



Times readers who learned to look forward to reading the columns written by the late Norman Wright probably were startled by the familiar "What's Cooking" heading above.

This column, however, is just the Times' way of paying respect to the man who did so much for this newspaper and for Ranger. This column is made up of some of Wright's many comments:

For instance, Norman once suggested that the best way to run down Ranger would be to "belittle all efforts for community betterment—the people trying to do these things are secretly making a lot of money, want to 'run things' and their way of doing things is all wrong anyway."

Another time Norman told this story:

"Once upon a time there was a group of men determined to embarrass and destroy the reputation of Jesus.

They brought an adulteress to him and posed the question whether or not she should be stoned as the law at that time required. Because the law and the teachings of Jesus were in conflict, the group had concluded that Jesus would have to cross himself up in choosing to recommend either course of action."

"But instead of saying the adulteress should be stoned, in conflict with religious principles, or saying she should not be stoned in conflict with the law, Jesus said, 'Let him who is without sin among you cast the first stone.'"

Here are a few more statements Norman made, which you probably remember:

It is a pleasure and an honor to mix and mingle with all the young men and young women at Ranger Junior College, and that goes for every man and woman on the faculty because they are a great bunch out there and are doing a noble work and building a wonderful school. (March 26, 1957)

There is too much at stake, businesswise, for carelessness indifference on the part of somebody to toss a monkey wrench into the machinery. As someone has aptly said, Ranger can be the best spot in Eastland County throughout the entire Fall, Winter and Holiday season if it wants to be and works at it. Who else in Eastland County has got anything to compare with what Ranger can offer the trading public? Brother, Ranger is loaded with it, but it is going to take a selling job to put it over in the right way—a 100 percent selling job! (August 15, 1957)

Yes, Norman Wright was always ready to aid any cause which would help Ranger and was always ready to fight any move which would hurt this city. If more of our citizens would take this attitude—and try to build up Ranger and all of its institutions—we would be far better off.

The time is here when Ranger must band together and move forward. We cannot afford to fight among ourselves over petty issues. We must see that all of our organizations and institutions get the support they need and deserve from all of us.

If their must be criticism, let it be of the constructive nature. Surely we do not have to resort to character assassination and other such low tricks.

We have a wonderful town, here in Ranger. We have schools, a good college, good churches, good business and professional men. There's just that one big thing that we lack at the moment... cooperation.

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Featherlite Announces Expansion

The Featherlite Corporation, through plant manager Carl Black, has announced another addition to its Ranger plant. Following the addition of its number 7 and 8 kilns in October, a new North-west 1-yard shovel was purchased in January. This equipment replaces two smaller shovels used in pit operation for the past two years.

Most recent addition was the installation of a primary crusher with conveyor belt feeding. The crusher replaces the two draglines which were used for many years to feed the expanded material to the crushers.

In effect, the conveying system has doubled the capacity of the crushing operation of the local plant.

Since October, Featherlite has been crushing and loading 8 to 10 cars per day, working two 8-hour shifts. The new equipment has increased the production to 12 and 15 cars per day on one 10-hour shift.

Ideal production through the kilns will average 100 yards each per day for a total of 800 yards daily and 24 thousand yards monthly. The new crushing set-up is more than adequate to handle this volume.

Combined operations of Featherlite and American Aggregate in Ranger, reportedly, from the largest expanded shale aggregate plant in the world.

The majority of construction is now complete and a clean-up and maintenance program on the old installations will now be the order of the day.

Featherlite welcomes visitors interested in touring the plant and watching operations.

Ranger Kin Dies In Abilene

Mrs. Merion Montgomery of Breckenridge, sister to Fred King of Ranger and granddaughter of Mrs. J. B. King of Ranger, died in Abilene Tuesday afternoon.

Mrs. Montgomery, who had been in ill-health for sometime, was stricken while riding with her mother in down-town Abilene.

The mother stopped the car and Mrs. Montgomery as the car door opened fell from the vehicle. She was carried to Hendricks Memorial in Elliott's Funeral Home ambulance, where she was pronounced dead on arrival.

A native of Gorman, the deceased was born Flossie Evelyn Lamb August 23, 1923, and had moved with her parents to Breckenridge at the age of one year.

