### SENATOR DUGGAN OBTAINED AMENDMENT TO RURAL SCHOOL AID BILL

Recent passage of Rural School Aid bill, was not satisfactory to many of West Texas counties and upon information of its passage delegates from many counties conferred with Senator Duggan who took the matter up with State Superintendent L. A. Wood and succeeded in getting an amendment to the bill which provides for aid in our school districts as follows: Striking out tax valuation clause. Also another amendment allowing state salary aid in all districts that transport more than 60 per cent of their rural population. Under this law each truck in Lamb county will receive \$2 per child per month for a period of eight months as truck aid. As an example, a truck transporting 40 pupils would draw \$80 per month from the state aid. These amendments have passed both the Senate and the House and now await the signature of the Governor. There is every assurance that the Governor will sign the amendments.

### MARVIN JONES GETS PEN

Washington, May 12.—Representative Marvin Jones of the Amarillo district is the possessor of one of the pens with which President Roosevelt approved the farm bill at the White House Friday. The group was photographed with the President in the executive office.

The new farm bill, more sweeping than any measure of the kind that Congress has enacted, was piloted through the legislature shoals in the House of Representatives by M. Jones as chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture, and in the conference committee the burden of defending the measure with its proposals of farm relief, farm mortgage relief and currency inflation fell to Mr. Jones, and in which he was the administrator's spokesman.—Dallas News.

### COMPLETE SCHOOL FACULTY SELECTED.

Branch Resigns as Principal; C. J. Jackson, M. S. Elected To Fill Vacancy.

According to M. A. Smith, superintendent of the Sudan Public School, who is here, from Graham where he is spending the summer, attending to school matters this week the vacancy created by the resignation of Sam A. ### SOIL IN SHAPE FOR PLANTING ROW CROP.

Good rains the latter part of last week and yesterday afternoon and last night is reported to have soaked the drouth ridden lands of almost all the Panhandle and the entire South Plains with apparently the heaviest and most general precipitation received since last fall.

Limits of the beneficial rain area were set at Shattuck, Okla. on the northeast, area immediately north of the Canadian River on the north, Tascosa and Vega on the northwest and west, Clovis, N. M. on the southwest, below Lubbock on the south, Quanah and Childress areas on the southeast, and Shamrock on the east.

The rain at Sudan and vicinity had reached about an inch this morning.

### MORTGAGE RELIEF BILL TO GIVE REAL AID HOME OWNER

Will Reduce Interest and Extend Time for Final Payments

Washington, May 20.—If you own a \$15,000 home with a \$10,000 mortgage on it, this is the way you would go about getting relief under the administration bill approved on Saturday by a Senate subcommittee. Although the bill is still subject to change the procedure will be about the same in its final form.

You, or the holder of your mortgage, may approach a Government agency to be created under the bill known as the Home Owners' Loan Corporation and ask for refinancing.

If you are paying 6 1-2 per cent interest on your mortgage, but are unable to continue, the holder of it may agree to accept bonds issued by the corporation in exchange for the obligation.

### Would Reduce Interest.

He would only get 4 per cent interest, but it would be guaranteed by the Government and would be tax exempt. In return for the sure interest payments and tax exemption he might agree to accept \$9,000 in bonds for the \$10,000 mortgage.

In either case you would agree to pay the Government corporation over a fixed period of years at 5 per cent interest.

In addition the Government would advance you cash for taxes and repairs, if necessary, which would be added to your debt, provided total obligation did not exceed 80 per cent of the appraised value of your home.

If you are out of a job and temporarily unable to pay anything the corporation could give you a three year postponement.

Under these circumstances, in addition to any moratorium and any reduction in total agreed to by the holder of your mortgage, your annual interest payments would be reduced from \$650 a year to \$500.

### Can Save Equity.

If you own a \$15,000 home and have worked the mortgage down to say \$5,000, but are now out of a job and can not pay on that, the bill has a further provision to help you.

In this case the holder of your mortgage probably would not exchange it for bonds because your home is such good security that he would rather foreclose.

To prevent this the corporation could extend to you cash up to 40 or 50 per cent of the value of your home to pay off your debtor. You would turn the mortgage over to the corporation for security.

Instead of foreclosing immediately, the corporation then would give you time to get on your feet.

**KINFOLKS PLANNING TO TAKE UP SUMMER RESIDENCE**

Austin, Texas, May 21.—Word has just been received by the State Department of Health that Mr. and Mrs. Mosquito and Mr. and Mrs. Fly, with their kinfolks, are planning to take up their summer residence in the State. They state that, although many had died since last summer, they would soon have large families. Mrs. Mosquito raises from fifty to three hundred children at one time and only takes around two weeks to have full grown children. Mrs. Fly bragged that she and her husband could be ancestors to a million flies in one season.

