Two non-conference games are the thin offering of Pioneer Conference basketball teams this week as action is slowed for the semester's final classroom examinations. San Angelo's Rams, third in loop season standings, will go against Howard County at Big Spring Friday night. The Rams whipped Howard County 87-65 last week at San Angelo, but may find the foreign floor uncomfortable. On Saturday night, Arlington State's steadily improving Rebels move to Weatherford for a rematch with the Weatherford College Kangaroos. One of ASC's six victories in 12 starts was a 96-68 success over the Kangaroos in December.

Undeclared Cameron State, idle Tarleton State for the conference lead last week with a 95-90 victory over the local Ranger Rangers. In racing to their tenth straight victory, the Cameron crew of Lawton, Okla., solidified its position as favorite to win the loop title. The local crew under Roy Barrett has yet to chalk up a win this year. In nine outings, the Rangers have been downed. They hold a 0-9 won-lost season mark and an 0-2 won-lost mark for conference play.

Admission Tests Set In 44 Cities

AUSTIN — High school seniors planning to enter the University of Texas in September, 1958, or later should plan to take admission tests being given Feb. 8 in 44 Texas cities, Dr. H. T. Manuel, Testing and Guidance Bureau director, said. Test application blanks must be received at the University at least 10 days before the test. Requests for test application blanks and information bulletins should be addressed to Director, Testing and Guidance Bureau, University of Texas, Austin 12. University admission tests are scheduled Feb. 8 in Abilene, Amarillo, Austin, Bay City, Beaumont, Breckenridge, Brownwood, Bryan, Childress, Columbus, Corpus Christi, Corsicana, Dallas, El Paso, Fairbairn, Fort Stockton, Fort Worth, Galveston, Gonzales, Harlingen, Houston, Kerrville, Lampasas, Laredo, Longview, Lubbock, Lufkin, McAllen, Midland, Palestine, Pampa, Port Arthur, San Angelo, San Antonio, Sherman, Snyder, Sulphur Springs, Temple, Texarkana, Tyler, Uvalde, Victoria, Waco and Wichita Falls.

Dr. Manuel reported applications to take University admission tests are running about 25 per cent ahead of the number received at this time last year. "It is uncertain at this time whether this great number of applications indicates simply a desire to take the tests early or an actual increase in the total number of candidates for admission," he added.

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Bulldogs Drop Game To Coleman Tuesday

The Coleman Bluecats gained undisputed possession of the District TAA title Tuesday night by embarrassing the Ranger Bulldogs 70-27 in Ranger. It was the fourth straight district loss for the local eagles headed by Harold Barrett. The local crew now sports a 0-4 won-lost mark for district competition. Coleman jumped off to a 16-5 first-quarter lead and was never behind the rest of the game. However, the local crew kept up the pace with the Bluecats in the second quarter scoring 13 points but at the intermission they were still behind 29-18. The local crew managed only six points in the third period while Coleman mustered 23 points to hold a 52-24 lead. David Wharton again led his team mates in the scoring department with eight points. Second best for the Bulldogs was Jerry Underwood with seven points. Jimmy Norris led the Coleman crew and was also high point man for the game with 28 points. The Coleman victory gave them a perfect 4-0 mark for the district and left them on top alone. In other district competition, the Winters Blizzard held off a fourth quarter rally Tuesday night to down the Cleo Lobos 61-55 and nail down the number two slot in the district.

The win gave the Winters crew, one of the pre-season favorites to top the district title, a 3-1 mark just behind Coleman. The Lobos are in the 300 department with a 2-2 standing. Friday night, Winters invades Ranger. It will be the fifth district contest for the local crew, still trying to break into the win column. Three district games remain on the docket after the Winters game for the local crew. The Bulldogs will meet Hallinger February 4, Cisco January 28, and close out the season against Coleman there on February 7.

