Brucellosis Program Elective On Sept. 1

The Eastland County Farm Bureau will hold a county-wide animal health program April 17 at the Eastland Auction Barn.

One of the topics to be discussed at that meeting is "Brucellosis Control."

New brucellosis control regulations become effective September 1. Texas dairymen who market Grade A milk products have until then to adopt one of two plans designed to eradicate brucellosis infection from their herds.

The need for regulations is evident in a 1956 survey by livestock sanitation officials. Of 2,

500 dairy herds checked, more than 71 per cent showed evidence of infection.

Cases of brucellosis—sometimes called undulant fever—are increasing among live-stock handlers and people who drink unpasteurized milk. Enforcing known control measures will help to prevent human infection.

The new regulation will also increase penalties for producers, once brucellosis has been eliminated from herds. A and M College veterinarians report that infected cattle produce up to 20 percent less milk. They calve less frequently and the calves they do bear are weak and affected.

Beginning Sept. 1, every dairyman producing milk under a Grade A label must have adopted one of the other of the following two plans. Since 95 per cent of all milk sold in Texas is Grade A, only a fraction of total production will be unaffected. Both plans have been approved by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and are contained in the milk ordinance and code recommended by the U. S. Public Health Service.

Plan A: All breeding cattle over six months of age must be blood tested. Vaccinated cattle under 30 months of age are exempt. Animals reacting positively must be removed for slaughter within 15 days, and non-reactors must be retested between 30 and 60 days to insure they are free of disease.

Under Plan A, only cattle vaccinated in calfhood may be added to the herd. It recommends, but does not require, that female calves from the original herd be vaccinated between four and eight months of age.

Plan B: All breeding stock over six months old, exclusive of those which have been previously vaccinated must be blood tested. Reactors must be branded and segregated from non-reactors. To prevent economic hardship to producers, this plan allows branded animals to be kept for 27 months and 18 months respectively for cows and heifers.

Two successful violations of the "no-calf" rule will result in suspension of the Grade A milk permit. No extension of time beyond the September 1 date is being considered by the Department.

Juvenile Hearings To Begin

Some 15 youths ranging in age from 13 to 16 will start going before Judge Hart today.

Judge Hart, who as county judge also serves as juvenile judge, told this newspaper today that he would hear each case individually, with only the boy, his parents or legal guardian and three selected non-interested persons present. The hearings—as the law provides—will be held behind closed doors. The public, including the press, will be barred. Records will not be made public, the Judge said.

The boys, who county officers claim were working as a gang, reportedly stole hundreds of dollars worth of hub caps and other articles off cars in Eastland and Ranger. Some of the youths, officers have reported, were responsible for the blaze which damaged the Church of God camp grounds building in Eastland.

Teachers Rate Deductions On Income

The United States Treasury Department has issued a regulation liberalizing deductibility of educational expenses of teachers from income subject to Federal Income Taxes.

Teachers can now deduct from their taxable income expenses incurred voluntarily for further education.

This regulation is retroactive to 1954 but amended returns must be filed within four years of the tax year under consideration.

Today, Tuesday, is the last day for filing returns for 1954.

H. E. Garrett, County School Superintendent suggests that any teacher who has a claim to file should discuss the matter with a representative of the Internal Revenue Department of his area.

The regulation of the Treasury Department is TD 6291. It appeared in Federal Register for April 8, 1958.

Large Veterans Building Program For County Set

Plans were announced today by C. C. Broyles, Abilene building contractor that recent Government legislation will once again permit the building of GI loan homes in Eastland and surrounding cities.

Previously, according to Broyles, the Government had required a downpayment of two percent of the price of the dwelling, with a 4 1-2 percent interest rate, and maximum term of 25 years in which to pay for the house.

Today's announcement by Broyles now makes it possible for a prospective homeowner to build with no downpayment. However, in doing this, Broyles stated, the Government raised the interest rate one-fourth of one percent, making the new interest rate 4 3-4 percent, but extending the payment time from 25 to 30 years. In removing all downpayments, the Government still allows the lending agency to charge a minimum handling fee, which will vary somewhat with the price of home to be built, Broyles said.

At the same time, Broyles stated that the Tri-Cities Real Estate Exchange, of Eastland, is his exclusive representative in Eastland County for the purchase and construction of GI homes.

Broyles, through the Tri-Cities Real Estate Exchange, has recently completed the construction of 15 FHA homes in the Rivercrest Addition to Eastland.

In further explaining the new housing act, Broyles said that it would be possible for the veteran to select his own lot, which must be approved as to location, or he will supply the lot, and add the cost of the lot to the price of the house. The veteran thereby is actually able to pay for the cost of the lot on a long-term basis.

Billy Anderson, born in Morgantown, W. Va., without arms and feet, is looking forward to his 16th birthday, July 26. He'll celebrate by walking by himself around the campus of the Good Shepherd Home for Crippled Children and Old People in Allentown, Pa.

