Six of the fourteen committees appointed by chamber officials made reports at the meeting. They included the membership, civic, business district improvement, education, trade extension, industrial, and finance committees.

A banquet honoring the teachers of both the public schools and the college to be held early in September is under consideration by the education committee, according to Dr. M. E. Jolly, chairman of that committee.

Dave Pickrell, chairman of the industrial committee, told the chamber representatives, that small business developed by local citizens would benefit Ranger more than one large business firm.

He noted that the oil industry was off at present and will continue to be off for the next six months. But he stressed the necessity of small business organizations in Ranger rather than large ones.

Dr. W. P. Watkins gave a brief report on the finance committee. Guest told the members that they may purchase a chair to be placed in the auction barn which is scheduled to open February 17. On the chair will be painted the name of the firm.

Surplus Food Issue Dates Are Announced

Next issue date for USDA surplus food commodities, under the program set up by Eastland County, will be Feb. 10, 11 and 12, J. Porter Sr., administrator, announced Saturday.

Porter said the surplus foods would be distributed to eligible citizens living in Precinct 1 (Eastland, Ranger and Olden) Monday, Feb. 10, Feb. 11 foodstuff will be distributed to eligible citizens from Carbon, Gorman, Desdemona, Okra and Rising Star. Wednesday, Feb. 12 citizens living in Cisco, Pioneer, Scranon and Nimrod will be served.

Distribution point is the lower floor of the Masonic Building in Eastland.

March of Dimes Drive Moves At Slow Rate Toward Goal

The March of Dimes campaign in Ranger continued to climb, at a slow rate, nearer the goal of \$4,000 designated.

Jess Cole, city chairman of the drive, said today that approximately \$1,300 had been collected for the fight against polio by several campaigns conducted by local clubs and organizations during January.

He said the drive, originally scheduled to end January 31, had been extended in Eastland County until February 14 because of the slow progress being made towards the goal. Eastland County has a goal of \$25,000.

According to Mrs. J. A. Bates, county chairman, the county is far below the goal and the extension was necessary in hopes that the goal could be reached.

Cole and Mrs. Bates jointly urged local and county residents to contribute to the fight against polio.

The latest boost for the campaign was from the Ranger Rebekah Lodge 244. The local lodge auctioned off cakes made by members at the Eastland Sales Barn Monday.

They netted an even \$183. Mrs. Ruby Greer secretary, said the following members made cakes for the auction: Mmes. Tillie Hicks, Eleanor Horton, Alton Norris, Willie Pirkle, and Madeline Bond.

The Mothers March, held January 30, netted the largest amount. Sponsored by the 1947 Club, the unofficial figure netted is slightly over \$400. However, club officers said that money was continuing to come in and a final count would be unavailable for several days.

Ranger College students collected \$211 with a road block staged Saturday afternoon on U. S. Highway 80 and other roads leading into Ranger.

The students gave several prizes to lucky people.

The Ranger Volunteer Firemen handled the parking meters in the downtown area January 25 and netted \$82.49 for the dime campaign. Firemen also issued tickets for over-parking. Each year, the firemen handle the meters for the city.

A pancake supper sponsored by the Ranger Lions Club held January 25 netted an even \$200. The club annually sponsors the supper for the campaign.

Local, state, and national concerns donated to the success of the supper.

The Rho Phi chapter of the Beta Sigma Phi, through bingo games held the same night of the pancake supper, collected \$183.65 for the March of Dimes. Also an annual Fry of Cisco.

Chamber of Commerce Series

Finance Group Prepares Budget

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the fifteenth in a series of articles dealing with the various committees set up by the Ranger Chamber of Commerce. The chamber has 14 committees all working together for the benefit of Ranger and the citizens of Ranger. It is hoped that through these articles, the people of Ranger will have a better understanding of the chamber of commerce and its functions. The articles were written with the cooperation of Wilson Guest, president of the chamber, and Rip Galoway, chamber manager.

The finance committee of the Chamber of Commerce works closely with the membership committee towards increasing the number of members in the local chamber.

Its primary function is to study the pledges of the various members and try to equalize them. Amounts are at times suggested by this committee but all pledges are on the volunteer basis.

The finance and membership committees met jointly recently and discussed the equalization of the pledges.

This committee, headed by Dr. W. P. Watkins, will work up a budget for the coming year and present it to the chamber officers and directors for approval.

Other members on the committee are W. F. Creager, B. A. Tunnell, R. V. Robinson, Jess Weaver, and Dr. Price Ashton.

It has been suggested of the committee for this year to set a goal and if possible make the goal cover projects that money is solicited for throughout the year.

These projects might include a Christmas program, street decorations, and money to supplement prizes received by FFA boys on the sale of their projects at the Eastland County Livestock show.

The finance committee is one of the most important of the 14 appointed by the officers and directors of the chamber.

FIRST SALE SCHEDULED FEBRUARY 17

The Ranger Livestock Commission Company will open February 17, it was revealed today by Wilson Guest, president of the chamber of commerce.

Guest, who has been negotiating for the re-opening of the auction barn for the past several months, said a Wichita Falls man and his son would operate the barn.

The two men are Bill White of Wichita Falls, and Wilford White of Mountain Park, Oklahoma. At present, the two men operate barns in Nacona and Stanford.

