

CASTRO COUNTY RECEIVES BEST RAIN OF SEASON. WILL BENEFIT PLANTING

The most persistent drought in years was definitely broken in Castro County early Thursday morning when a drenching rain swept across from the northeast to bring precipitation varying from one-half to an inch and one-half throughout the county.

Very little wind accompanied the rain and little was lost as the fast drying ground drank the moisture. This was the best rain this section has received in several months and its general character will add a great deal to the

Row crops and gardens will receive a wonderful increased yield while the wheat lands of the county has been placed in excellent shape to receive the wheat planters. Drills will be put in operation just as quicky as the ground is dry enough to permit their use.

The extent of the rain over the local area included some twentyfive miles East, South to Plainview and North and West to the county lines.

Everyone is feeling pepped up and business conditions generally will feel the improvement immediately.

WAS HER SUICIDE JUSTIFIED?

The death of Mrs. Charlotte Perkins Gilman, who ended her life with chloroform, will undoubtedly do what she hoped, attract attention to suicide and cause much discussion.

Here was a woman, who had undoubtedly been a leader of her sex, having once been picked among the "twelve | greatest women" of this country. In failing health for several years and facing certain slow death from cancer, Mrs. Gilman left a suicide note worth reading. She thus explained the motives behind her act:

"No grief, pain, misfortune, or 'broken heart' is excuse for cutting off one's life while any power of service remains.

"But when all usefulness is over, when one is assured of an unavoidable and imminent death it is the simplest of human rights to choose a quick and easy death in place of a slow and horrible one.

"The time is approaching when we shall consider it abhorrent to our civilization to allow a human being to lie in prolonged agony which we should mercifully end in any other creature.

ORDER OF COMMISSIONERS COURT ESTAB-LISHING BOUNDARIES OF ELECTION

PRECINCTS

The Commissioners Court setting in regular session this 12th day of August, 1935, came to consider the matter of re-establishing the election precinct lines of election precincts No. 1, 4, 5, and 12 of Castro County on motion made by Commissioner L. A. Ricketts, duly seconded by Commissioner Andrew Acker and passed by unanimous vote of the court, the following order was passed. First:

That the boundary lines between election precinct No. 1 and No. 4, be changed from the present location as follows, From the center of the East door of the Castro County Court House in an Easterly direction to an intersection with the center line of State Highway No. 86, and Thence following the center line of said Highway No. 86 in an Easterly direction to the present East boundary line of election precinct No. 1. The territory lying on the North side of this line being election Precinct No. 4, and the territory lying South of this line being being election precinct No. 1;

Second, t hat the boundary line between election precincts No. 5, and No. 12, be as follows: From the East boundary of election precincts No. 1 and No. 4, along the center line of State Highway No. 86, in an Easterly direction to the Castro County & Swisher County line. The terriitory lying North of this line being in election precinct No. 12, and the territory lying South of this line being in election precinct No. 5. The boundary lines of commissioners Precincts No. 1 and No. 4, will be changed to conform to the change in election precincts.