Mosquitoes are responsible for the spread of malaria, dengue, and yellow fever. Malaria is spread by the bite of the Anopheles or malarial mosquito. Dengue fever and yellow fever are transmitted by the Aedes aegypti or Tiger mosquito. The best way to prevent these diseases is to destroy the breeding places of the mosquito. They breed in any standing water, therefore, you should drain,

ditch or fill such places. spray oil on water each week, too, or stock the water with surface minnows as they will eat the wiggle-tails. Houses should be screened.

Flies help spread typhoid fever, dysentery, diarrhoea, tuberculosis, anthrax and cholera. They breed, live and feed in filth. To prevent their increase all refuse should be disposed of at once garbage kept in covered containers, privies made sanitary and houses screened. Every neighborhood raises its own flies so that their number is an excellent index to the sanitary conditions. The State Health Department, County and City Health Officers are only too glad to assist in banishing this source of disease.

**SIDELIGHTS**

The emergency measure which has just been passed embodies the farm mortgage refinancing provisions as well as the currency program. It is frequently referred to as the most important and far-reaching legislation ever presented to the American Congress.

The Senate and House have now agreed on all of the provisions of the bill, and it has received executive approval.

Soon after the farm measure was sent to the Senate, I introduced the administration's farm mortgage bill and lead the fight for its adoption by the House of Representatives. It was adopted by an overwhelming vote.

Currency expansion measures were also pending in the House during this period and had been discussed by many members on the floor.

These measures were combined and the Thomas currency amendment added. The result of those various steps and combinations is one measure of tremendous importance to the farmer and to the nation in general.

In passing this combination measure, the Senate added eighty-five amendments. In order to iron out the difference in the measure as it passed the House and Senate, it was necessary for a joint conference committee to be selected to represent each body.

Because of the importance of this legislation, I felt greatly honored in being chosen to head the group of conferees from the House when the measure was thus taken up for final revision and adjustment by the two groups before its enactment into law.

The House and Senate both adopted the conference report which was the last step before executive approval. It was my privilege to be present when it was approved, and the President presented me with a pen which he used in signing the measure.

The farm relief section of the composite bill is admittedly an experiment, and is intended to be used only in the present emergency. Under its provisions the Secretary of Agriculture is given broad powers to administer several plans in an effort to bring temporary relief to the farmer while a permanent program is being instituted.

The mortgage refinancing provisions have been discussed in the press reports. The necessity of farm refinancing was recognized by the President, with the result that such a measure has been approved by Congress.

I believe that a controlled expansion of the currency will be a long step toward recovery, because it brings with it an increase in commodity prices and increased purchasing power.

The reflation, or expansion, amendment which has been added to the farm bill contains four major proposals, any or all of which may be used by the President for the purpose of increasing the commodity price level. The first relates to open-market operations by the Federal Reserve banks; the second provides for the issuance of Treasury notes within certain defined limits; the third relates to the acceptance of silver aggregating two hundred million dollars in payment of debts owed by foreign governments; and the fourth authorizes a change in the gold content of the dollar or the remonetization of silver.

With such a program as this in operation, accomplishing three important steps in the President's program of ultimate national recovery, I have every hope that the farmer will once more assume his proper place in our economic structure, and that America will be well on its way to better times.

**FARM NOTES**

By D. A. Adam, County Agent.

The A. and M. Short Course will offer a new deal to the farm men, farm women, farm boys and farm girls of Texas this summer," states D. A. Adam County Agent. "The Short Course authorities are planning to have interested groups of farmers in overalls, club boys in jumpers, women and girls in aprons learning how to make all kinds of products under farm conditions.

"Under a tree will be a sorghum syrup mill going full blast with syrup expert and chemist on hand to show the working farmers how to sample, taste and treat their syrup to make it or to take the 'sting' out of the syrup, or any of the many little tricks necessary to producing a quality syrup.

"Toiling over yonder vat will be a group of interested farmers learning the art of tanning their hides (that have been thrown away heretofore) into quality leather that may be used for harness or a hundred other uses on the farm.

"Bent over a bench over there will be another group of interested farmers learning how to make their own harness from hamestrung to brichen; and seated over to one side will be women and girls stamping leather and learning the art of making saleable leather goods from hides tanned by the farmers.

"Down in the creamery, those boys interested in selling fancy country butter, will be giving the old churn another extra lick to make the butter come, while the women will be learning how to make a better quality of cottage cream of commercial ice cream.

