

## SEE WHAT I MEAN?

THIS TALK about a joint dial system for Ranger, Eastland, and Cisco seems to be picking up more momentum and it leads us to speculate: Who will benefit?

ELSEWHERE in the Times can be found an editorial expressing the viewpoint of the Times and we need not elaborate to any great extent but we would like to add a few things.

J. W. SITTON, in his Cisco Press column, is of the opinion that the tri-cities system would not go over. He seems to dwell on the increase in rates as the major drawback for the proposal.

WE WOULD like to point out that there will be an increase in rates whenever the dial system goes into effect regardless of whether the joint system is used or just a local exchange. Should the joint system be used, the rates would be slightly higher.

THE TIMES thinks it will benefit Ranger. At present, county unity here is about as obscure and as beneficial as the north end of a south bound jackass. Local residents want to benefit Ranger; Eastland residents want to benefit Eastland; and the same holds true with Cisco.

AND WITH that kind of tug-of-war going on, all we can see is damage to the entire county. Its about time the people of this county put their heads together and started working towards a common goal. By doing so, you would be assured what the county can accomplish.

SOME RANGERITES are of the opinion that should the one-exchange system be used, Ranger would not get a building. There is no basis for such a statement. Ranger will get the building regardless of which method is used.

ALL OF THIS talk involves the man on the street and it is him who will have to make the decision. But we are attempting to make him pick the right choice.

Things you might never know if you did not take the pains to check: There are fourteen births listed at the city hall here thus far this year.

All of them are not from Ranger but a good many are.

Still in the speculative mood, we noted that an estimated 60,000 persons are expected to attend the second annual Fort Worth Boat and Sports Show this week.

And we cannot help but wonder if Ranger could pull something like that. It would draw a lot of state-wide publicity.

With 335 registered boats on Lake Leon and scores of persons using the facilities daily, we think such a thing would go over. It would, however, need the backing of the chamber of commerce, and the merchants and businessmen of Ranger.

Ranger has the facilities to hold a boat show. It is understood that the high school gymnasium or the National Guard Armory could be used in case of bad weather. If the sun shines, there is a suitable lot in the downtown area that can be used.

With 35,000,000 Americans part-time seafarers, we dare say that a few thousand of them live in the Ranger area. And with a little backing and pushing, they could all be pulled out to attend the show.

There are at least a half dozen merchants who handle motors, boats, and fishing and camping equipment in Ranger. We think they could all participate in the show to make it a success.

Take, for example, L and J Supply, Montgomery Ward, Ranger Boat Shop, and Western Auto. They all handle motors and boats. The Ranger Farm Store, Arterbaugh Hardware and H. H. Vaughn handles fishing and camping equipment. The top three stores listed also handle fishing and camping equipment. We would like to see a show here.

Scores of things are on the docket Saturday night and Monday night in observance of George Washington's birthday. We just learned this morning that Washington was a Mason.

## Rotarians Told Of Tri-Cities Phone System

W. H. McAnelly, area manager of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, Wednesday briefed the Rotary Club on the possibilities of a tri-cities telephone system to include Ranger, Eastland, and Cisco.

Speaking in the Ranger College cafeteria, McAnelly said the Rotary Clubs of Cisco and Eastland had recently adopted resolutions asking the phone company to study the matter and determine the feasibility of the joint system.

He noted that the company is ready to offer a "package deal" to the three cities that would allow free dialing to any of the cities from one. However, this proposal must be approved by the city commission of the three cities.

The company, at present, is surveying the three cities to determine the needs of each.

Two such systems are now in operation in Texas, McAnelly stated, in the Rio Grande Valley and in Arlington, and both are termed successful.

"The dial system is coming to Ranger regardless of whether the people elect to use the tri-cities system," McAnelly emphasized.

Should the one-exchange system be used, it would mean a slightly higher increase in rates. McAnelly indicated that the increase would be in the neighborhood of seven-fifty cents for a private home phone.

With the exchange set up where residents could make only local calls, the increase would be fifty cents for a private home phone.

The speaker revealed that a tentative date of August, 1959 had been set for Ranger to "go dial". Construction on the exchange building is expected to start in August this year.

