## Two Ranger Players To Play at ACC

ABILENE (Special)—Two Ranger football standouts, tackle Robert Veale and halfback Jerry Underwood, have signed letters to play football at Abilene Christian College, Coach N. L. (Nick) Nicholson announced Saturday.

Both won two football letters with Ranger and earned all-district honors last fall. Veale, a 210-pound, 5-11 boy, was also named to the all-Abilene Area second team in 1957. He has won one tennis letter at Ranger. Underwood was selected to the all-regional team in 1957 in addition to his district honor. He lettered one year on the Ranger basketball team.

The 6-foot, 175-pound halfback would also like to play basketball for the Wildcats. Veale has indicated that he will probably try out for the ACC baseball team also. Veale will study a pre-engineering course at ACC and plans a career as a geophysicist. Underwood is undecided about his major course of study.

This Ranger duet brings the total of high school footballers signed by ACC to five. They join tackle Glen Willingham of Breckenridge, tackle Charles Wiseman of Akron, Ohio, and end Jimmy Glover of Georgetown.

## Spring Training Starts At Ranger College

Ranger College kicked off football spring training Monday afternoon at 3 with 45 men coming out to limber up. Two new coaches were on hand to start out the season.

Coach David L. Slaughter began his first season here with his assistant, Jim Puryear. Both came here from Carrollton. This is the third coaching job for Slaughter, who started at Knox City after graduating from East Texas State College, then coached at Carrollton High School for four years. Puryear graduated from North Texas State and coached three years at Carrollton. Both men are married, and Puryear is the father of a six-month boy.

Commenting on the first day of training, Coach Slaughter said, "It looked real good for the first day. The kids had a lot of spirit." A former quarter-back, Slaughter added, "I think it'll be great living in Ranger. Everything's been real fine."

Puryear said, "I like it here. I'm well satisfied." This is his first time in West Texas. Among the players were 18 men returning from last year. The rest were high school seniors who will play their first college football next fall.

Several other seniors were expected to come in Monday night, and about 20 more were expected to arrive before May 9, last day of spring training. Training will continue six days a week for the next two weeks on the college work-out field.

Twenty persons interested in learning more about pecans attended the first session of County Agricultural Agent J. M. Cooper's pecan budding school this week in Eastland.

Cooper said there was a lot of interest in the school, and he announced plans for making it an annual affair for the next three years. He said the school was started because so much interest in pecan budding had been shown in the county that he was unable to take time out to teach each interested person the art. The all day session was held in the classroom and half in the field. During the morning students listened as Cooper lectured on budding. Then that afternoon they went into the woods on the north side of Lake Eastland and actually did some budding on small trees. All persons participating actually budded a tree. May 14 the second session of this year's school will be held. That's when Cooper's students will return to the field to bud the string and force the buds out. Then in June they will return again to tie the bud to keep it from blowing off.

### Highway Death Rate Lowest In State History

A slower driving Texas public during 1957 produced the lowest death rate in the state's history, the Texas Department of Public Safety reported today.

The encouraging information released by Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS director, was part of the department's annual statistical report on traffic accidents, as compiled by N. K. Woerner, department statistician. The new booklet is entitled "1.6 MPH."

Garrison said the average speed of all vehicles on Texas rural highways in 1957 was 1.6 miles per hour less than in 1956. Most of this speed reduction was in the 60-mph-and-above category.

"This slower average speed is a significant factor in holding the state's death rate to 6.0—six motor-accidents per each 100 million miles of driving. More directly, we believe this speed reduction during 1957 has prevented the death of 111 persons who would have died had the 1956 rate of 6.5 continued."

The state police director pointed out that speed reduction alone is not the total answer to traffic accident prevention, but that severity of accidents increase with speed.

"All regulations governing the movement of motor vehicles are designed to prevent traffic accidents. But it is only when all drivers comply with all traffic regulations that accidents be prevented.

"The public's response to our 1957 traffic safety campaign is very encouraging; we ask for the continued cooperation of Texas motorists in making 1958 an even safer year for driving."

AS IT LOOKS FOR HERE

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Most heard around Washington these days is "tax less" and "spend more."

Either of these taken separately may make some sense, but taken together it is near idiotic.

To cut taxes without cutting government spending is, to put it mildly, a disregard and an injustice to children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

From the political standpoint it does, however, sound good to talk about cutting taxes and, at the same time, spend money for every cause and purpose anyone can dream up.

It follows the proposition mentioned before in this column that all blessings flow from Washington, and that government can cure all ills.

And speaking of children, a recent survey of 6,000 high school students over the United States indicates that 25 percent of the boys and 33 percent of the girls control basic industries such as power, steel and railroads. The poll among school students reveals that most seniors believe that business is not good for the country. Fifty-six percent thought that the government could eliminate economic problems by taking from the rich and giving to the poor. Sixty-one percent favored government censorship and control of press, radio and T.V.

This strongly suggests that we are not imbuing the youth of this country with the principles of free enterprise, which, of course, is basic to our economic system.

While we are talking of better education in the sciences and mulling over the many proposals to improve the deficiencies found in this field, it seems pretty obvious that somebody should be doing something about teaching the basic philosophies which have made us the greatest country and the greatest people on earth.

Miss Hybernia Grace taught history and economics in Anson High School. Dr. Earl Brown taught economics in Abilene Christian College, and Dr. W. Aubrey Stephenson taught economics and politics in Hardin-Simmons University. Dr. Walter Prescott Webb, author of "Divided We Stand," taught the same in the University of Texas. All these teachers were my instructors.

