Ever panic at the thought of all the children and relations home for Christmas dinner? Advance planning preparation will set you free to enjoy your guests on Christmas day. A detailed written plan, thought out carefully ahead of time, will allow time to visit and manage the constant interruptions while making final preparations for dinner.
Begin with the menu. Check it for interesting color, appetive appeal, texture variety, harmonious flavor, ease of service, and possibility for advance preparation.

Now think through the steps necessary for preparing the dinner. Write out a work plan or schedule as you plan. Include the grocery order time for shopping, table decorations and arrangement, equipment needed for cooking and baking, and surface units and oven space needed for preparation. Consider refrigerator space needed. If there are several babies visiting, refrigeration for individual bottles may be necessary. Schedule time for working on foods which can be prepared ahead of time. List foods and details that must wait until the last minute. A good plan will keep last minute preparation to a minimum. It will help you "come out even" at mealtime.

That is, all foods will have had the proper time to turn out in perfect condition at the right time. If it's a family affair, let your guests help with the final preparation and serving of the meal as well as with the dishes. They will feel more at home and a part of the celebration if they have contributed in some way.

Have you started making all those delicious Christmas candies? Extension specialists say candy thermometers are the best guides for testing a candy mixture.

Before you begin, make sure your thermometer is accurate. You can check it quickly by placing it in boiling water. To get a correct reading, make sure the thermometer does not touch any part of the pan, and that the bulb is completely covered with the candy mixture. Read the temperature at eye-level—not from above or below.

You can use the cold water test as a cross-check. Drop a small portion of the candy mixture into a bowl of cold water and note the kind of ball formed. Fondants, when done, should form a small soft ball which flattens out when held on the tip of the thumb. A firm ball—the test for caramels—will hold its shape when lifted on the finger. For divinity and popcorn balls the syrup should form a hard ball which can be manipulated with the fingers. The soft crack stage for buttered candy or taffy means that threads are hard but not brittle. Hard crack threads will snap when tapped against the side of the bowl. Use a fresh bowl of cold water each time you make a test.

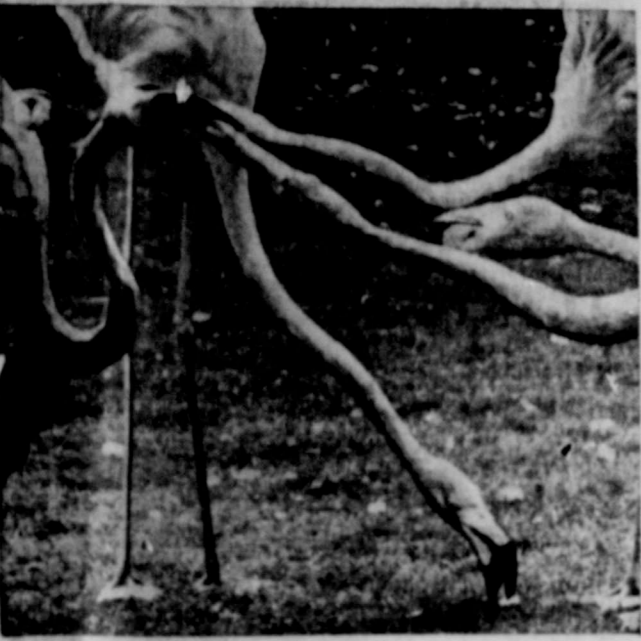

Gadgets Can Not Take Place of Mother as Planner

CHICAGO, Ill. — Young homemakers of tomorrow will live in a world of gadgets and convenience that defies today's imagination. But conveniences and gadgets never will take over mother's role as planner, comforter, nursemaid and companion to her family. That was the essence of the

talk by Adelaide Hawley (television's "Betty Crocker") to state and national winners of the 4-H Food Preparation Award Program sponsored by General Mills. The group gathered at the Conrad Hilton hotel in Chicago as a highlight of the 26th annual National 4-H Club Congress.

"In the increasingly complex world of the future which piles world responsibility on top of woman's traditional work," she said, "the 4-H pledge stands out as the key to homemaking success. It points out these really important needs:

"Every quarter grain of knowledge your head can absorb and keep on absorbing all the days of your life; A strong, healthy body to keep you going efficiently through all your activities; Hands trained to obey your brain, and a heart full of faith to sustain you at times when everything seems to fall apart. You will also need imagination to utilize your knowledge and intelligence to help you reach for what is best in life. A passing grade, the average, 'good enough to get by' is not good enough any more."