White said the barn would be open each Monday. He told a Times reporter that all kinds of livestock would be sold at the barn.

The barn was closed in October, 1957.

Repair work on the barn is underway now and is expected to be completed within ten days and be ready for operation.

White is expected to be in Ranger Monday and Tuesday next week and the Friday prior to the opening to contact buyers and sellers in this area.

Sales will start at 12 noon each Monday, White said. Cattle, hogs, sheep, goats, and horses will be auctioned, he pointed out.

Work on the re-opening of the barn, located on U. S. Highway 80 east, has been in progress by Guest and other chamber of commerce officials since the barn first closed.

The president of the chamber said the re-opening of the auction would increase the economy in Ranger by bringing in buyers and sellers.

Other details of the auction barn and sales will be released later by White.

Poll Tax Receipts Decrease In County

Poll tax receipts increased in Eastland County from last year, according to figures released today by J. C. Olson, county tax assessor collector.

However, Allison pointed out, there was a considerable decrease in the number for 1956, the last big election year in the county.

Total poll taxes paid over the entire county were 4,038 compared with 3,132 for 1957 and 5,100 for 1956. Allison noted that 1957 was an off-election year with only a few scattered elections held in the county.

Only one election of any importance was held in the county and that was the election of a senator to fill a post vacated by Gov. Price Daniel.

Four branch offices were set up in the county for citizens to pay their poll tax, Allison said. These offices were located at Ranger, Rising Star, Gorman, and Cisco. And the tax assessor's office in the county courthouse in Eastland.

A total of 921 persons used the Cisco branch office in paying their poll tax, Allison said. Second largest was the Ranger office with 454 tax receipts listed.

Gorman had 250 and Rising Star 164.

Bargains To Start March 3

The trade extension committee of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce this week voted to inaugurate a Dollar Day in Ranger on the first Monday of each month.

Morris Newham, chairman of the committee, said letters were being mailed to Ranger merchants and firms asking them to cooperate in making the monthly event a success.

The committee has set March 3 as the date for the beginning of the program.

A similar program was conducted through September and December, 1957 and met with considerable success, and it was suggested to this committee that another program of that nature be inaugurated.

In the letter being mailed, Newham asks the unanimous participation of local merchants and firms in making the event a success.

"Only through the cooperation of the merchants can such an undertaking be successful. It will aid greatly in pulling more people from the outlying communities into Ranger," Newham said.

The letter asks that merchants place various things on sale for one dollar, but also stresses that items selling for one dollar should not be the only bargains offered.

"Bargains on any price item will draw interest from the people as well as those selling for one dollar," Newham pointed out in the letter.

The bargain days conducted by local merchants in the fall of last year met with tremendous success, it was noted by Wilson Guest, chamber of commerce president.

Local merchants joined in and the city commission voted to "back" parking meters to aid shoppers.

The trade extension committee, one of 14 appointed by the officers and directors of the chamber, has an active program outlined for Ranger for the coming year.

The group composed of Newham, John Tibbels, W. H. Stevenson, Calvin Lipkin, and John Smith, plan to conduct several other events that will benefit Ranger.

One project the committee will undertake is to urge local business men to meet with home demonstration clubs in the surrounding area. Through this, a closer relation will be obtained between the businesses of Ranger and the immediate area.

An estimated ten interested persons were present for the meeting.

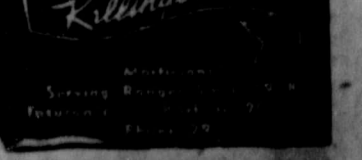
January 31 was the final day to pay poll taxes. And it was also the final day to obtain exemption certificates.

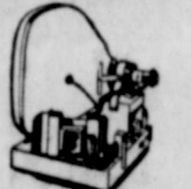

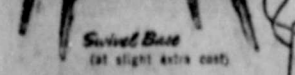

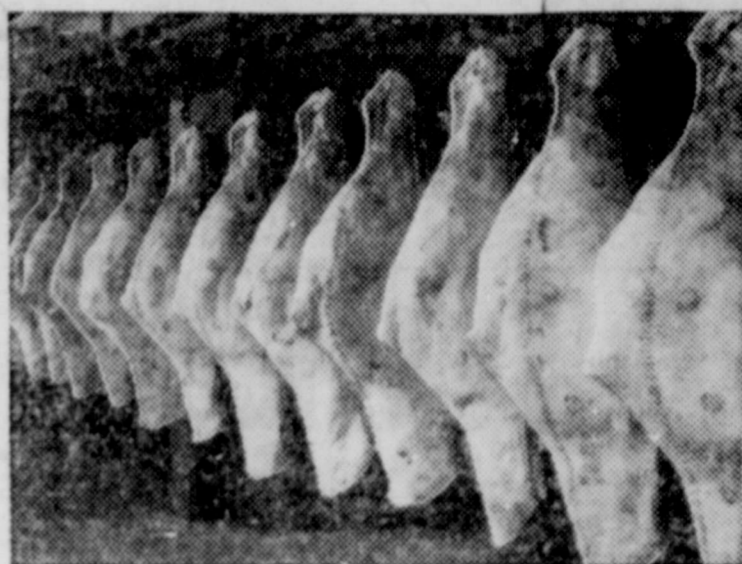
