More than 13,000 lawyers will begin expressing their preference for appellate court candidates in the Texas State Bar's secret judicial poll in May.

Seaberry and Joseph A. Chandler of Stephenville, bar director for the 17th Congressional District, will leave Thursday for Galveston to attend the State Bar board of directors quarterly meeting, where details will be completed for the biennial sampling of lawyer opinions on qualifications of all candidates for higher court places. The ballots will include candidates for contested places on the Texas Supreme Court, the Court of Criminal Appeals and the Court of Civil Appeals for the district in which the voter lives.

Seaberry said the ballots will be tabulated and counted June 15 at State Bar headquarters in Austin and the results made public soon thereafter.

DREADED MARINE HAZARD DESTROYED—Water and shattered rock erupted from the effects of 1,375 tons of explosive, one of the largest, non-nuclear blasts in history. The Canadian Department of Public Works set off the explosion to level Ripple Rock, an underwater hazard in British Columbia's Campbell River that has claimed over 100 lives and destroyed about 100 ships in the past 100 years. The three-million-dollar project was designed to shatter about 270,000 tons of rock. Wavy lines at right are from rockets fired by scientists testing the explosion's force.

Rev. Austin pastored for eight years in West Texas before entering the Seminary in Fort Worth. He is a native of Abilene.

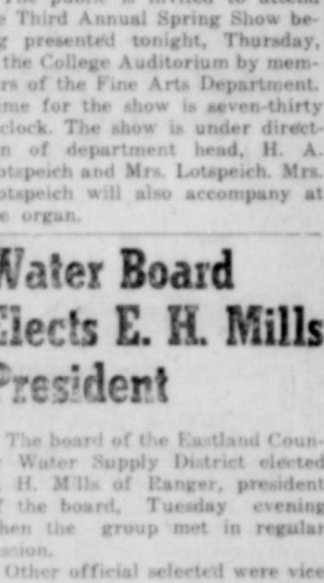

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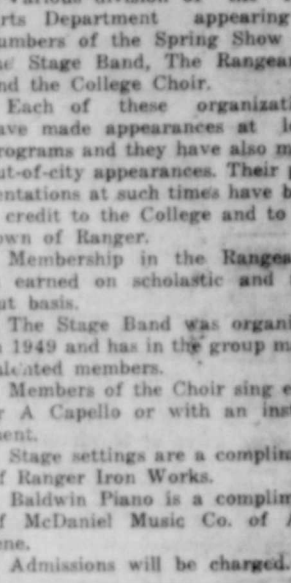

YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

(Editor's Note: This is the sixth in a series of articles compiled by C. M. Vaden, Jr., Field Representative, of the Abilene Social Security Office.)

Today the Social Security program covers nine out of 10 people who work for a living - over 99 percent.

You may wonder how many of the present aged population are eligible for Social Security. There are about 14.7 million people in the U. S. today past 65. About 60 percent of them are either getting Social Security benefits or are still working in work covered by Social Security.

The fact that 90 percent of those who are now covered and only 60 percent of the present aged have this protection is evidence of the newness of the Social Security program. Eventually, of course, 90 percent of those who reach the retirement age will be eligible for Social Security.

Retirement payments can be made to you in your old age and to your dependents. Men workers are eligible beginning at age 65; women at age 62, but their payment is reduced if they start before 65.

fore 65. The reduction is 20 percent at age 62, about 13 percent at 63 and about seven percent at age 64. As a general rule, the woman worker who elects Social Security at any age between 62 and 65 will be money ahead for about 15 years.

Wives of workers also get reduced payments at 62 or full payments at age 65. A wife's payment at 65 is one half of her husband's monthly benefit. The reduction for the wife is 25 percent at age 62, about 17 percent at age 63 and about 8 percent at age 64. As a general rule the wife who elects payments at any age between 62 and 65 is ahead for about 13 years.

If you are eligible both as a worker and as a wife, you can draw whichever payment is higher, but cannot draw both.

Children of a retired worker who is getting payments are also eligible for payments. Each child who is either under 18 or totally disabled since childhood is entitled to an additional one-half of the worker's benefit. Mothers of children entitled to benefits may also be eligible. There is a certain maximum amount payable on each Social Security account.

