Oak Ridge speaker to explain 'Atomic World' at DHS Tuesday

Atomic energy and its applications will be described Tuesday at Dimmitt High School.

A PROGRAM titled "This Atomic World" will acquaint Dimmitt students with basic principles of nuclear energy, its sources and role in agriculture, industry, medicine and research.

The 40-minute presentation by Harold L. Watson is part of the Atomic Energy Commission's traveling educational program.

Watson will explain in easily understood terms the structure of atoms, nuclear reactor operation and concepts such as radiation, fission and fusion. Special equipment will be used to demonstrate sources of radiation, how nuclear energy is harnessed to generate electricity, and use of radioisotopes to aid in diagnosis and treatment of diseases and to 1 more about life processes.

A CHALKBOARD talk to Dimmitt High Science classes will go into more detail on atomic structure, radioactivity, radiation biology and nuclear science careers. The program will be presented by Texas A&M University in cooperation with Oak Ridge Associated Universities, a non-profit edu-

cational and research corporation of southern colleges and universities.

Watson, who holds Texas A&M and Arkansas A&M degrees, trained with the AEC and ORAU at Oak Ridge, Tenn.

October, 'Cooperative Month,' geared to better life in 70s

"Cooperative Commitment Month" during October has been designated as a time for cooperatives to gather strength for the 70's — strength directed toward helping members build a better life for themselves, their community and the nation.

ON A national basis, representatives of the national cooperative organizations are working with federal government officials on plans for activities.

These national groups are preparing background and support materials for state and local groups to use — all geared to the theme, "A Better Life In The Seventies — The Pledge of America's Cooperatives."

Kenneth D. Naden, executive vice-president of the National Council of Farmer Cooperatives, is heading up rural cooperative's activities; and Stanley Dreyer, president of the Cooperative League of the USA, heads activities for urban cooperatives.

THEY suggest that while members and employees are seeking to help correct some of the problems facing the communities and the nation, they can also be building stronger cooperatives.

Cooperatives and their members will be making pledges to move into action on various fronts.

AMONG these are:

- Improving the environment by curbing pollution and other hazards.
- Adding to income of members so they personally can have a better life.
- Finding new services and improving existing ones that will upgrade the quality of life for members.

—Increasing participation in community affairs to improve educational and cultural aspects of life.

—Encouraging young farmers to begin to take leadership.

—Helping bring industry into rural areas to provide jobs and add to income.

NADEN explains why a clear call to action is needed this month. "There is overwhelming evidence that our nation is in trouble. Rural areas especially are facing problems, yet cities too face a serious crisis. The irony of it is that one relates very directly leads to migration from the country leads to overcrowded cities. Pollution on the farm threatens food and water supplies of the city. Pollution from the cities threatens crops and livestock on the farm."

"Group action such as practiced through a cooperative can amplify the sound of needs calling for action and reach a much broader audience."

Stored chemicals can kill animals

Misuse, mishandling and improper storage of herbicides and other agricultural chemicals is resulting in the death of many farm animals.

DR. JOHN C. REAGOR, toxicologist for the Texas Veterinary Experiment Station, has become the leading cause of death in cases he has investigated.

"In one case, a can of arsenic had fallen from a shelf onto the dirt floor of a hay barn," Dr. Reagor said. "Moisture had rusted a hole in the can and had spread the arsenic over most of the floor of the barn, and whenever bales from the bottom row were used, animals would die."

"In this case, there was extreme difficulty in locating the source of poisoning, since only a few bales of the hay 'hot' with arsenic were fed."

DR. Reagor also warned against using barrels for feed troughs or storage that had previously been used as containers for arsenic base agricultural chemicals.

"You can burn them, wash them, and everything else, but the arsenic may still remain in the metal of the barrels in sufficient quantities to kill almost any animal," he said. "You are just asking for trouble when using these barrels."

Dr. Reagor urged the policing of all areas in which animals are housed or pastured or where feed is stored.

"All agricultural chemicals, potentially dangerous to all farm animals and small children, should be gathered up and buried in an area where leaching into farm and community water supplies will not occur," he said.

