The man, who says he is fifty years old but looks twenty, just naturally likes kids. And the youngsters, in turn, are equally as crazy about him. The kids have their pet nicknames they apply to him when his ears are out of sight.

But the nicknames used do not signify disrespect.

He and Mrs. Perry spend three nights — Thursday, Friday, and Saturday — each week at Teen Town directing the youngsters in scores of activities offered there.

They become part of the crowd at playing ping pong, pool, or dancing. Even though they are grandparents they are just as young as the kids they host.

Imagine being host to 6,105 Ranger teenagers in the past twelve months. And that figure does not include visitors from every section of Texas and other states of the Union.

Patience is, indeed, a virtue with the Perrys.

During the course of a conversation, Homer may be interrupted any number of times by the youngsters with, "Mr. Perry, when you turn the juke box up some," or "Mr. Perry, give me a tickle to put in the juke box," or "Mr. Perry, do you spot the cue ball when you scratch?"

And the man has an answer for every question. Always with a smile and a quality of patience far better than any virtue, he will quickly aid the children.

To the Perrys, children are the keys to Paradise.

The Teen Town organization is one of the most unique in the state. A group of teenage officers operate it with the assistance of adults.

Everything in the wood-frame building is ultra-modern, and has the touch of a teenage hand in it. One thing is primitive in Teen Town.

The juke box.

At a glance, one would conclude that the present one is from a World War II USO show. It only plays 24 records which is not much in music variety for the rock-n-roll lovers.

Even though there are 48 selections, the juke box will only play 24. And 24 are going to waste. It is a 78 rpm deal.

With a new one, say a 45 rpm turntable capable of playing both sides of 40 records, the youngsters would really be set to music. From 40 records, they can get 80 selections.

But a 45 rpm turntable costs about \$350. However, Perry and the youngsters are not dissuaded. They all want one. And with the help of the citizens of Ranger, they could very easily get one.

A recently completed annex to Teen Town will bear the name of Norman Wright, late editor of The Ranger Times, who did so much for the organization. It was the members' idea to name it after Wright.

The Teen Town Mothers Club has just recently completed a kitchen, complete with range, refrigerator, and cabinets.

And Perry has a dozen other improvements in the back of his mind. With time, they will all materialize.

Just try and tell the Perrys that the younger generation is going to the dogs. One cannot succeed. In any generation, children are children. They have their own queer thoughts, queer because we did not have the genius to think of them when we were young.

Ranger, to be sure, has one unique thing to brag about, and that is Teen Town, and it can brag equally so about a couple of good citizens—the Perrys.

Ivy Turkey Growers President

Ed Ivy, who lives about eight miles south of Cisco on the Breckenridge highway, was elected president of the Central Texas Turkey Growers Association at a meeting held at Carbon in 1951. It has continued to grow since that time.

Named vice president of the Association was Don Kincaid of Cisco. Mrs. Aubrey Kincaid of Ranger was elected secretary.

Turkey growers heard George Draper, state supervisor of the Texas Turkey Improvement program, explain "Turkey Management." Draper told growers that there would be fewer turkey breeder hens in the state this year, meaning that the price of turkeys should be better this year.

Officers for the new year voted to have as their number one project for the year an all-out effort to get the Texas A&M Extension Department to put a poultry diagnosis laboratory in Stephenville. The organization has the support of the Texas Farm Bureau in the drive. Eastland County Farm Bureau members pushed a move to have the state organization support the movement. Turkey growers agreed that the need for such a lab in this area is great.

A number of other projects for the year were discussed at the meeting, which was well attended. Proposed turkey regulations and

other important matters also came up for discussion at the meeting. The Central Texas Turkey Growers Association was first organized at a meeting held at Carbon in 1951. It has continued to grow since that time.

Bell Studies One-System Phone Set-up

Studies are still under way for a tri-city dial system by the Eastern Bell Telephone Company, according to W. H. McAnelly, district manager.

McAnelly told The Times by telephone Monday that a considerable amount of research must be done by the Dallas office before any action can be taken. The company is studying the revenue taken in from the three towns — Ranger, Eastland, and Cisco, and, according to McAnelly, this would take about three to four months.

WEATHER CONDITIONS BLAMED

Fishing at Lake Leon is at an all-time low for this time of the year, according to Ed Richardson, caretaker.

The continued cold and wet weather that has prevailed in this area has been the blame for the decrease in fishing and camping activity at the lake, Richardson said.

Richardson noted that this time last year, a large amount of fish were being pulled from the lake daily. However, in May, 1957, when the heavy rains started to fall to set a record amount in Eastland County, fishing dropped considerably.

Richardson said since these rains, and the heavy downpours this year, the lake has remained muddy. Some clearing is noticeable and, according to Richardson, should fair weather prevail, the lake should clear up in several weeks.

The lake remains at full level, 75 feet.

Thus far this year, an unofficial total of 7.15 inches of rain has been recorded in the Lake Leon area. However, the U. S. Weather Bureau station in Eastland has recorded slightly less than that. Unofficially, 4.15 inches of it has fallen in March.

And indications are that more are in store before the month is over.

The weatherman calls for continued cold for several more days and that will put the stopper on fishing at the lake.

Most local weather observers are of the opinion that fair weather will be predominant after the entry of spring, March 20. And should this happen, fishing at Lake Leon will increase.

Soil Conservation Meeting Held Here

Soil Conservation District supervisors from the Upper Leon, Rosque, Palo Pinto and Lower Clear Fork Soil Conservation districts met in Eastland for a luncheon at the White Elephant restaurant and a business session which followed at the Texas Electric Service Co. Conference room.

Henry W. Turney, district supervisor of the Upper Leon district of the State Association of Soil Conservation Districts, led the group discussion on soil and water conservation problems confronting landowners of this area. He said the State Soil Conservation Board welcomes this type of "grass roots" information from over the state—a basis for a more effective conservation program.

A second range deferral period will start April 1 and end Dec. 31. The rate of pay will be .62 per acre as provided by the Eastland County ACP handbook. Landowners desiring to participate in this practice must make their application prior to April 1. Maximum benefits should be received from this practice by landowners due to the excellent moisture conditions of most rangelands. E. E. McAlister said. Grass seedlings

Since approximately 70 percent of the county is made up of range land it is evident that grass is our most important crop.