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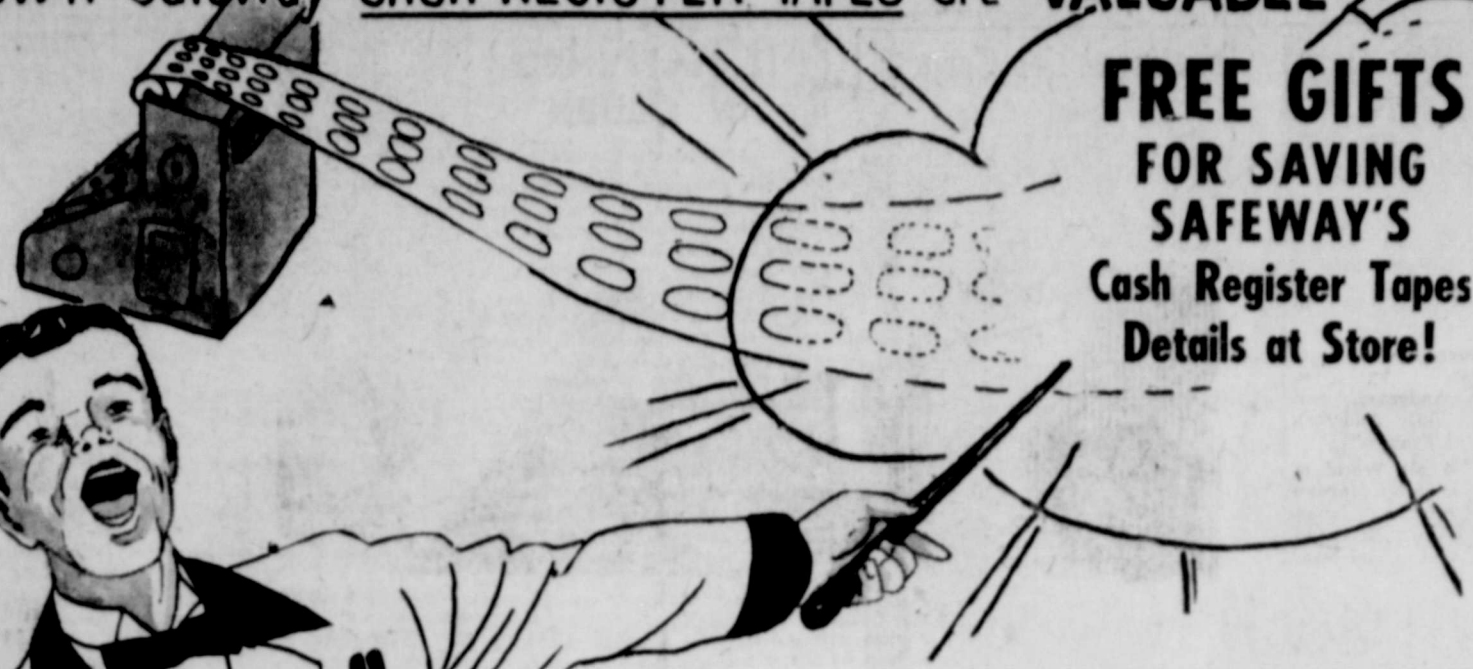

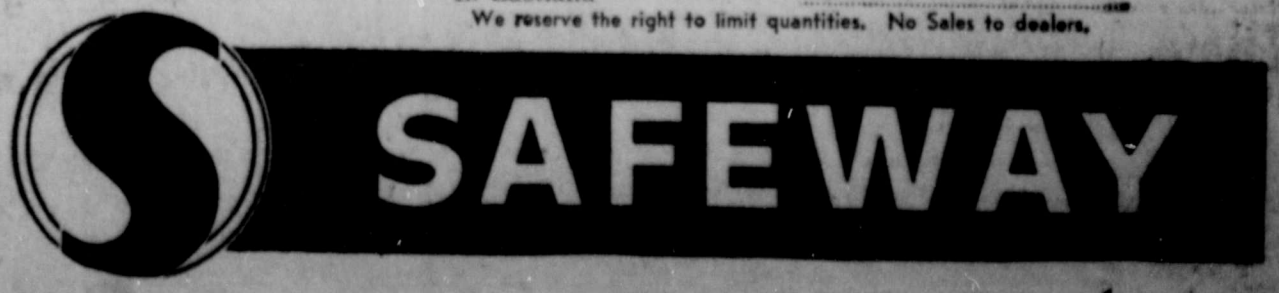

Recently a poll was made of 21 typewriting students of Ranger College in order to find out the letter styles they prefer and the reasons for the choice.

According to the results of the tabulation, it appears that should these young men and women go out into the business world tomorrow to become executives, there would be some-what of a change in letter style—a trend toward the more modern.

Of the six letter styles—indented, semiblocked, blocked, full-blocked, NOMA simplified, and square-blocked—the following information was revealed:

Full block—13; NOMA Simplified—4; Blocked—3; Indented—1.