Survivors include her husband, her mother, Mrs. Lynetta Lamb of Breckenridge and three children, Merlon Jr., Lynetta Merlene and Larry Rewell with the above mentioned.

Funeral services were held at Breckenridge under direction of Satterwhite Funeral Home.

County's Death Toll Is Ahead of Schedule

Eastland County is ahead of schedule as far as highway deaths are concerned, Sgt. C. A. Cockrell, head of the Eastland County Highway Patrol sub-station, told Eastland Lions Tuesday.

Sgt. Cockrell, who oversees traffic enforcement in a five-county area, said two persons have already died in highway mishaps. Eastland County's "quota" for the year, according to statisticians, is five.

Records show, Sgt. Cockrell said, that last year six persons died for every 100 million miles driven. The death rate in Texas has come down and down. In 1958 there were 14.6 traffic deaths for every 100 million miles driven and in 1956 the number dropped to 6.5.

That means that in 1957 traffic deaths in the state dropped by three percent, from 2611 to 2539, despite the fact that the number of miles traveled increased.

In the five county area Sgt. Cockrell supervises — Eastland, Shackelford, Brown, Coleman and Stephens — a total of 750,000 miles are traveled daily. In a year's time 274,000,000 miles are driven by drivers in the five counties. For the five counties it is estimated that 16 or 17 persons will die in 1958. So far six have been killed.

In Eastland County alone daily mileage is listed at 25,100 miles. The county's death rate has had a continued decline in recent years, and the number of arrests made by highway patrolmen has shown an increase. In 1955 13 persons died in the county and only 812 arrests were made. In 1956 seven were killed and 1689 arrests were made. In 1957 there were four killed and 1236 arrests made. Sgt. Cockrell said that at Eastland County Highway Patrolmen Les Stewart and Al White deserve much of the credit for the decline in deaths.

While the state's traffic deaths were down for 1957, the major crime rate was up. A total of 1084 persons died from homicides in the past year, an increase of 9.2 per

GOC SET TO GIVE TORNADO ALERT HERE

Post Supervisor T. C. Weaver urges that the public acquaint itself with the tornado alert plan of action.

Mr. Weaver stated that the Ranger Ground Observer Corps will receive alerts through the Dallas filter-center by code. Upon receipt of message the local corps will sight the tornado line of approach. If any possible strikes in indicated for Ranger, the GOC will sound the tornado danger alert.

This alert will be three blasts of the siren. The blasts will be sounded; the FIRST, one minute pause, the SECOND, one minute pause, the THIRD which means run for shelter or get out of town.

Tornado warnings and areas will be flashed by KRRC Radio and TV of Abilene, KP&K TV Abilene, KRLD Radio and TV Dallas, WBAP Radio and TV Fort Worth, KWTW Radio and TV Wichita Falls.

Mr. Weaver will be assisted by M. D. Sharp and Chief Observer, Max Ohr.

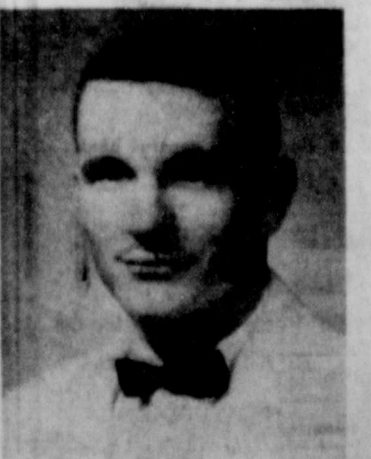
An educational picture showing progress of a tornado and action of GOC will be shown April 29 in the High School auditorium. Time will be announced later.