It'll be his first walk unaided ... a tribute to his courage and to the care and training he's been getting during the three years he has been living in Good Shepherd Home.

In that time, Billy, who travels around in a low four-wheel carrier, received and learned to use an artificial arm. Now he's learning to use an artificial right leg and an artificial left foot attached to the stump of his leg. And Billy, for the first time in his life, is able to take steps with the aid of an arm crutch strapped to his mechanical hand. The Good Shepherd Home's physical therapist is on hand to guide Billy's steps, but soon will come his birthday and his first walk around.

Rev. Conrad W. Raker, D. D., superintendent of Good Shepherd Home where Billy lives with 187 other crippled children, young adults and old people, said Billy is the glistering apostle of the Home's golden anniversary this year. The Home was the first in the nation to house crippled orphaned children. It was established on Feb. 21, 1908, when Dr. Raker's late father, Rev. John H. Raker, also a Lutheran pastor, took into his home a crippled orphan girl.

Billy's rehabilitation is typical of the care given to handicapped children at the Home which has as its symbol open doors, "always open." Dr. Raker said, "In Christ's name, to care for those who are needy, regardless of race, creed or color, and who have no others to help them. No fees are charged for the care of those in the Home."

The work of Good Shepherd Home, supported entirely by voluntary contributions from friends in all parts of the country, is told in pictures and words in the Golden Anniversary issue of its bi-monthly publication, "Sweet Charity," and a 24-page book, "Open Door." Large Veterans Building Program For County Set

Plans were announced today by C. C. Broyles, Abilene building contractor that recent Government legislation will once again permit the building of GI loan homes in Eastland and surrounding cities.

In an interview with the Telegram, Broyles stated that the recently enacted housing legislation, part of the Government's program to stem the reported recession, makes it possible for eligible Veterans to construct 2 and 3 bedroom homes in Eastland County without a downpayment. He announced plans for \$200,000 G. I.

building program in the county. Previously, according to Broyles, the Government had required a downpayment of two percent of the price of the dwelling, with a maximum term of 25 years in which to pay for the house.

Today's announcement by Broyles now makes it possible for the prospective homeowner to build with no downpayment. However, in doing this, Broyles stated, the Government raised the interest rate one-fourth of one percent, making the new interest rate 4 3/4 percent, but extending the payment time from 25 to 30 years. In removing all downpayments, the Government still allows the lending agency to charge a minimum handling fee, which will vary somewhat with the price of home to be built, Broyles said.

At the same time, Broyles stated that the Tri-Cities Real Estate Exchange, of Eastland, is his exclusive representative in Eastland County for the purchase and construction of GI homes.

Broyles, through the Tri-Cities Real Estate Exchange, has recently completed the construction of 15 FHA homes in the Rivercrest Addition to Eastland.

In further explaining the new housing act, Broyles said that it would be possible for the veteran to select his own lot, which must be approved as to location, or he will supply the lot, and add the cost of the lot to the price of the house. The veteran thereby is actually able to pay for the cost of the lot on a long-term basis.

Broyles has asked that eligible Veterans Contact the Tri-Cities Real Estate Exchange, on the Southeast corner of the square, in Eastland in person, or by phoning 768, for further information.

Billy Anderson, born in Morgantown, W. Va., without arms and feet, is looking forward to his 16th birthday, July 26. He'll celebrate by walking by himself around the campus of the Good Shepherd Home for Crippled Children and Old People in Allentown, Pa.

It'll be his first walk unaided... a tribute to his courage and to the care and training he's been getting during the three years he has been living in Good Shepherd Home.

In that time, Billy, who travels around in a low four-wheel car, received and learned to use an artificial arm. Now he's learning to use an artificial right leg and an artificial left foot attached to the stump of his leg. The Good Shepherd Home's physical therapist is on hand to guide Billy's steps, but soon will come his birthday and his first walk around.

Rev. Conrad W. Baker, D.D., superintendent of Good Shepherd Home where Billy lives with 187 other crippled children, young adults and old people, said Billy is the glowing apostle for the Home's golden anniversary this year. The Home was the first in the nation to house crippled orphaned children.

It was established on Feb. 21, 1908, when Dr. Baker's late father, Rev. John H. Baker, also a Lutheran pastor, took into his home a crippled orphan girl.

Billy's rehabilitation is typical of the care given to handicapped children at the Home which has as its symbol open doors, "always open," Dr. Baker said. "In Christ's name, to care for those who are needy, regardless of race, creed or color, and who have no others to help them. No fees are charged for the care of those in the Home."

