There was a group of youngsters, accompanied by a couple of adults, present at Teen Town from Cross Plains, recently. They wanted to study the local organization and get some ideas on creating one in Cross Plains.

So, when another community picks the local Teen Town as a pattern, you can bet that it is pretty good.

Perry told us of a plan to get a group of Teen Town members together and appear on "Teenage Downbeat", a program sponsored by WBAP-TV Fort Worth Monday through Friday afternoon.

### NEED TITLE AND RECEIPT

## It's Time Again To Register Car

When you go to register your car this year take your title and last year's license receipt.

That's the advice of Mrs. Roberta Grisham of the County Tax Assessor-Collector's office. Mrs. Grisham pointed out that a new law requires the tax collector to examine both the title and the license receipt of an automobile before registering it for 1958 and issuing license plates.

And of course you better take along a little more money with you too. Licensing fees have also been hiked 10 percent across the board.

Large signs have been placed in the office of the tax collector reminding citizens of the law requiring an examination of title and license receipts. The posters says, "Do not ask your tax collector to violate the law."

Eastland County will have two different prefixes this year. Starting with "D" license plates will be issued from 10 through 149. Then a new prefix, "DH" will be used. Numbering will start at 650.

### County Draws Three Oil Trys

Three Eastland County oil tries were staked this past week.

John R. Shaw Jr. and N. W. Yaniger of Dallas staked the No. 1 A. O. Tindall "B" as a regular field try 330 feet from the north and east lines of Section 1, Block 4 H&TC Survey, 1 3-4 miles northeast of Eastland on a 160 acre lease. Proposed depth is 2999 feet with rotary.

Another try in the same area is the No. 1 A. O. Tindall "A" Being drilled by John R. Shaw

and Joe B. Brown of Dallas. This try spots 810 feet from the south line and 2460 feet from the east line of Section 1, Block 4, H&TC Survey, 1 mile northeast of Eastland.

Frank Pritchard of Fort Worth is drilling the No. 2 W. M. Isenhower as a regular field try. Location is 1260 feet from the south line and 2500 feet from the west line of Section 4, Block 4, GC&SF Survey (3 1-2 miles east of Putnam of a 60-acre lease. Proposed depth is 500 feet with cable tools.

### Forty-One Persons Voted Into National Cowboy Hall Of Fame

Forty-one persons were voted into the National Cowboy Hall of Fame by trustees in annual meeting here. Contracts were signed on architects' plans and specifications leading to construction start by autumn for the first \$1 1/2 million of the western shrine.

Trustees from 14 of the 17 historic western states chose 11 persons at large to be honored in the memorial, with 30 from other states after nominations had been screened in those states. Oregon did not present nominations this year and Colorado deferred to await polls in connection with its fund raising campaign for the shrine.

All persons to be honored this year were deceased; all were identified with the livestock industry, had a hand in development of the American West or were prominent in perpetuation of traditions and ideals of the West, which were the basic criteria for selection and ap-

proval by a three-fourths majority of trustees.

The list includes territorial and early state governors; trail blazers of western migration and development; empire builders; colonizers, regionally and nationally known cattlemen; a triple world's champion rodeo cowboy; one of the most popular all time western movie stars and two of the century's most prominent animal husbandmen.

Previously voted into the Cowboy Hall of Fame were Will Rogers of Oklahoma; Theodore Roosevelt of New York and North Dakota; Charles Goodnight of Texas; Charles Russell of Montana and Jake McClure of New Mexico.

During the annual trustees meeting here ground was broken for the shrine atop its 37-acre hill-top site, by governors, other state officials and trustees of all the historic 17 western states that are to share in the project. The other 14 states will be divided one square yard of land at the site so the memorial will, in fact, be built on land of all these states.

The largest honorees are Edward Beale of California; Dean W. L. Hazard of Oklahoma; Frank Boice of Arizona; William F. "Buffalo Bill" Cody of Nebraska; Dr. Chetler E. Curtis of Iowa; James J. Hill of Minnesota; Pete Knight of Alberta; Henry Miller of California; Tom Mix of Texas and Hollywood; Eugene Manlove Rhodes of New Mexico and Brigham Young of Utah.

Honorees by states were: Arizona, Ramon Ahumada and Geo. Ruffner; California, Henry C. Daillon (and Fred E. Babby; Idaho, Frank Gooding and John Haley; Kansas, Dan C. Casement and Calvin F. Floyd; Montana, Robert C. Ford and Carsten C. Kohrs; Nebraska, Frank North and Edward Creighton; Nevada, John Sparks and Daniel Wheeler; New Mexico, John Chisum and Vic Culbertson.

And North Dakota, Wise Richards and John W. Goodall; Oklahoma, Charles H. Tompkins and Otis Barby; South Dakota, James Philip and Ed Lemmon; Texas, Stephen F. ### ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

The curtains looked dingy, so she decided to clean them in a pan of gasoline in the bathtub. She forgot about the pilot light on the floor furnace just outside the bathroom door.

She was buried just a couple of weeks ago, this usually alert woman who was "accustomed" to doing her own dry cleaning. It happens to someone somewhere practically every day.

Many victims of home dry cleaning accidents, like the woman above, routinely use flammable liquids to clean curtains or clothes. Others were beginners, motivated by economy or convenience.

Most of them were ordinarily sensible, with full awareness of the peril of gasoline or naphtha or other dry cleaning preparations.

One moment of carelessness to which we are all prone turned them from happy homemakers into sad statistics.

Explosions are only one of several risks run by the thoughtless do-it-yourself operators. Some cleaning agents are flammable; others give off injurious vapors; still others are harmful to human

skin. All could be lethal if taken internally.

So inflammable is gasoline that to keep it stored at home is to openly court disaster. Gasoline emits vapors to form explosive mixtures in the air. A transient spark from a light switch or cigarette and the mixture may be ignited.

Vapors may flow in an invisible stream for 200 feet from the point of use, flashing back and exploding the main container when touched off by flame or spark. Static electricity generated by synthetic or silk fabric being cleaned is fully capable of igniting the fumes of gasoline or naphtha.

Care must be taken to avoid inhaling concentrated vapors, since the common one—excluding turpentine—are anesthetics. Some, after prolonged exposure, are injurious to internal organs.

If gasoline or naphtha can gasoline dirt and grime on fabrics, obviously these same fluids are able to cut through the natural oil of human skin.

You still insist on doing your own dry cleaning? Then do it right.

Use only non-flammable cleaning agents, keeping in mind that "non-explosive" markings on a label do not necessarily mean "non-flammable." Never, under any circumstances, use gasoline or naphtha.

Do your cleaning outside, where toxic vapors will be quickly and safely dissipated. Use a dip stick in the liquid instead of your bare hands.

Keep children and pets away from your cleaning operations. Children are often the innocent victims of home cleaning accidents.
