Banquet Speaker One of Top Line Coaches In State

One of the state's best line coaches will speak at this year's Ranger Lions Club Athletic Banquet Friday. He is Allie White, White of Texas Christian University.

A former standout as a TCU tackle, White just completed his eighth season as varsity line coach.

He was a starter on the great 1938 club and his line coach, Mike Brumbelew, said: "Here's a guy who could make any one's ball club." White earned three letters at TCU.

Before coming to Texas Christian, he coached at San Benito, Fort Worth, North Side, Lehigh University and Texas Tech. During World War II he served in the Navy.

White is regarded by TCU head coach Abe Martin as a "fine teacher of overall line play." He is also a much sought after speaker.

The TCU coach will bring a film of one of this year's games with him to Ranger. Three well known ex-Ranger stars will also be on hand for the banquet. They are Charles Masegosa, Hardin-Simmons University standout back; Junior Arterburn, assistant coach at Texas Tech and a former Ranger High and Ranger College star; and Chico Mendoza, TCU end.

Tickets for the banquet, which honors both players of Ranger High and Ranger College, are now on sale at almost every store in Ranger and by all members of the Lions Club.

As in the past four trophies will be awarded at the banquet. The most valuable high school player and the most valuable college player will be awarded trophies, as will the most valuable non-letterman from each squad.

Tickets cost \$2. That amount will help pay for not only the individual meal but for one of the players being honored.

The banquet will be held at 7 p.m. at the Guard armory.

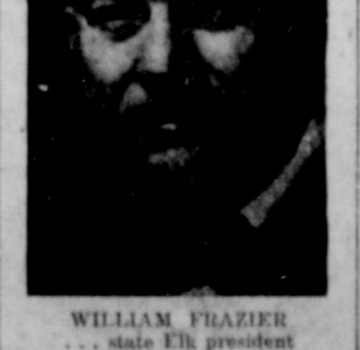

"The passing of Norman Wright may be likened to a broken column, indicating the unfinished life. Or a broken reed, or the grass of the field that is cut down and cast out. Life is always an uncertain thing, and must be lived with regard to service and sacrifice for others. Norman Wright lived for Ranger and to make this a better city in which to live and a finer place in which to rear our children."

"Alexander the Great cried at 33 because there were no worlds to conquer. Yet death came to him at this age," Perkins said.

"Christ Jesus, the Son of God, went to the Cross of Calvary at the age of 33, dying for lost mankind, and giving the world—the only plan worth while for a better way of life."

"Norman Wright at the height of his career, age 49, was giving himself without reserve for the progressive movement of our city. Realizing that there were worlds to conquer and that those new worlds might have the fullness of Christian principals, he was willing to give his last ounce of devotion to the cause of his Master, and his community," Perkins concluded. Reference was made to the numerous letters of sympathy and condolence.

The club paused for a moment of silent prayer and were dismissed by Lion Perkins in a prayer of dedication.

Many Churches Organized In Late 1880's In This Area

(Editor's Note: This is the 51st in a series of articles taken from the book, "History of Eastland County, Texas," written by Mrs. George Langston in 1904.)

Other Churches

The Rising Star Cumberland Presbyterian Church was organized by Rev. D. A. Knox in July, 1885, with fourteen members.

Conspicuous in the early history of the church appear the names of L. M. Marshall, J. T. Winfield, H. W. Younce, Maxwell brothers and Uncle George and Mily Wood. Services were held in the public school building and in the Methodist Church until 1892, when a house which is well situated in the northern part of town, was built. A comfortable manse is situated on the adjoining lots.

The church is well officered by a board of six elders and one deacon, and has a Sabbath school under the efficient management of Prof. G. C. Barnes. The contributions for the different enterprises for the year 1903 exceeded all amounts for previous years to gether. No public collections are taken.

The present pastor is Rev. Z. T. Clinton. Perfect harmony prevail and it is hoped that this body may occupy its place as a presiding factor in the spiritual uplift of Rising Star and the surrounding country.

The Salmons Cumberland Presbyterian Church was organized in 1886 by the Rev. D. A. Knox. For several years the congregation was held in the school house, holding its services under a bush arbor in the summer of 1896 a house was built, an expense that has been paid for by the members, which are 250 members.

C. C. Bellamy is the present pastor. Messrs. W. A. Frazier, R. P. Smith, and J. S. Frazier are members. Mr. D. D. Dyer and J. R. Hodo are deacons.

Church

This congregation was organized in 1889 with ten members as the result of a revival meeting conducted by the Rev. W. E. Green.

As a church organization would not be allowed to occupy the school house, Messrs. S. A. Fleming (Cumberland), Sam Webb (Episcopist) and W. T. Boyd (Methodist) met and decided to build a union house for these denominations. This was done. Several revivals have been held, these denominations always co-operating.

The Cumberland Presbyterian Church now has about forty members. Messrs. B. L. Marshall, Lewis Marshall, G. R. Kelley, S. A. Fleming and John D. Walker are the present elders, with Rev. C. C. Bullock as pastor.

The Ranger Cumberland Presbyterian Church

Rev. J. A. Williams, pastor, is in a thriving condition, with a fine Sunday School and an active Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. The organization has its own church building.

In Cisco the Presbyterians have an excellent church building well furnished. The Disciples of Christ have several organizations and church buildings in the County. Rev. McKnight is the pastor of the Cisco congregation. R. C. Maddox is pastor of the congregation at Rising Star.

Mrs. M. C. Hunter is pastor of the Holiness Church at Rising Star.