Equipment is now being designed for the Ranger exchange. He noted that "the dial system is custom built to fit the needs of the family and civic life and should be a prime interest to every person in the city," the proclamation points out.

## A TRI-CITIES SYSTEM?

The plan to put Eastland, Ranger and Cisco under a one telephone exchange arrangement, the Times believes, would strengthen this county many-fold.

The idea has already undergone the supreme test. It has had some cold water poured on it by a number of citizens from all three of the towns who believe that the three towns are better off divided. Despite these doubters, who are ready to oppose the plan even before hearing a report from the telephone company concerning rate increases—if there is to be any—the plan still has a full head of steam back of it.

We believe the majority of Eastland County citizens want the service if it can be provided at a reasonable price. If Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. reports the service would be warranted only alongside of a big rate increase, the Times will reverse its field and fight the plan.

We believe that citizens of the three towns hold a lot in common. We believe, in fact we know, that the large majority of us have friends and relatives in the other two towns which we could enjoy more if we could pick up the phone anytime we chose to and give them a call. We believe it would help businessmen in all three cities. We believe it would give us a strong economic unity.

We do not believe that many of us would oppose a slight increase in our telephone rates. We are confident that Bell will recognize the fact that businessmen have the most to gain, and are certain, therefore, that most of any increase which would have to come, would be placed on their shoulders.

For once, let's quit talking unity out of one side of our mouth and division out of the other. Despite the overuse of the phrase, we must say, "United we stand, divided we fall."

## March 1-8 Made 4-H Club Week

COLLEGE STATION — The nation's 4-H club members, more than 2,200,000, will observe National 4-H Club Week from March 1 to 8. They will not only salute their parents but all parents and will recognize the important part that parents play in guiding and influencing youth.

The 111,535 Texas 4-H club members were recognized by Governor Price Daniel in his greeting to them when he said, "As 4-H members you have contributed much to the material wealth of Texas and the Nation in raising the quality of agricultural production, but you yourselves are our richest resource. May you continue to build yourselves, your homes and communities during the coming year, and thus help build a greater America." The Governor also saluted the parents, adult leaders and friends of 4-H for the contributions they have made to the 4-H program in Texas.

The Texas 4-H members last year completed more than 154,000 demonstrations involving practically every phase of farming, ranching and homemaking. They are members of 4,027 local 4-H clubs and received assistance from 10,068 local adult leaders and 3,210 junior leaders. Local county extension agencies provided the leadership for 4-H club programs in the counties.

Members of 4-H clubs, individually and as a group, participate in community service activities. Any boy or girl between the ages of 9-21 years of age may become a member by agreeing to follow 4-H ideals and standards. The chief requirement is a willingness to "learn to do by doing", which is the club slogan, and "to make the best better", which is the club motto.

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## Ranger Phone Survey Ended

A two-day survey of the telephone lines in Ranger and the immediate area was completed Tuesday by two representatives of the Southwestern Bell Telephone System.

The survey was conducted primarily for equipment purposes, it was pointed out by the two men.

However, the results of the survey, also being conducted in Eastland and Cisco, is expected to be used to some extent in determining the feasibility of a joint system between the three towns.

It has been suggested that a joint system be put to use in Ranger, Eastland, and Cisco. Under the system, one telephone book would be used and residents of each town may call the other town without a toll.

Suggestions have been made through the Ranger, Eastland, and Cisco Rotary Clubs and various individuals. W. H. McAnelly, area manager, has spoken at meetings of these three clubs, the most recent being the Ranger club today.

The two-day survey just completed in Ranger was conducted by Bob Davis and Charles Barrett of Fort Worth. The two men indicated that there are approximately 1,300 families in Ranger.

According to the two, there are 1,591 phones in the Ranger system. That includes the surrounding area, but not extension phones. There has been a gain of 22 phones from last year, the survey revealed.

## AS IT LOOKS FOR HERE

 WASHINGTON, D. C.—Perhaps one of the most common inquiries from constituents to their Congressman is, "Why can't you do something about . . . ?" and one difficult to answer. Usually it is a good question. Time was when Congressmen and Congress could do more "about" than they can today. On the other hand, there is more to do "about" today than ever before. The Executive Department, headed by the President of the United States, or the various bureaus and commissions, administer and enforce the laws.