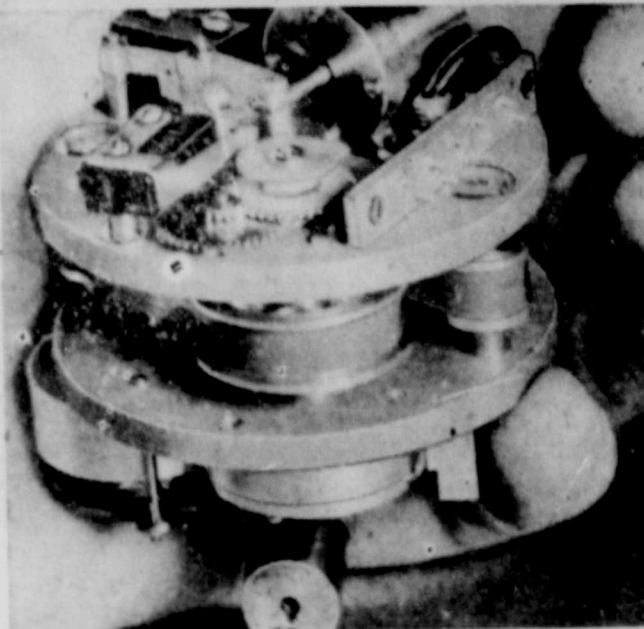

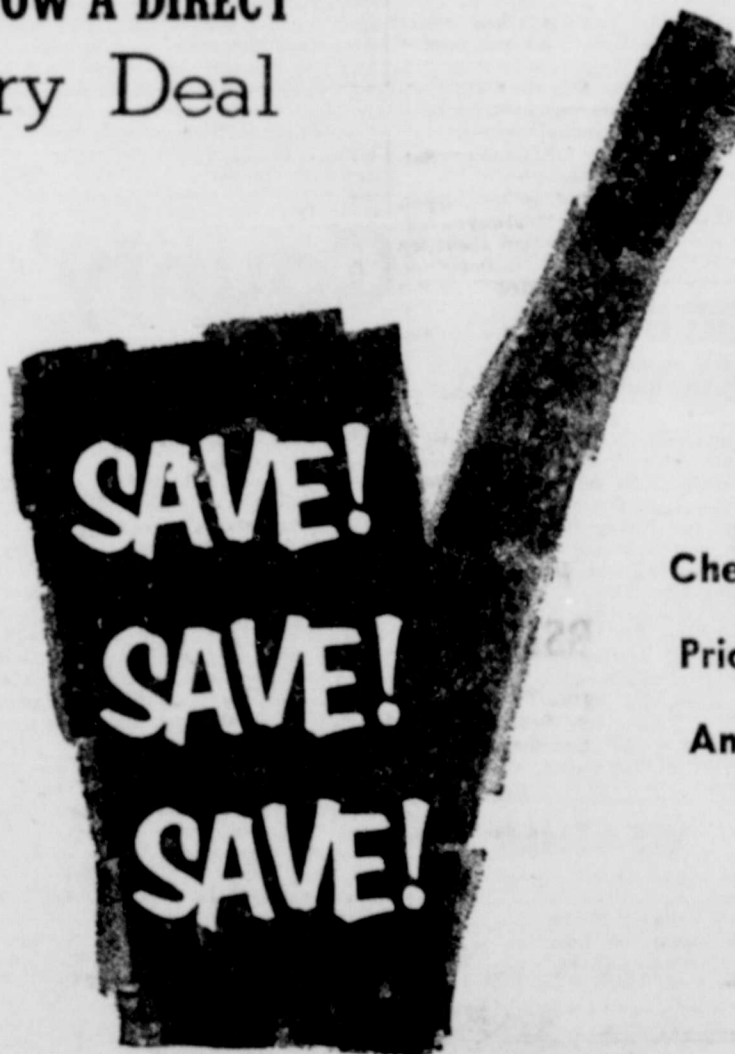

YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

(Editor's Note: This is the third in a series of articles on your Social Security program compiled by C. M. Vaden, Jr., Field Representative of the Abilene Security Office.)

The last article covered "quarters of coverage" and explained how this measure of Social Security coverage is obtained.

Now, how many of these quarters do you need to be eligible for payments?

To be eligible for Social Security when you reach the retirement age, you must be "fully insured." In order to be fully insured, you need quarters of coverage equal to one-half the time since 1950 (or since the year in which you reached 21 if that was after 1950) up until you reach the retirement age or up until the time of your death.

These quarters may have been earned at any time after 1926 or at any age, so long as the total is equal to half the time since 1950 (or age 21) up to the retirement age or death.

