millet, red top sorghum and grain sorghum should be fertilized with a balanced fertilizer to insure an adequate growth and in turn increase the yield of grain in case the land owner chooses to make a head harvest.

Former experiences indicate the importance of strip width, not less than two rows of closely drilled and well fertilized sudan or millet and eight rows of peanuts are required and not less than four rows of well fertilized and thickly seeded grain sorghum and eight rows of peanuts will give the needed protection.

Nature will control both wind and water erosion if given a chance, by preserving a mulch on the land. Landowners who understand these needs of the land furnish this protection through cover crops, crop residue management and strip cropping. This type of treatment results in increased yields plus the personal satisfaction of doing a satisfactory job of conservation.

### Area Peanut Farmers Plan Strip Cropping

(Editor's Note: The following article was prepared for this newspaper by the local Soil Conservation Service.)

Strip crops are very effective in holding sands in place. They also fit well into a system of crop rotation. The crop residue from strips such as sudan and grain sorghum are coarse and prove effective in wind and water erosion control for a longer period of time. These coarser stalks do not decompose as rapidly as small grain residue.

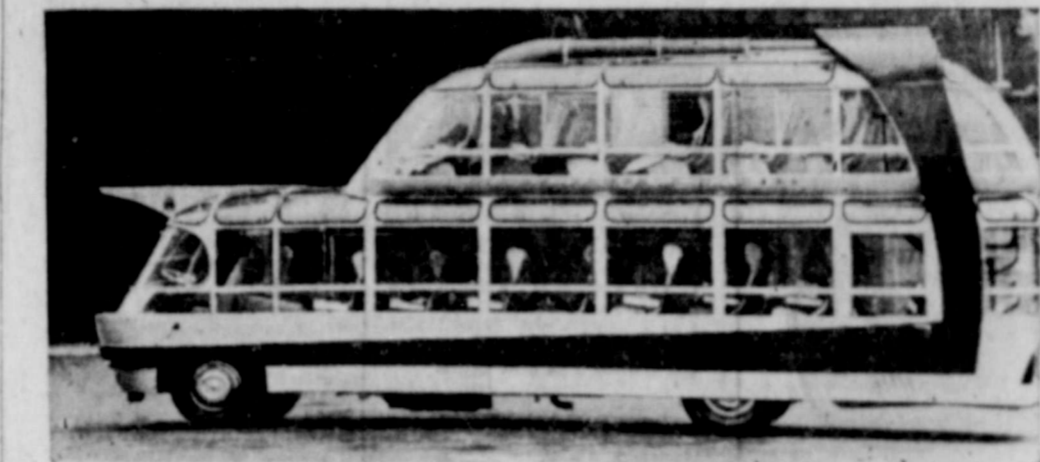

### Three Declared Delinquent by Draft Board

Three registrants of Local Board No. 30, Eastland, have been declared delinquent by the local Selective Service board, this week, it was revealed today.

According to selective Service regulations it is the duty of each registrant to keep his local board advised at all times of the address where mail will reach him. The mailing of any order, notice, or blank form by the local board to a registrant at the last address last reported by him to the local board shall constitute notice to him of the contents of the communication, whether he actually received it or not.

The following registrants have been declared delinquent: Noble Steward, Jimmie Harold Reeve and E. J. Grisham.

Unless these men are located they will be ordered to report for induction as delinquents, and if they fail to report they will be reported to the U. S. Attorney. Anyone knowing the whereabouts of these men should get in touch with them, Mrs. Jewel Reeve, local clerk, said.

The Universal Military Training and Service Act, as amended (usually called "the draft law"), requires that every man who was born on or after August 31, 1922, and who has reached his 18th birthday, and has not previously registered under this law, should present himself for and submit to registration before a local board. Men should register within five days of their 18th birthday.

### Don Butler Is Made Assistant Chief of Police

City of Ranger Fire and Police Commissioner Hershel Angus announced today that the City Commission has appointed Don Butler Assistant Chief of Police.

Butler will principally be on duty at night. Under this arrangement, there will be someone on duty on the night shift with full authority to handle any situation that might arise.

Butler has been a member of the police force since May, 1955. He has for some time assisted Chief of Police W. G. Pounds in investigative work, and it was primarily due to their work that the recent hub cap theft ring was broken up in Ranger, Eastland and Cisco.

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### Oil Squeeze Cause Of Unemployment

According to R. F. McCrary, manager of the Brownwood office of the Texas Employment Commission, claims for unemployment insurance filed at Eastland during the first three months of 1958 increased slightly more than 41 percent compared to the same period last year.

