As the matter stands now, that "hunk of concrete" is in the way. And if nothing is going to be done, it should be removed as a traffic hazard.

The crime of one youngster forcing another youth to give up his lunch money for three weeks to pay off a five dollar debt is, without a doubt, one of the worst things to come to light in the recent hubcap thefts.

And before the complete story unfolds, dozens of other crimes are destined to cause some sore spots before the eyes of local residents.

As far as law officers can ascertain, the hubcap ring was an amateur organization. But it had the possibilities of expanding and would had time permitted.

The youngster who forced another younger than he was to give up his lunch money daily has a touch of the Roaring 'Twenties' days in it. We think it is sickening to know that such things are going on in the local junior and senior high age group.

It is past due for someone to pull the scalp off the sore and allow the eyes of Ranger citizens to see the rotten picture.

The youths involved in a "straighten up" for good. Some will be good for a period of time, and some will go right back to their old ways. Time will reveal the story.

Mrs. R. V. Robinson telephoned Wednesday afternoon and read us a brief quotation from Williams that we feel is worthy of reproduction.

Here it is: "A dear old friend of mine used to say with the truest christian charity, when he heard me being loudly condemned for some fault: 'Ah! well, yes, this seems very bad to me, because that's not my way of sinning.'"

All of the circulars pertained to the president of Ranger College, the college itself, and the college board of regents.

## Crime Inside Crime Revealed By Officers

A crime within a crime was revealed today by local law enforcement officers in the unraveling hubcap thefts in Eastland County.

Law officers revealed that a 15-year-old Ranger boy had forced a 13-year-old junior high school boy to give him his lunch money to pay a five dollar debt.

The weird, gangland type payoff came to light last week with the arrest of some fifteen teenage boys from Ranger and Eastland.

According to officers, the two youths stole two hubcaps and hid them just outside Ranger. Later, the younger boy and another companion returned to the hiding place of the hubcaps, took them and sold them to another youth for four dollars.

When the 15-year-old learned of the action, he demanded five dollars each from the two youths.

## Crappie Fishing Increases With Warmer Weather

Eb Richardson, caretaker at Lake Leon, indicated today that when the present cold spell comes to an end, crappie fishing will increase at the lake.

He noted that an Eastland man, Dave Godley, Saturday morning caught six crappies that weighed an average of 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 pounds near the dam.

These were caught in four feet of water, Richardson said. Indications from the weatherman was that a warming trend was under way. And, with warm weather, Richardson said the crappie would bite.

# BOAT SHOW SET

## Prizes Will Be Offered

An estimated one hundred dollars in prizes will be offered at the first annual boat show to be held in Ranger Saturday and Sunday.

Prizes to be offered include a pair of water skis, a rod and reel, a set of step pods, and a flag pole to attach to a boat.

Visitors of the two-day boat show event will also have an opportunity to enter the Fisherman Conservation Contest and win a sixteen foot Lone Star boat, or to win a 15-foot Yellowjacket boat, valued at \$895, to be given away by the Ranger Volunteer Firemen.

Approximately seventeen boats will be on display at the local National Guard armory. Also to be exhibited will be every known type of picnicking, camping, and fishing equipment.

Four local dealers in boats, motors, and fishing equipment will exhibit at the show. The four are Ranger Boat Shop, L and J Supply, Montgomery Ward, and Arterburn's Hardware and Furniture Store.

L and J Supply will give away a pair of water skis at the show.

To be eligible to win the skis, valued at \$40, all one need do is register at the L and J Supply booth. A person does not have to be present to win.

The drawing will be held Sunday at 5:30 p.m.

Montgomery Ward and Company will give away a rod, a reel, valued at approximately \$25. And Ranger Boat Shop plans to give away a set of step pods and a flag pole to attach to a boat.

The colorful boat show will start at 1 p.m. Saturday and continue through until 6 p.m. Sunday. Saturday hours will be from 1 until 8 p.m. The show will resume again at 1 p.m. Sunday. All drawings will be staged just before the show closes Sunday.

L and J Supply indicated that they will exhibit three boats at the show. Also to be exhibited will be motors, all types of boat accessories, and water skis.

Ranger Boat Shop said they would display between seven and ten boats, motors, and other boating accessories.

Montgomery Ward plans to exhibit five Sea King boats during the two-day event.

All that is necessary to win any of the prizes to be given away is to register. One does not have to be present to win.

