City names members for Development Corp.

The Dimmitt City Council appeared to move one step closer to obtaining the Cargill Plant for use as an ethanol plant on Monday night.

After Mayor Wayne Collins recused himself, Mayor Pro Tem Bob Murdock handled the three items dealing with the Dimmitt Development Corporation. The council voted 4-1 on all three measures, with Gloria Hernandez as the lone no vote each time. "I haven't been privy to everything and I don't think I should vote with limited knowledge," she said.

First the council voted to establish a board and then named three board members out of a list of 13 they'd considered.

"We graded them from 1 to 10," Murdock said. "The ones with the top numbers, we went to them and asked them to serve. All three agreed. They are Richard Jackson, Carol Lust and Jim Bradford."

All three serve at the pleasure of the council and can be replaced at anytime without having a reason. The maximum term is six years. The council also passed the bylaws for the board.

As was explained in both this week's meeting and the one held last week, the purpose of the DDC is to be a conduit for Cargill and other land that the city might have. The city will take possession of Cargill and immediately turn it over to the DDC, which will in turn pass it on to Dimmitt Ethanol. After that, Dimmitt Ethanol, said Lance Duncan who is a partner in Dimmitt Ethanol, will come to the city, the DDC and the Dimmitt Economic Development Committee with at least two recommendations from the four proposals that

have come before them. He said at that time, all those boards will decide which offer to accept.

This will not be done in a public meeting, however.

The DDC will be a non-profit, non-stockholder setup, serving merely to pass through property the city has acquired. What will be done with the proceeds that come from an ethanol plant hasn't been discussed --- at least publicly. The expenses of the directors will be paid with any money generated by the committee. And they are indemnified by the city except in the case of malfeasance.

At the last council meeting, Duncan said he believed the plant will be up and running in 14-16 months. As for the proceeds from an ethanol plant, Duncan said he has been in contact with Chaun Gunstream at least once a week to keep him up to speed.

County Judge Bill Sava, who was present at the meeting, asked the council what its pleasure is regarding whether and when to appoint a permanent rail commit-

What's going on at Cargill?



USDA guides help ag producers keep our food supply safe

DIMMITT - The U.S. Department of Agriculture has released a new guide to help agricultural producers enhance security at the farm level, announced Rosie Kleman, County Executive Director for the Castro County Farm Service Agency (FSA).

"There is no one-size-fits-all approach to protecting agriculture, but the Pre-Harvest Security Guidelines and Checklist 2006 is a guide that addresses potential security concerns for an agricultural operation regardless of type or size," said Kleman.

Food and agriculture biosecurity is an important component of USDA's mission. Improving awareness through enhanced outreach and communications is a key element of USDA's homeland security efforts. The voluntary guidelines and checklists were developed based upon recommendations made by producers throughout the United States. Guidelines have been developed for general agriculture, dairy, crops, cattle and poultry security.

According to Kleman, this guide is the latest in a series of materials produced by USDA to bolster food and agriculture security. USDA continues to work closely with its federal, state and local government partners as well as industry stakeholders to develop sector-wide guidelines. For instance, guidance has been issued by USDA for food processors and distributors, and for agricultural transporters

in coordination with the trucking industry. Agriculture and food account for 13 percent of the U.S. gross domestic product, 18 percent of its employment and \$140 billion in revenue. USDA continues to work with its federal, state, local partners as well as industry in protecting the nation's agriculture and food production, from threats such as natural disasters and either the naturally occurring, intentional or unintentional introduction of diseases and pathogens as they do not respect geographic borders. The

Dimmitt beef producers can get free training to become more productive

Beef producers can get free training to help them become more competitive by attending the Texas Beef Quality Producer Program in Dimmitt, Texas, on Tuesday, August 15. The Texas Beef Quality Producer Program teaches the principles of Beef Quality Assurance, a proven system of sensible management practices that help improve the quality and safety of beef, explains Dick Sherron, president of Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

"In addition, the program updates ranchers on changes occurring in the industry and what we must do to increase demand for our cattle. It clearly demonstrates how a producer's actions on the ranch have a huge impact on the final beef product," emphasizes Sherron. Each session involves an intensive eight hours of training, divided into two levels.

Level I covers BQA principles, industry update, record keeping, environmental stewardship and proper management practices associated with genetic selection,





cattle handling, culling, vaccine and drug use. Level II provides a detailed explanation of the requirements needed to receive and maintain full certification as a Texas Beef Quality Producer. "Certification recognizes an elite group of cattle producers who do things right," asserts Sherron. Cattle producers must embrace BQA methods if they plan on staying in business "Consumers - the people who buy our beef to eat - are telling us they want their food, not only delicious, but safe, wholesome and raised responsibly. We must respond if we want a place for our beef to go." 
Top doctor coming to Dimmitt Miller honor with a citation

Medicare beneficiaries not enrolled by May 15 may have to wait until Nov.

Medicare beneficiaries who did not enroll in a Medicare drug plan by the May 15, 2006 deadline will need to wait until the next annual period enrollment (November 15 - December 31, 2006). But if you are eligible for the extra help that is available under the Medicare Prescription Drug Program, you can join a Medicare drug plan at any time without paying a

penalty in 2006.

The extra help can pay for part of the monthly premiums, annual deductibles and prescription co-payments under the new prescription drug program, and it could be worth an average of \$3,700 per year. Basically, you may qualify for extra help if your income is below \$14,700 a year as a single person or below \$19,800 a year if you're married and living with your spouse. Your total resources must less than \$10,000 if you are single or \$20,000 if you are married and living with your spouse. Resources include such things as bank accounts, stocks and bonds, but do not include your house and car. And resources can be slightly higher (an additional \$1,500 per person) if you will use some of your money for burial expenses.

Also, if you first become eligible for Medicare in February 2006 or after, you can enroll in a drug plan during your initial enrollment period of seven months three months before and three months after the month you become eligible for Medicare.

If you think that you might qualify for the extra help, you can complete an online application at www.socialsecurity.gov or call 1-800-772-1213 (TTY 1-800-325-0778) and a representative will assist you in filing an application over the phone. For more information about the prescription drug program itself, you can go to www.medicare.gov.