Some of the reasons of these choices may be found from the following notations:

L. B. Hirst, sophomore student from Gorman, says that he likes the full-block letter style because it is easy to use. It is a change from the indented style which has been used for so many years. The full-block style allows the typist more time to think about his spelling and grammar since he does not have to think, "Do I indent this? Do I tab here? Or how must I set this up so it will rhyme with the rest of the letter?" When using the full-block style, everything is blocked at the left margin, thereby eliminating many chances of error.

Joe Anderson, business administration student from Eastland, says, "I like the full-block letter style best because it seems to combine every essential of letter writing, yet it is the simplest and easiest form to use. For the employer who has to pay the typist, it means much time saved in typing when time is very valuable. To the typist it means less work at the typewriter."

Mary Ann Reese, freshman student from Olden, gives the following reasons for preferring the indented style: 1. Everything on the entire page balances. 2. It is a neat and efficient form to use. 3. It does not look as if someone is afraid he will spend too much time writing a letter. 4. From the appearance of the letter a person knows immediately that some extra time was spent in getting his message to him.

Kenneth Johnson of Cisco states that he likes the NOMA simplified letter because it does not use the salutation or closing, which you do not need. This letter style is also easier to type; therefore it would save time in letter production.

Marvin Crawford, freshman business administration major from Guthrie, says, "I like the NOMA style because it is so much easier to type. The salutation and closing usually contain about the same thing on every letter, and a person never bothers to read them. So why not omit them?"

Roger Kelly, freshman student from Crane, prefers the NOMA simplified. His main reason for choosing this form lies in the fact that the subject, the most important part of the letter, is given in all capitals. A person may scan the letter at a glance to find out

Everybody believes the sign when a motor, Ford or Imperial, Chevrolet or Buick, Dodge or Chrysler, sputters and chokes down.

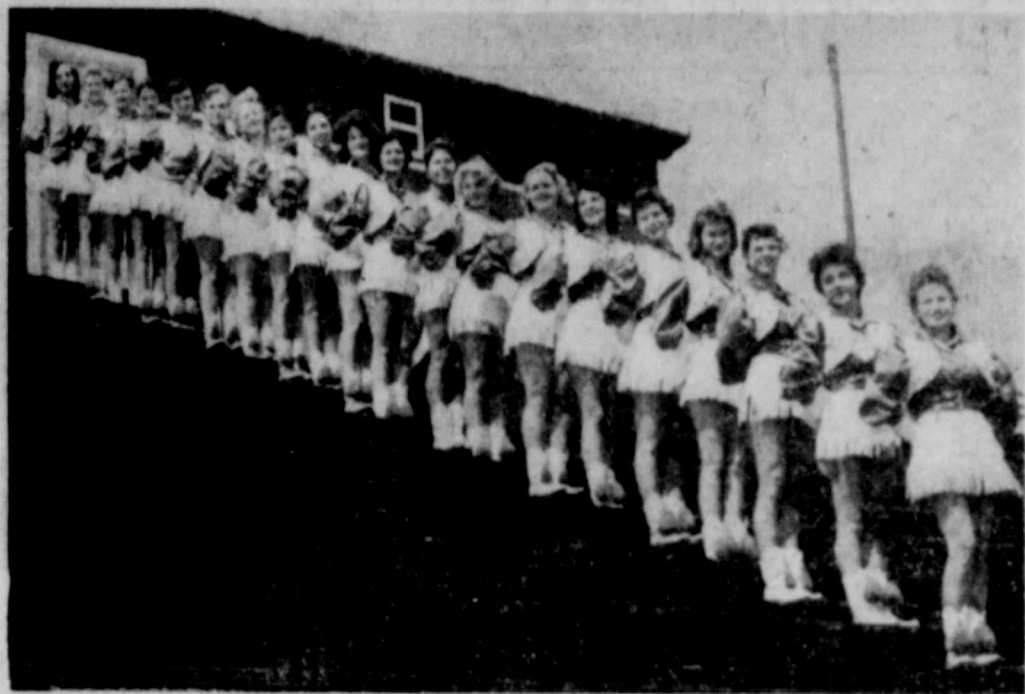
And a motorist riding another's bumper better believe the stop-

YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

(Editor's Note: This is the sixth in a series of articles compiled by C. M. Vaden, Jr., Field Representative of the Ahilene Social Security Office.)
Today the Social Security program covers nine out of 10 people who work for a living - over 90 percent.

