



However, when a person deliberately commits sin (as for-saking the assembling of t h e saints) knowing he is doing wrong, his heart must not be right. Therefore, that individual needs to repent and pray to God, also asking thers to pray with and for him. The Bible so teaches in Acts 8:21-24. A public sin demands a public confession before the church. If the church practiced discipline as taught in the New Testament, there would be less trouble with ischievous church members.'