McCrary pointed out that the Eastland office serves all of Eastland County and part of several adjoining counties.

He said that records show that most of the claims for unemployment insurance were filed by persons moving back into this area from West Texas cities where the oil production limited quotas have curtailed operations.

The Brownwood Employment Commission manager said that claims in the Brownwood office have increased more than 100 percent.

### Installation of Dial Phones Underway Here

Installation of dial telephones will begin in the immediate future here. W. H. McAnally, manager, announced today.

McAnally explained that dials are being installed on telephones here in preparation for the change to the new dial system. He pointed out that local service will remain the same, that numbers will still have to be given to operators.

He also pointed out that turning the dial while telephoning can result in a disconnection.

### T-P. Coal & Oil Vote Dividend

Directors of Texas Pacific Coal and Oil Company on April 16 voted a regular first quarter dividend of 25 cents per share, payable June 5 to stockholders of record May 9.

Earnings in the first quarter 1958 were \$1,495,266, equal to 42 cents per share, according to H. B. Fuqua, board chairman and president. This decrease of 16 cents per share from the first quarter of 1957 is due to the cut-back in allowable oil producing days in 1958, Fuqua said. The 32 producing days allowed in the first quarter of 1958 represent a 35 percent cut below the 49 days of the first quarter of 1957.

The 69th stockholders meeting was held at the Company's headquarters in Fort Worth. All officers and directors were re-elected. Frank Pearsall heads the Texas and Pacific Coal and Oil in Ranger.

### Palsy Tests Promising

Authorities at Dallas Research Center have expressed the belief that they have come up with a muscle relaxant which may help the tiny victims of cerebral palsy.

Dr. Phillip N. Hood, director of the Dallas Center where tests of the drug are being made, said the tests were called a "double blind study." One group of children under observation at the center given the drug, while a second group under observation is given only a sugar pill.

The treatment center is at the Dallas Research Center for Crippled Children, which is an Easter Seal agency.

Only the doctor conducting the experiment knows which children receive the drug.

The drug has produced for the first time different results in the two groups. It is apparent to experts that psychological reaction play a big role in cerebral palsy. When young palsy patients know they are supposed to show improvement, they usually do to a certain extent.

Relief or even slowing muscle tenseness, said Dr. Hood can mean much toward helping the slow progress of palsy victims.

The drug also cuts down on the excess movement of the atrophic cerebral palsy patients.

### 100-YEAR CLOCK—London's Big Ben, perhaps the world's most famous clock in the world, has ticked off just about 100 years. It was on April 10, 1858, at eight o'clock at night, that workmen poured 17 tons of metal into a giant mold. ### WTCC To Meet In Fort Worth April 27-29

The chairman of the State Board of Water Engineers and an executive of one of the nation's top magnetic tape companies will appear on the program of the 40th annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, WTCC officials announced today.

Manford is in the farming and ranching business at Smiley in South Texas and also owns the Manford Grain and Elevator Co. and the Manford Hatchery and Feed Co. He is past president of the South Texas Elevator Assn. and was president of the Texas Tideland Assn.

He also served on the advisory committee for highway study of the Texas Research League.

Manford will appear on the WTCC convention program on Tuesday, April 29.

The tape recording executive, Bill Grove, vice-president of EMC Recording Co. in St. Paul, Minnesota will be the first speaker on the convention agenda on Monday, April 28. Recently honored as "Salesman of the Year" by the National Sales Executive association, Grove annually addresses more than 100,000 salesmen at sales meetings and conventions.

He is retained by five national concerns as a sales consultant and writes numerous sales pieces for trade journals.

Grove has addressed several state chambers of commerce and was featured on the program of the annual convention of the American Chamber of Commerce Executives association last year.

The WTCC convention headquarters will be in the Hotel Texas. The officers of the regional chamber have announced that the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce

is sponsoring a dinner on the evening of April 27 for all WTCC members attending the convention. Registration will begin on the afternoon of April 27. Tentative plans call for the first program sessions to begin the morning of Monday, April 28, and conclude at noon, April 29.

Special entertainment arrangements have also been made for the wives of members, WTCC officials said, including a tea and style show by Fort Worth apparel stores.