Taking "A Glimpse Into The Future," television's "Betty Crocker" told her audience about irradiated foods which have indefinite shelf life, push-button food preparation, solar cooking, a heating system and other household electronic marvels.

"Your kitchen might have a monitor television screen through which you can check on the baby or see who's at the front door. A vacuum cleaner will scurry by itself out of its corner and gobble up dust. You might have a serving cart that creeps in from the kitchen with dessert, then returns to the dishwasher bearing soiled dishes. Your clothes will be washed automatically every time the hamper collects an eight-pound load. And, we might even have dry cleaning stations like those minute car-wash places. Walk into a compartment and dirt is removed ultrasonically from your clothes—even from you! Room colors can be changed by flipping a button which controls illuminated wall panels. And there will be many, many more such innovations. You, for example, may be earning a living or contributing to family income by working for industries which today do not exist."

Sputniks shared the emphasis. They were described as "something we can be grateful for. Not only have they brought the exhilarating, expansive world of the space cadets closer, they have made us all think. Your whole world is going to be influenced by, threatened by and protected by science. It will be up to us to keep ahead of the gadgets and keep up with the economy which produced

them. "But no matter how many gadgets science produces, there never will be hot and cold running nursemaids. Someone will always have to bandage Junior's knee, and soothe his hurt feelings. Someone will have to plan good-tasting meals 365 days a year, buy the food and put it away in the dispensers so that when a button is pushed, something happens. Someone will still have to hear prayers and remember birthdays, discuss family affairs and finances with dad and play gracious hostess even when the feet hurt and the heart is aching. Someone will have to explain tolerance and brotherhood to little Susie. The somebody who does all these things with love and patience, nine times out of 10 will be you."

Cup of Tea Apparently Suits Americans to T

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

TODAY, more and more women are making hot tea their mealtime beverage.

The reasons vary, according to spot interviews with homemakers across the country. Some say tea as a mealtime beverage has gained in popularity in their homes since they've learned to make it the way their husbands like it best—strong and full-bodied.

Others say they serve tea with meals because it's light and refreshing—just right after a heavy meal.

Whatever the reason, we have it on sound authority that tea consumption has increased 24 per cent since 1949 in the United States. Our own belief is that one of the basic reasons for the increased popularity of tea at mealtime is the fact that more women are making tea according to the experts' Four Golden Rules: (1) always use a tea pot, (2) use fresh bubbling, boiling water, (3) use 1 teaspoonful tea or 1 tea bag per cup and (4) brew 3-5 minutes.

When planning your meal tonight, you might try this mild chicken curry, a most delightful main dish that goes so well with a good pot of tea.

Indian Chicken Curry - (6-8 servings)
Boil a 3 to 3 1/2-pound frying chicken, disjointed. Saute 1/2 cup

chopped onions, 3/4 cup chopped celery in 1/4 cup cooking oil until golden brown. Blend in 1/2 cup flour; gradually add 2 cups chicken broth and 1/2 cup tomato juice, stirring constantly until mixture is thickened and smooth.

Stir in salt and pepper to taste and 1 teaspoonful curry powder. Add cooked chicken and heat thoroughly. When ready to serve, pour over 4 cups hot cooked rice and garnish with 3/4 cup chutney, slightly heated.