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Colorful Fort Worth Stock Show Opens 62nd Annual Affair Friday

Boots, saddles and bucking broncos come into their own Friday (Jan. 24) when the 1958 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show opens the doors for its 62nd annual run. Texas Governor Price Daniel will ride in the downtown Fort Worth parade which officially opens the festivities Friday afternoon. The first rodeo performance is scheduled at 8 p.m. Friday night. Gail Davis, star of the Annie Oakley television series, will be featured in afternoon and night rodeos throughout the 10-day stock show, which ends Feb. 2. Riding clubs and sheriff's possees from many towns will participate in the opening day parade. Dozens of bands from Texas high schools also will take part. Actual livestock events begin at 8 a.m. Friday morning (Jan. 24) with the sifting of barrows, lambs and steers in the livestock barns. The junior livestock department of the show will be larger this year.

Other livestock departments also were up in total entries this year, especially the sheep and pig divisions. Hereford, with 389 entries, top the number of beef breeding stock. Other entries are Polled Herefords, 178; Aberdeen-Angus, 243; Shorthorns, 104; Santa Gertrudis; 22; Brahmans, 44 and Brangus, 24. Of the 85 dairy cattle entered 39 are Guernseys and 46 are Jerseys. Also in the open show are 942 sheep and 767 swine. The junior livestock show features 293 steers—179 Herefords, 69 Aberdeen-Angus and 45 Shorthorns; 72 dairy heifers; 386 lambs; 353 pigs and 79 junior heifers. One of the biggest drawing cards of the exposition is the horse show, which this year is bigger than ever. About 100 more Quarter horses are entered in the 1958 show than last year. The Fort Worth Quarter horse show is the largest of its kind in the nation. The Fort Worth Exposition always has more "special days" honoring cities and groups than any other show in the country. This year, more than 100 towns, communities, organizations, youth groups and clubs will have a "day".

See What We Mean?

THE TEXAS Observer recently printed an article from a chemistry class of a Texas high school. It is a chemical analysis of a Texas legislator. WE FOUND it very unique and interesting and is here reprinted. Might bring a chuckle to several readers.

ANALYSIS of the Texas legislator (free-loading variety only) as seen by the chemist. Symbol: TL. Accepted atomic weight: 150-20. Physical properties: fumes at anything and boils at any minute. Flammable when properly treated. Very bitter if not well heeled. CHEMICAL properties: a great affinity for gold, silver, Cadillacs, and blondes. Violent reaction to color. Able to absorb great amounts of food and drink. Shrinks and turns red under microscopic observation. USES: highly utile. A tonic in the acceleration of public apathy. This writer, being from East Texas, noted one outstanding chemical property that stuck with us. A violent reaction to color. We started our newspaper career in the hometown of a fellow that gained a limited amount of fame by raising his voice displaying a definite reaction to color.

To paraphrase Shakespeare, he says there is nothing in a name. Call a skunk by any other name and it would still stink, so we need not repeat the old name. He is a friend of the family, in a sense of speaking.

But you read about his actions at the University of Texas and at a recent Marshall meeting. He is a chip that certainly fits into this analysis of a Texas legislator. There are many others and as elections time grows near, some chips will undoubtedly write another description that will be even worse. But until they do, this one will serve the purpose.

Other vegetables on the plentiful list are canned and frozen corn and potatoes. Growers' prices of potatoes are below those of last year in most western produc-

ing areas, while canned and frozen corn stocks are heavy enough to rate a spot on the list. Since February usually marks the time when the fall pig crop starts to market, pork takes the featured spot at meat counters. The fall pig crop is 2 percent larger than last year.

Milk continues in heavy supply as productions stands a record level.

Apples and dried prunes are the only fruits listed as plentiful for February.

Other plentiful include peanuts and peanut products.

USDA determines what's plentiful every month by a survey of major food suppliers in this area.

Freezing Pork
 Storage time for fresh pork in your home freezer should be limited . . . pork does not keep its quality in frozen storage as long as other meats.

Fresh sausage may be stored in the freezer from one to three months . . . Other cuts of fresh pork can be stored from three to six months, provided they are packaged properly and held at zero degrees F. or lower.