A person reaching the retirement age now would need 14 quarters of coverage. Next year at this time he would need 16, the year after 18, etc. The minimum requirement in any case is 6 and the maximum is 40 quarters or 10 years.

The retirement age for women is 62 and for men it is 65. So any man born 1906 or later and any woman born 1909 or later will need 40 quarters of coverage to get retirement benefits.

Some death benefits are payable when the worker is only "currently insured." You will be currently insured if you have at least six quarters of coverage out of the 13 calendar quarters en-

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VA DENIES ERRONEOUS REFUND REPORT

Veterans Administration today denied categorically the report that \$60 million in unclaimed premium refunds awaits veterans who hold or have held World War II GI Life Insurance policies. The unfounded report emanating from Kentucky VA says, has brought a deluge of post card requests for the non-existing dividends. VA said the erroneous report may have started from the recent cancellation of 63,000 undeliverable National Service Life Insurance dividend checks, most of which date back to the 1948 special dividend which was paid in 1950 to policyholders or ex-policyholders for time in service during World War II. The checks, which total less than \$3 million, were returned to VA because the Veterans had moved without leaving a change of address notice with the Post Office. GI Life Insurance checks have always been forwardable if a change of address notice has been filed with the Post Office although forwarding of other VA checks was not permitted before January 1, 1958, the agency said. Although the checks have been cancelled VA said the money is

being held in a special fund and will be paid to eligible veterans as they are located. More than 99.6 percent of eligible veterans applied for and received the Special NSLI dividend VA pointed out. The agency added veterans should not write VA unless they are certain they did not receive it.

Times readers who learned to look forward to reading the columns written by the late Norman Wright probably were startled by the familiar "What's Cooking" heading above.

This column, however, is just The Times' way of paying respect to the man who did so much for this newspaper and for Ranger. This column is made up of some of Wright's many comments:

For instance, Norman once suggested that the best way to run down Ranger would be to "belittle all efforts for community betterment—the people trying to do these things are secretly making a lot of money, want to 'run things' and their way of doing things is all wrong anyway."

Another time Norman told this story: "Once upon a time there was a group of men determined to embarrass and destroy the reputation of Jesus.

They brought an adulteress to him and posed the question whether or not she should be stoned as the law at that time required. Because the law and the teachings of Jesus were in conflict, the group had concluded that Jesus would have to cross himself up in choosing to recommend either course of action.

"But instead of saying the adulteress should be stoned, in conflict with religious principles, or saying she should not be stoned in conflict with the law," he said, "Let him who is without sin among you cast the first stone."

Here are a few more statements Norman made, which you probably remember:

It is a pleasure and an honor to mix and mingle with all the young men and young women at Ranger Junior College, and that goes for every man and woman on the faculty because they are doing a noble work and building a wonderful school. (March 25, 1957)

There is too much at stake, businesswise, for carelessness or indifference on the part of anybody to toss a monkey wrench into the machinery. As someone has aptly said, Ranger can be the busiest spot in Eastland County throughout the entire Fall, Winter and Holiday season if it wants to be and works at it. Who else in Eastland County has got anything to compare with what Ranger can offer the trading public? Brother, Ranger is loaded with it, but it is going to take a selling job to put it over in the right way—a 100 percent selling job! (August 15, 1957)

Yes, Norman Wright was always ready to aid any cause which would help Ranger and was always ready to fight any move which would hurt this city. If more of our citizens would take this attitude—and try to build up Ranger and all of its institutions—we could be far better off.

The time is here when Ranger must band together and move forward. We cannot afford to fight among ourselves over petty issues. We must see that all of our organizations and institutions get the support they need and do serve from all of us.

If their must be criticism, let it be of the constructive nature. Surely we do not have to resort to character assassination and other such low tricks.

We have a wonderful town here in Ranger. We have schools, good colleges, good churches, good business and professional men. There's just that one big thing that we lack at the moment... cooperation.

Featherlite Announces Expansion

The Featherlite Corporation, through plant manager Carl Black, has announced another addition to its Ranger plant. Following the addition of its number 7 and 8 kilns in October, a new Northwest 1-yard shovel was purchased in January. This equipment replaces two smaller shovels used in pit operation for the past two years.