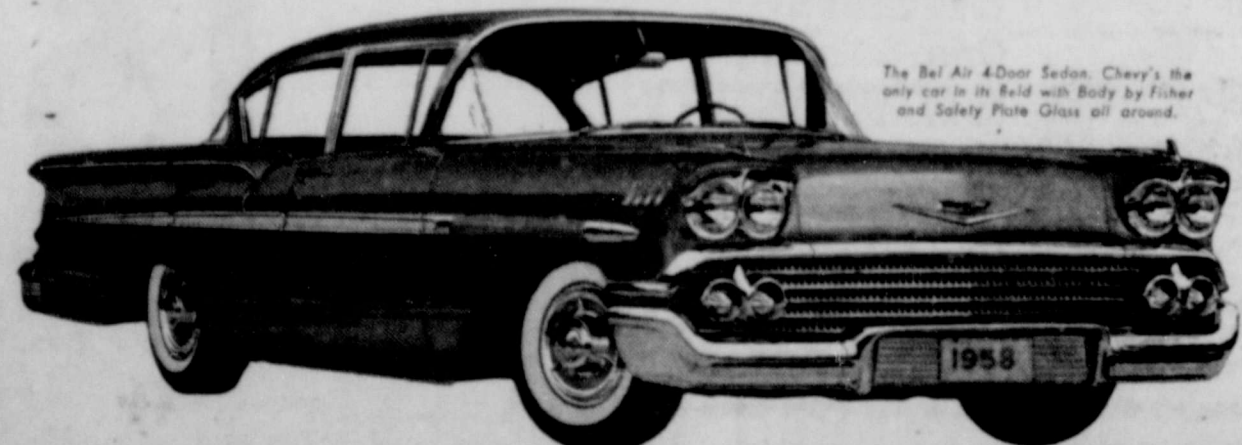

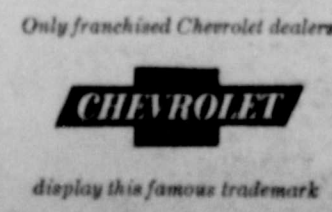

IT'S THE LAW
in Texas

There is no time like the present to start a procedure that will aid you with next year's income tax calculations. That is to maintain a record of your income and

ougo. Such a record can be simple and brief but it may save you tax dollars and many hours of work in filling out tax forms.

The average man who works for a wage or salary doesn't have to concern himself about keeping books and records—at least so he thinks. His employer keeps a reliable record of his earnings and Uncle Sam looks primarily to the employer for information on his earnings and for the withholding of various taxes out of his wages.

But whether or not you run a business of your own, you have a partner who each year is claiming a substantial interest in your per-

sonal income. And the law requires that you keep books for him in case he ever asks for an accounting.

Perhaps you own your home or are paying it out in installments. It's likely that some day you may sell that house. When you do you'll want to be able to prove whether you realized a gain or a loss on that sale. If a gain in capital resulted, it probably will add to your income tax. If a loss was suffered, it probably will reduce your income tax.

You may have made certain capital improvements on the house while you lived in it, but unless you can show what out-of-pocket expense you incurred while making them, you may not get credit for them in your cost basis so as to prove that you had no capital gain or that you had a loss.

Or perhaps you received that little summer cottage on the lake as a gift from your father. If you ever sell it, you should be able to show Uncle Sam not only the cost of improvements you made on it while you owned it, but also what its fair market value was at the time Dad gave it to you.

It may be that you are receiving an annuity on an insurance

policy. If so, do you know how much that policy costs you and how much of that cost you have recovered tax-free to date?

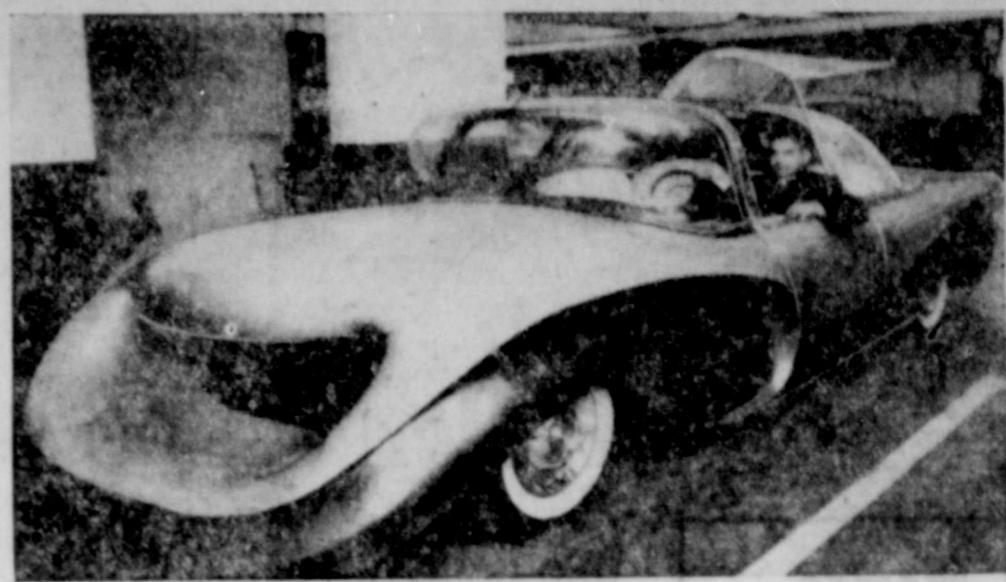
There are many kinds of transactions you enter into that may some day affect the computation of your personal income tax. The best proof of the cost of anything you've purchased is a receipted bill or canceled check. If one of these pieces of evidence relates to any transaction that may affect your income in later years, it's a good idea to keep it. Your "partner" may some day ask to see it.
