Baptist Church Growth In County Is Recorded

(Editor's Note: This is the 49th in a series of articles taken from the book, "History of Eastland County, Texas," written by Mrs. George Langston in 1904.)

The Baptist Church this church organization might

be truthfully compared to a mighty oak, whose roots dig down deep through the soil, drink in the moisture and draw up the food for the branches and leaves, and forage for the minerals that help color the foliage and make it a thing of joy and beauty, as well as a protection from the sun's fierce rays and the storm's beating rain. Nor is this all, it affords the songsters of the forest a sheltering place for their young.

As this mighty oak has grown from a tiny acorn and is now able to withstand the terrible wrenchings of storm and tornado, so the Baptist Churches have grown in Eastland County.

Away back many years ago—Mr. McGough does not remember the date—under a brush arbor, the Rev. W. H. Brashears organized the first Baptist Church in Eastland with seven members, C. Brashears, J. R. Higgins, Enoch Dawson, Amanda Dawson, W. C. McGough and wife and the preacher. This was known as Providence Baptist Church, and was one of four in the county when the Rev. C. G. Stevens of sainted memory projected and accomplished the organization of that wonderful body known as the Red Gay Baptist Association, which not only included the churches in this county, but finally embraced all the territory to El Paso and New Mexico.

The Fifth Annual Eastland County Pecan Show, which gets underway in Cisco Friday, promises to be the best show ever held in this area, County Agent J. M. Cooper said today as final arrangements for the show were completed.

Cooper said more entries are expected this year than ever before. The Eastland County Pecan Growers Association and the Cisco Chamber of Commerce are co-sponsors of the show.

A quart of nuts will constitute an entry, according to Oscar Schaefer of Cook, president of the Pecan Growers. Growers may show one entry each of their papershell or improved nuts and as many of the seedling pecans as they wish. Growers in adjoining counties are also eligible and are encouraged to put their nuts in the show. Schaefer explained, Brown, Stephens, Erath and Callahan County growers have exhibited nuts at the shows in the past.

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Indian Grass Produces Best Seed Crop; Some Harvested

The old saying that "The eye of the master fattens his stock" is as true on the range as it is in the feed lot. Constant vigilance and attention is the key to both range and livestock management. Periodic forage checks are an essential operation for best range management.

Several definite improvement trends show up in examining pastures in this area, although range recovery is usually a slow process. We actually can not expect recovery to be indicated in one year by the remnants of short grass (and on much of our badly deteriorated rangeland a year ago. On these over-abused pastures relief from prolonged drought along with relief from grazing pressure brought about a tremendous weed growth. In that weeds furnish round cover this is a very desirable thing a big improvement trend. Weeds are the first stage of recovery on deteriorated ranges.

Range land which had more grass cover and better grass species a year ago shows fewer weeds. The grass itself gained in vigor and ground cover last spring and suppressed weed growth after relief from drought and grazing pressure. Forage production was abundant, although few new seedlings of the better species were produced.

Some grass seed, has been produced on some ranges. Side oats grama seed stalks have been very abundant although actual seed fill

has apparently been poor on all ranges examined, more stem seed stalks were less abundant but have showed better fill. Indian grass produced the best seed crop of any. In fact about 1200 pounds of Indian seed was actually harvested on two farms. Pete Hatcock combined a nice lot of seed for N. E. Richardson on the J. H. Littleton farm four miles north-east of Eastland. Joe Barnett combined a good lot of seed for Clint McCain from a planting four miles south of Carbon. This planting was made by McCain in 1950 and is the first seed produced by the planting.

Our sustained grass production depends on how we manage our ranges after this year's gains. Grass has several uses. Part may be harvested, part should be left on the range, and part should be returned to the soil for maintaining soil condition. Neither the greatest total pounds of beef or the greatest number of animals will show the largest profit over a period of time. Only proper stocking inevitably shows the most profit and is the most practical way of keeping soil and grass in best condition. When range is properly stocked animals can eat their fill every day in all seasons. Under such conditions cattle use about 70 percent of the nutrients obtained for maintenance of bodily functions and the remaining 30 percent for growth and reproduction. Where a range is being overused the animal still uses about

the same for maintenance and much less will be left for growth and reproduction. When cattle can always get their fill the mature beef cow will weigh over 1000 pounds and will produce over a 90 percent calf crop, with calves (Continued on Page Eight)
