Gambling Gains Taxable, Loss Not Deductible

"Those golf, poker, or bridge winnings you collected during 1957 are taxable according to law and should be reported in your Federal income tax return."

"However," according to A. E. Fogle, Jr., of Internal Revenue Service, Abilene, "gambling losses may only be deducted to the extent of your winnings and provided you itemize your deductions. This is done on page 2 of your Form 1040."

Here are two examples: "During 1957 you had casual gambling winnings of \$300 and losses of \$500. The \$500 winnings must be reported on schedule H, page 3. If you itemize your deductions you may deduct \$300 of the losses on page 2. When you use the Standard Deduction, or the Tax Table, you may not claim any of the losses as a deduction."

Mr. Fogle continued with example 2: "Suppose your winnings were \$500 and losses \$300. The total winnings of \$500 must be reported on Schedule H, and all of the losses may be claimed as a deduction on page 2, if you itemize your deductions."

State Plans To Rid Herds Of Disease

The State of Texas has adopted plans, approved by the United States Department of Agriculture and the United States Public Health Service, to rid Texas Dairy herds of Brucellosis. Control regulations designed to eradicate brucellosis infection will become effective September 1 of the present year.

Owners of dairy cattle are being aforesaid and urged to be ready to comply with ordinances. Brucellosis, commonly called undulant fever, according to the State Health Department, is continually on the increase among stockhandlers and people who drink unpasteurized milk.

A and M College veterinarians report that infected cattle produce 20 percent less milk, calve less frequently and bear weak calves.

The plans include blood testing and vaccinations.

Plans also require that records must be kept by all dairymen as to history of herd.

Two violations after the September date will bring immediate revocation of Grade A permits. At present 95 percent of the milk sold in Texas is Grade A.

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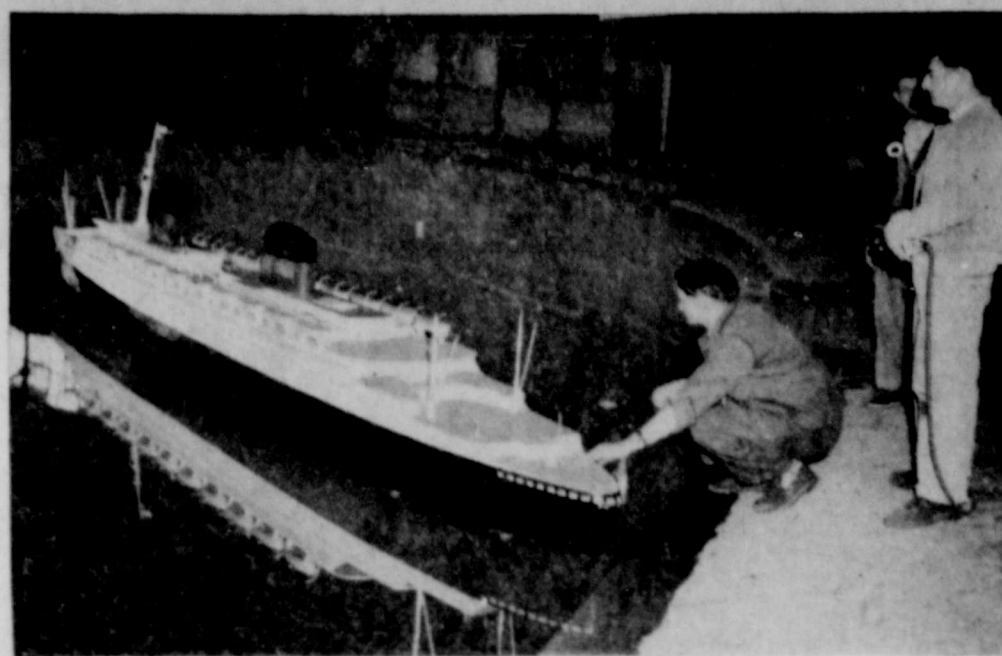

When the Soviets announced their intention to suspend testing of nuclear weapons, the world reacted. It seemingly is natural that man wishes to hear and believe that which he wishes to hear and believe, hence the propaganda value of the Russian announcement.

Our nation, whose every act is based on the moral concept, could not make such a promise unless it intended to keep it.

It is the purpose of this nation to continue to test nuclear weapons. Russia says that if we continue to explode atomic and hydrogen tests that they will be released from their promise to suspend their testing.

It is wrong to assume that all people of the world trust the United States. Millions of multilied millions know us as little or less than they know the Russians. They are conscious of the meaning of the explosion of hydrogen bombs and fear it.

