

fore 65. The reduction is 20 percrist at age 62, about 13 percent at 63 and about seven percent a age 64. As a general rule, the woman worker who elects Social Security at any age between - 62 and 65 will be money ahead for about 15 years.

Wives of workers also get redured payments at 62 or full payments at age 65. A wife's payment at 65 is one half of her husband's ponthly benefit. The reductin for he wife is 25 percent at age 62. about 17 percent at age 63 and about 8 percent at age 64. As a general rule the wife who elects payments at any age between 62 and 65 is ahead for about 12 YEATS.

If you are eligible both as worker and as a wife, you can draw whichever payment is higher. but cannot draw both.





You may wonder haw many of the present aged population are eligible for Social Security. There are about 14.7 million people in the U. S. today past 65. About 60 percent of them are either goting Social Security benefits are still working in work covered by Social Security.

The fact that 90 percent of those who are now covered and only 60 percent of the present aged have this protection is evidence of the newness of the Social Security program. Eventually, of course, 90 percent of those who reach the retirement age will be gible for Social Security.

Retirement payments can be made to you in your old age and to your dependents. Men workers are eligible beginning at age 65; women at age 62, but their payment is reduced if they start be-

Wives of workers also get redu ced payments at 62 or full pay nents at age 65. A wife's paymen at 65 is one half of her husband's he wife is 25 percent at age 62 bout 17 percent at age 63 and about 8 percent at age 64. As general rule the wife who elect payments at any age between 6 one 65 is ahead for about 1

If you are eligible both as worker and as a wife, you car draw whichever payment is high er, but cannot draw both.

Children of a retired worker who is getting payments are also ligible for payments. Each child sabled since childhood is entit led to and additional one-half the worker's benefit. Mothers of bildren entitled to benefits may lso be eligible. There is a certain naximum amount payable on each Social Security account.
