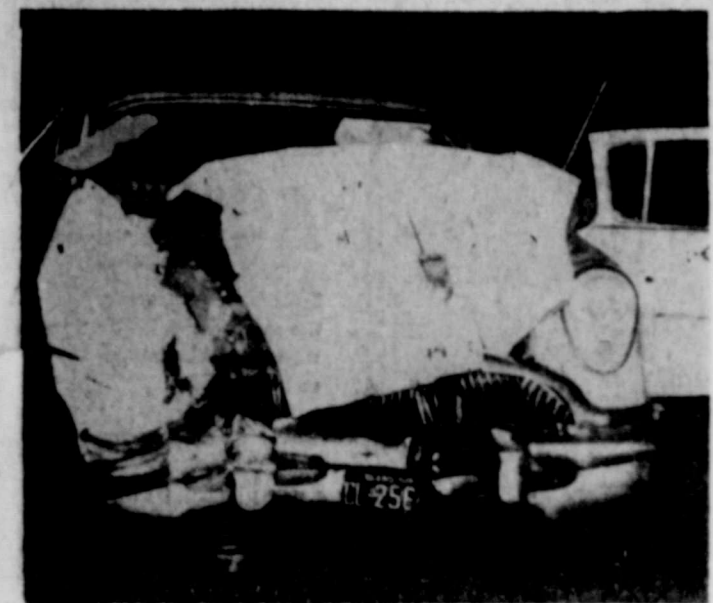

EASTLAND MAN INJURED—Landon Jordan was seriously injured when the borrowed car he was driving rammed into the High Point Service Station...

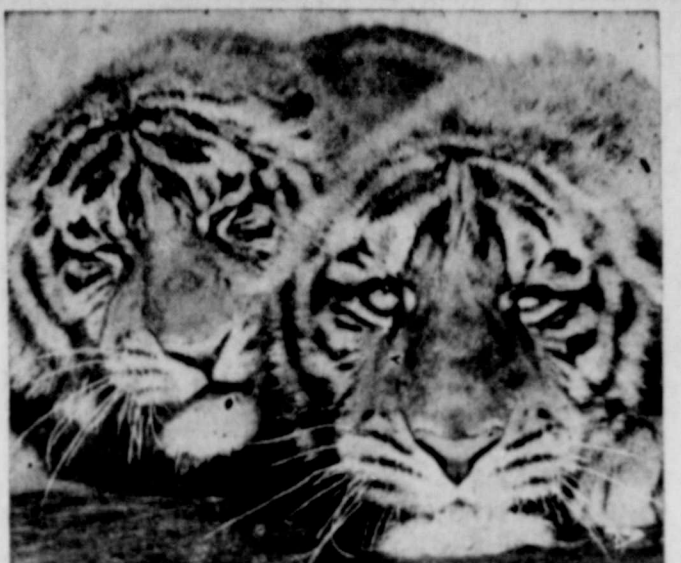
One person died and another was seriously injured early Wednesday morning in two different highway accidents in Eastland County.

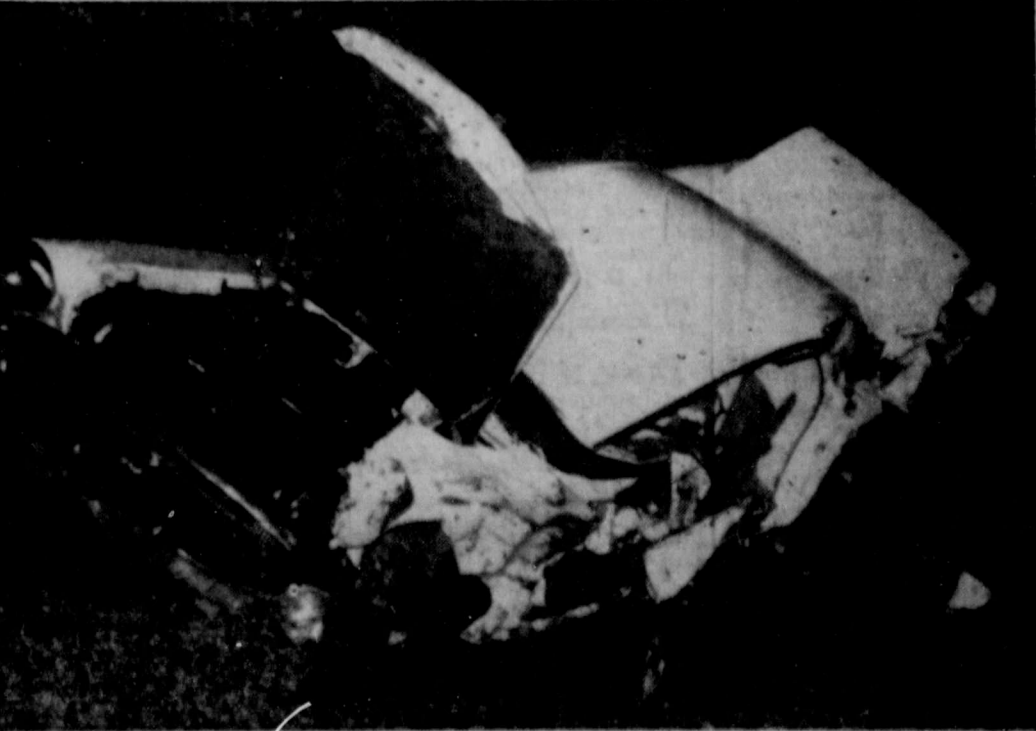

Eastland Co. Bond Sales In March Total \$226,762

Eastland county bought \$226,726 in Series E and H bonds during the month of March, according to a recent report from the Treasury Department.