It was never intended, and it is not possible to spell out in detail the administration procedures and specific enforcement of laws. After laws are passed, those administering the laws usually do so under their own "regulations." As Government has grown, the many commissions and bureaus in existence today were created to carry out the purpose of Acts of Congress. Governmental agencies exercise tremendous influence in the lives of our people. Many of them hold almost life and death power over our economy. The Executive Branch of our Government administers laws dealing with agriculture, taxes, veterans' benefits, Social Security, unemployment and all matters with policy of Government, both domestic and foreign. Of course, it has many other functions of administration.

In addition to these, the Congress over the years has created such agencies as the Federal Communications Commission, the Federal Power Commission, the Federal Trade Commission, the Civil Aeronautics Board, and others. These last named agencies are supposedly an arm of the Congress, but in recent years they have become somewhat a law unto themselves.

It is often wondered by a lot of people why certain things

can't be done, or specific cases resolved in their favor. It is true, that as the Congress passes laws it can place maximum and minimum limitations, but interpretation and application must necessarily be made by the Executive Department and those various agencies and commissions.

It is difficult sometimes to explain why this, that and the other is not done or cannot be done. In any instances, it is a matter of some bureaucrat of Government employee looking and finding ways that something "can't be done," rather than to find a way whereby something can be done. In the last session of the Congress a subcommittee known as the Subcommittee on Legislative Oversight was created to investigate the administering agencies of Government, because it is common knowledge that those directly responsible to Congress had slipped beyond Congress' control.

This Subcommittee has been making the headlines of late—not because of what it has accomplished, but its failure to even get started. It has fired its Chief Counsel, and a part of its staff and the Subcommittee Chairman

have resigned. Politics and internal conflicts are the difficulty.

The Subcommittee, however, will continue under new leadership. It has a worthy motive and much to accomplish. It should do so.

