IT'S THE LAW in Texas

Many persons feel that the "whereases", "aforesaid", and other legal verbiage used by lawyers are intended only to confound and confuse the laymen.

Nothing could be further from the truth. In drafting legal documents, the lawyer attempts to draft them in such a way as to exclude all ambiguities. In the last analysis, a legal document means what some court at some future time shall declare that it means. As a consequence, it is the lawyer's duty to his client to attempt to draft the instrument in such a way that it can mean only one thing.

Most any paragraph of non-legal language contains numerous ambiguities. When a lawyer refers to the "deed aforesaid", he is attempting to make it clear beyond question that the deed he is referring to is the deed mentioned in a prior portion of the instrument. Likewise, when he prefixes a legal document with a long list of "whereases", he is simply reciting pertinent facts for the benefit of the court to show the facts of the situation that lead to the execution of the instrument.

The difficulty with drafting a document in laymen's language is that to the trained analyst such language is susceptible of several meanings, and consequently is likely to lead to litigation. It is the draftsman's purpose to avoid litigation which is usually expensive for the client.

Another reason why lawyers use legal language is historical in nature. Thus most deeds declare that the grantor "by these presents does grant, sell and convey" the land in question to the grantee. Each of the words recited has a technical meaning. The words together have frequently been construed by the courts and consequently the lawyer knows in using them that their meaning is settled and that they will operate to properly transfer the title. He would be inviting litigation for his client, if instead of using those words, he devised new language to express the same purpose. He could only say, "While I think the language that I have used will accomplish the purpose, I cannot be sure of it."

As a consequence, the lawyer, in the interest of his client, naturally uses the time-tested language instead of experimenting with new language.

Pecan Growers Urged to Watch Nut Casebearers

Possibilities for a good pecan crop in Eastland County are described as good, but B. G. Hancock, extension horticulturist, has warned that pecan nut casebearers are already on the job in the state and unless control measures are applied the crop could be a small one.

South Texas producers are spraying and those in all other areas in the State are warned by Hancock to be ready to apply the needed insecticides any day. The usual pattern of casebearer development is off schedule and the smart thing to do, says the special-

ist, is to watch the orchard every day.

The three essentials in obtaining satisfactory casebearer control are listed by Hancock and C. F. Garner, extension entomologist, as correct timing of spray application, proper application of spray material and use of the correct insecticides.

To be sure of timing, the specialists urge pecan growers to check the nut clusters closely and regularly for the appearance of the casebearer eggs.

Postal Services Are Explained

Everybody knows that "April showers bring May flowers." And everybody knows that May showers bring June brides. But not everybody knows that invitations and announcements bring congratulations to the postal service. Acting Postmaster Ella White says that this is not because the postal service dislikes weddings, or showers, or receptions, or any of the other functions which have to do with getting married. As a matter of fact, postal workers everywhere are anxious to contribute whatever they can to the success of these fine occasions. But sometimes those most interested in getting people happily started in life make helping very difficult for the postal service.

Take shower invitations for instance. When the date, the hour, the place the shower is to be held, the name of the prospective bride, and other pertinent information is shown in handprinting, handwriting, or typewriting, the first-class rate of postage must be applied, regardless of whether the invitations are in sealed or unsealed envelopes. If shower invitations are wholly printed, mimeographed, duplicated, or otherwise wholly produced by machine process, they may be mailed in unsealed envelopes at the third-rate class rate of two cents each. Printed announcements which are of odd size or shape, or which are exceptionally large or unusually small, must bear the minimum first-class rate of postage regardless of whether they are done by machine or by hand.

Homemakers who like good things in small packages will be glad to find another favorite—a small canned ham. Cans will be available in a new size. The U. S. Department of Agriculture's meat inspection division has cooperated with the meat-packing industry to develop a processing method that yields one and 1/2 pound canned hams much like the larger six to eight pound canned hams now on the market.

Small canned hams, many of them imported, have been on the market previously. These hams have been fully processed at a fairly high temperature. Although this allowed them to be stored at room temperature, it also resulted in considerable free liquid in the can. To avoid this problem, a way was found to process the new small canned hams safely at lower temperatures. Like the usual large canned hams, they have good flavor, little excess liquid in the can and must be stored in the refrigerator.

Processing of these hams is just beginning. They should be popular with those who like the convenience of ready-to-serve boneless hams but find the six pound hams too large. These small canned hams will be handy to keep in the refrigerator for a quick meal. Cold or hot, a 1 1/2 pound canned ham should serve 4 to 6 people.

Potatoes supply food energy at low cost. They also yield a small amount of protein which is improved in quality when potatoes are served with meat, fish, eggs, or milk. The Texas Food Standard, Texas Homemakers' guide for planning meals, lists one serving of potato a day.

If properly prepared, potatoes furnish C, the B vitamins, thiamin and riboflavin, and some iron. Boiling potatoes in their jackets or baking them is the best way to retain vitamin and mineral content.

It is not a fact that potatoes are fattening and must always be omitted from a weight control diet. A medium-sized potato supplies only about 100 calories, about one-third the amount supplied by a piece of pie or a piece of fried cake. It is the fat and gravy added to the potato that add calories to the serving. Potatoes have many uses. Combined with meat, fish, eggs or cheese, they are part of the main dish; boiled, baked, mashed, or fried, they are served as an accompaniment of a main dish. They also appear in soups, pancakes and salads. Add variety to

your meals by serving potatoes a different way each day.
