Really Good

Eastland County quail hunters will find the best crop of birds in years when the season opens in Texas Dec. 1, according to the Director of Law Enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission. He says reports from wardens throughout the state indicate not only a heavy hatch, but an unusually large survival.

This applies to practically every section of the state. There was an ample food crop during the summer and fall months, affording plenty of seed for the birds.

More than 28,000 bobwhites and 8,500 cottontail quail were released by the State Hatchery at Tyler this year, through clubs in different parts of the state. These, with the heavy hatch of native birds, are responsible for the big crop.

The bag limit is 12 in one day or not more than 36 in one week or in possession.

Christmas Lights To Go On Thursday

Mark down Saturday, Nov. 30 on your calendar. That's when Santa Claus will pay his pre-Christmas visit to downtown Ranger!

Santa will ride a fire truck up Main Street to the O. K. Grocery and then return to City Hall where he will distribute bags of candy to the little tots.

Christmas lights will be turned on Thanksgiving night here for the first time and a 13-foot high Santa Claus will be featured at the intersection of Main and Commerce. The giant Santa will be easily visible from Highway 80.

Beautiful garlands across the streets, mingled with vari-colored lights will again present a festive holiday appearance. The decorations will be on when fans and the football team return from McCamey.

Rip Galloway, Chamber of Commerce manager, said Wednesday that almost all of the vacant shop windows have displays in them now. Merchants not located on Main Street have made good use of the display space, he stated.

He said a few vacant windows are still available that had been spoken for but not decorated. Anyone interested can get information by phoning 31.

Postmaster Gives Friendly Tips to Aid Holiday Rush

The local post office hopes to keep its good record on handling Christmas mails by getting everything processed and delivered well before Christmas Eve. Postmaster Ella White said this week.

She added that how well the mail moves will depend a great deal on the cooperation local people give in getting their packages and Christmas cards mailed during the next ten days.

"It's important in the small town as well as in the city to mail early during the Christmas season," the Postmaster said. "Most people appreciate the early arrival of a gift or card, and where there is a heavy concentration of mail early mailing could mean the difference in on-time and late delivery."

"And be sure to use the correct address," the postmaster added. "Wrap and address packages carefully. Take a little extra time and place the address inside the package just in case it should come unwrapped."

The address on all mail destined for the larger cities should include zone numbers to insure faster delivery.

The Postmaster also advocated the use of first class postage on Christmas cards. First class postage—a three-cent stamp—allows a written message to be included inside. There are other advantages, too. The Post Office considers first class mail as preferential mail which is entitled to the fastest handling. Also, a Christmas card with first class postage may be forwarded or returned to the sender.

"Incidentally," the Postmaster concluded, "it is socially correct to place your return address on the envelope bearing a Christmas card."

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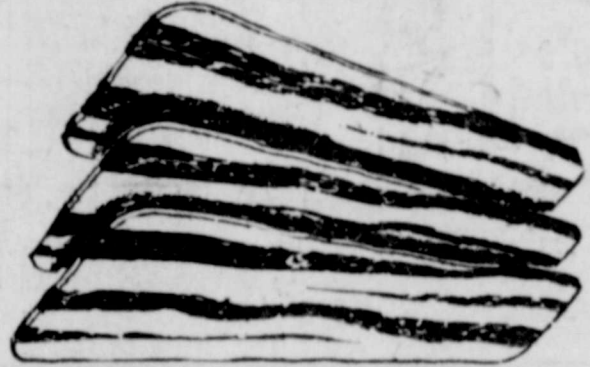

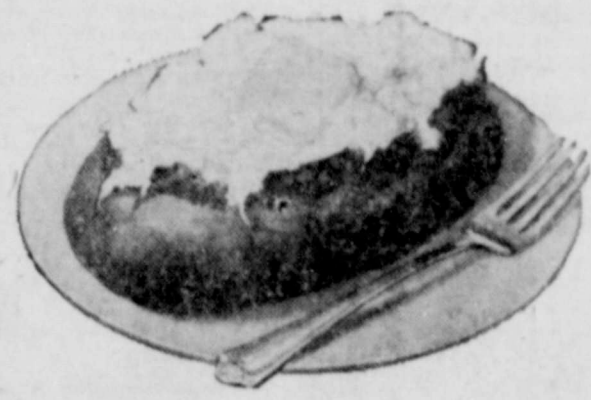

1/2 teaspoon almond extract
1 can (29 ounces) fruit cocktail, thoroughly drained
1 baked 9-inch pie shell

Mix gelatine, sugar and salt. Gradually stir in eggnog. Warm over direct low heat until gelatine is dissolved. Chill until mixture mounds when dropped from spoon. Fold in whipped cream, flavorings, 1 1/2 cups drained fruit cocktail. Chill again until mixture mounds. Heap into baked pie shell. Decorate with remaining fruit cocktail. Chill 2 to 4 hours. YIELD: 1 9-inch pie.
