The designation to authorize the making of initial emergency loans in Eastland County was made by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson as a result of damages and losses sustained by local farmers from excessive rains, freeze and other adverse

weather. Loans to finance 1958 operations are available to farmers who suffered actual production losses, who have a good record of past operations, and who are unable to obtain the credit they need from private or cooperative credit sources. Loans may be made for annual farm and house operating expenses, the interest rate is 3 per cent and loans are repayable annually. H. P. Cole, advised.

"This credit assistance is in addition to credit services already available from Farmers Home Administration," Mr. Cole further stated. "Other credit services include subsequent emergency loans to farmers who suffered losses due to drought and all loans authorized under the agency's regular lending activities."

Eligibility for all types of loans assistance is determined by the local County Committee and applications are now being accepted at the local Farmers Home Administration office, Charles D. Ballou, Otho W. Kean and Whitlow L. Graham are now serving on the Eastland FHA Committee.

on an estimated 6000 acres, for additional soil protection and improvement.

Mechanical conservation practices continued to be applied at a satisfactory rate, although construction work was hampered by wet ground and some one hundred rainy days. Seventy two farm ponds were built for stock water. Forty five miles of terraces were

Lull which will protect over 1000 acres of cropland. Three hundred and sixty two miles of terraces have been built in recent years.

It is estimated by the supervisors that about 1900 miles of terraces are still needed in this area to adequately protect all cropland feeding terraces.

In addition to actual on the ground application practices, 45 farmers made new basic conservation plans with the two districts. A total of 225 land owners now have basic plans in this area. This represents about 20 percent of all landowners.

By providing for the treatment of each acre of agricultural land in accordance with its needs for protection and improvement along with the use of each acre within its capabilities, basic plans lead to the application of a complete co-ordinated conservation program.

With the present rate of applying conservation we still see a great need of applying more and more soil, water, and plant conservation on the land. Local farmers and ranchers are the ones that can apply conservation and benefit from conservation.

If you have any questions about any of these soil, water, and plant conservation practices for your individual conservation program contact your local Soil Conservation District supervisor or the local Soil Conservation Service personnel for technical help. Cost sharing is available through the local A.S.C. office for most practices.