Most recent addition was the installation of a primary crusher with conveyor belt feeding. The crusher replaces the two draglines which were used for many years to feed the expanded material to the crushers.

In effect, the conveying system has doubled the capacity of the crushing operation of the local plant.

Since October, Featherlite has been crushing and loading 8 to 10 cars per day, working two 8-hour shifts. The new equipment has increased the production to 12 and 15 cars per day on one 10-hour shift.

Ideal production through the kilns will average 100 yards each per day for a total of 800 yards daily and 24 thousand yards monthly. The new crushing set-up is more than adequate to handle this volume.

Combined operations of Featherlite and American Aggregate in Ranger, reportedly, from the largest expanded shale aggregate plant in the world.

The majority of construction is now complete and a clean-up and maintenance program on the old installations will now be the order of the day.

Featherlite welcomes visitors interested in touring the plant and watching operations.

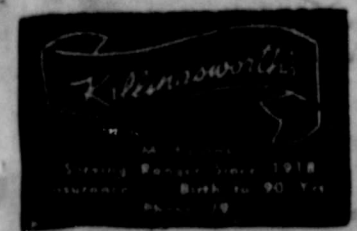

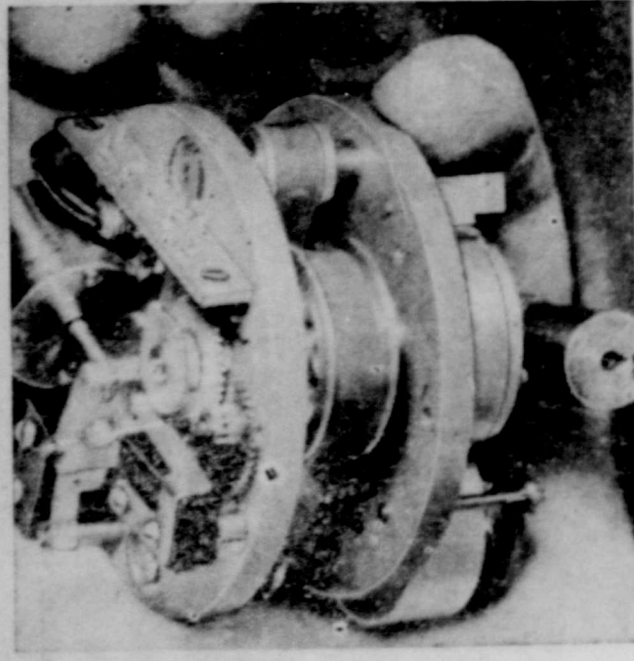

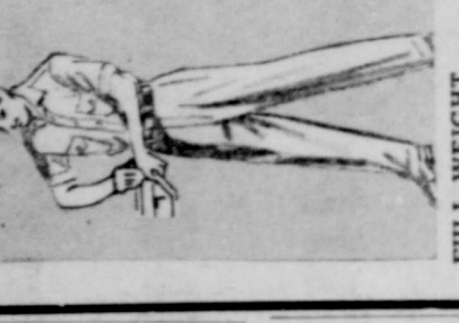

VA DENIES ERRONEOUS REFUND REPORT

Veterans Administration today denied categorically the report that \$60 million in unclaimed premium refunds awaits veterans who hold or have held World War II GI Life Insurance policies. The unclaimed report emanating from Kentucky VA says, has brought a deluge of post card requests for the non-existing dividends. VA said the erroneous report may have started from the recent cancellation of 63,000 undividable National Service Life Insurance dividend checks, most of which date back to the 1948 special dividend which was paid in 1950 to policyholders or ex-policyholders for time in service during World War II. The checks, which total less than \$3 million, were returned to VA because the Veterans had moved without leaving a change of address notice with the Post Office. GI Life Insurance checks have always been forwardable if a change of address notice has been filed with the Post Office although forwarding of other VA checks was not permitted before January 1, 1958, the agency said. Although the checks have been cancelled VA said the money is

being held in a special fund and will be paid to eligible veterans as they are located. More than 99.6 percent of eligible veterans applied for and received the Special NSLI dividend VA pointed out. The agency added veterans should not write VA unless they are certain they did not receive it.
