Often these words were not very clear.

But they were written a thousand years ago by a forgotten race. Hence they were holy.

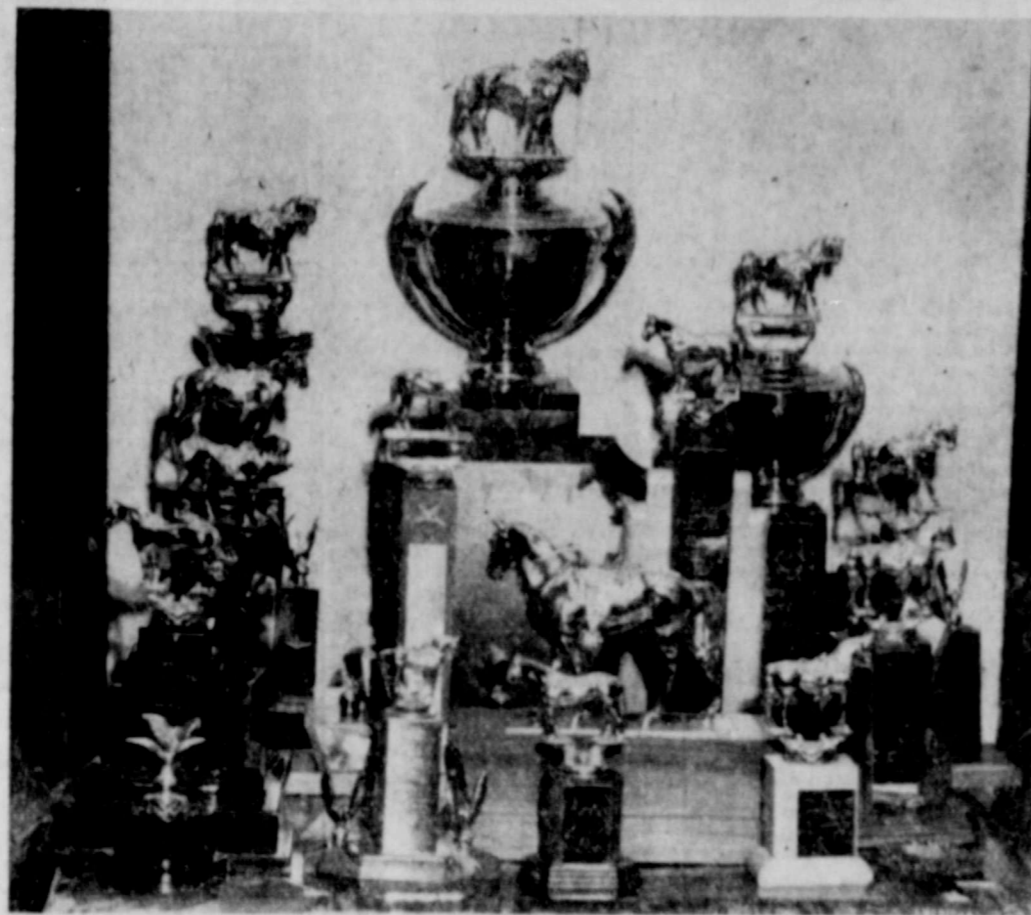
For in the Valley of Ignorance, whatever was old was venerable. And those who dared to gainsay the wisdom of the fathers were shunned by all decent people.

## Interest In Flood Control Program On Leon Is Noted

(Editor's Note: The following story was written by Soil Conservation Unit Workers.)

W. R. Heizer, of Soil Conservation Service, Dublin, met with the Eastland Chamber of Commerce directors recently, and discussed the flood prevention program as provided by Public Law 566.