The work of Good Shepherd Home, supported entirely by voluntary contributions from friends in all parts of the country, is told in pictures and words in the Golden Anniversary issue of its bi-monthly publication "Sweet Charity," and a 24-page book, "Open Door." 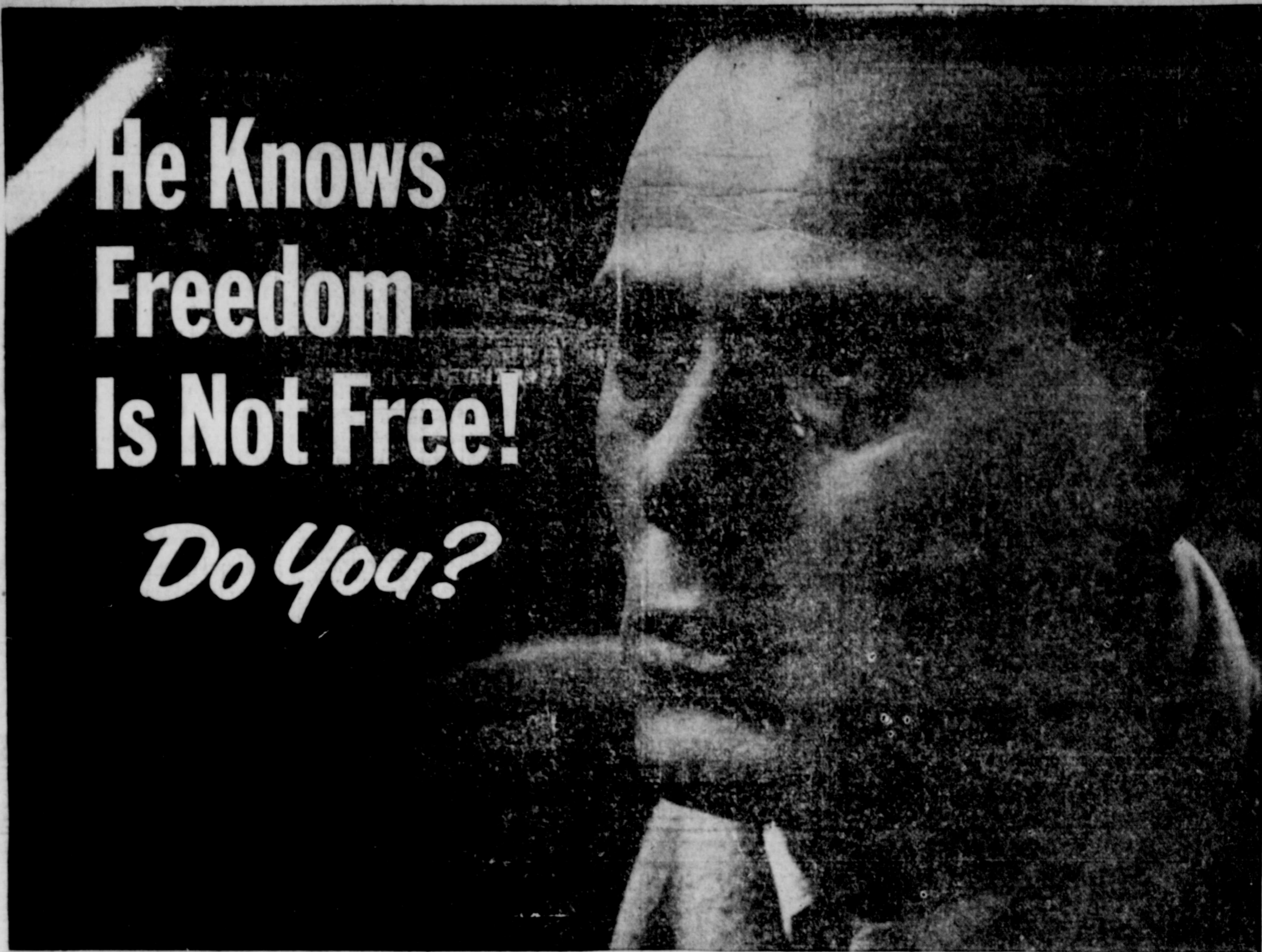

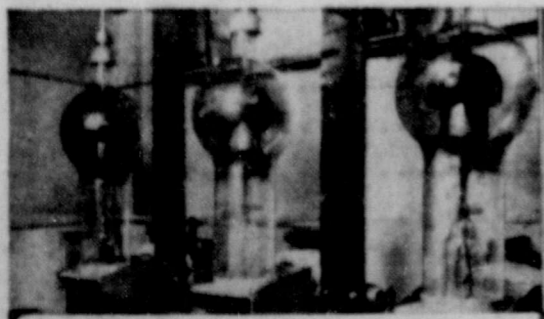

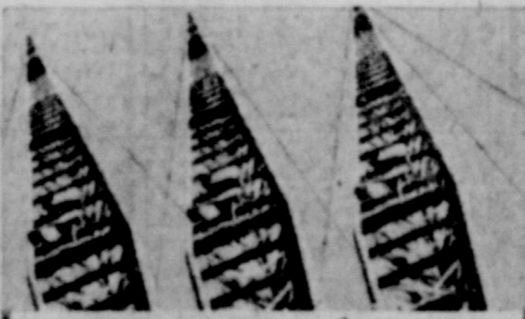
