Clyde L. Garrett of Eastland Saturday revealed that "at the urgent solicitation of scores of representative citizens from all parts of the county" he will make the race for county judge this year.

Garrett is a native of Eastland County and has always maintained this county as his legal residence. For five years immediately prior to his return to Eastland County two years ago, he was in charge of the Direct Loan Program of the Veterans Administration for the Waco Regional office, which is comprised of some 40 counties.

During the period, according to Garrett, he loaned approximately six million dollars to veterans for the purpose of acquiring homes. He said there had not been a foreclosure on a veteran during that time.

He said he would make a formal announcement of his candidacy at a later time.

Farmers Can Still Sell Eggs To Customers Under New Law

One observer pointed out.

Prior to the passage of the new law both producers and retailers of eggs could do pretty well what they wanted to do. Certain regulations have been made under the new law, Texas was the last state in the union to pass such a law.

As best this reporter could understand under the new law an egg producer can sell his eggs without any kind of license so long as he does not claim a grade. He can label his eggs fresh or use other words of description, but cannot use grade lettering. He can also continue to sell his eggs to retail outlets without a license, providing that he does not claim a grade.

Asked if the farmer would not suffer a reduced price by selling his eggs ungraded to a retail outlet, County Agent J.M. Cooper said they probably would if their eggs would grade Class A.

The law, according to State Department of Agriculture, will protect the consumer by placing a guarantee on graded eggs.

Cooper said that at present very few county producers claim a grade on their eggs.

The State Department of Agriculture listed the following questions and answers for producers and retailers:

Producers

Q.—Under what conditions will I as a producer have to have a license?

A.—If you claim a grade.

Q.—If I need a license, where do I apply?

A.—Texas Department of Agriculture, Capitol Station, Austin.

Q.—As a producer, do I have to sell my eggs on grade?

A.—No.

Q.—As a producer selling directly to consumers, can I label my eggs fresh jumbo eggs, new laid, fresh hennessy, or other words of such import, regardless of their grade?

A.—Yes, you are exempt from this provision of the law.

Q.—Can I sell to retail stores?

A.—When a producer sells to persons other than consumers, he is dealing with parties who are regulated by the law; and even though the producer himself is exempt from certain provisions, the retailer, dealer, wholesaler and processor are not exempt from the law.

Midwestern Nips Local Crew 49-25

The new Southwest Athletic Repair Company located in Ranger joins the growing number of industries in this Central Texas town.

Owned and operated by Roy Barrett and Dick Henderson, the company was formed in October, 1957. It is located on U. S. Highway 80 West.

As evident by the name of the company, it will repair and sell all kinds of football equipment. Since its opening in October, the company has enlarged its territory and now serves high schools and colleges throughout Texas.

It serves schools and colleges in El Paso, Dalhart, Jefferson in East Texas, Keebyville, and Houston and is continuing to grow.

Three employees of the company cover the Texas schools often.

There are only five other shops of this nature in Texas. They are located in Vernon, Fort Worth, Temple, Houston and San Antonio.

From an investment of approximately \$8,000 in machinery, the company has the potentiality of an annual income of \$200,000, it was pointed out by Barrett.

Both owners of the company are familiar with football and the equipment used. Barrett, at present, is assistant football coach and head basketball coach at Ranger College. Henderson is a former football coach at Ranger College. His last year as coach was in 1954.

Among the things that the Southwest Athletic Repair Company will do is:

Repair football shoes. The shoes are polished, and new cleats are replaced if necessary.

Make new covers for blocking dummies, tumbling mats, and safety mats for gymnastics.

Do major and minor repairs to shoulder pads, hip pads, and other types of padding worn by football players. On a major repair, only (Continued on Page Four)

The Flowboys have a 5-2 won-lost record, and are considered top contenders with Cameron State College of Lawton, Okla., for the loop title this season.

The local crew will be participating for the last year in the Pioneer Conference loop. Next year the Rangers will be in the Texas Conference.

Winless in five outings this year, the cagemen of Roy Barrett have been working out each afternoon preparing for conference competition. They have dropped games to Odessa Junior College, Frank Phillips College, and a pair to Howard County Junior College of Henderson.

How they will stack up Saturday night against Tarleton State is anybody's guess. Both teams are confronted with the height problem. Barrett can only put two boys on the hardwoods who are over six feet tall. The Flowboys are in a like situation.

In their last outing, the Flowboys whipped the Hardin - Simmons Bulldogs 90-78 to stifle the Abilene squad which went into the game with seven straight victories.

The Tarleton-Ranger set-up is the only league action on the week's docket, but all members will play.

Arlington State will host Schreiner Institute Saturday night in their first of two meetings for the season. A Pioneer Conference member last season, Schreiner dropped its membership to freelance this year.

Cameron State, which replaced Schreiner on the league list, is on the home court in a Jaycee-sponsored tourney. The Aggies are undefeated to date.

San Angelo, National Junior College champions last season, also will participate in the Lawton tournament.

The fiber will be used in the equipment. The pad is completely rebuilt.

The plant is equipped to sew up rips in jerseys and pants at a reasonable cost to schools and colleges.

Breaks in helmets can be repaired at the shop by the seven employees of the company. Nose bars and chin straps are also repaired.

Besides doing all sorts of repair work on football equipment, the repair shop also plans to sell pads made there.

Barrett pointed out that they will make and sell line backers' pads. They will make and sell hip pads at a saving to schools and colleges in Texas.

The company will also make and sell knee pads, hip and thigh pads.

The two partners in the venture are optimistic about the enterprise. Both stated that it has potentialities and should grow with Ranger.

The two owners plan to use students from Ranger College on a part-time basis, Barrett said.

any provisions of the law.

Retailer

Q.—Do I need a license and if so where do I get it and what are the costs?

A.—Yes you need a license, but if you meet the definition of a retailer as defined in Sec. 15, no fee is required. You can get the license from the Texas Department of Agriculture, Capitol Station, Austin.

Q.—When does the law take effect?

A.—It was effective Oct. 20, 1957.

Q.—Will eggs be inspected for meeting the provisions of this act in my place of business?

A.—Yes.

Q.—Do I have to label or identify all eggs handled as to grade?

A.—Yes.

Q.—Do all eggs in my place of business have to be identified as to grade or not graded?

A.—Yes.

Q.—What records will I have to keep to comply with provisions of the egg law.

A.—None.
