WAR PRISONERS AVAILABLE FOR FARM LABOR NEEDS

Castro County farmers can now get war prison labor by making application at the office of County Agent M. U. May. These applications are sent to College Station and then the War Prison Camp will notify the farmer when his contract is ready to sign at the camp.

According to information received by Mr. May, the prisoners this year do not work nearly as well as they did last year and from this information this type of labor should not be counted on heavily for it is quite possible they will not turn out much labor, County Agent May declared.

The rate of pay this year will probably be around 25 cents per hour, if it is not changed by the camp. Farmers will have to furnish transportation as they did last year, Mr. May stated.

It will take approximately from 6 to 12 days to make a contract for prison labor and in cases where this type of labor can be used application should be made at least two weeks in advance of the time the labor will be needed, applications can be made at the office of County Agent May.

NEWS FROM THE COUNTY AGENT'S OFFICE

Those who are planning on planting created wheat grass this fall will be glad to know that seed can be purchased from one of the local elevators in Dimmitt. Created wheat grass should be planted sometime in September on a firm seed bed depending on course on the moisture from now on.

It would always pay to creep feed your calves and with prices of beef as they are the calf market looks the best and with a good fat calf off the cow you can still make some money with them. Raymond Annen built a calf creep this year and started his calves on it April 23rd. To date his calves have eaten an average of 1 1/4 pounds of feed per day and they are really fat nice calves. Raymond is feeding in his calf feeder a mixture of bundles, threshed maize, cotton seed meal and soy bean meal. Stop by at Raymonds if you want to see the results of a little feed for little calves.

Now is the time to be thinking about your wheat seed for planting this fall. A number of Castro county farmers are planning to secure some certified turkey and tenmar wheat and if you would like to have some contact me and I will be glad to tell you where you may obtain some. Marion Benton has some first year from certified tenmar wheat which should do the job for you if you want tenmar wheat as it was grown on summer fallowed ground and was certified when he planted it last fall.

Six Castro county 4-H Club boys, one from each 4-H Club over the county, will have the opportunity to attend the district 4-H encampment at Oeta Glenn on the 21st of August. This camp is attended by 4-H boys from 17 West Texas counties and is a real outing for the boys.

UNFAVORABLE OUTLOOK FOR ROW CROP HARVEST

This years harvest situation on grain sorghums looks serious stated County Agent May after attending a meeting at Plainview on Monday. There is expected to be a very serious car shortage which will make shipping by rail very difficult and as local elevators and terminals are full of wheat there is but little storage for row crop grains.

As it looks now stated May everyone should, where at all possible, try to make arrangements to store their grain at home. In this way a government loan could be obtained on it and the farmer would have a chance of getting more for it later. As the terminals are pretty full about all they are likely to be interested in is buying grain sorghums and storing now which might depress the present harvest time.

The problem is still more complicated as there is very little lumber available to build grainaries with, but as it looks now everyone who can store their grain at home or can build a grainary will be many dollars ahead according to all information that is at hand, according to County Agent May.

NEWS FROM SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT

Orbin Nowell of the Dodd community has started construction of a diversion terrace with a big disc one-way plow. The results so far are a nice uniform ridge over eleven inches high and partial protection to 60 acres of land that had started to gully. The terrace has handled two rains of approximately 1 1/4 inches, but more height is needed in case of larger rains. More terraces are also needed below to complete the protection. Water from the terrace is spread over contour furrowed pasture before it reaches the draw where it formerly flowed. According to Nowell the only objection to this form of construction is that his plow does not have a power lift.

W. C. Crick is making some improvements in the irrigation system on his farm in the Mulkey community. Crick, who has farmed irrigated land in the Rio Grande Valley, is highly pleased with the low mineral content of the water here.