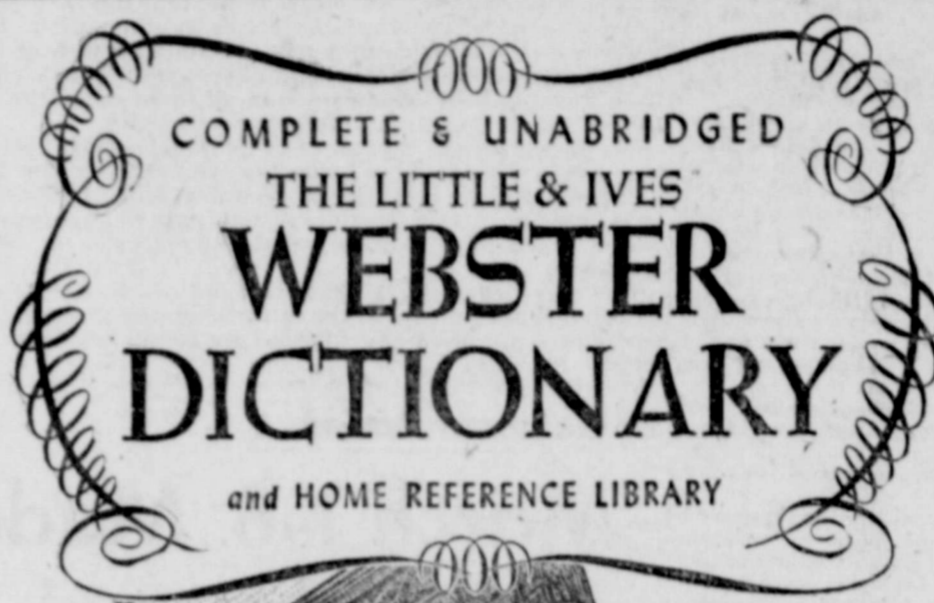

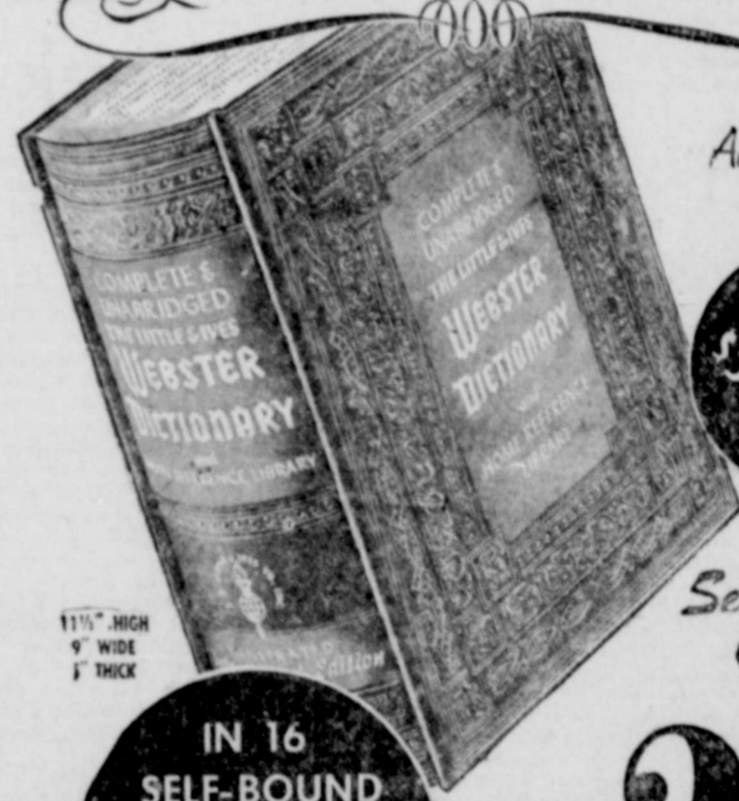

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**Deadline For Entering Stock Show Is Set**

All animals to be exhibited at the annual Eastland County Livestock Show, in Eastland, March 28 and 29 must be properly entered and in their place by 12 o'clock noon on opening day, according to C. M. McCain, general superintendent.

Judging of the show, one of the largest county shows in this area, will begin at 8:30 a.m. on the second day with Angora goat classes. The judging of all animals will be completed by late afternoon according to show officials.

Animals in the breeding classes must be representative of their

breed though they do not have to be registered or purchased and is open to both adult and juniors. Juniors defined as FFA and 4-H Club members from Eastland and adjoining counties are the only ones eligible for the fat animal classes of steers, pigs and lambs. 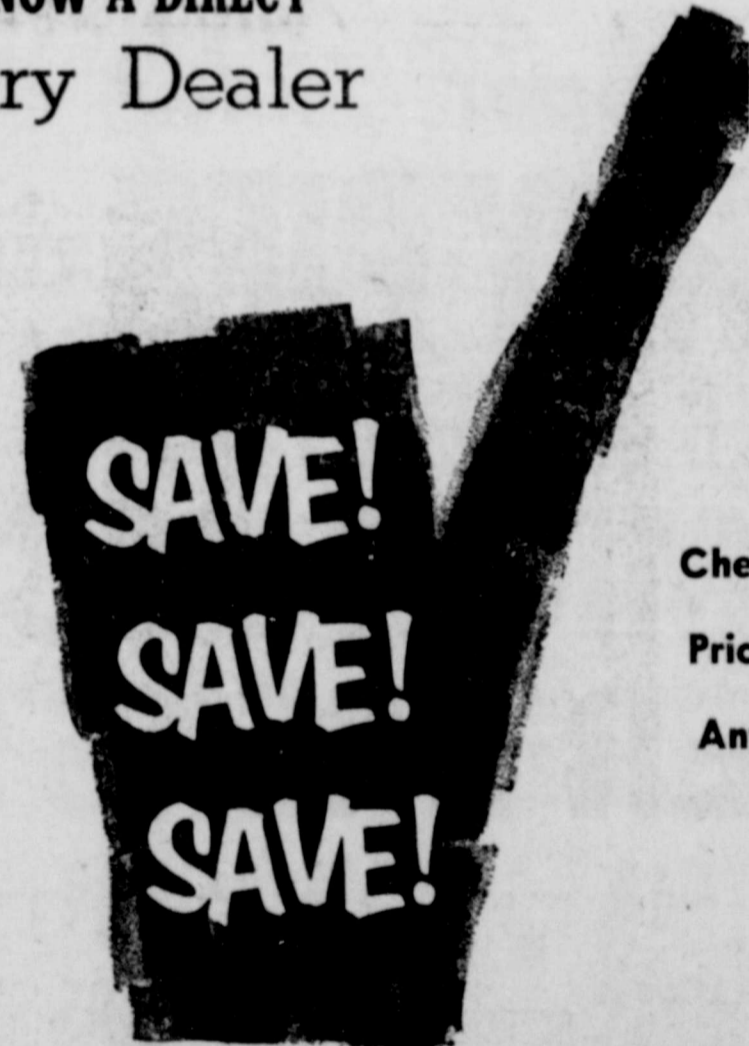

