### ORDIANANCE PROTECTS CITIZENS

The City Commission recently passed an ordinance requaring everyone who offers milk for sale within the city limits of Sudan to have a permit issued sausage, beef, pork, by the city health officer.

This ordinance was passed not to protect any one milk producer but was passed to protect the users of milk in Sudan. In order to get a permit to sell milk in Sudan certain sanitary requirements must be complied with which is required by the state and federal government.

One of these requirements as set forth by the state health department is the testing of cows for T. B. Mayor H. G. Ramby in an effort to save the owners of cows who want to sell milk in Sudan money advertised last week for all who desired to have their cows T. B. tested leave their names at the City Hall.

By having 25 to 50 cows ready to be T. B. Tested when a state veternarian comes to Sudan, it would cost the owners of the cows only 50 to 75 cents per head. If the veternarian is called to test only one, two, five, or 10 cows the cost would be prohibitive as he would charge \$25.00 for testing only one cow if he was called here only for that purpose.

Mayor Ramby and the City Commission are cooperating with the cow owners of Sudan in helping them get their cows T. B. tested and should be commended for their work in this matter.

Some citizens may not know the reason for having cows T. -tested. The reason is to eliminate all cows which have T. B. By doing this the purchasers and users of the milk are protected against this dreadful di-

The ordiance requiring certain sanitary conditions for the production of milk that is to be offered for sale is a good one as it protects the users of milk.