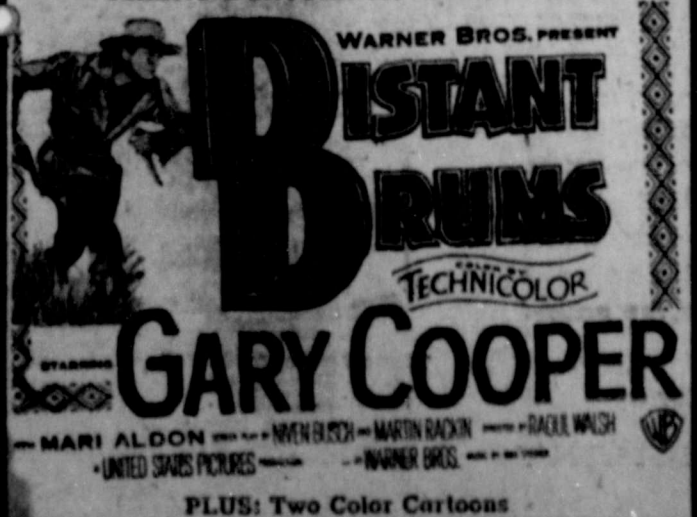

de detergent) should be right for your water supply. In hard water, soap mixes with the minerals in the water to form a scum. It's hard to rinse this out, so your clothes take on a gray look. However, if you have natural soft water or soften both the hot wash water and the rinse water, soap will do as good a cleaning job as a syndet. In hard water, syndets do a better cleaning job than soap. They soften the water so that no curd is formed.

Choose the soap or syndet made for the washing job you plan to do. For heavy-duty wash jobs special ingredients added to soaps and syndets give greater cleaning power. Most packages for heavy-duty wash are marked with all-purpose, "family wash", or "wash everything". Jobs for the light-duty detergents or mild soaps are marked on the package—"wash lovely lingerie, protect your hands in dishwasher, for baby things, etc."

For washing satisfaction, check your water carefully, keep special laundry problems in mind and choose the soap or syndet accordingly.

Fancy-leaved caladiums in planters or pots add color and interest to indoor furnishings. They also can be used to brighten summer gardens. Recommended varieties, ranging in color from snow white with green to deep red with green, include: Candidium, Lord Derby, Crimson Wave, Forcile Anglia, Red Ensign, Spangled Banner and Thomas Tomlinson.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—On the night of April 10, Ben Wooten, president of the First National Bank of Dallas, made a speech in 'Abilene. In that speech he inferentially chided the business interest of the country for not doing a better job of selling to cure a recession. It seems as if Wooten is critical of everyone running to Washington looking for Governmental remedies for all the ills which beset us. There are hundreds of pressure groups in the United States organized for the purpose of gaining favors from Government. Many of these force Government into improper activities. It is the con-

clusion of some very intelligent people that this practice has brought about a condition which has destroyed a lot of individual initiative, which otherwise would contribute to the economic life of the country.

Many clubs and organizations act very much like the Government. When something is needed they figure the best thing to do is appoint a committee to look into the matter. In Government we find instances of a committee or commission appointing another committee or commission, and finally with authority completely diffused, no one knows what anybody else is supposed to do. Of course, the result of such a situation is that nothing is done.

Back to Mr. Wooten's speech—I think he disproved what a farmer once gave as his reason for success. This well-to-do farmer (back in the days when there were well-to-do farmers) said that he attributed his success to staying away from mean horses, hay balers and bankers. But Mr. Wooten recommended in his talk that it is the business of business to do more for itself. His point has been proved lately by one large manufacturer of radio and television sets. Price cuts were made by this company as an experiment. Reports indicate amazing results. The company had such an increase in demand it had to hire more workers to fill its orders.

As long as industry and business look to Washington to cure all the economic ills, there are plenty of those in Washington who are ready and willing to try it.

This time last year economy was the watchword. There is not very much being said about it at this time. The business community of our country is seemingly willing for the pumps to be primed. The primer and the grease for the pump will be bought on credit, but not the usual kind. When an individual buys on the installment plan, he pays in the future for whatever he has purchased at present prices. The pump priming of Government will be paid for in the future at a higher price than that now prevailing, even in these inflationary times. This will come about because the "priming" will result in deficit financing, and deficit financing means more inflation. More inflation means higher prices—it means the Government is mortgaging the future of the taxpayers.

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

lator, the representative of the senator.

Otherwise, most of our expressed ideas are gripes. Gripes, that seldom get to the elected official.

In a "now and then" correspondence through the years my husband and I feel that we have come to know Congressman Erierson. This is not because he has rendered or has been asked to render us a personal service. It is because we desired to express our opinions and because we wanted to let him know that we appreciate his wholesome integrity.

Letters from Senator Johnson have been of interest.