Arterburn's Hardware, exhibitor of camping, fishing, and hunting equipment, will give show visitors an opportunity to enter the Fisherman Conservation Contest. Entry blanks will be made available at the Arterburn booth. Top prize in this event is a 16-foot Lone Star boat.

The Ranger Volunteer Firemen will give away a 15-foot Yellowjacket boat which will be on display at the Guard Armory. The boat will not be given away until July 4.

This is the first time any attempt has been made to conduct a boat show in Ranger. Scores of shows are held throughout the year in the Ranger area.

Most local citizens and firms involved in the show are of the opinion that the show will be a success. Only local firms will exhibit during the two-day show.

# Survey of Ponds In Area Show Most Getting Old

Important new information, including results of a farm pond survey just completed in Texas, was released today by H. N. Smith, state conservationist, Soil Conservation Service.

Smith stated that the survey was made in response to questions raised during the recent drought concerning the effect of conservation measures on water supply. Municipal and industrial users of water were greatly interested in the outcome of the survey.

Information gathered for the survey by the local S.C.S. work unit at Eastland shows some 2700 ponds in the North Central Prairie Resource area of Eastland County. The North Central Prairie Resource Area in Eastland County generally includes about the northern two-thirds portion of the county.

Even though a very large number of ponds have been built in this area in recent years the average age of ponds is comparatively old. About 60 percent of all ponds are 10 to 20 years old and 24 percent are over 20 years old. Most of these older ponds are small in size, shallow, and have a large portion of their original storage filled with silt.

All ponds as a whole sampled in this area show an average of 40 surface acres and an average of 2.00 acre feet storage capacity. They have an average depth of 11 feet and an average drainage area of 29.3 acres. The survey shows 28.1 percent of all land in this area is draining through ponds. This is as high as found in the state although a large portion is through old small ponds with undesirable storages.

Farm ponds were singled out for the study, because some had felt that they might have more effect on water yield than any other single practice. When the survey was completed, little definite information was available as to the number of ponds, their location, or the "run" effect they might have on water supply.

Information gathered included total number of farm and ranch ponds by water watershed, surface acres, drainage area, capacity, and depth. A very good list of a farm or ranch owner to

for livestock water was considered as a farm or ranch pond. From these data, such information as the present of total land area draining through ponds, the total surface area by watersheds and for the state, the total capacity, and other items could be compiled.

The information was gathered on a representative sampling basis. In addition to its being expanded on a major river watershed basis, it also can be calculated on a land resource area basis, increasing its usefulness to water use planners.

The survey revealed that for the state as a whole there are almost 342,000 farm ponds. When filled to capacity, these ponds had an original total storage of approximately 922,000 acre-feet.

When the survey was made, an estimated 100,000 acre-feet of the original capacity had been filled by sediment. The total surface area of the ponds was about 248,000 acres, and the total drainage area 12,757,000 acres. The average pond capacity when full was 2.72 acre-feet, the average surface area 0.72 acre-feet, the average maximum depth 10.57 feet, and the average drainage area per pond 37.25 acres.

For three of the major river watersheds in the state, the survey revealed the following: Watershed, Number of ponds, Average Capacity, Average Surface Area, Average drainage area, respectively are: Brazos, 93,00, 2.61 ac. ft., 1.72

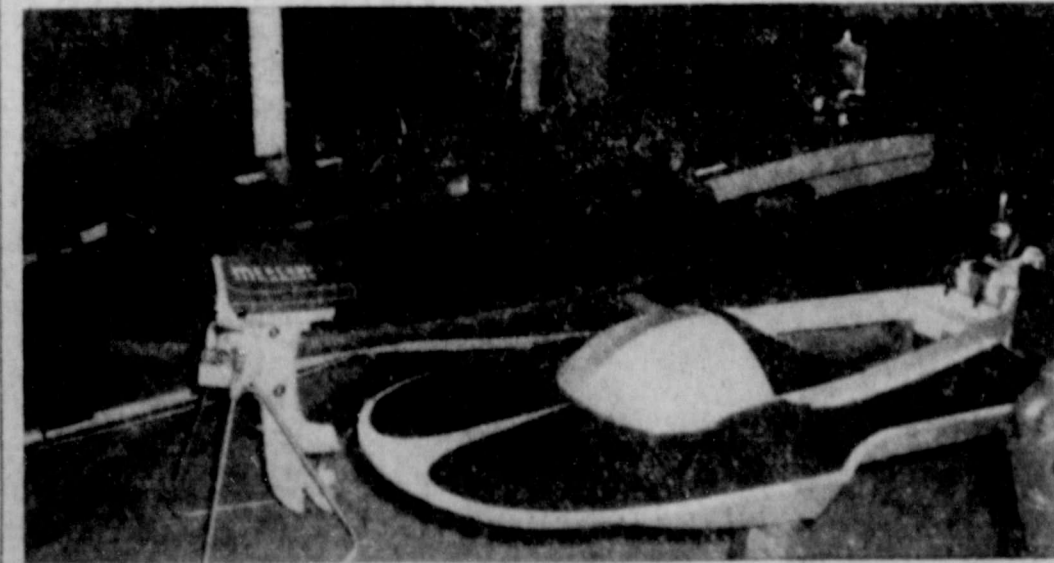
A reminder to county women wanting to donate pies and cakes for the show concession stand was given today by Mrs. Johnnie Aaron. She urged women to bring

