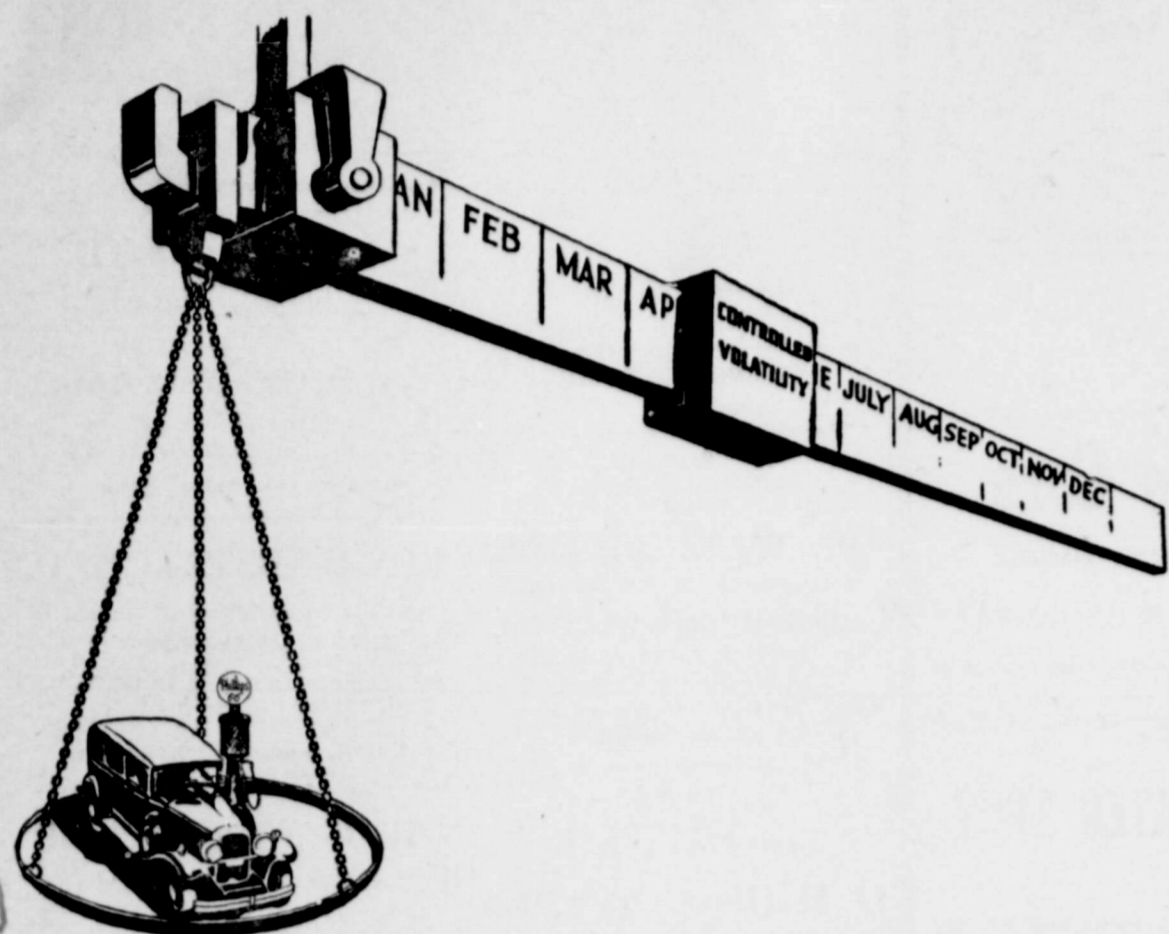

HEALTH and ...BEAUTY

TUBERCULOSIS

In spite of the fact that great efforts are put forth by so many agencies to spread knowledge in regard to tuberculosis, yet the ignorance and misapprehension that the average person has managed to accumulate on the subject is discouraging, to say the least.

Every third person between fifteen and sixty years of age dies of tuberculosis. It kills one out of every ten. But you inquire, "Is not tuberculosis decreasing?" Statistics tell us that it is growing less among men and women in middle life, but since the craze for the slender silhouette has been rampant its ravages have increased frightfully among young girls. They diet until they are pathetically undernourished, frail and thin. Their resistance to disease is broken down and their vitality so lowered that the germs find their lungs inviting soil in which to grow and multiply. For this reason the very skinny young things are an easy mark for this dread disease.