## SEE WHAT I MEAN?

THIS TALK about a joint dial system for Ranger, Eastland, and Cisco seems to be picking up more momentum and it leads us to speculate: Who will benefit?

ELSEWHERE in the Times can be found an editorial expressing the viewpoint of the Times and we need not elaborate to any great extent but we would like to add a few things.

J. W. SITTON, in his Cisco Press column, is of the opinion that the tri-cities system would not go over. He seems to dwell on the increase in rates as the major drawback for the proposal.

WE WOULD like to point out that there will be an increase in rates whenever the dial system goes into effect regardless of whether the joint system is used or just a local exchange. Should the joint system be used, the rates would be slightly higher.

THE TIMES thinks it will benefit Ranger. At present, county utility here is about as obscure and as beneficial as the north end of a south bound jackass. Local residents want to benefit Ranger, Eastland, and the same holds true with Cisco.

AND WITH that kind of tug-of-war going on, all we can see is damage to the entire county. Its about time the people of this county put their heads together and started working towards a common goal. By doing so, you would be surprised what the county can accomplish.

SOME RANGERITES are of the opinion that should the one-exchange system be used, Ranger would get a building. There is no basis for such a statement. Ranger will get the building regardless of which method is used.

ALL OF THIS involves the man on the street and it is him who will have to make the decision. But we are attempting to make him pick the right choice.

Things you might never know if you did not take the pains to check: There are fourteen births listed at the city hall here this far this year.

All of them are not from Ranger but a good many are.

Still in the speculative mood, we noted that an estimated 60,000 persons are expected to attend the second annual Fort Worth Boat and Sports Show this week.

And we cannot help but wonder if Ranger could pull something like that. It would draw a lot of state-wide publicity.

With 335 registered boats on Lake Leon and scores of persons using the facilities daily, we think such a thing would go over. It would, however, need the backing of the chamber of commerce, and the merchants and businessmen of Ranger.

Ranger has the facilities to hold a boat show. It is understood that the high school gymnasium or the National Guard Armory could be used in case of bad weather. If the sun shines, there is a suitable lot in the downtown area that can be used.

With 35,000,000 Americans part-time seafarers, we dare say that a few thousand of them live in the Ranger area. And with a little backing and pushing, they could all be pulled out to attend the show.

There are at least a half dozen merchants who handle motors, boats, and fishing and camping equipment in Ranger. We think they could all participate in the show to make it a success.

Take, for example, L and J Supply, Montgomery Ward, Ranger Boat Shop, and Western Auto—they all handle motors and boats. The Ranger Farm Store, Arterburn's Hardware and H. H. Vaughn handles fishing and camping equipment. The top three stores listed should handle fishing and camping equipment.

We would like to see a show here.

See the things on the dock Saturday night and Monday night in observance of George Washington's birthday. We just learned this morning that Washington was a Mason.

## Rotarians Told Of Tri-Cities Phone System

W. H. McAnelly, area manager of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, Wednesday briefed the Rotary Club on the possibilities of a tri-cities telephone system to include Ranger, Eastland, and Cisco.

Speaking in the Ranger College cafeteria, McAnelly said the Rotary Clubs of Cisco and Eastland had recently adopted resolutions asking the phone company to study the matter and determine the feasibility of the joint system.

He noted that the United States has been divided into 98 areas for the cross country dialing system, with Texas divided into five areas. Ranger will be in number 915 in Texas, an area that covers most of West Texas, when the network is completed.

The building to be constructed will be located at Pine and Austin Streets in downtown Ranger.

Some dial phones have already been installed in Ranger, McAnelly said, and others will be installed in future months. Test calls will be made when the exchange is near completion.

