Skipping breakfast is not a good way to diet. It has been demon-strated by research at a Midwestern medical school that breakfast-skippers on a weight reducing program were less efficient in the late morning hours and experienced disagreeable hunger pange. Thereakfast is an important part of an effective weight reduction phan. An adequate breakfast should provide one-fourth of the daily caloric requirements and protein allowance. Here is a 400-calorie breakfast that provides approximately one-fourth of the daily endorie requirements and protein allowance.