Heizer is in charge of the technical assistance given by the Soil Conservation Service on the Greens Creek Pilot Watershed. He stated that all floodwater retaining structures, numbering 13, had been completed and had functioned very nicely during heavy rains. On April 30, 1956, an 11 inch rain fell in the watershed on the heels of showers a few days earlier making a total, in excess, of 11". No flooding was experienced due to these structures, combined with a good soil and water conservation program on the farms and ranches of the watershed. He further stated that Greens Creek had been flowing practically clear water since these earlier rains. The success of this project, Heizer says, is due to the full cooperation given by the local agencies and the many individual landowners.

There is a growing interest among many local people for a similar program on the South and north forks of the Leon River; for this to be possible the combined efforts of businessmen and landowners will be necessary, Heizer said.

The extremes of weather seems to continue over the state.

The drought which began in October 1950 over much of the state and extended through February 1957 was really something to talk about, Heizer said. Covering a period of approximately 77 months, it was the most severe drought in the state's recorded history.

The drought broke in February 1957 and Eastland recorded an all time record rainfall for the year 1957. Thus far, the year 1958 has started out as a wet one. Farmers and ranches alike are in good spirits and look forward to what appears to be the best Agricultural year since 1949. Some landowners of the district plan to build terraces.

## Vet's Land Board Sells Land Here

AUSTIN, Feb. 28.—Seventy-seven tracts of forfeited land in 23 Texas counties will be offered for sale by the Veterans' Land Board on March 31.

The forfeited tracts are located in every part of the state, says Frank Driskill, administrative assistant to Land Commissioner Bill Allcorn.

Meanwhile, the Veterans' Land Program is continuing at top speed. Driskill says, 2,750 application forms have been mailed since the Board sold \$12.5 million worth of bonds on December 16.

About 55 application forms are mailed every day to veterans on the waiting list, Driskill points out. The Board reached application number 8,730 today.

## County Delegates To Attend Area Farm Bureau Meet

Eastland County Farm Bureau leaders plan to attend a district-wide Farm Bureau meeting Monday in Brownwood to discuss current state and national issues. Those planning to attend from Eastland County are Don Kincaid, Ray Norris, Mitchell Campbell, John Love and other Committee Members.

The meeting will serve as a training clinic for both county officers, directors and committee members. Special training will be offered members of the Policy Execution.

Service to member a n d Membership committees. In addition, important issues on which Farm Bureau has policies will be reviewed. National issues include: national Wood Act, direct production payments, agricultural research, extension of reciprocal trade agreement act, federal aid to education, the "new look" long range program for cotton and feed grains, and wage and hour legislation.

State issues expected to come up are farm-to-market road program, redistributing county commissioner's precincts, permanent school fund, and rural electric cooperatives. These are among the more important issues likely to come before the Texas Legislature next January.

The meeting in Brownwood is one of 13 district sessions being held over the state in March.

## New Producer, Wildcat Try Noted In Area

A new producer northeast of Cisco and a wildcat try northeast of Gorman top area oil developments this week.

Fred A. Janssen Jr. of Dallas has completed the No. 1-A George F. Fee in section 76, block 4, H&TC survey, two miles northeast of Cisco as the confirmation well and an east offset to his recently completed No. 1 Fee, a Lake sand discovery.

It flowed 264 barrels of 41 gravity oil daily through half-inch chokes and perforations at 3,392 and 2,400 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 5,274.

The wildcat try is the No. 1 G. E. Smith, being drilled by O. O. Terrell at Argleton.

Location is 1450 feet from the south line and 330 feet from the west line of section 61, block 2, H&TC survey, one mile northeast of Gorman on a 163-acre lease. Proposed depth is 3500 feet.

## Motor Vehicle Inspection Date Looms Near

With less than two months left in which to have motor vehicles inspected, Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, urged motorists to obtain their 1958 inspection stickers immediately.

In doing so, he said that 64 per cent of the registered vehicles in Texas have not been inspected for the current year.

"At the present rate of inspection it looks as though the usual ten line for inspections will be waiting in line on April 15. With crowded inspection stations on this deadline date immediate service cannot be rendered and car owners will suffer an unnecessary loss of time and inconvenience."