In answer to a question, he said it may not be possible for a person to retain the old telephone number. Phone numbers are determined by the class of service and it may be accidental that a person may keep the old number.

The 21 telephone operators now used in Ranger will be transferred to other towns but all will be given a choice of towns whenever possible.

If the one-exchange system is used, there will be one telephone book, similar to the present city directory. The long distance operator will be located in Cisco and long distance calls will go through her.

Dr. A. W. Brazda, president of the Rotary Club, presided at the noon meeting. Virgil Elliott introduced McAnelly.

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## A TRI-CITIES SYSTEM? (An Editorial)

The plan to put Eastland, Ranger and Cisco under a one telephone exchange arrangement, the Times believes, would strengthen this county many-fold.

The idea has already undergone the supreme test. It has had some cold water poured on it by a number of citizens from all three of the towns who believe that the three towns are better off divided. Despite these doubters, who are ready to oppose the plan even before hearing a report from the telephone company concerning rate increases—if there is to be any—the plan still has a full head of steam back of it.

We believe the majority of Eastland County citizens want the service if it can be provided at a reasonable price. If Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. reports the service would be warranted only alongside of a big rate increase, the Times will reverse its field and fight the plan.

We believe that citizens of the three towns hold a lot in common. We believe, in fact we know, that the large majority of us have friends and relatives in the other two towns which we could enjoy more if we could pick up the phone anytime we chose to and give them a call. We believe it would help businessmen in all three cities. We believe it would give us a strong economic unity.

We do not believe that many of us would oppose a slight increase in our telephone rates. We are confident that Bell will recognize the fact that businessmen have the most to gain, and are certain, therefore, that most of any increase which would have to come, would be placed on their shoulders.

For once, let's quit talking unity out of one side of our mouth and division out of the other. Despite the overuse of the phrase, we must say, "United we stand, divided we fall."

## AS IT LOOKS FOR HERE

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Perhaps

one of the most common inquiries

from constituents to their

Congressman is, "Why can't you

do something about . . . ?"

and one difficult to answer.

Usually it is a good question.

Time was when Congressmen

and Congress could do more

"about" than they can today. On

the other hand, there is more to

do "about" today than ever before.

The Congress passes the laws.

The Executive Department, head-

ed by the President of the United

States, or the various bureaus and

commissions, administer and en-

force the laws.

It is never intended, and it

is not possible to spell out in detail

the administration procedures and

specific enforcement of laws.

After laws are passed, those

administering the laws usually do

so under their own "regulations."

As Government has grown, the

many commissions and bureaus in

existence today were created to

carry out the purpose of Acts of

Congress. Governmental agencies

exercise tremendous influence in

the lives of our people. Many of

them hold almost life and death

power over our economy.

The Executive Branch of our

Government administers laws deal-

ing with agriculture, taxes, veter-

ans' benefits, Social Security, un-

employment and all matters with

policy of Government, both domes-

tic and foreign. Of course, it has

many other functions of adminis-

tration.

In addition to these, the Con-

gress over the years has created

such agencies as the Federal Com-

munications Commission, the Fed-

eral Power Commission, the Fed-

eral Trade Commission, the Civil

Aeronautics Board, and others.

These last named agencies are

supposedly an arm of the Con-

gress, but in recent years they

have become somewhat a law unto

themselves.

It is often wondered by a lot

of people why certain things

can't be done, or specific cases resolved in their favor. It is true, that as the Congress passes laws it can place maximum and minimum limitations, but interpretation and application must necessarily be made by the Executive Department and these various agencies and commissions.

It is difficult sometimes to explain why this, that and the other is not done or cannot be done. In any instances, it is a matter of some bureaucrat of Government employee looking and finding ways that something "can't be done," rather than to find a way whereby something can be done.

In the last session of the Congress a subcommittee known as the Subcommittee on Legislative Oversight was created to investigate the administering agencies of Government, because it is common knowledge that those directly responsible to Congress had slipped beyond Congress' control.

This Subcommittee has been making the headlines of late—not because of what it has accomplished, but its failure to even get started. It has fired its Chief Counsel, and a part of its staff and the Subcommittee Chairman

have resigned.

Politics and internal conflicts are the difficulty.

The Subcommittee, however, will continue under new leadership. It has a worthy motive and much to accomplish, it should do so.