The purpose of our Government in testing is to develop the "clean bomb," to control its effects and reduce its size for both military and peaceful purposes.

But many people will not listen to this reasoning. Rather, they want to hear that all tests are suspended.

It is the call of the sirens. Some years ago Philip Wylie told the story of the "Fifth Horseman." He rode ahead of his brothers, warning the people of their coming. The people laughed and refused to believe. So when Conquest, Slaughter, Famine and Death ravished the land, the people were caught unprepared. Then when the Fifth Horseman

Gambling Gains Taxable, Loss Not Deductible

"Those golf, poker, or bridge winnings you collected during 1957 are taxable according to law and should be reported in your Federal income tax return."

"However," according to A. E. Fogle, Jr., of Internal Revenue Service, Abilene, "gambling losses may only be deducted to the extent of your winnings and provided you itemize your deductions. This is done on page 2 of your Form 1040."

Here are two examples: "During 1957 you had casual gambling winnings of \$300 and losses of \$600. The \$300 winnings must be reported on schedule H, page 3. If you itemize your deductions you may deduct \$300 of the losses on page 2. When you use the Standard Deduction, or the Tax Table, you may not claim any of the losses as a deduction."

Mr. Fogle continued with example 2: "Suppose your winnings were \$500 and losses \$300. The total winnings of \$500 must be reported on Schedule H, and all of the losses may be claimed as a deduction on page 2, if you itemize your deductions."

State Plans To Rid Herds Of Disease

The State of Texas has adopted plans, approved by the United States Department of Agriculture and the United States Public Health Service, to rid Texas dairy herds of Brucellosis. Control regulations designed to eradicate brucellosis infection will become effective September 1 of the present year.

Owners of dairy cattle are being forewarned and urged to be ready to comply with ordinances. Brucellosis, commonly called glandular fever, according to the State Health Department, is continually on the increase among stockhandlers and people who drink unpasteurized milk.

A report that infected cattle produce 20 percent less milk, calve less frequently and bear weak calves. The plans include blood testing and vaccinations.

Plans also require that records must be kept by all dairymen as to history of herd.

Two violations after the September date will bring immediate revocation of Grade A permits. At present 95 percent of the milk sold in Texas is Grade A.

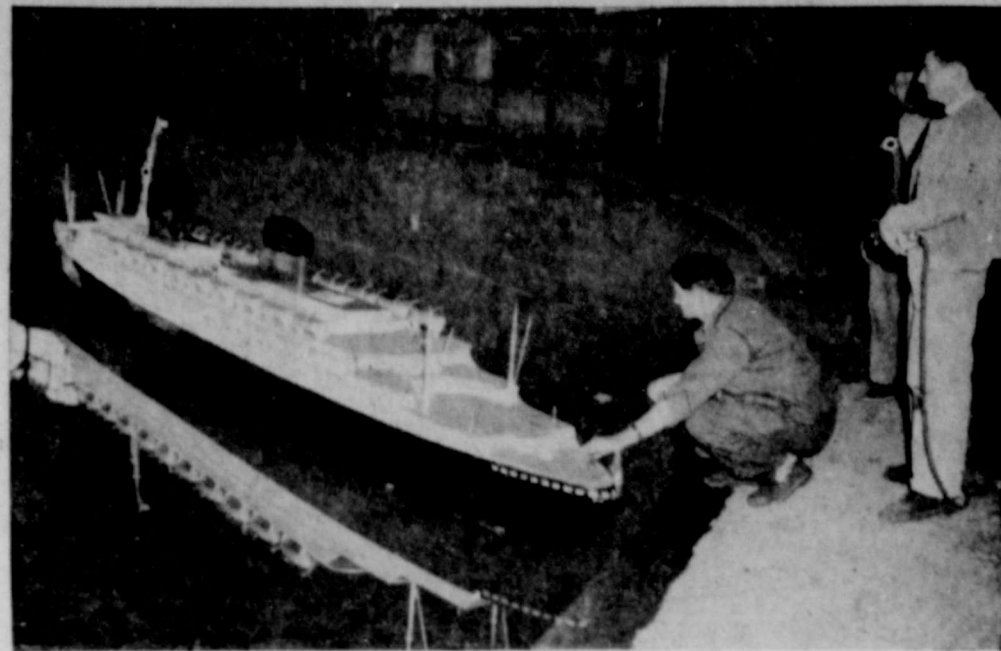
