Damages High After Wreck Of Truck On 80

An estimated \$15,000 damage resulted from a truck crash on U. S. Highway 80 Sunday morning and the driver of the truck was hospitalized.

Roy Leslie Branter Jr. of Pearland was rushed to Ranger General Hospital following the mishap, and attendants said he suffered chest injuries and numerous cuts and bruises. He was released Monday morning.

The 1956 Mack tractor pulling a semi-trailer failed to make a curve 10 miles east of Ranger at 7 a.m. The truck was carrying 29,000 pounds of dressed chickens. Chickens were scattered along the highway and shoulder for some 200 to 300 feet. The cab of the truck was crushed and Branter was lucky to escape with his life, observers said.

Highway Patrolmen out of Eastland investigated the accident.

The truck was owned by Jim Truck Lines of Arcadia. It was westward bound for Los Angeles, Calif.

El Paso Mother of Two Kids Named Polio Mother of Year

Mrs. John L. Crouch, attractive El Paso mother of two, and widow of an Air Force pilot, was today named Texas Polio Mother of the Year for the 1958 March of Dimes.

Nomination of Mrs. Crouch was announced by Gordon McLendon, Texas chairman for the 1958 March of Dimes, who described the 37-year-old mother as "symbolic of the hundreds of Texas mothers who have courageously and successfully battled crippling polio to return to active and useful living."

Selected from a large group of nominees submitted by Texas county chapters of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Mrs. Crouch typifies, McLendon said, what a combination of determination and rehabilitation techniques can accomplish for the victims of the pre-Salk vaccine polio wave.

Though confined to a wheelchair by the after-effects of a polio attack, Kathryn Crouch now serves successfully as homemaker, and as executive secretary of the El Paso County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

It is a dual role, she says, "that seemed impossible eleven years ago."

She remembers that "like most people, I thought polio was something that happened to somebody else. It wouldn't happen to Kathy Crouch."

When it did, it began with "the worst headache I ever had." A few hours later, in August, 1946, Kathy Crouch, mother of one child and expecting another, was admitted to a Fort Arthur hospital.

Although her case was diagnosed as polio and her right leg completely paralyzed, she remembers

Ranger Residents Asked To Note Inspection Date

Ranger residents were reminded today of the April 15 deadline for motor vehicle inspection stickers.

It was noted by John H. Grant, manager of Motor Vehicle Inspection Records, Texas Department of Public Safety, that more than one million vehicle owners have obtained their 1958 inspection stickers, setting a trend for early inspections.

Regarding the early inspections, Grant said, "In addition to the ever increasing awareness of automobile and truck owners of safety inspections as an essential safety measure, the increase this year is due in part to the realization that periodic inspections help maintain automobiles at higher value by lessening depreciation."

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Department of Public Safety, reported that vehicle inspections have reduced traffic fatalities.

The state police director asked for the continued good cooperation of vehicle owners in getting their trucks and cars inspected during the short period that remains in the inspection period.

He asked that vehicle owners obtain their inspection stickers early to avoid long waits in lines that normally occur during the first two weeks in April.

Representatives for the Ranger and Eastland chambers of commerce Monday got their first help out of the county commissioners' court in their efforts to complete the road around the lake.

The delegation, headed by Virgil Seaberry Jr., asked only that the court ask the State Highway Commission if any extra funds would be available in 1958 to construct some four miles of highway which would complete the route and give Staff community citizens an above-floodstage road.

The court agreed to write such a letter asking if an appropriation "over and above the 1958 program" would be available. They also included in the letter a statement which asked that any such grant not interfere with present or future farm-market road appropriations for this county.

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IT'S THE LAW in Texas

The last Regular Session of the Texas Legislature passed a law (Articles 1.02 to 1.09, inclusive, Insurance Code), establishing a 3-man State Board of Insurance with a single Commissioner of Insurance as the administrative head. This regulatory set-up replaced the Board of Insurance Commissioners of Texas.

sioners should continue in office if they accepted directly or indirectly any employment, pay, compensation or gratuity from any insurance company. (Article 1.17, Insurance Code.) Except for the general law against bribery, dismissal from duty was the penalty and such penalty apparently did not apply as against Board Members.

The law establishing the new State Board of Insurance makes it a penitentiary offense for any member of the State Board or the Commissioner of Insurance or any employee or agent to accept anything of value or sell to or buy from any insurance company or its agents anything of value. The insurance company representative is also guilty of a penitentiary offense if he proposes any such forbidden act. (Article 1.09-3, Insurance Code.)

To further strengthen the penal (criminal) laws, provisions were added (Articles 21.47 and 21.48, Insurance Code) that every report or document required to be made or filed under the Insurance Code should be verified by a written declaration that it is made under the penalties of perjury. Any person willfully making such a report or document falsely shall upon conviction be fined the sum of \$5,000.00 and imprisoned for not less than two, nor more than five years.

New powers were also given for regulating life insurance policies. Heretofore the law provided for the filing of life insurance policy forms and required that certain provisions be included and others be prohibited. (Articles 3.43 to 3.45, inclusive, Insurance Code.) When those "do's" and "don'ts" were met, the Board had little or no authority to disapprove other policy provisions.

There are new protections that you may not know about. Your insurance against many possible disasters may now be inadequate, in view of increased replacement costs of property. Even damage suits are bigger now.

Let us survey fully your current needs for protection against fire, wind, theft, embezzlement, accidents, damage suits, interruption of business and other risks.

The new law (Article 3.42, Insurance Code) places the duty upon the Insurance Commissioner to disapprove any life insurance policy and to withdraw any previous approval if "it contains provisions which encourage misrepresentation or are unjust, unfair inequitable, misleading, deceptive or contrary to law or to the public policy of this State."

Some time ago there was prepared a model law for presentation to the Legislatures of the various States to prohibit unfair competition and deceptive practices in the insurance business. Laws patterned after this uniform or model bill have been passed in a number of States. Texas passed such a law at the last Regular Session, which is quite comprehensive in its regulation of the advertising and sale of insurance. (Article 21.21, Insurance Code.)

Tax Man Sam Sez

Taxpayers often make mistakes that cause their income tax returns to be audited. The most common mistake is claiming a dependent the taxpayer is not entitled to.

Nobody has any trouble making up their mind what should happen to the farmer who claimed Maud as a dependent for years before the Internal Revenue folks discovered that Maud was a mule.

Generally speaking, quite a few folks don't claim a dependent parent who qualifies as an income tax dependent under the law simply because they haven't read the instructions. On the other hand, divorced parents frequently have both parents claiming one dependent.

It can't be done. It is a mighty good idea to study the tax instructions before you fill your tax return.
