STATE TO VOTE AUGUST 26 ON \$20,000,000 BOND ISSUE

Lawrence Westbrook, director of relief commission, announced Tuesday he has been advised of the Texas rehabilitation and \$968,787 federal relief funds would be available for disbursement in Texas this week.

Westbrook said the funds were being dispatched by air mail. "We hope to get the money disbursed this week," Westbrook said.

The May allotment of Texas' relief money had been withheld by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation until the legislature had submitted to the voters a proposed \$20,000,000 bond issue, proceeds to augment federal government funds.

The legislature passed a resolution submitting the bond issue to a vote at a special election on August 26 and Governor Miram A. Ferguson approved it Tuesday.

Governor Ferguson sent to both houses a message suggesting passage of a bill that would allow otherwise qualified persons to vote in the August 26 election although they had not paid a poll tax. She said such legislation would "permit many good citizens to vote who would be denied that privilege." Under Texas law one who does not pay a poll tax by February 1 cannot vote in any election during the year unless exempted from payment of a poll tax.

124,000 MOTORISTS WILL NOT RUN CARS IN 1933.

Austin, Texas, May 15: Texas got both bad news and good news concerning her state highways during the week but the bad news was temporary and the good news is expected to last longer, the Texas Good Roads Association reported.

The bad news came when the highways department announce

ed that only 911,904 Texas motor cars were registered up to May 1. This means, the Association pointed out, that more than 124,000 Texas motorists will not up their cars this year and not replace them. Last year 104,689 cars were quit battling the depression and high motor tax. Retirement of these cars means a heavy loss in public revenue. The average motor vehicle fee is \$10, and the average motor vehicle fee is \$10, and the average Texas autoist pays \$27.80 a year in gas tax. As a result, the cars retired last year caused a loss in public income of \$3,957,244, and this year loss will be repeated, in addition to which the new decline will bring the year's total well over \$8,500,000—an aggregate drop of \$12,500,000 in two years.

But even in this cheerless picture, W. O. Huggins, president of the road association, found rosy rays of promise. "The quarter of a million Texas motorists who have given up their cars will not keep on walking when conditions improve", he declared. "Private motor transportation has become the fourth basic necessity. The story of the couple whose house leaked so bad they had to sleep in the sedan, is not as absurd as it sounds. These tired motorists will furnish a rich market for auto sales the moment the upturn is general. "There is just one big if. Auto sales and auto taxes will come back strongly provided we keep our roads in readiness, and even improve them. It is a hard job now, with road funds

so heavily reduced. But the cars were registered up to May highways themselves earn enough money to do it, if we leave them the money which is rightfully theirs and do not seize it for other purposes." More optimism came from the national capital, where Col. Ike Ashburn, executive manager of the Texas Good Roads Association, had been busy during the week urging administration lead money for road building in Texas. Colonel Ashburn's argument was that Texas, having no large federal public lands, can derive only scattering benefits from reforestation plans and that flood control and erosion work will give the state an insufficient share of the great public works program. "Texas has the largest and most pressing road-construction task in America," he said. "Three-fourths of the states are ahead of her in proportionate highway development. Road-building puts more men to work at family-sustaining wages than anything else. It results in permanent improvements, which are immediately income-bearing through the gas tax." Colonel Ashburn was cheered by reports that the president's committee approves such work and intends to include a large sum, perhaps \$250,000,000 for it in the program. He is bending his efforts toward securing for Texas a liberal share of whatever amount congress finally approves.

STATE TO VOTE AUGUST 26 ON \$20,000,000 BOND ISSUE

Lawrence Westbrook, director of relief commission, announced Tuesday he has been advised of the Texas rehabilitation and \$968,787 federal relief funds would be available for disbursement in Texas this week.

Westbrook said the funds were being dispatched by air mail.

"We hope to get the money disbursed this week," Westbrook said.

The May allotment of Texas' relief money had been withheld by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation until the legislature had submitted to the voters a proposed \$20,000,000 bond issue, proceeds to augment federal government funds.

The legislature passed a resolution submitting the bond issue to a vote at a special election on August 26 and Governor Miram A. Ferguson approved it Tuesday.

Governor Ferguson sent to both houses a message suggesting passage of a bill that would allow otherwise qualified persons to vote in the August 26 election although they had not paid a poll tax. She said such legislation would "permit many good citizens to vote who would be denied that privilege." Under Texas law one who does not pay a poll tax by February 1 cannot vote in any election during the year unless exempted from payment of a poll tax.

124,000 MOTORISTS WILL NOT RUN CARS IN 1933.

Austin, Texas, May 15: Texas got both bad news and good news concerning her state highways during the week but the bad news was temporary and the good news is expected to last longer, the Texas Good Roads Association reported.

The bad news came when the highways department announced

ed that only 911,904 Texas motor cars were registered up to May 1. This means, the Association pointed out, that more than 124,000 Texas motorists will put their cars this year and not replace them. Last year 104,689 car-owners quit battling depression and high motor tax es, and gave up their machines. Retirement of these cars means a heavy loss in public revenue. The average motor vehicle fee is \$10, and the average Texas autoist pays \$27.80 a year in gas tax. As a result, the cars retired last year caused a loss in public income of \$3,957,244, and this year that loss will be repeated, in addition to which the new decline will bring the year's total to well over \$8,500,000—an aggregate drop of \$12,500,000 in two years.

But even in this cheerless picture, W. O. Huggins, president of the road association, found rosy rays of promise. "The quarter of a million Texas motorists who have given up their cars will not keep on walking when conditions improve", he declared. "Private motor transportation has become the fourth basic necessity. The story of the couple whose house leaked so bad they had to sleep in the sedan, is not as absurd as it sounds. These retired motorists will furnish a rich market for auto sales the moment the upturn is general. "There is just one big if. Auto sales and auto taxes will come back strongly provided we keep our roads in readiness, and even improve them. It is a hard job now, with road funds

so heavily reduced. But the highways themselves earn enough money to do it, if we put rightfully theirs and do not seize it for other purposes." More optimism came from the national capital, where Col. Ike Ashburn, executive manager of the Texas Good Roads Association, had been busy during the week urging administration lead ers to allot federal public works money for road building in Texas.

Colonel Ashburn's argument was that Texas, having no large federal public lands, can derive only scattering benefits from reforestation plans and that flood control and erosion work will give the state an insufficient share of the great public works program. "Texas has the largest and most pressing road-construction task in America," he said. "Three-fourths of the states are ahead of her in proportionate highway development. Road-building puts more men to work at family-sustaining wages than anything else. It results in permanent improvements, which are immediately income-bearing through the gas tax." Colonel Ashburn was cheered by reports that the president's committee approves such work and intends to include a large sum, perhaps \$250,000,000 for it in the program. He is bending his efforts toward securing for Texas a liberal share of whatever amount congress finally approves.