### Soufflé And Soup For Supper



New-method soufflés are simple enough for the most inexperienced cook, and hearty enough for the hungriest he-man. A perfect soufflé can be made in an everyday pie plate . . . It owes its ease of preparation and airiness of texture to the cup of evaporated milk in the ingredient list. The evaporated milk eliminates the need for a white sauce, and even the cheese is sliced right into the milk mixture, without any previous grating. The only unbreakable rule is that a soufflé waits for no man, so better a hungry brood clamoring at the dinner table, than a crestfallen soufflé that's been kept a-waiting. Preceded a cheese soufflé filled with a piquant asparagus sauce with soup on the rocks.

**Cheese Soufflé Pie**

1 cup evaporated milk	1/2 teaspoon monosodium glutamate
3 tablespoons all-purpose flour	1/4 pound cheddar cheese or process American cheese
1/2 teaspoon salt	3 eggs separated
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard	

Pour evaporated milk into top of double boiler. Add flour, salt, dry mustard and monosodium glutamate; beat with rotary beater until smooth. Place over boiling water and beat until slightly thickened, about 5 minutes. Slice cheese into milk mixture and stir occasionally with rotary beater until thickened and cheese has melted. Beat until smooth. Remove from heat. Add egg yolks, one at a time, beating after each addition. (Wash beater thoroughly. Any trace of fat will prevent egg whites from whipping.) Beat egg whites until stiff, but not dry. Gradually fold in cheese mixture. Bake in a slow oven (325° F.) 30 minutes. Serve immediately. YIELD: 4 servings.

**Bit 'O Spring Sauce**

1 can (10 1/2 ounces) condensed cream of asparagus soup	1-16 teaspoon thyme
1/2 cup evaporated milk	2 teaspoons lemon juice

Blend together soup and evaporated milk in saucepan; add thyme. Heat to serving temperature. Stir in lemon juice. Turn into serving dish; if desired, garnish with chopped hard cooked egg. YIELD: Approximately 1 1/2 cups.