The germ is known as the tubercle bacillus. They manufacture and throw off poisons which destroy the surrounding tissues. Its nature is to spread, and if not checked it will sooner or later destroy the lungs and also the patient.

It is said that the bacilli frequently enters the body in childhood, and are either destroyed by the tissues or remain latent awaiting a favorable opportunity to begin their deadly work. Bouehard, a noted French investigator, said: "The healthy body is not attractive to microbes," hence as long as a person is not run down in health he is not apt to contract tuberculosis.

Any cause which tends to lower vitality, breaks down resistance to the disease. Work for long hours in bad air, over-crowding, dissipation, insufficient sleep and rest, poor food, pneumonia or influenza, all tend to weaken the body and give the germs an opportunity to develop.

The resistance to tuberculosis is high in human beings and in some animals. Many of the human victims after acquiring the disease live from two to ten years. There is a form of tuberculosis that the laity call "galloping consumption," which progresses with such great celerity that the patient seldom survives beyond six months or a year.

Negroes have comparatively little resistance to tuberculosis, and usually manifest the symptoms of the most rapid and dangerous forms of the disease. However, their resistance to malaria is greater than that of the Caucasian. The blacks doubtless, built up a comparative immunity through the centuries in Africa where the most virulent forms of malaria are present.

THE OPEN GATE TO THE SOUTH

(Amarillo Daily News.) America barred the gate to Europe and closed the door to Asia when it adopted restricted immigration several years back, but the entrance to the south has remained open.

This condition virtually nullifies our immigration aims, writes Dr. Roy L. Garis, professor of economics in Vanderbilt University, in an article in The Saturday Evening Post.

Backing up the views of Mr. Garis, the Commissioner General of Immigration recently wrote: "I cannot reconcile the unlimited flow of immigrants from the Western Hemisphere with the sharp curtailment of immigrants from Europe."

The Secretary of Labor also comments:

"The limitation of European immigration has clearly proved to be a long step toward an economically sound balance between the labor demand and supply, but it is obvious that such a goal cannot be fully established and permanently maintained so long as there are nearby sources from which millions of immigrants may come at any time they may choose to do so.

The mistake of our immigration policy is that there are no restrictions from the south, and this is being recognized by economic and labor leaders everywhere.

Immigration from Mexico, especially, is now one of the major national problems of America.

The power to change conditions rests with Congress.

Closing the gates to Europe and Asia simply diverted the immigrant stream to South America, Central America and Mexico.

Unless congress does something to stop this flow the unemployment situation in America will become more alarming year by year.

Until recently the Mexican problem was confined mostly to the border states of Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California.

Mr. Garis, in his Saturday Evening Post article, quotes statistics to prove that the problem has become nation-wide. The flow of cheap labor which has come across the Rio Grande by the thousands, has spread to every state in the Union.

In 1900 Texas had a Mexican population of 71,000, Arizona, New Mexico and California had 25,000, running the total to 100,000 in round numbers.

Today in Los Angeles and vicinity there are 299,000 Mexicans, San Antonio has 75,000, El Paso has 53,000. "Every city of Texas has a large Mexican element," says Mr. Garis. They are not confined, however, to the Southwest.

"Chicago has its own Little Mexico of 30,000. The Mexicans are displacing the Negroes in the stock yards. In Pittsburgh, Detroit and Gary, the steel mills are full of them. They are found in the railroad construction gangs of New York, Pennsylvania and other states.

"In 1926 the Mexican embassy set the number of Mexicans in the United States at 890,000, a careful consideration of all available data seems to indicate that the total population in the United States which could be designated as Mexican is nearly 2,000,000 at the present time."

A marker will eventually designate the spot where lies the remains of the Southwest's most famous young outlaw, the light haired boy who had killed 21 men by the time he reached his majority.

Lying in the old cemetery near Fort Sumner are Billy the Kid, Charley Boundrey and Tom O'Phallon, all of whom wrote flaming chapters of southwestern history.

A concrete curbing has been placed around the three graves, located side by side and a concrete slab has been placed over the grave of Billy.

In the past twenty years only families of the old timers who witnessed stirring history of the 80's have been permitted burial in the little plot. Among the families buried here are the Maxwells, Beaublens, Abreu and Jaramillo.
