County Office Holders Face Election Year

Business is expected to get brisk at the Tax Assessor - Collector's office during the coming week. Eastland County citizens will be going after their poll tax slips since this is an "on year" as far as politics is concerned.

A handful of county, precinct and state offices will be filled by voters this year. Among the county officials to be elected are the county judge, county clerk, county treasurer and county attorney. Then voters will elect a district clerk, two county commissioners and a state representative.

So far none of the present office holders have announced that they will seek re-election, but a number are expected to. County Commissioner Ed McCandless of Cisco has definitely made it known he will not be a candidate, however.

John Hart of Cisco presently is county judge, Johnson Smith is county clerk, Richard Cox is county treasurer, Earl Conner is county attorney, Roy Lane is district clerk and Paul Brashear is state representative.

As in the past a poll tax slip costs \$1.75. Any person who will become 21 years of age after Jan. 1 or 30 days before an election is required to obtain an exemption certificate in order to be entitled to a free vote.

The Tax Collector's office has opened a poll tax sub-station at Cisco at the Chamber of Commerce office, and plans are to open other sub-stations at Ranger, Rising Star and Gorman.

The Rev. Father Mark Van Hemelryck has been appointed to replace Father Boesmans.

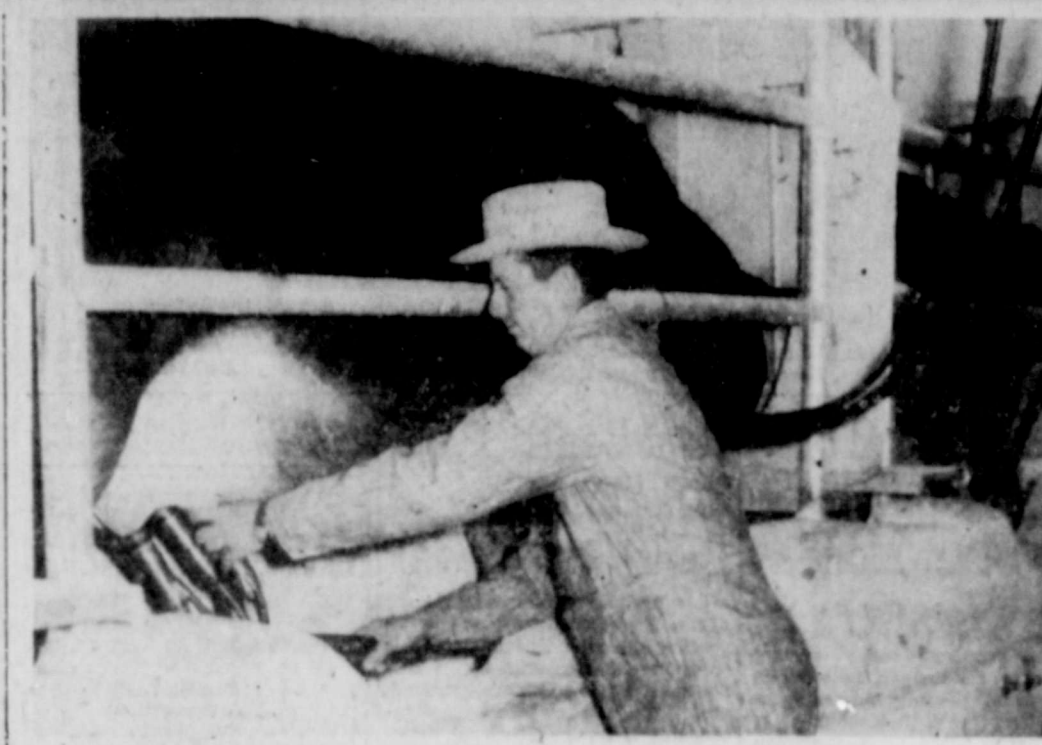
Chamber of Commerce Has Many Functions

Modernism: That's Richardson's Dairy

An Eastland County dairyman has joined the trend towards modernizing the dairy industry, and in so doing, he has recorded some remarkable results.

The results are not only time-saving but there is also an increase from the financial aspect of the thing.

Norman Richardson, who lives six miles west of Ranger on the Breckenridge highway, recently installed a De Laval Combine Milker, a completely mechanical milker, that enables him to milk and strain the milk and stand idly by watching.

It is a time-saving device besides being completely sanitary. The milk is taken from the cow and piped through stainless steel and glass tubing into a container that cools it to 34 degrees and keeps it that way until it is ready for transportation.

Richardson estimated that the old method, using electric milkers and putting the milk in the customary cans, took him four hours or more. With the De Laval Combine, he has cut the time in half.