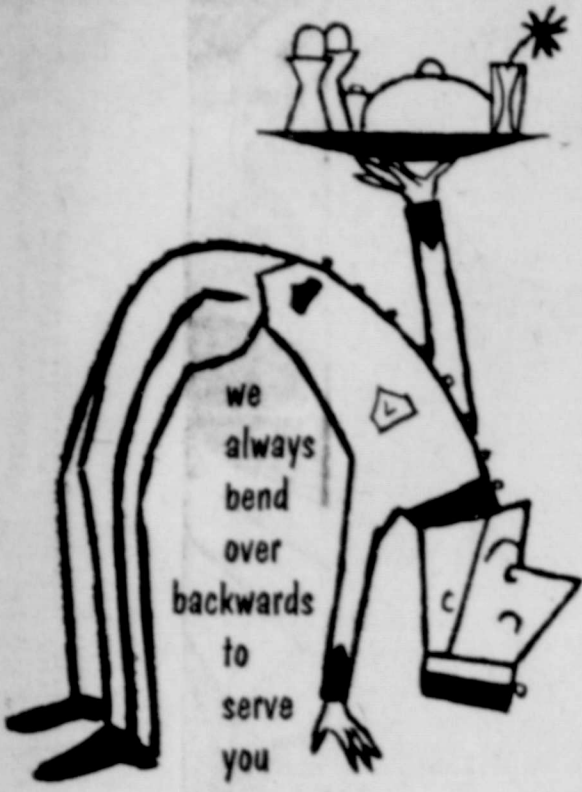

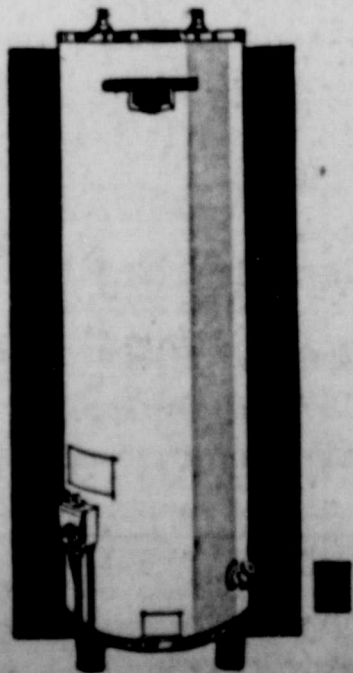

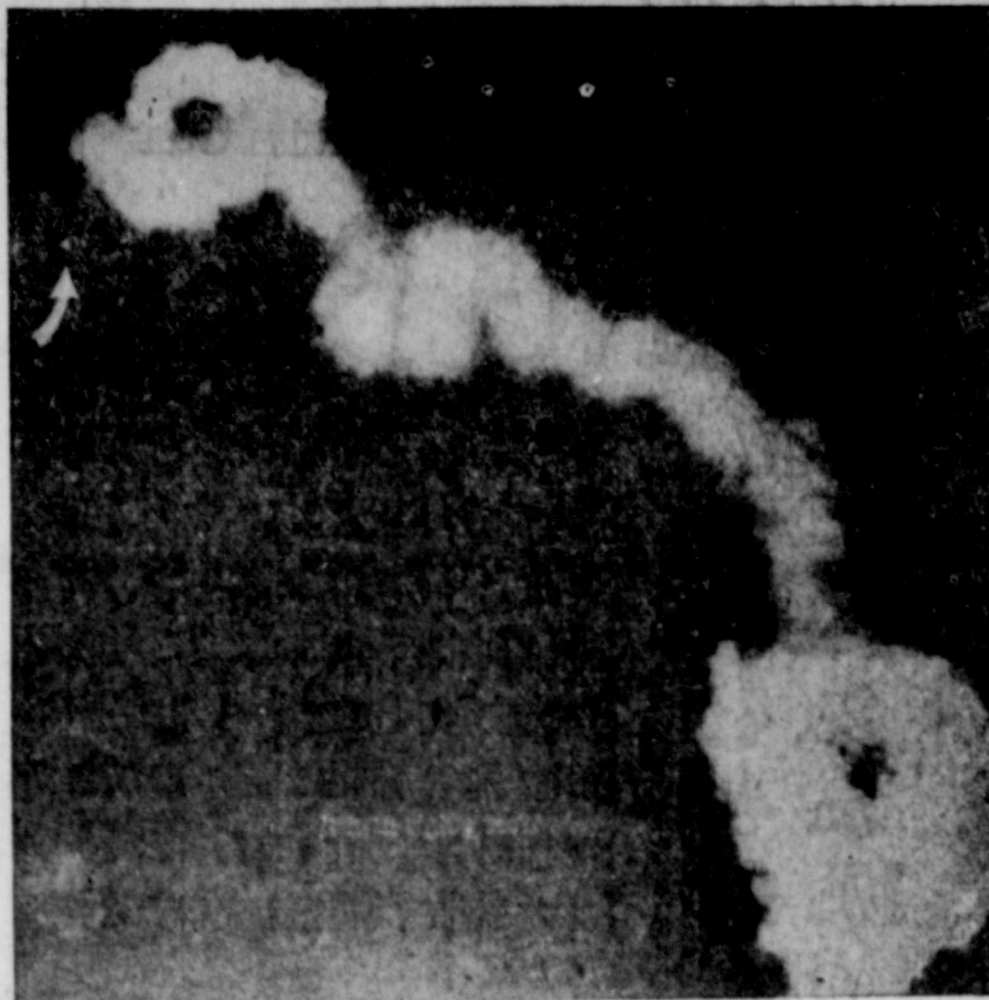

The total area draining through ponds comprises only 7.55 percent of the land area of Texas. This varied from a low of 0.44 percent in the Coast Prairie Resource Area to a high of 26.26 percent in the North Central Prairie Resources of Northern Central Texas.

Smith stated that in many areas of the state, farm ponds are the major source of usable livestock water available to the farmer or rancher, and they play a vital role in the management of livestock grazing resources.