Pat portions of cured or smoked pork may become rancid if stored longer than a two-month period.

To package pork for the freezer use a moisture vapor resistant material, such as heavy freezer foil . . . Fold closely to drive out the air. Use an overwrap to prevent puncturing or breaking the foil in the freezer.

You get extra dividends from foods when the label says "enriched." All refined wheat flour and bread products are enriched according to law. Enrichment of cornmeal, grits and rice is not required by Texas law. Several millers do enrich these products voluntarily. They are available in most food stores at no extra cost.

Enrichment adds iron and the B vitamins, niacin, riboflavin and thiamine, which are lost in the milling when the outer coat of the grain is removed. Calcium is sometimes added.

Take advantage of this extra bonus in food value—Look for labels on these products that tell you the food is enriched.

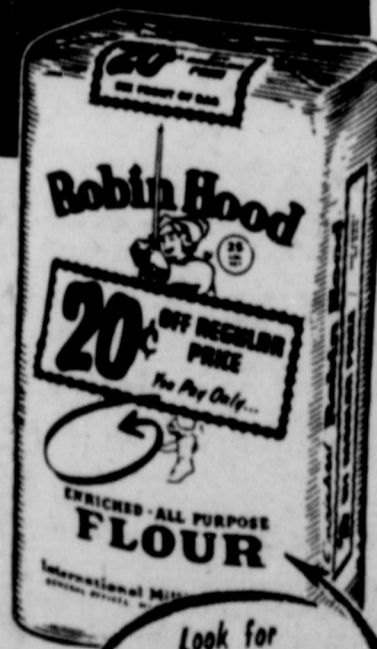

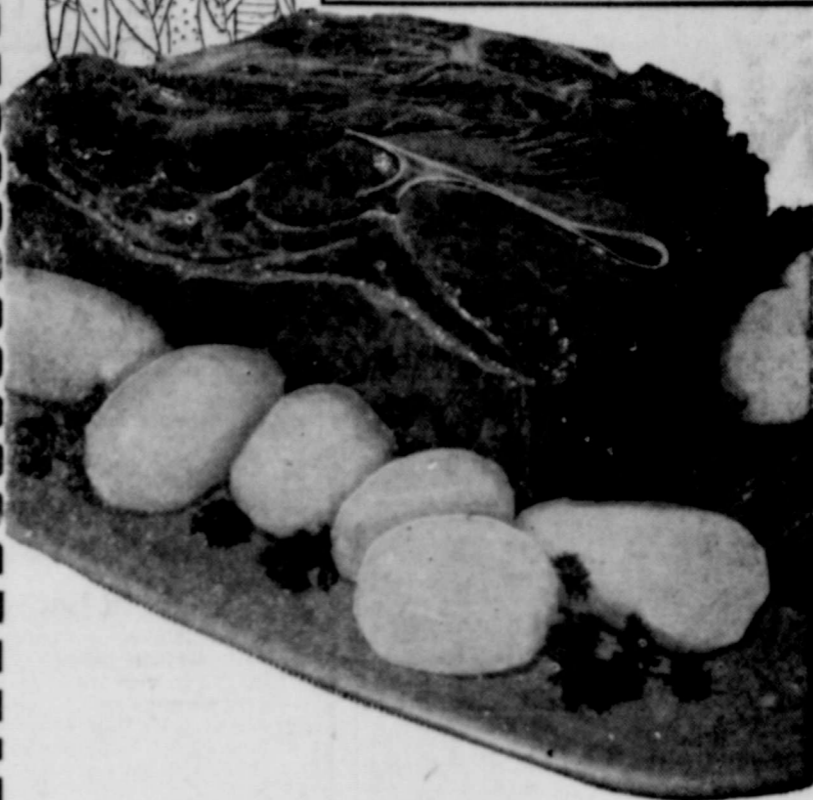

Veterans Warned That Interest Earned on Insurance Is Taxable

Although payments for Veterans Administration benefits are tax-free, interest earned on GI life insurance dividends left on deposit with VA is not a "benefit" and is taxable.