Now, he may milk his 80 head

of cattle in two hours. This he does alone. With the old method, there were a couple of people helping him.

The combine, bought through Arterburn's Hardware & Furniture store in Ranger, has been in operation for about three months. Richardson says that it will soon pay for itself.

The dairy barn where the combine is located is divided into two rooms. One small room contains

two shoots that will each hold three cows for milking. He milks three cows at one time.

In the other room is the tank for holding the milk, the straining apparatus, and the sanitary equipment for cleaning the combine. It is cleaned just before each milking by Richardson, to insure safety.

The milk, from the time it leaves the tubes of the electric milker, is visible until it falls into the container. Once it reaches the container, in less than two minutes, it is cooled to a temperature of 34 degrees and remains there.

All of the tubing is overhead and visible by the eye. The tank can hold approximately 600 gallons of milk, or about two milkings from Richardson's herd. The milk is picked up about every two days and transported to the dairy.

The two shoots for the cows are divided into three sections each with a feed container separating each one. As the cows enter, the feed containers are pushed in dividing each shoot. Once the cow is milked, the containers are pulled back and the cow goes out the opposite end it entered.

It is estimated by Richardson that the dairy barn and the equipment cost approximately \$10,000 but he added that it was well worth it.

Born and raised in Eastland County, he has about 750 acres of pastureland for his cattle, 320 he owns himself. And he farms about 500 acres of land. He used most of the pasture land for beefers. Last year, he raised 10,000 bales of hay for his own use.

Richardson said that storing milk in cans will be out in a couple of years. Everyone will eventually change to the combine method or to similar methods to save a considerable amount of time.

Texas is a community property state. Wives who are native Texans clearly understand that they only own half of the homestead.

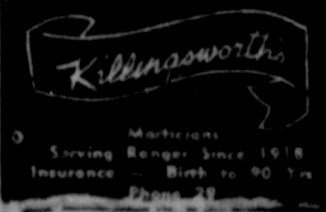
It comes as a distinct shock to some of our naturalized female Texans that she only gets half of what her husband made and even worse, her husband owns half of the salary she made all by herself.

A Tree Trimmer's Delight



A bacon and sweet potato bake is a real "filler-upper" for hungry tree trimmers who need to be fed. The flavors of the brown sugar cured Swift's Premium Bacon and the glazed sweet potatoes are delightful together.

Dainty appetizers or hearty sandwiches get a flavor boost with the addition of crisp bacon. The same is true of soups, sauces, and salads when bacon bits are sprinkled liberally on top.

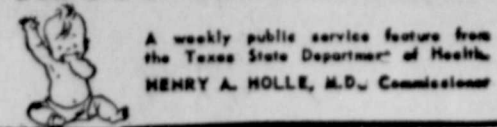

ABOUT YOUR HEALTH



A weekly public service feature from the Texas State Department of Health. HENRY A. HOLLE, M.D., Commissioner

Texas now has six stations operating in a gigantic, coast-to-coast air sampling network designed to measure the extent and type of air pollution at points of collection in American cities and towns.

There are now 110 stations located throughout the nation, 51 of them in comparatively remote non-urban areas, operating in cooperation with the U. S. Public Health Service. The Service provides the equipment, analyses, and reports on findings.

Analyses are made of chemical, physical, and radiological content of filters. State and local officials are informed of results so as to have a clearer picture of air pollution at collection points in their areas, and thus relate conditions to climate, geography, population densities, and industrial development.

Competitors must show that they can deal with the public agreeably and effectively and that they are reliable citizens who would command the respect and confidence of patrons of the post office.

Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will be assigned final ratings on the basis of

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Patrolmen Exams To Be Held On January 13

Major Wilson E. Speir, Commander of DPS Region Four, announced today that examinations for patrolmen with the Texas Department of Public Safety will be given in January.

Men between the ages of 21 and 35 who are interested in joining the state police organization can take the tests in Region Four at Abilene on January 13, in San Angelo on January 14, and in Liddell on January 15. All exams will begin promptly at 8:00 a.m. Applications for these positions will close on January 10 and training for those selected will begin April 1.

Major Speir pointed out that applicants must have a high school education and be in good physical condition. They must be between 58 and 76 inches in height, of good normal standards and weigh not less than two or more than three pounds per inch of height.

"Patrolmen positions with the Department offer such personal benefits as good pay with retirement benefits, annual vacations and holidays plus sick leave," Speir said. "Students are paid \$300 per month while training in Austin and receive automatic pay raises upon completion."