Acquaintance with the Junior Senator Scarborough we have not as yet made.

The late president Franklin Delano Roosevelt challenged me with his vast conservation program and thrilled me with his almost incomparable command of the English language.

But when he had served his 8 and 4, I could not go along with those whom I felt put partly first.

When I saw his portrait, the last ever painted, now shown in "The Little White House" at Warm Springs, Georgia, I felt his determined backers had all-but crucified him. Not for country, but for self.

His withered limbs are not visible, neither his tired heart. But the emaciated face is a sad likeness.

In 1952 while editing the *German Progress*, I wanted to know just how to interrupt campaign literature that branded General Eisenhower as a man with no belief in God. I should have been smart enough to read the autobiographical histories of his campaigns in Europe but I wasn't.

The thought struck me that if anyone knew his religious belief, his wife would know.

The question I asked of her was, "Is your husband a Christian?"

It was months later that I received a letter from Mary Mc-

Affee stating that a sack of mail had been lost in Denver and that Mrs. Lutz made my letter illegible.

Really, I felt, "The election is over. It doesn't make any difference now."

But I pushed aside my temptation "not to answer the secretary."

My effort was well worth my time. A few days later there came to hand that distinctive envelope, with its return "The White House."

I have kept the letter with its lines, "Now, more than ever, we will need your prayers," Mamie David Eisenhower.

Few among us, as constituents, will ever know an intimate friendship with our public servants. It will be to our credit, nonetheless, to know our state and national officials by what they have done and what they are doing.

November elections are Party elections. Among the 75 of my acquaintance who serve in legislative or Congressional capacity (and the number is necessarily limited) I have found much to be desired in their capability and in their integrity.

The big men and those who will attain greatness are those who allow themselves the privilege of becoming bi-partisan when right demands it.

We, as constituents, elect to office a public servant a person who has actually been selected by a very small number of us. This time we are content to let the vote be our last contact with the legislator. (Continued on Page Eight)

### Area Peanut Farmers Plan Strip Cropping

(Editor's Note: The following article was prepared for this newspaper by the Local Soil Conservation Service.)

The conservation farmer continues to be a highly skilled worker in his field of endeavor. For example, he is now starting his row crop operations for the current season. Cover crops seeded last fall have given excellent soil protection against both wind and water erosion. To destroy these cover crops and still leave maximum crop residue on or near the surface of the soil is his goal, realizing that good ground cover, to include dead litter, is essential.

The peanut farmers are also planning a strip crop program to further supplement the highly important vegetative program. Last fall during the "blow season" strips prevented peanuts in the wind row from being covered with sand, thus preventing partial or in some instances, a complete loss of the crop.

Strip crops are very effective in holding sands in place. They also fit well into a system of crop rotation. The crop residue from strips such as sudan and grain sorghum are coarse and prove effective in wind and water erosion control for a longer period of time. These coarser stalks do not decompose as rapidly as small grain residue.

Strip crops, such as sudan, pearl millet, red top sorghum and grain sorghum should be fertilized with a balanced fertilizer to insure an adequate growth and in turn increase the yield of grain in case the land owner chooses to make a head harvest.

Former experiences indicate the importance of strip width, not less than two rows of closely drilled and well fertilized sudan or millet and eight rows of peanuts are required and not less than four rows of well fertilized and thickly seeded grain sorghums and eight rows of peanuts will give the needed protection.

Nature will control both wind and water erosion if given a chance, by preserving a mulch on the land. Landowners who understand these needs of the land furnish this protection through cover crops, crop residue management and strip cropping. This type of treatment results in increased yields plus the personal satisfaction of doing a satisfactory job of conservation.

Virgil Massingill recently completed a farm pond for livestock water and a diversion terrace to divert outside water from his cropland field.

A farm pond was staked for Earnest Sneed and ponds have been requested by M. R. Frye, H. E. Wagley, Carl Simpson and J. F. Reynolds. Terrace lines have been run and are in process of construction on the J. F. Harlow farm. Harlow had completed a farm pond this week.

Three registrants of Local Board No. 30, Eastland, have been declared delinquent by the local selective service board, this week, it was revealed today.

According to Executive Service regulations it is the duty of each registrant to keep his local board advised at all times of the address where mail will reach him. The making of any order, notice, or bank torn by the local board to a registrant at the last address last reported by him to the local board shall constitute notice to him of the contents of the communication, whether he actually received it or not.