You may wonder how many of the present aged population are eligible for Social Security. There are about 14.7 million people in the U. S. today past 65. About 60 percent of them are either getting Social Security benefits or are still working in work covered by Social Security.

The fact that 90 percent of those who are now covered and only 60 percent of the present need have this protection is evidence of the newness of the Social Security program. Eventually, of course, 90 percent of those who reach the retirement age will be eligible for Social Security.

Retirement payments can be made to you in your old age and to your dependents. Men workers are eligible beginning at age 65; women at age 62, but their payment is reduced if they start before 65.

fore 65. The reduction is 20 percent at age 62, about 13 percent at 63 and about seven percent at age 64. As a general rule, the woman worker who elects Social Security at any age between 62 and 65 will be money ahead for about 15 years.

Wives of workers also get reduced payments at 62 or full payments at age 65. A wife's payment at 65 is one half of her husband's monthly benefit. The reduction for the wife is 25 percent at age 62, about 17 percent at age 63 and about 8 percent at age 64. As a general rule the wife who elects payments at any age between 62 and 65 is ahead for about 12 years.

If you are eligible both as a worker and as a wife, you can draw whichever payment is higher, but cannot draw both.

Children of a retired worker who is getting payments are also eligible for payments. Each child who is either under 18 or totally disabled since childhood is entitled to an additional one-half of the worker's benefit. Mothers of children entitled to benefits may also be eligible. There is a certain maximum amount payable on each Social Security account.