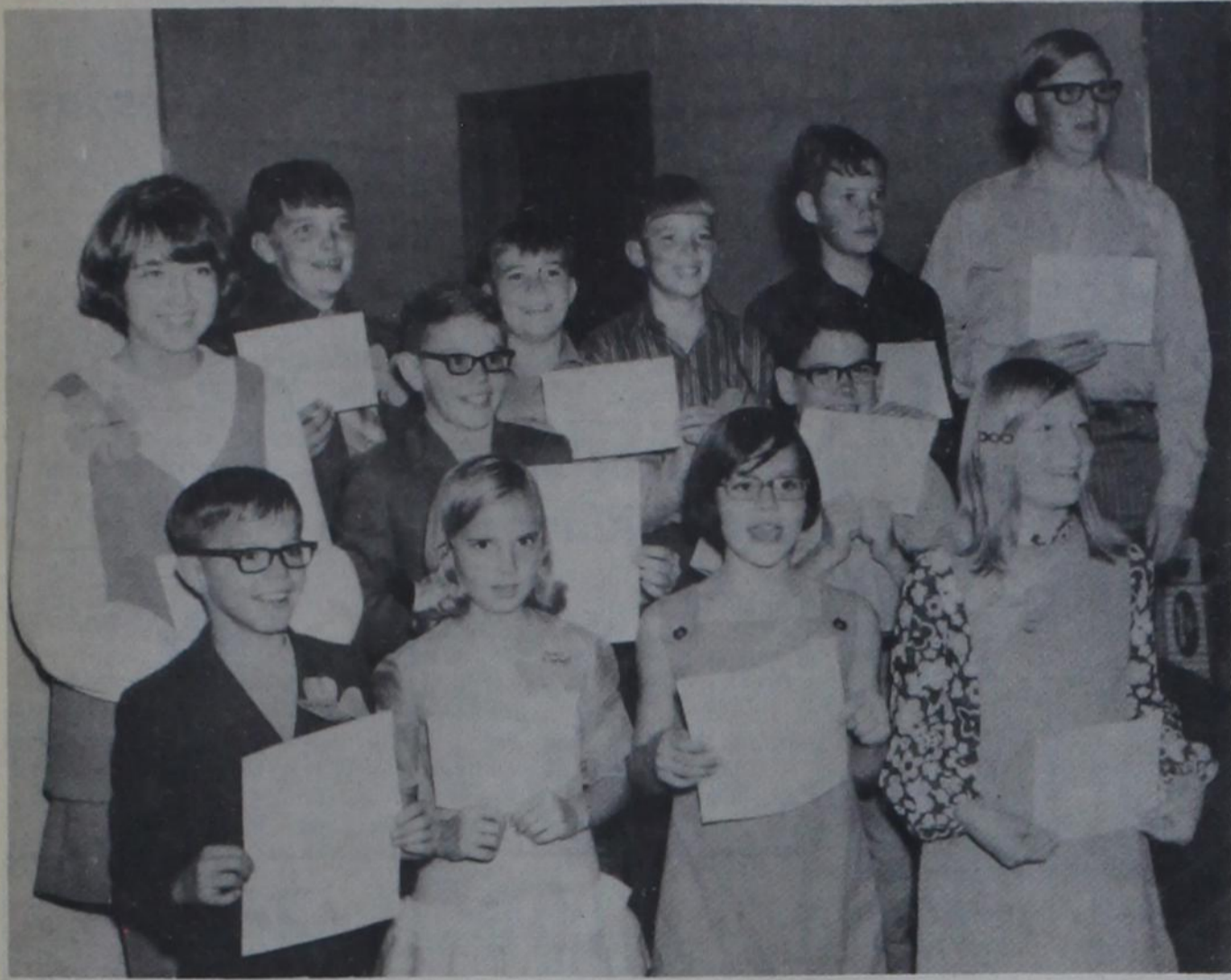

Musicks' son-in-law receives medal for heroism in Vietnam

Sp-5 John Fitch of Plainview, husband of the former Debbie Musick of Dimmitt, has been awarded the Army Commendation Medal for heroism in Vietnam.

FITCH, 22, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Al D. Fitch of Plainview and the son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Derrel Musick of Dimmitt.

Fitch has been in Vietnam since June 10, with the Second Artillery. His wife, a 1969 graduate of Dimmitt High School, is attending beauticians' school in Plainview while he is overseas. They were married May 22 while he was home on a 30-day leave after being stationed in Germany.

According to the order for the medal, "Specialist Fitch distinguished himself by heroism on July 30, 1970, while serving as a cannoneer on a twin 40mm Duster with Battery B, 5th Battalion, 2nd Artillery in the Republic of Vietnam.

"WHEN (his battery) came under heavy enemy attack, accurate mortar barrage came from several enemy positions in the line some 250 meters from the perimeter.

"As soon as the first rounds

struck, Specialist Fitch immediately left his bunker and, ignoring his own personal danger, ran through a hail of mortar fragments to mount the open turret of his M42A1 Duster.

"In this position he was completely exposed to the fragmentations of enemy rounds. Yet he calmly remained at his post, feeding a continuous stream of ammunition to the automatic leaders, insuring uninterrupted fire.

"AS A result of the heroism and devotion to duty of Specialist Fitch and his fellow crewmen, the enemy positions were silenced with minimum friendly casualties.

"Later that same night, when the enemy again fired mortars, Fitch repeated his earlier performance and he and his crew silenced the enemy."

Fitch enlisted in the US Army in January 1967, after attending Plainview Public Schools. He received his high school diploma while serving in Korea. He also has served in Germany, at Fort Bliss, and at Key West, Fla.