The following registrants have been declared delinquent: Noble Stouard, Jimmie Harold Reeve and E. J. Grisham. Unless these men are located they will be ordered to report for induction as delinquents, and if they fail to report they will be reported to the U. S. Attorney. Anyone knowing the whereabouts of these men should get in touch with them, Mrs. Jewel Reeves, local clerk, said.

The Universal Military Training and Service Act, as amended (usually called "the draft law"), requires that every man who was born on or after August 31, 1922, and who has reached his 18th birthday, and has not previously registered under this law, should present himself for and submit to registration before a local board. Men should register within five days of their 18th birthday.

### Don Butler Is Made Assistant Chief of Police

City of Ranger Fire and Police Commissioner Hershel Angus announced today that the City Commission has appointed Don Butler Assistant Chief of Police.

Butler will principally be on duty at night. Under this arrangement, there will be someone on duty on the night shift with full authority to handle any situation that might arise.

Butler has been a member of the police force since May, 1955. He has for some time assisted Chief of Police W. G. Pounds in investigative work, and it was primarily due to their work that the recent hub cap theft ring was broken up in Ranger, Eastland and Cisco.

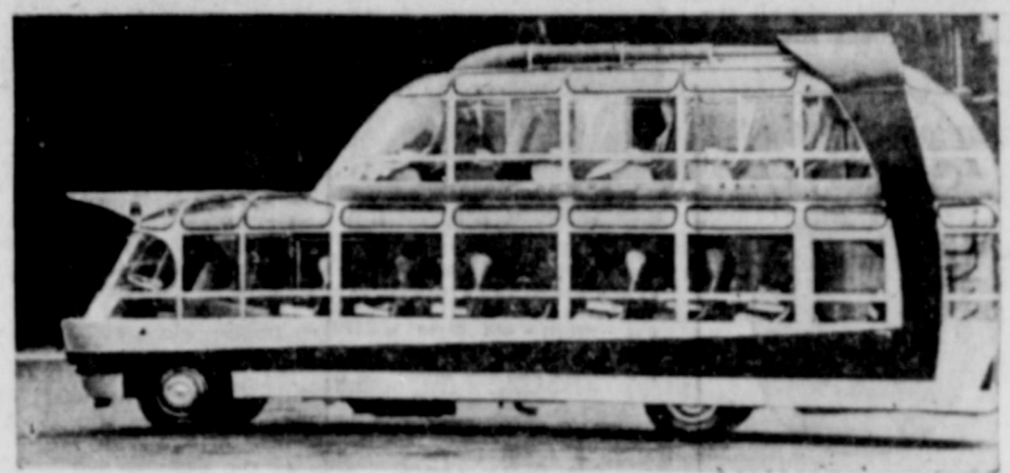

He also served on the advisory committee for highway study of the Texas Research League.

Manford will appear on the WTCC convention program on Tuesday, April 29.

The tape recording executive, Bill Grove, vice-president of EMC Recording Co. in St. Paul, Minnesota will be the first speaker on the convention agenda on Monday, April 28. Recently honored as "Salesman of the Year" by the National Sales Executive association, Grove annually addresses more than 100,000 salesmen at sales meetings and conventions.

He is retained by five national concerns as a sales consultant and writes numerous sales pieces for trade journals.

Grove has addressed several state chambers of commerce and was featured on the program of the annual convention of the American Chamber of Commerce Executives association last year.

The WTCC convention headquarters will be in the Hotel Texas. The officers of the regional chamber have announced that the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce

is sponsoring a dinner on the evening of April 27 for all WTCC members attending the convention. Registration will begin on the afternoon of April 27. Tentative plans call for the first program sessions to begin the morning of Monday, April 28, and conclude at noon, April 29.

Special entertainment arrangements have also been made for the wives of members, WTCC officials said, including a tea and style show by Fort Worth apparel stores.