Mr. Scott B. Harrington, manager of the VA regional office in Dallas, said today the ruling on dividend interest was made last year by the Internal Revenue Service.

Still tax-free are proceeds of a GI life insurance policy, including the dividends themselves, he said.

Mr. Harrington added that other VA benefits which need not be reported on Federal income tax returns include:

Education and training allowances for veterans of the Korean conflict period who are in school or training establishments under the Korean GI Bill.

Subsistence allowances paid to World War II veterans training under the original World War II GI Bill.

Subsistence payments made to disabled World War II and Korean conflict veterans training under Public Law 16, the Vocational Rehabilitation Act.

Disability compensation and pension payments received by veterans for service-connected and non-service-connected disabilities.

Grants to seriously disabled veterans for homes designed for "wheelchair living."

Grants for motor vehicles to veterans who lost their sight or lost the use of their limbs.

World War I emergency officers' retirement pay.

VA death benefits to families of deceased veterans also are exempt from taxation. They include death compensation and pension, indemnity and all GI insurance payments.

3. If such applicant is not at the time of receiving assistance an inmate in a public institution (except as a patient in a medical institution for tuberculosis or a mental disease, or has not been diagnosed as having tuberculosis or psychosis and is a patient in a medical institution as a result thereof.

4. If he is not receiving Old Age assistance, Aid to the Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children.

5. If he has not disposed of property, either personal or real, for the purpose of qualifying or increasing need for assistance.

The State Department of Public Welfare determines whether or not a person is in need by the application of reasonable rules and regulations. The purpose of the act is to provide reasonable financial aid compatible with health and decency to those without resources of their own for such purpose. The amount so determined cannot exceed the amount of Federal aid for that purpose.

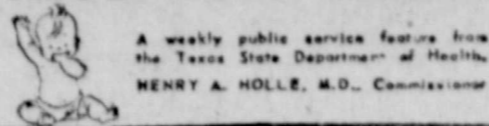

ABOUT YOUR HEALTH



A weekly public service feature from the Texas State Department of Health. HENRY A. HOLLE, M.D., Commissioner

Every three seconds someone in the United States needs prompt first aid for an accident or illness. Often the right kind of aid makes the difference between life and death. Being prepared to give effective first aid takes time and study—before emergencies arise. It is too late to learn and dangle on to go afterward. You and your family can meet most emergencies by enrolling now in a first aid course, learning how to follow through on these ten aids to give first aid.

- 1. Act promptly. Examine the victim carefully from head to toe. Look for breathing obstructions, bleeding, and broken bones. 2. Send for help. First aid "holds the line" until a physician takes over. Call him at once. 3. Stop bleeding. A snug bandage or pressure dressing usually checks bleeding. If not, press firmly at the point which cuts off blood flow to the injured area. Use a tourniquet only when other methods fail. 4. Look for shock—face drained of color, cold moist skin, rapid weak pulse, fainting. Wrap the victim in blankets, make him lie down unless doing so will make other injuries worse, and try to calm him. If he can swallow, has no abdominal injury, and is not vomiting, have him drink as much "shock solution" as possible. Make the solution by stirring one teaspoon of table salt and a half teaspoon of baking soda into a quart of water. 5. In poisonings, follow antidote instructions on the poison container label if it is at hand. Otherwise, give egg whites beaten in water.

der padded with clothing. 8. Splint broken bones. The time-honored rule is to "splint 'em where they lie." Make splints from any firm object, and long enough to reach well beyond the joints above and below the suspected break. 9. Care for burns by applying a sterile gauze dressing and cover with bandages. Don't pull off clothing stuck to burned tissue. In case of chemical burns, rinse immediately with plenty of water. 10. After covering wounds with sterile dressings, bandage to guard against infection, reduce bleeding, and lessen pain.

