The Bulldogs landed four players on the first team, three on the second, and two on the honorable mention list. Thus Ranger, picked to end in the cellar of District 7-AA, not only won the district and bi-district titles, but dominated the all-district squad. Wolford and Wharton were two of four players unanimously selected.

# Dogs Fight to Last But Bow to Badgers

Ranger's Bulldogs filled the sky above McCamey Stadium Thursday before bowing to the best team ever to come from that city, 28-13. The Bulldogs thus dropped out of the state Class-AA playoffs

and McCamey fans went away convinced that the third time, indeed, is a charm. The Bulldogs, upset district and bi-district champions, used determination and guts to hold the

Badgers to a mere 14-13 lead going into the final period. But too much reserve power and speed spelled the end of a great season for the Bulldogs in the final stanza.

It was the first time a McCamey team had ever whipped the Dogs, and to McCamey fans it was the greatest day in the school's history. Ranger previously knocked out two good McCamey teams in the state playoffs, once in 1953 and again in 1955.

But this Thanksgiving Day it was a different story. The Badgers keyed All-District Fullback David Wharton all day, limiting him to a mere 29 yards in 12 carries. The Badgers were watching Wharton so close that everything he checked out of the game a McCamey lad ushered him to the bench.

The passing of Quarterback Lee King couldn't be controlled by the West Texans, however. King threw for 179 yards, completing 12 of 18 passes.

The game started out as though it would be a defense against offense, but things got warmed up quickly offensively. The Bulldogs couldn't move the ball the first time they got it, but Charles Wolford booted to the McCamey 25. The Badgers drove to the 40 then spectator Mike Smith was shaken loose from the hall at that point and David Russell came up with it for Ranger. The Dogs drove to the 31 and needed another yard on fourth down for a first. Lee King tried to sneak it across, but a measurement showed the ball was a yard short and it went over on downs.

The teams fought back and forth in the first quarter, but neither could manage to score. Late in the period the Badgers opened a drive that led to pay- (Continued on Page Four)

# Building Big Problem of Churches In Early Years

(Editor's Note: This is the 47th in a series of articles taken from the book, "History of Eastland County, Texas" written by Mrs. George Langston in 1904.)

## Rising Star Church

This Church first belonged to the Pecan Circuit and was served by L. S. Chamberlain in 1877. In 1879 this same preacher was returned to the work and then organized the class of Rising Star with eight members, James Irby, Fannie J. Irby, Andrew Agnew, N. S. Agnew, J. P. Agnew, Sarah Agnew, Dennis Bond and Sarah Tammehill. Out of the eighth members only James Irby and wife remain with the church today. It was at a slight appointment this organization was made in a little 10x12 log school house with a dirt floor and was the first church organized in this part of the county.

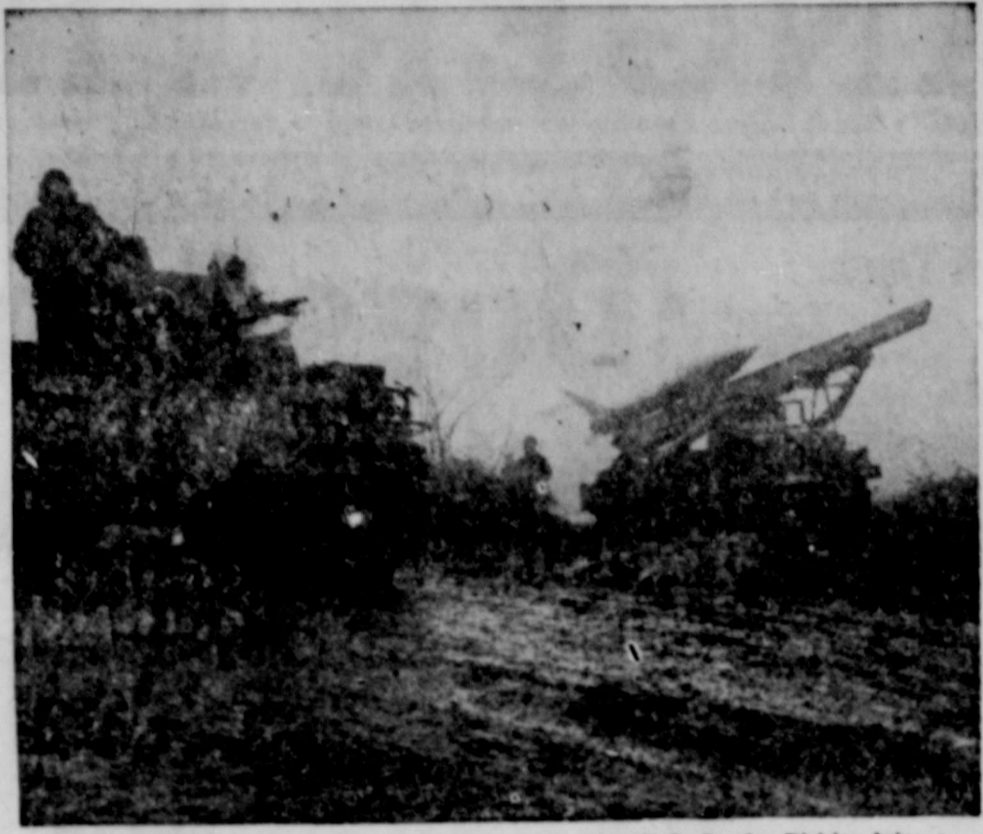

## Bond Sales In County In Oct. Total \$42,794

Nathan Adams, State Chairman and Ed Gossett, State Co-Chairman for the U. S. Savings Bonds Committee for Texas announced today that \$14,236,015 in Series "E" and "H" Savings were purchased during October in Texas.