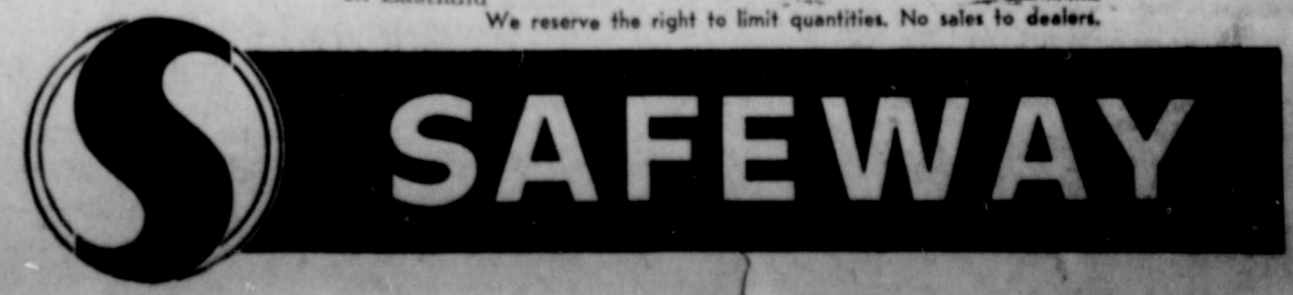

### AS IT LOOKS FOR HERE

WASHINGTON, D. C.—On the night of April 16, Ben Wooten, president of the First National Bank of Dallas, made a speech in Abilene. In that speech he inferentially chided the business interest of the country for not doing a better job of selling to cure a recession. It seems Mr. Wooten is critical of everyone running to Washington looking for Governmental remedies for all the ills which beset us.

There are hundreds of pressure groups in the United States organized for the purpose of gaining favors from Government. Many of them force Government into improper activities. It is the con-

clusion of some very intelligent people that this practice has brought about a condition which has destroyed a lot of individual initiative, which otherwise would contribute to the economic life of the country.

Many clubs and organizations act very much like the Government. When something is needed they figure the best thing to do is appoint a committee to look into the matter. In Government we find instances of a committee or commission appointing another committee or commission, and finally with authority completely diffused, no one knows what anybody else is supposed to do. Of course, the result of such a situation is that nothing is done.

Back to Mr. Wooten's speech—I think he disproved what a farmer once gave as his reason for success. This well-to-do farmer (back in the days when there were well-to-do farmers) said that he attributed his success to staying away from mean horses, hay balers and bankers. But Mr. Wooten recommended in his talk that it is the business of business to do more for itself. His point has been proved lately by one large manufacturer of radio and television sets. Price cuts were made by this company as an experiment. Reports indicate amazing results. The company had such an increase in demand it had to hire more workers to fill its orders.

As long as industry and business look to Washington to cure all the economic ills, there are plenty of those in Washington who are ready and willing to try it.

This time last year economy was the watchword. There is not very much being said about it at this time. The business community of our country is seemingly willing for the pumps to be primed. The primer and the grease for the pump will be bought on credit, but not the usual kind. When an individual buys on the installment plan, he pays in the future for whatever he has purchased at present prices. The pump priming of Government will be paid for in the future at a higher price than that now prevailing, even in these inflationary times. This will come about because the "priming" will result in deficit financing, and deficit financing means more inflation. More inflation means higher prices—it means the Government is mortgaging the future of the taxpayers.

lator, the representative of the senator.

Otherwise, most of our expressed ideas are gripes. Gripes, that seldom get to the elected official.

In a "now and then" correspondence through the years my husband and I feel that we have come to know Congressman Burleson. This is not because he has rendered or has been asked to render us a personal service. It is because we desired to express our opinions and because we wanted to let him know that we appreciate his wholesome integrity. Letters from Senator Johnson have been of interest.

Acquaintance with the Junior Senator Scarborough we have not as yet made.

The late president Franklin Delano Roosevelt challenged me with his vast conservation program and thrilled me with his almost incomparable command of the English language.

But when he had served his 8 and 4, I could not go along with those whom I felt put party first.

When I saw his portrait, the last ever painted, now shown in "The Little White House" at Warm Springs, Georgia, I felt his determined backers had all-but crucified him. Not for country, but for self.

His withered limbs are not visible, neither his tired heart. But the emaciated face is a sad likeness.

In 1952 while editing the Gorman Progress, I wanted to know just how to interrupt campaign literature that branded General Eisenhower as a man with no belief in God. I should have been smart enough to read the autobiographical histories of his campaigns in Europe but I wasn't.

The thought struck me that if anyone knew his religious belief, his wife would know.

The question I asked of her was, "Is your husband a Christian?"

It was months later that I received a letter from Mary Mc-

affee stating that a sack of mail had been lost in Denver and that rain had made my letter illegible.

Really, I felt, "The election is over. It doesn't make any difference now."

But I pushed aside my temptation "not to answer the secretary."

My effort was well worth my time. A few days later there came to hand that distinctive envelope, with its return "The White House."

I have kept the letter with its lines, "Now, more than ever, we will need your prayers," Mamie David Eisenhower.

Few among us, as constituents, will ever know an intimate friendship with our public servants.

It will be to our credit, nonetheless, to know our state and national officials by what they have done and what they are doing.