W. B. Boston and W. D. Winbourn are proud possessors of new irrigation wells who have received district assistance the past week in laying out their ditches. Well sites were located for them last winter. Boston's farm is near the Rance school site. Winbourn's farm is south of Flagg. Both farms have excellent soil and topography for irrigation.

CAPT. GREER ESTES IS KILLED IN ACTION

Being unable to contact members of the family of Percy Estes to secure information concerning the death of Capt. Greer Estes, The News takes the liberty of publishing the following item from the Methodist church bulletin:

CAPT. GREER ESTES
 Bro. and Sister Estes received a message from the War Department last Friday at about 11:00 A. M. advising them of the death of their son Greer who was killed in action in France on July 8th, 1944. Greer was serving in the infantry and had been in service since February 1940. He landed in England in March '41 and was in the invasion of France.

Greer was born in Dimmitt, Texas, June 26, 1913 in the Bethel Community. He finished high school in Dimmitt and went to Texas State Teachers College at Canyon one year. Becoming interested in law he decided to go to the state University at Austin where he attended four years. He finished his law course there and was admitted to the bar. He was practicing law at Seagraves when he enlisted in the U. S Army in February 1940.

He received his commission as Second Lt. May 1941 and was promoted to First Lt. in August 1942, and was advanced to the rank of Captain in July 1943.

Greer was converted and united with the Methodist church in Hereford, Texas at the age of seven, under the ministry of Rev. M. M. Beavers.

Every head is bowed in grief, and sympathy with Bro. and sister Estis, Helen, and Bob in this great loss. They have made the supreme contribution to the future peace and welfare of the world. Our sincere prayers and deepest sympathy are extended them in this hour of sorrow.

\$155,792.50 IN WAR BONDS SOLD HERE IN 5th WAR LOAN

According to information received here this week by County War Bond Chairman, H. W. Golden, from the War Finance Committee of Texas, the War Bond sales tabulation completed by the Federal Reserve Bank revealed that Castro County citizens purchased an overall total of \$155,792.50 worth of bonds during the 5th War Loan. Series E Bond sales during the 5th War Loan amounted to \$91,200 in Castro county. The county quota for the 5th War Loan was set at \$130,000.

DIMITT SCHOOL TO OPEN SEPT. 4

According to announcement from Superintendent J. W. Blaine the Dimmitt Schools will open September 4, with the first six grades enrolling at the Elementary School and the upper six at the High School.

In a statement to the News Suprt. Blaine declared, "Those students who will be entering Dimmitt Schools for the first time should have report cards when they come to enroll. Those in the tenth grade and above should write to their former superintendent and have a transcript of their work sent to Dimmitt High School."

Extensive repair work has been done at both school plants which should add to the effectiveness of the school.

BROTHER OF MRS. COGSWELL REPORTED KILLED IN ACTION

According to information received here by Mrs. R. E. Cogswell, her brother, S-Sgt. Oliver Alexander, 34, was killed in action June 22, in France. A telegram bearing the information was received by Mrs. Cogswell from the War Department on July 31. Sgt. Alexander was a member of the 357th Infantry, 90th Division. He was reared in Hill and Floyd counties and was inducted into the armed services March 21, 1942, from Hale county.

He received his training at Camp Barkley and participated in maneuvers in the Arizona and California deserts. He arrived in England in March and was sent to France June 8. Royle Curry, a cousin of Sgt. Alexander and a member of the 19th Company, was wounded June 19, and is now receiving treatment in the McCloskey Hospital in Temple.

Another brother of Mrs. Cogswell, Lieut. Melvin Alexander, died of wounds received in action on Eniwetok Atoll in the Marshall Islands on March 10. He was a member of the Army Engineer 47th Combat Regiment. A third brother of Mrs. Cogswell, Cpl. Leonard Alexander, received medical discharge from the Army last August after being wounded on Guadalcanal March 17, 1943. He lost his right eye and two fingers and a thumb in combat. Cpl. Alexander was a member of the Army Ordnance Department, 48th Division.