The county led all other counties in the district except Taylor, which reported sales totaling \$1,380,000.

Nolan county sales amounted to \$143,248, coming in third in the district.

Sales in the Fort Worth area, including Eastland county, totaled \$2,535,814, representing the second highest amount of any area in the state. The Houston area was first.

Sales in Texas increased over five percent during the first three months of 1958, compared to the same period in 1957. Bond sales for March, alone, increased 11.7 percent above sales for March, 1957.

Cake and Pie Baked in 'One'



Molasses Sugar Pie has a crust like a pie, a filling like cake, and tastes like both. "Long sweetening" is what our grandmothers called molasses in the days when they used it to save sugar which was then expensive. Most of the good things they made with "long sweetening" didn't last long, though.

Take, for example, Grandmother's Molasses Sugar Pie. Most of us would call it cake, since the filling is like cake. But it is baked in a pie shell, and that makes it pie. The filling has a sort of gingerbread flavor. Old time cooks learned some shortcuts, just as we do today. When you cut into Molasses Sugar Pie you'd think a cake batter had been poured into a pie shell to bake. But making it is much easier than making a cake batter. A crumb mixture made of flour, sugar and margarine is spread into a pastry-lined pan. Over this is poured a mixture of boiling water, molasses and soda. The crumb mixture is alternated with the hot molasses until all the ingredients are used up. Surprisingly, baking transforms this unusual, easy-to-make filling into what looks and tastes like cake.

MOLASSES SUGAR PIE (19-inch pie)

- Pastry for bottom crust**
- 2 cups sifted flour
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 cup sugar
 - 1/2 cup margarine (1 bar)
 - 1/4 cup molasses
- Line 9-inch pie dish with pastry. Trim and flute edge. Into mixing bowl sift together flour, salt and sugar. Cut in margarine until mixture is like coarse cornmeal. Mix molasses, boiling water and soda, stirring to blend and dissolve soda. Add vanilla extract. Over bottom of pastry in lined pie dish sprinkle about one-fourth of the margarine-flour mixture. Pour some of the molasses mixture over,
- 1/2 cup boiling water
 - 1 teaspoon soda
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
 - 1 4-ounce package cream cheese
 - 1/2 cup chopped candied ginger drizzling about one-third of it over entire surface. Then add another layer of the margarine-flour mixture, more molasses, continuing until both are used. Alternate layers, ending with a layer of the crumb mixture on top. Bake in moderate oven (375°F.) 45 minutes. Serve warm. If desired, top with ice cream or whipped cream cheese into which candied ginger bits have been folded.

Home Makers May 1, 1958

Spring is here and appetites call for some changes from foods that have been favorites all winter. Salad for instance, may need to be varied a bit.

For a cool refreshing salad, Pineapple Sour Cream Salad is ideal. It even looks cool. Add 1 cup hot water to 1 package lime gelatin. Add 1-2 teaspoon salt and stir until dissolved. Stir in 1-4 cup cold water, 2 tablespoons lemon juice and 1 cup heavy sour cream. Beat until well blended. Pour into freezing tray and place in freezing section of refrigerator until mixture is firm about 1 inch from edge but is still soft in center. Pour mixture into a bowl and beat with a rotary beater until fluffy. Fold in 1-2 cups drained crushed pineapple. Pour into mold which has been oiled or rinsed with cold water. Chill until firm. Unmold on salad greens.

Use lime gelatin too, for Emerald Relish. Add 1 cup hot water to 1 package lime gelatin. Add 1-4 teaspoon salt and stir until dissolved. Add 3-4 cup vinegar. Stir to mix well. Chill until thickened. Combine 1-4 teaspoon salt, dash of pepper, 1-2 teaspoon grated onion, 2 tablespoons prepared horseradish and 2 cups drained chopped cucumber. Fold cucumber mixture into thickened gelatine. Pour into small individual molds which have been oiled or rinsed with cold water. Chill until firm. Unfold on serving plate or on salad greens arranged on salad plates. Makes 12 servings and goes especially well with fish and cold meats.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK Olive Cucumber Slaw: Combine 3 cups shredded cabbage, 1 cup well drained grated cucumber, 1-2 cup thinly sliced stuffed olives, 1 teaspoon salt and dash of pepper. Sprinkle with 2 tablespoons lemon juice. Mix with enough mayonnaise to moisten thoroughly, about 1-2 cup. Chill. Makes four servings.

In solving problems and making plans together family groups may find a "Pattern for Solving Pro-

blems and Planning Together" of real help.

A pattern consists of the following steps:

- 1. Face the problem
2. Look at the causes of the problem
3. Pretend you are the other persons involved.
4. Set some goals
5. List the choices you have.
6. Decide on a plan of action.
7. Check your plan with your goals.

8. Decide on a test or check of your plan.

The following suggestions may be of help in making a family council successful.
1. Begin, if possible, with very simple problems.
2. Try to have some fun and pleasure out of it.
3. Concentrate on people's feelings.
4. Remember that everybody has good ideas.
5. Avoid meaningless arguments.
6. Don't take yourself too seriously.

Counseling, planning, working and sharing together in the family can result in stronger family and community life as it builds a more unified family through agreement of its members rather than by authority of the head, and it provides basic training for citizenship in a democracy.