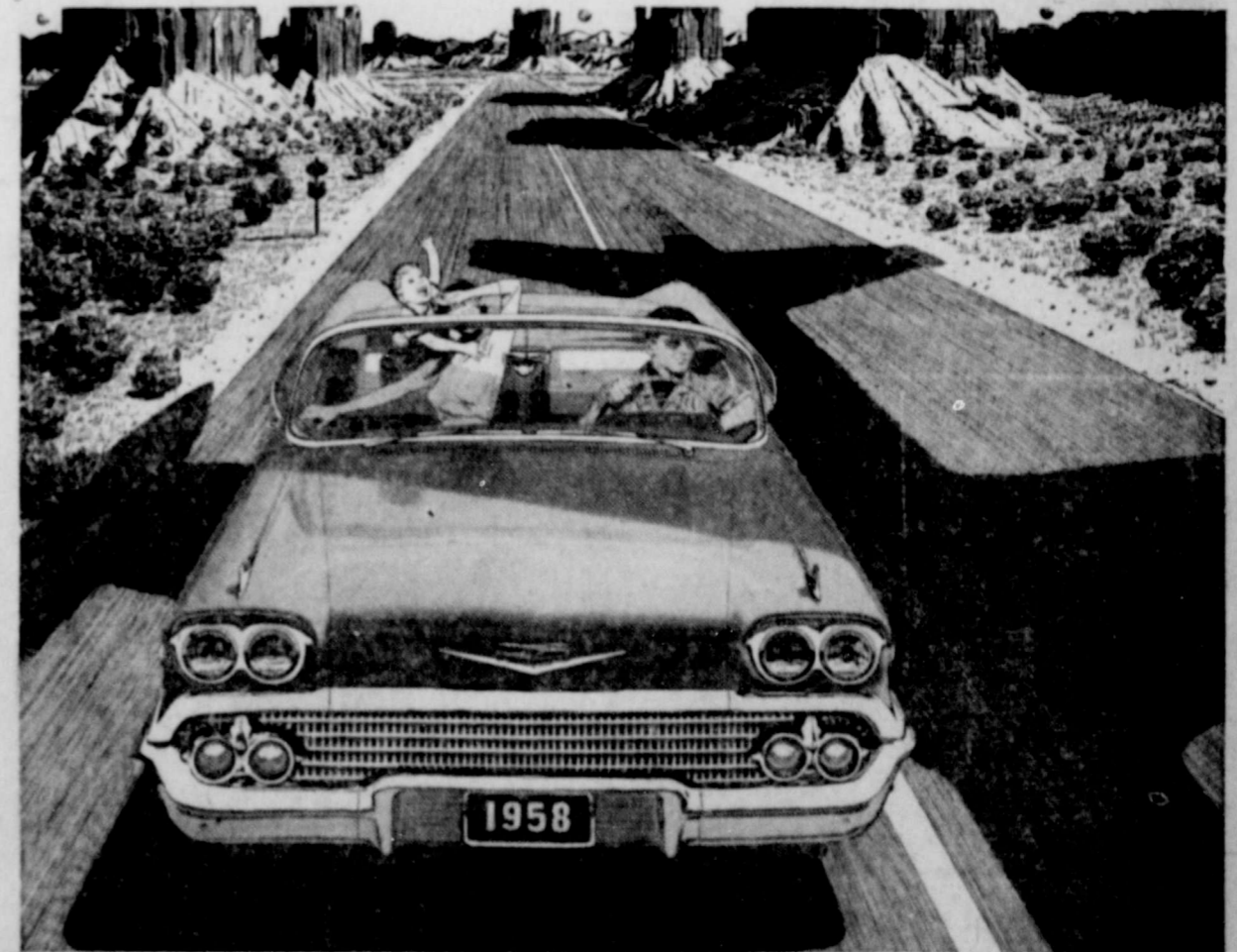
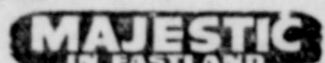