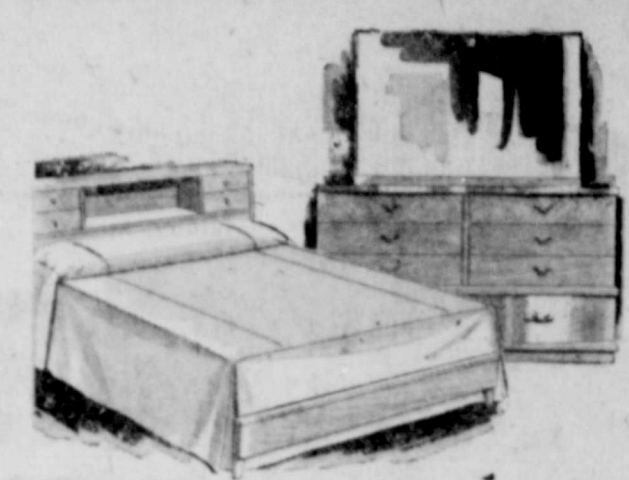

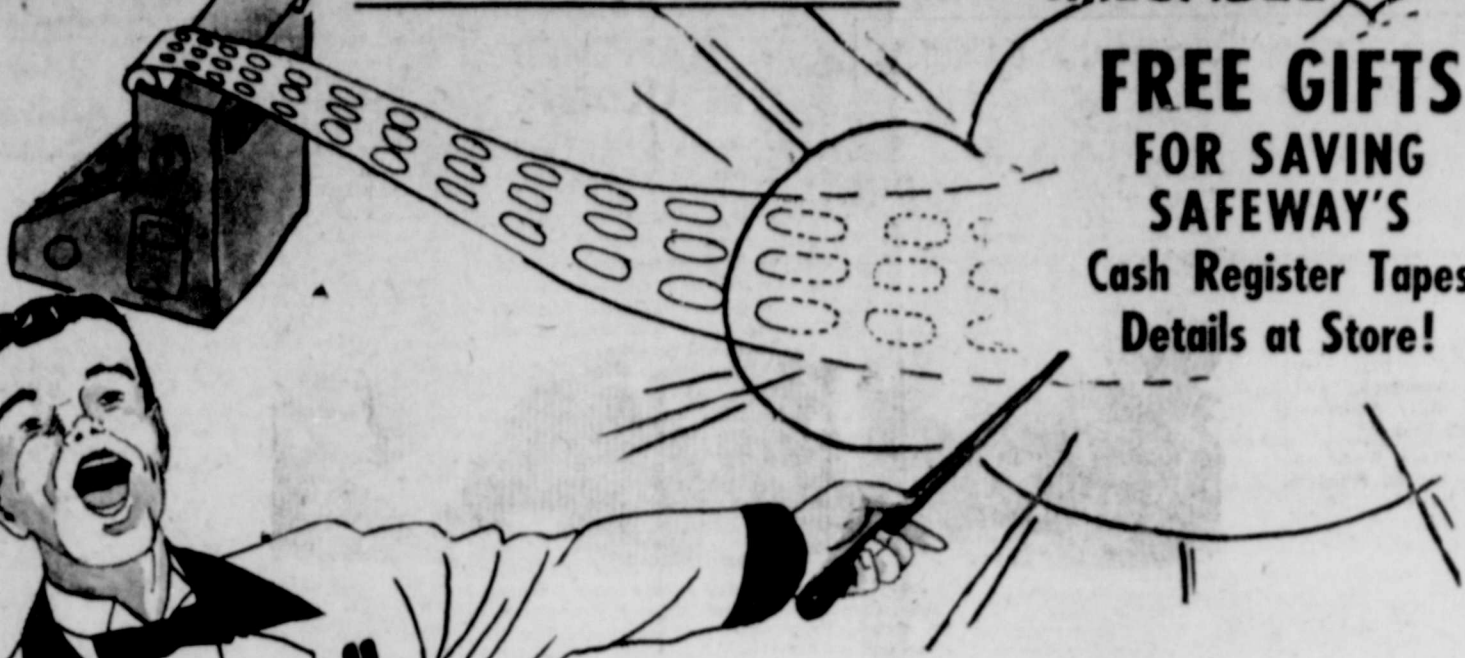

Recently a poll was made of 21 typewriting students of Ranger College in order to find out the letter styles they prefer and the reason for the choice.

According to the results of the tabulation, it appears that should these young men and women go out into the business world tomorrow to become executives, there would be some what of a change in letter styles—a trend toward the more modern.

Of the six letter styles—indented, semiblocked, blocked, full-blocked, NOMA simplified, and a n d square-blocked—the following information was revealed:

Full block—12; NOMA Simplified—4; Blocked—3; Indented—1.

Some of the reasons of these choices may be found from the following notations:

L. B. Hirst, sophomore student from Gorman, says that he likes the full-block letter style because it is easy to use. It is a change from the indented style which has been used for so many years. The full-block style allows the typist more time to think about his spelling and grammar since he does not have to think, "Do I indent this? Do I tab here? Or how must I set this up so it will rhyme with the rest of the letter?" When using the full-block style, everything is blocked at the left margin, thereby eliminating many chances of error.

Joe Anderson, business administration student from Eastland, says, "I like the full-block letter style best because it seems to combine every essential of letter writing, yet it is the simplest and easiest form to use. For the employer who has to pay the typist, it means much time saved in typing when time is very valuable. To the typist it means less work at the typewriter."

Mary Ann Reese, freshman student from Olden, gives the following reasons for preferring the indented style: 1. Everything on the entire page balances. 2. It is a neat and efficient form to use. 3. It does not look as if someone is afraid he will spend too much time writing a letter. 4. From the appearance of the letter a person knows immediately that some extra time was spent in getting his message to him.

Kenneth Jones of Cisco states that he likes the NOMA simplified letter because it does not use the salutation or closing, which you do not need. This letter style is also easier to type, therefore it would save time in letter production.

Marvin Crawford, freshman business administration major from Guthrie, says, "I like the NOMA style because it is so much easier to type. The salutation and closing usually contain about the same thing on every letter, and a person never bothers to read them. So why not omit them?"

Roger Kelly, freshman student from Crane, prefers the NOMA simplified. His main reason for choosing this form lies in the fact that the subject, the most important part of the letter, is given in all capitals. A person may scan the letter at a glance to find out

Drivers License Patrolman Lists Local Schedule

"Has your driver's license expired?" An effort to improve Drivers License Service was revealed today by Major Wilson E. Speir, Commander of Region 4 of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"If you once held a driver's license in Texas and still have the license in your possession, regardless of the expiration date, it may be re-newed, by going to the Driver's License Office," said J. B. Hart, Captain of the Driver License Service, Midland Region.

If you hold a license that has expired within the last five years you may renew it by mailing your full name, birth date, and description, along with the statutory fee to the DPS Headquarters in Austin for a new license.

At the same time, Major Speir pointed out that Highway Patrolmen are intensifying their driver's license checks for drivers who are driving on expired licenses or no license at all.

"It is not the Department's desire to surprise motorists without warning," Speir said, "So we would like to take this means of advising the public they may expect these checks any time." Major Speir pointed out, "The Department is now mailing courtesy reminders to all licensed drivers 30 days before their licenses expire and we hope our motorists will take advantage of this reminder and re-new their licenses before expiration."

Major Speir stated the Driver's License Law has been in effect almost 22 years in Texas and we feel that no driver has a legitimate excuse for not having a valid driver's license.

The Driver's License Patrolman for this area is in Eastland on the first, third and fifth Mondays of each month for the purpose of giving examinations and accepting renewals of licenses.
