Ranger College Plans Street Paving Project

A feature story, pointing out the needs for campus improvements at Ranger College, was printed in the graduation edition of the Times last year.

Written by the late Norman Wright, it pointed out the need for street paving and gutter work at the college. Mr. Wright urged the ex-students and the people of Ranger to get behind the project to pave the streets.

A year has passed and nothing has been done. But plans for the project are under way and the work is definitely planned to start this summer, according to Dr. Price Ashton, college president.

The beautification program is needed to "lift it from the mire of a hog pen and place it in the proper setting for a school plant," said Wright. Now such a program is in the planning stage.

Wright compares the 19th largest junior college to industry, which benefits the city and the area beyond dollar and cents values. It is a cultural and education asset, one that should be pointed out in pride. It should be one of the most beautiful college campuses in the state, Wright said.

Local people and students will now do something about it. They will take shovels in hand and undertake the street-paving project themselves, using college equipment.

ment, Ranger College is also furnishing the asphalt and gravel for surfacing.

If the project proceeds successfully, the students will return to the campus next fall to find about six blocks paved, with curbs and gutters. They will no longer think of it as a "hog pen" or a "stock yards". Perhaps for the first time they will be filled with pride for their college campus.

Students will join in with other young people and a few older, more experienced workers, to put this project over during the summer months.

An entrance arch on Highway 80 is still planned for sometime in the future. But building this arch entails more problems than can be solved immediately.

Wright said, "In the proper setting these buildings on the campus would give the school the appearance of a bright diamond in a polished platinum mounting."

Now, perhaps, this dream will come true.

Farm Buildings Pay Themselves

Farmers who plan to modernize their service buildings this year have an opportunity to make the jobs pay for themselves twice over, Calvin Brown of Ranger Lumber and Supply declares.

Most service building improvement will pay for itself the first time in the labor it saves, or in added production it makes possible, Brown explains.

A second way to make farm building improvement pay for itself is the opportunity to win a cash prize in a farm building contest jointly sponsored by Farm Journal magazine and the National Lumber Manufacturers Association.

The contest is divided into two divisions: one for projects costing less than \$500; one for projects over \$500. In each division the top prize is \$1,500. There is a second prize of \$750, a third prize of \$500, and a fourth prize of \$250, with 20 \$100 awards.