\$188,374 Cash Prizes Offered In Stock Show

Cash awards totaling \$188,374 will be offered during the 1958 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth Jan. 24 through Feb. 2. The seven breeds of beef breeding cattle are allotted a large share, \$45,180, of the premium total. Prizes for the breeds are: Herefords, \$13,500; Filled Herefords, \$5,000; Shorthorns, \$6,000; Aberdeen-Angus, \$10,000; Brahms, \$2,000; Santa Gertrudis, \$1,000, and Brangus, \$2,000. There is also the bull carload-pen division with \$5,580 in cash awards. Premiums in the Junior show total \$11,919, which includes \$3,761 for steers; \$2,880 for heifers; \$2,000, dairy calves; \$1,128, lambs, and \$2,150, swine. Open show steers will compete for \$4,180; open dairy cattle, \$7,435; poultry, pigeons and rabbits, \$2,000; sheep, \$5,875, and swine \$8,950. Awards in the judging contests amount to \$1,500. Entry fees and horse show premiums probably will come to an estimated \$37,185. The Southwestern exposition horse show ranks among the foremost in the nation and, as in the past, will offer both show and Western type horses. The open cutting horse contest will be presented at each of the 19 rodeo and horse show performances, as will the Ranch Girls barrel race. The rest of the \$188,374 figure will be awarded to rodeo contestants. The rodeo contenders will be trying for an estimated \$63,950, which includes entry fees. First performance of the rodeo and horse show will be Friday night, Jan. 24. Deadline for cattle, sheep and swine entries in the livestock judging is Dec. 15. Horses may be entered until Jan. 1. Premium lists and entry blanks may be obtained by writing the stock show at P. O. Box 150, Fort Worth 1, Texas.

HOME MAKERS Views and News

Though washable garments, such as slips, blouses, shirts, in the new synthetic fibers are tops in ease of care and length of wear, they sometimes tend to cling to the body in cold, dry weather.

Fatigue, too much food or not the right kind, tension and excitement, all are factors in lowering body resistance to the common cold. The holiday season ahead will be happier if you plan now to help your family guard against this health hazard.

Food makes a difference. Start family members with a good wholesome breakfast every day. Follow through with simple balanced meals at noon and at night. Fat at regular times as much as possible. Reserve the sweet or rich foods for mealtime dessert. Keep in-between meal refreshment snacks light and nutritious. Fruits, fruit juices, crisp, colorful vegetables served with special dips can be just as tasty as rich, heavy foods. Tension and fatigue may be hard to control when the holiday rush season starts. But proper food before and during the busy season will help keep resistance up.

Proper care can keep white nylons looking bright throughout their lifetime. Wash white nylons separately. Colored articles included with white garments are likely to fade and discolor the white.

Wash nylon garments thoroughly after each wearing. Home furnishings articles, too, should be laundered as often as necessary to maintain a pleasing appearance. Pretreat heavily soiled areas with a paste of water and heavy-duty detergent before placing in the machine or hand-washing. Machine washing, whenever possible, is the most effective way to launder white nylon. After pretreatment, wash in warm water, using a heavy-duty detergent, a non-precipitating type water softener, and a liquid sodium hypochlorite bleach. Nylon brighteners such as "Pro-Nyl" or "Nylonu", available for consumer use, will help maintain the whiteness level of nylon garments when used repeatedly.

Scientific research, which developed these fibers, has come up with an effective, easy way of combating this tendency—just add a small amount of liquid detergent, fabric softener, or a special liquid anti-static agent to the final rinse water. Liquid detergents and fabric softeners—often marketed as "laundry rinses"—can be purchased at most grocery stores. Liquid anti-static agents can be obtained at notion counters in drug or department stores.

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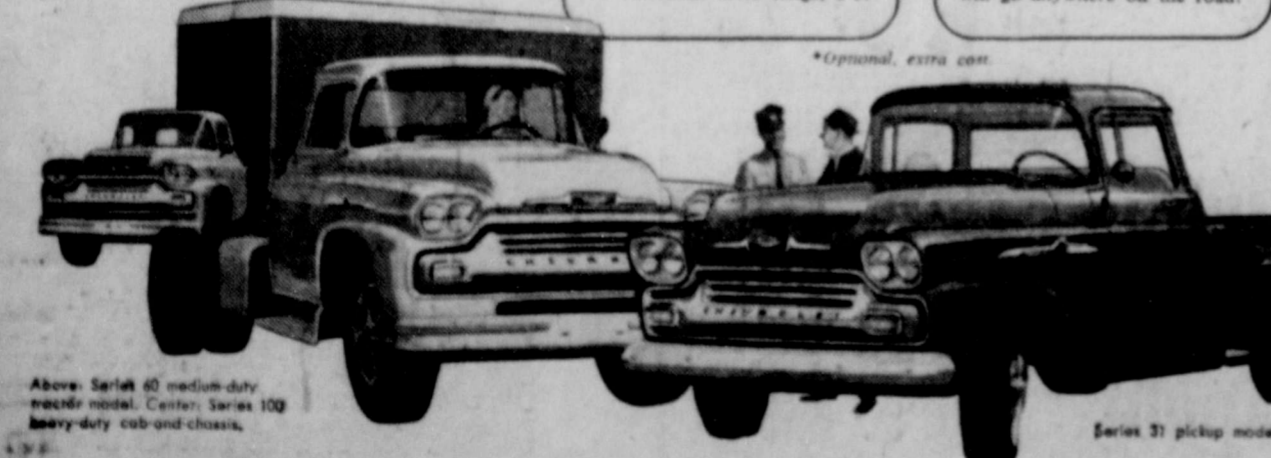
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
