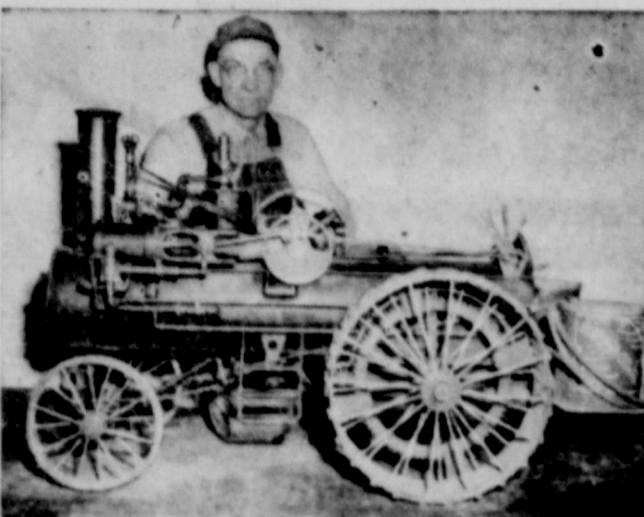

Christian Science Lecture Attended By Large Number

Liberation from the bondage of sin, sorrow, and limitation is available to all, Robert K. Slaughter of Dallas, declared in a lecture on Christian Science her Thursday.

Ever increasing numbers of people are gaining freedom from discords of every kind through an awakened understanding of God and man's relationship to him, Slaughter stated.

During the course of his lecture, he described healings through spiritual means alone of alcoholism, influenza, and accidental injuries said to be beyond help.

Speaking under the auspices of First Church of Christ, Scientist, Eastland Slaughter addressed a large audience in the church edifice at the corner of plummer and Lamar Streets on the subject "Christian Science: Its Message of Liberation." A member of The Christian Science Board of Lectureship, he was introduced by Mrs. E. J. Stanford, First Reader.

Throughout recorded history, the Lecturer said, no force has spurred on individuals more than the longing for freedom.

"Many people today long for a release from some kind of bondage, such as restricted opportunity, sickness, a sense of inadequacy, fear of a censuring past or foreboding future, or possible some enslaving habit that darkens one's life," he declared.

The spiritual truths of the Bible offer these individual liberation, he said, by revealing man's God-given heritage of dominion.

Cookies Children Can Make

On days when children are at home and the weather does not permit much outside activity, help them make cookies. An easy recipe and a little guidance will open up a whole new area of interest for them. The results can be fun, too, for cookie baking may lead to an impromptu party.

A recipe that is just right for such a baking spree for children is Banana Walnut Specials. The ingredients are only four; plain cookie mix, a banana, allspice and walnuts.

Look for the new transparent package in which Diamond Walnuts are now being marketed. After much research, saran was selected as the packaging material because of its fine protective qualities. Walnuts will keep well and are guaranteed fresh in the new package.

Also, the packages are marked in 1/2, 1/4, 1/8 and 2 1/2 cup amounts. This helps the homemaker to select precise amounts from the grocery's shelf. If the package of walnuts is only partly used, carefully fold back the edges of the saran and refrigerate. This will help keep the shelled walnuts fresh until used.

Here is the recipe for Banana Walnut Specials.

Banana Nut Specials
1 1/2 cup package plain cookie mix
1/2 cup chopped Diamond Walnuts (purchase package marked 1/2 cup for convenience)
3/4 cup mashed banana (about 1)
1/2 teaspoon allspice

Empty the package of cookie mix into a medium sized bowl. Take one banana (yellow banded with brown) and mash a little at a time in a glass measuring cup until the amount reaches 3/4 cup. Add this to the cookie mix. Carefully measure out 1/2 teaspoon of allspice (cinnamon may be used if you like) and place in the bowl. Take 1/2 cup package Diamond Walnuts and empty package into mix. Mix together. Drop by teaspoonful on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) for 12 to 15 minutes.

bushels of corn".
That is the way inflation works.
It gives us the pleasant but dangerous feeling that everything is wonderful, while it eats away at your pocketbook and savings, our insurance and pensions...

make it necessary for our government to increase annual defense spending by several billion dollars, which would add to the inflationary spiral.
But we can help check this inflation if, individually and collectively, we cease demanding federal aid, assistance and benefits for our special projects and programs. We can urge our government to economize, not

to spend and spend and spend.
You and I should write our senators, congressmen, and the president of the United States and say:
"Appropriate and spend whatever is necessary for the defense of our country, but let us cut out non-essential appropriations and expenditures... including the special aids, benefits and services for my group and my community."

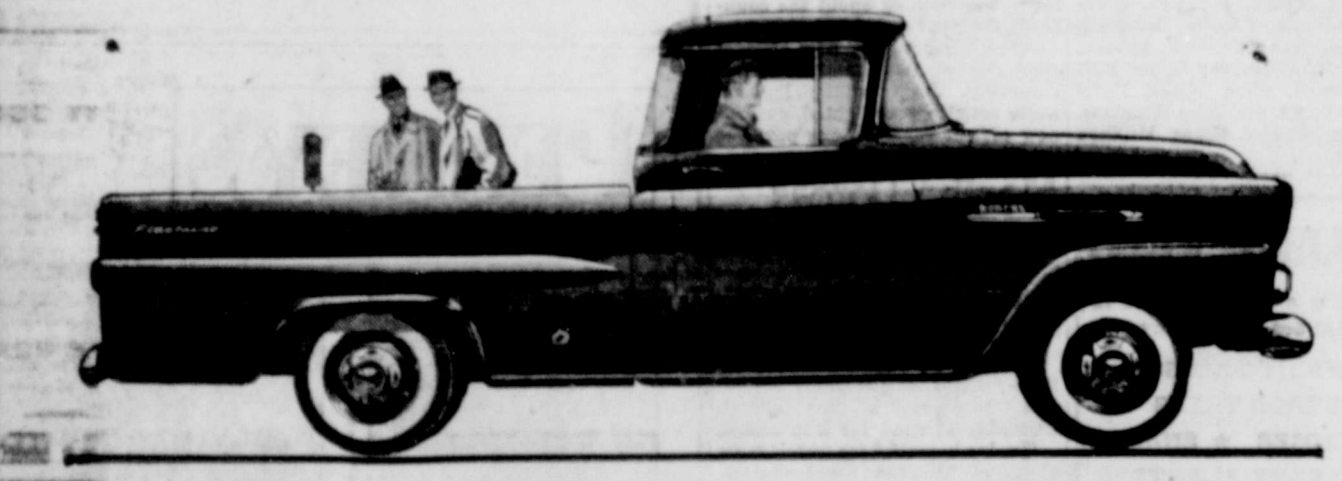

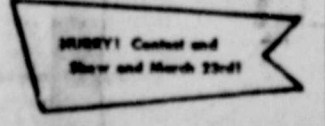
