We were told that much of the land visited had been in cultivation for the past sixty seventy and as much as sixty, seventy and as much as eighty years, and that the fertility of the soil had been depleted many years ago and that only through good soil building practices was the present economy in that rich agricultural area possible. While many commercial feeders are operating in the Arkansas and Platt River Valleys, buying from the farmers and selling barnyard fertilizer back to them, there are many farmers who operate their own feed lots on both large and small scales. Many of the cattle fed out in that area are purchased in West Texas, we saw one group of cattle that had been purchased from a Castro County farmer. The feeders declare that they invaria-

According to J. W. Skipworth, city secretary, an estimated \$213,525 has been spent in Dimmitt since January 1st on building and remodeling programs. This figure includes all residences and business buildings which secured permits after the first of the year. This is a record for the length of time elapsed for Dimmitt. The figure represents a small fortune spent in erecting businesses and residences in Dimmitt. Most of the money was used for new homes and remodels and therefore covers many new homes in town. The figure includes the new Hays Implement Building, farm loan building now being completed and the new theatre building.

But the trade we are talking of is those groceries you buy, your clothes, automobiles, farm machinery, petroleum products, and other things.

It is good business to trade in Dimmitt because the money will stay in town and some will go back to the purchaser. It also enables the merchant to increase his stock. It is poor business to used strictly for amusement, it spend \$5 for gas and oil to go to Amarillo to buy sale products when they can be purchased here. Prices may be higher here than in other towns but they are not enough higher to counteract the expense of going out of town. If a purchase is not satisfactory the buyer can hardly return it if bought outside of the County, whereas it is a simple matter to get the product redeemed here. Incidentally you would have a better chance to get an adjustment from local merchants than those out of town.

Do you know that marble or pinball machines are a violation of the law, if they give a free

While there is a wide difference of opinion among the members of the public as a whole as to the legality and propiety of these machines the law itself

If the machine is operated and is legal to operate one. However, merely placing a sticker, "This machine for amusement only" on the machine does not end the operator's responsibility. In the first place, if the machine gives anything of value as a result of skillful manipulation of the machine, it is used for gambling purposes and subject to the laws governing such devices. Even the make the machine subject to confiscation as a gambling devise. operator give nothing of value, but those who play the machine bet upon the results of their operation of the game, and the operator of the machine knows of this fact and permits it to be done, then he is subject to punishment and the machine subject to confiscation.