Nearly half of the vehicles already inspected have required some adjustments or repairs which require more time for both the owner and the inspection station and can be handled better when not rushed.

The state police director said much time can be saved if car owners obtain their 1958 inspection stickers early.

Prepackaged Foods Offer Advantages

COLLEGE STATION — Prepackaging of food is often thought of as an extra service to the consumer. And it is frequently used as an explanation for the rising costs involved in marketing farm products.

Both these ideas are sound, says B. G. Hancock, extension horticulturist, but overlooked is the fact that packaging may also be of great advantage to the producer and seller of farm goods.

As recently as 1951, only about 1 percent of the fresh carrots was sold prepackaged. More than 85 percent are now sold this way.

This change is due in part to advantages to the grower, shipper, retailer and consumer, says Hancock. Prepackaged carrots are topped by the grower as they are harvested.

Ten years of research by the U. S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the carrot industry led to adoption of efficient and money-saving packaging methods...

### IT'S THE LAW

in Texas

You've heard the old saying that half a loaf is better than none. But when it comes to written contracts, that isn't exactly true. Oral contracts with some exceptions are perfectly enforceable in court. You make many such contracts in your daily living. When you drive into a filling station and say "Fill 'er up!" you've made an oral contract obliging you to pay for the gasoline the attendant puts in your tank. Every auction results in many oral contracts of sale. Millions of people are employed on oral contracts. The trouble with an oral con-

tract is the difficulty of proving its terms if a dispute arises. The court will listen to your version of the contract and to the other fellow's version and then try to reach a decision.

It is best then to put a contract in writing. But here is the danger—be sure you put it all in writing. If the written contract does not contain all of the elements you believed to be in the agreement, the court will not even listen to your version of the agreement. Thus, half a written contract may be worse than none.

For instance, you buy a stove which the salesman says you may return if you don't like it. You sign a conditional sales agreement that does not mention your right to return it. In fact, the fine print on the form says that you agree that no representations have been made about the stove except those written in the contract. If it turns out you don't like the stove you will have no right to return it, and you can be sued if you fail to pay for it.

For your own protection, read your contracts before you sign and insist on writing in any promises the seller makes to you but does not put in the contract.

### Zero Tolerance For Methoxychlor Noted in Milk

COLLEGE STATION — The use of methoxychlor as a pesticide on milking dairy cows when the method employed leaves residues of the poison in the milk has been outlawed by the Commissioner of Food and Drugs.

The Commissioner's ruling was in the form of a regulation setting a zero tolerance for methoxychlor in milk, according to F. W. Fuller, extension entomologist. The action was on a petition requesting a tolerance of 0.25 parts per million for methoxychlor in milk to permit use of the pesticide as a fly spray on milking dairy cattle.

Because of the unique place of milk in the diet of infants, children, the sick and aged, the Food and Drug Administration asked the National Academy of Sciences to select an advisory committee of scientists to consider the petition and make a recommendation, as

provided by the pesticide law. The committee found that the data on safety were inadequate to justify the establishment of a tolerance which would permit residues of methoxychlor in milk.

Summarizing their position, the committee pointed out the long-standing policy of the FDA and food officials of all states that no poisonous or injurious substance should be sanctioned in milk. They said that in view of the importance of milk in the diet, a greater margin of safety must be established than would be the case for any other food item.

But Fuller points out that the FDA's action does not prohibit the use of methoxychlor on dairy cows if the use will not result in residues. A tablespoonful or 10 grams of 50 percent wettable powder per animal, rubbed lightly in the hair on the back of the cows will help control horn flies, and will leave no residue when applied no often-

er than once every three weeks. But a residue results when used in sprays or dips, and they are unacceptable.

A spray for controlling horn flies on dairy cattle (in milk) which Fuller recommends consists of either .1 percent (one-tenth)

pyrethrin plus 1 percent piperonyl butoxide or .006 percent rotenone.