If it could be summed up in one sentence, the idea in their teaching was that every individual American should be guaranteed the right by his government to earn and accomplish that which he wishes to accomplish by his own ability, initiative and energy, so long as he does not infringe

**Highway Death Rate Lowest In State History**

A slower driving Texas public during 1957 produced the lowest death rate in the state's history, the Texas Department of Public Safety reported today.

The encouraging information released by Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS director, was part of the department's annual statistical report on traffic accidents, as compiled by N. K. Woerner, department statistician. The new booklet is entitled "1.6 MPH."

Garrison said the average speed of all vehicles on Texas rural highways in 1957 was 1.6 miles per hour less than in 1956. Most of this speed reduction was in the 60-mph-and-above category.

"This slower average speed is a significant factor in holding the state's death rate to 6.0—six motor-vehicles per each 100 million miles of driving. More directly, we believe this speed reduction during 1957 has prevented the death of 111 persons who would have died had the 1956 rate of 6.5 continued."

The state police director pointed out that speed reduction alone is not the total answer to traffic accident prevention, but that severity of accidents increase with speed.

"All regulations governing the movement of motor vehicles are designed to prevent traffic accidents. But it is only when all drivers comply with all traffic regulations will accidents be prevented."

"The public's response to our 1957 traffic safety campaign is very encouraging; we ask for the continued cooperation of Texas motorists in making 1958 an even safer year for driving."

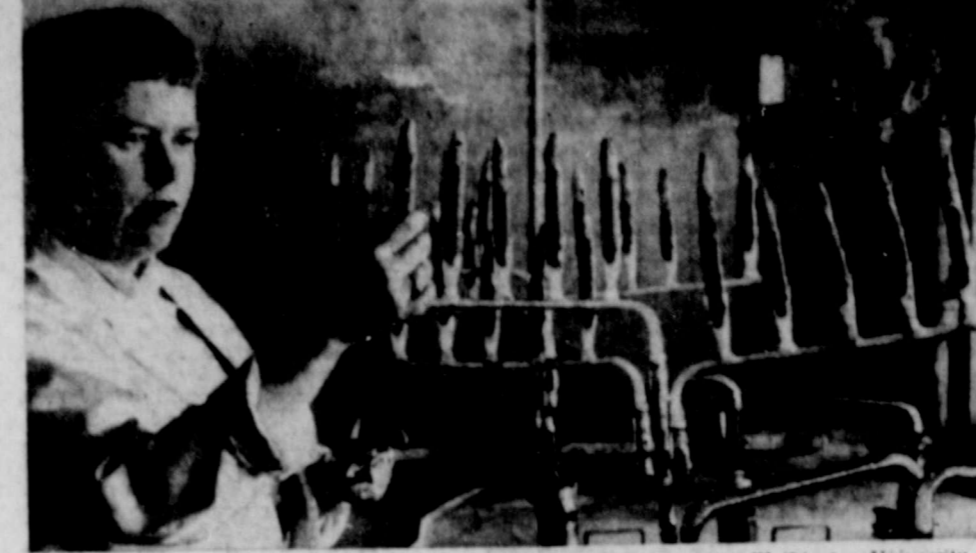

AS IT LOOKS FOR HERE

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Most heard around Washington these days is "tax less" and "spend more."

Either of these taken separately may make some sense, but taken together it is near idiotic. To cut taxes without cutting government spending is, to put it mildly, a disregard and an injustice to children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

From the political standpoint it does, however, sound good to talk about cutting taxes and, at the same time, spend money for every cause and purpose anyone can dream up.

It follows the proposition mentioned before in this column that all blessings flow from Washington, and that government can cure all ills.

And speaking of children, a recent survey of 6,000 high school students over the United States indicates that 25 percent of the boys and 33 percent of the girls control basic industries such as power, steel and railroads. The poll among school students reveals that most seniors believe that business is not good for the country. Fifty-six percent thought that the government could eliminate economic problems by taking from the rich and giving to the poor. Sixty-one percent favored government censorship and control of press, radio and T.V.

This strongly suggests that we are not imbuing the youth of this country with the principles of free enterprise, which, of course, is basic to our economic system. While we are talking of better education in the sciences and mulling over the many proposals to improve the deficiencies found in this field, it seems pretty obvious that somebody should be doing something about teaching the basic philosophies which have made us the greatest country and the greatest people on earth.

Miss Hybernia Grace taught history and economics in Anson High School. Dr. Earl Brown taught economics in Abilene Christian College, and Dr. W. Aubrey Stephenson taught economics and politics in Hardin-Simmons University. Dr. Walter Prescott Webb, author of "Divided We Stand," taught the same in the University of Texas. All these teachers were my instructors.

If it could be summed up in one sentence, the idea of this teaching was that every individual American should be guaranteed the right by his government to earn and accomplish that which he wishes to accomplish by his own ability, initiative and energy, so long as he does not infringe

upon these same rights on the part of his fellow man.

It would seem to me that there is need, if we believe in these surveys, for a reiteration of this broad principle. It would seem that it is equally important for the preservation of our nation to teach fundamentals as to educate our youth in the sciences.

What gain we from conquering all space and to lose that which has made us a great nation?

Perhaps we are protecting ourselves for the moment but forgetting what the future will be, should we allow our youth to drift into socialistic thinking.

"Twas a sheep, not a lamb, that strayed away. In the parable Jesus told, A grown up sheep that had gone astray. From the ninety and nine in the fold.

And why for the sheep should we earnestly long. And as earnestly hope and pray?

Because there is danger; if they go wrong They will lead the lambs astray.

For the lambs will follow the sheep, you know, Wherever the sheep may stray. When the sheep go wrong, it will not be long. Till the lambs are as wrong as they.

And so with the sheep we earnestly plead. For the sake of the lambs today.

If the sheep are lost, what a terrible cost. Some lambs will have to pay."