"The total amount of these Savings Bonds purchased during the ten month period is \$141,725,997," said Gossett. "In order to reach the state's goal for the year, \$51,374,003 in Savings Bonds must be purchased during November and December. We feel confident that Texas will make the 1957 goal, for Christmas shopping traditionally begins the day after Thanksgiving and numerous bonds will be purchased for gifts. We are ready for these Christmas Gift Shoppers this year with a new, streamlined, if not jet-propelled Series "E" Savings Bond, and a new gift envelope to fit its smaller size.

The envelope bears the label that is now traditional for Savings Bonds: "The Gift that Keeps on Giving." On the reverse side is a space for an inscription: "To—From—" and the slogan: "A Gift Today for a Bright Tomorrow." These new envelopes may be secured from local banks at the time the Gift Bonds are purchased," he added.

Bond sales in Eastland County amounted to \$42,794 for the ten month period. This is 70.6 percent of the 1957 goal according to Guy Parker, chairman of Eastland County. Parker, pointed out that Savings Bonds are equally suitable and welcome as gifts for any occasion, from the birth of a child through successive birthdays, graduation and wedding anniversaries, as well as for Christmas and year-end bonuses, incentive and performance awards—"Anything that calls for a 'Present With a Future'," Parker advised.

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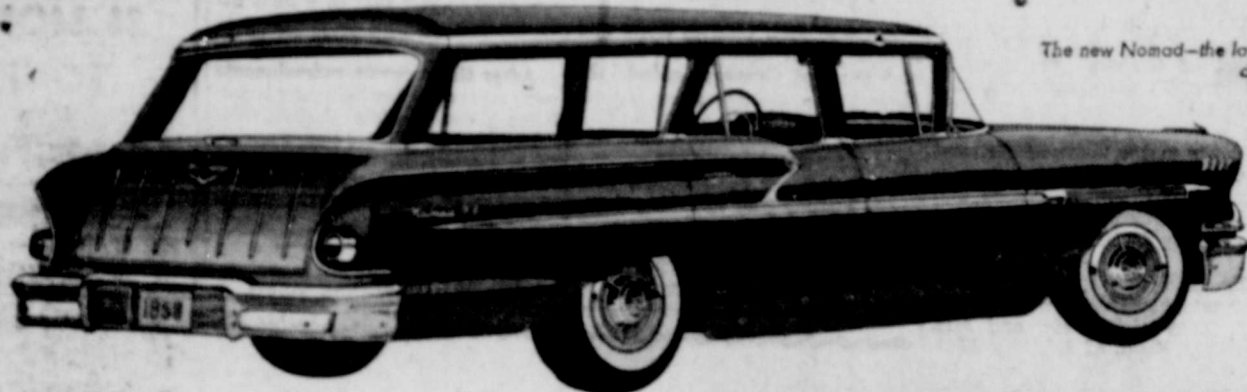
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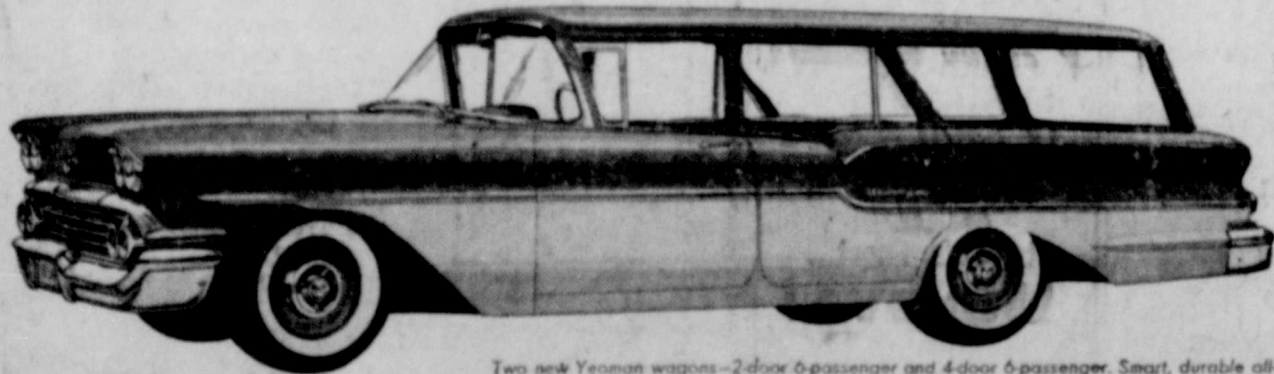
