Cooper said that due to so many calls concerning pecan budding, he plans to hold the school "in an attempt to teach folks how to bud pecans."

Everyone interested has been urged to attend. The one day school will begin at 10 a.m. at the Texas Electric Service Co. conference room. Classwork will continue until noon. After lunch the group will go to the woods on the north side of Lake Eastland dam where those interested can actually do some budding on small trees. Cooper said the program should end by 3 p.m.

The county agent said that in order to cut the strings and check the buds another half day of schooling will be held in May and another half day in June.

"Those who enroll in the school are asked to make every effort to attend all sessions in order to get every angle of budding and then taking care of the buds after it comes out," Cooper said.

There are no paid workers and no local administrative expenses. Members of the committee make their own decisions on problems presented to them and thus meet need as it arises without delay or red tape.

THE ROAD TOLL OF THE TOLL ROAD

By Lucretia Fairbatter

Tomorrow, April 23rd, the Texas Traffic Safety Council under chairmanship of Governor Price Daniel and with the aid of all Mayors, Chiefs of Police, Sheriffs and Prosecuting Attorneys, will launch a statewide traffic safety campaign.

To make this first in the history of Texas campaign, all Texans should pledge themselves to make history by observing road and street safety laws and courtesy regulations.

The Road Toll will cost a million times over what the Toll Road costs. Life cannot be measured in dollars and cents.

Toll Roads and Controlled Access Highways are being greatly increased in mileage to speed up travel and transportation to decrease traffic hazards and to facilitate safety for the driver and pedestrian.

Such adages as the following, although familiar to most, continue to be wise council: "Keep your humanity when you get behind the wheel. Be a person not a pig." "Be bright. Dim your lights." "If you drink, don't drive; if you drive, don't drink."

The highest toll by far is paid by the passenger car. In 1957 there were 150,000 more non-fatal vehicle accidents than in 1956.

However, because of the efforts of some there were 1500 less vehicles featuring fatal accidents.

In personal injury accidents, 80 percent of the automobiles involved were passenger cars.

Governor Daniel is determined to cut the traffic death rate in Texas by at least 10 percent for 1958. His minimum goal will be the saving of 254 lives.

The Governor will be on a statewide broadcast tomorrow at 9:30 a.m., outlining the safety program.

Seventy-five hundred pedestrians walked right into death in 1957. They were saving time, following the fellow in front, crossing without looking, standing or playing in a danger zone, or doing one of many other careless things.

The Toll Road can only slightly lessen the Road Toll. The driver and the pedestrian must be of themselves, safety conscious.

When the "Pooh, Pooh" flashes through one's mind, it is time to remember the warnings are not merely to save the life you are so sure of, your own, but to save the lives you may take. The lives you may take because you "take time."

Parents, who do not see to it that their children know traffic safety and that the children have learned to abide by the laws, are of themselves, potential killers.

A five-year-old child who can learn to drive, can learn that the car is not a toy.

Any parent who, refuses to observe warnings, laws and regulations, risks the peril of facing a (Continued on Page Four)

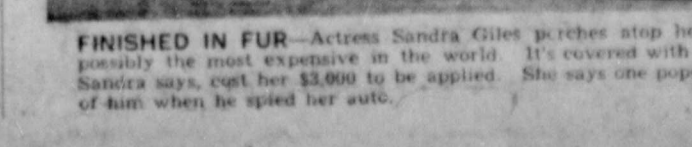

Diet! But Eat A Good Breakfast



One of the most serious danger spots in our American health picture is the neglected breakfast, according to Elmo Roper, who made a nation-wide study of eating habits. Skipping breakfast seems to be associated with a fear of being overweight. In one survey 55% of the women who were concerned about their weight did not eat a good breakfast.

Skipping breakfast is not a good way to diet. It has been demonstrated by research at a Midwestern medical school that breakfast skippers on a weight reducing program were less efficient in the late morning hours and experienced disagreeable hunger pangs. Breakfast is an important part of an effective weight reduction plan. An adequate breakfast should provide one-fourth of the daily caloric requirements and protein allowance. Here is a 400-calorie breakfast that provides approximately one-fourth of the commonly prescribed reducing diet of 1500 calories and helps maintain efficiency in the late morning hours.

- Sugar (1 teaspoon)
 - Orange juice (1/2 cup)
 - Corn Flakes (1 ounce)
 - Milk, skim (1 cup)
 - Bread, enriched, toasted (2 slices)
 - Butter (1 teaspoon)