"Over there in the textile mills amid the whirl and swirl of the looms women will be carding cotton, wool, and mohair, while farmers will be learning how to shear, tie and grade their wool, and just imagine some of those wool blankets made from your own wool!

"The poultryman and home industry workers will be drilling visitors in the proper method for killing, dressing, boning, and canning of chicken, down in the meats laboratory.

"Across the hall the meats men will be killing, cutting and curing meats while the women

will be canning some of the products.

Others will be making grape juice on a commercial scale in a small form plant set up especially for this farm course. Still in another room experiment station folks will be showing you how to process figs to keep them for months at a time, and how to process figs to keep them fresh. How to handle various kinds of fruit juices.

"This Short Course was designed for farm folks that want to know how to do things and are going someplace," stated the county agent. "There will not be an idle moment, as there will be an inspirational talk in the morning with most of the afternoon given to making things as outlined above, with the night filled with entertainment. Farm folks can't afford to miss the 'New Deal' in short course at A. and M. College on the last week in July, July 24 to 29th."

Poison Grain can be obtained at the County Agent's office for control of ground squirrels, during planting time.

Copper carbonate should be used for smut control in grain sorghums. This is a dry treatment, and a heaping tobacco can full to the bushel of seed will control smut for you.

Ceresan should be used to treat cotton seed, and 3 ounces to the bushel is the required amount. This has been successful in the control of rot and other fungous diseases.

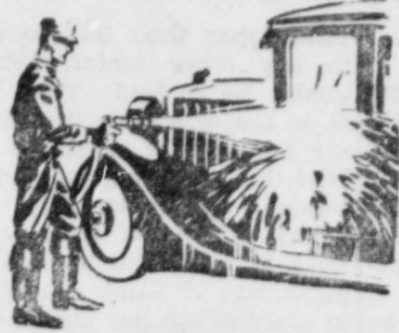

**DOCTORS TO CARE FOR INDIGENT SICK; PLANS ARE GIVEN.**

Two plans for the caring for the indigent sick in this county have been drawn up by the Lamb County Medical association and was presented to the county commissioners in a meeting early last week.

One of the plans drawn up by the association would call for the county to contract to pay the association a set sum of money each year and this would be distributed between the various doctors according to the amount of services they render in connection with indigent cases.

The other plan calls for the commissioners court to set a fee to be paid by the county to the attending physician in all indigent cases.

Following is a resolution signed by 13 Lamb county physicians in connection with the steps the association is taking in an attempt to collect medical fees:

That we, the undersigned physicians of Lamb county, State of Texas, wish to call attention to the responsibility of the community for the care of the indigent sick (the county's pauper poor,) a responsibility which has heretofore been foisted on the shoulder of the individual doctor. That the doctor is no more under obligation to give free medical service at his own time, expense than other individuals are to give on demand food, drugs and fuel required to sustain life, but which the community provides when needed. That the county, which pays regularly the expense incurred by distant hospitals for the treatment of a few cases, should pay as well the expenses of all local physicians for the treatment of a vastly overwhelming number of charity cases (pauper poor). That a committee be elected to meet with the Commissioners of Lamb County to discuss this need and the means of correcting it.

That in the case of those who are not indigent that is, all other cases, and hence have come without the authority of the proper county officials, all office visits and other charges of only a few dollars must be paid in cash or its equivalent; That on charges of larger amounts a substantial initial payment at least must be forthcoming and the remainder covered by notes of adequate security. That each of these signed below will refuse cases who apparently do not attempt in good

faith to pay their bills to us or to any other doctor. Let the public be advised: That there is no law or statute that a doctor has to take cases of any kind that may happen or in any way call for his services.

That a copy of these resolutions be presented to the commissioners of Lamb county and to every newspaper published in the county. That we regret that the practice of neglecting or refusing to pay the doctor has developed within the community to the extent that we are forced to adopt such a policy toward the public, having found, to our sorrow, that we cannot depend on the words, "I promise to pay."

### SENATOR DUGGAN OBTAINED AMENDMENT TO RURAL SCHOOL AID BILL

Recent passage of Rural School Aid bill, was not satisfactory to many of West Texas counties and upon information of its passage delegates from many counties conferred with Senator Duggan who took the matter up with State Superintendent L. A. Wood and succeeded in getting an amendment to the bill which provides for aid in our school districts as follows: Striking out tax valuation clause. Also another amendment allowing state salary aid in all districts that transport more than 60 per cent of their rural population. Under this law each truck in Lamb county will receive \$2 per child per month for a period of eight months as truck aid. As an example, a truck transporting 40 pupils would draw \$80 per month from the state aid. These amendments have passed both the Senate and the House and now await the signature of the Governor. There is every assurance that the Governor will sign the amendments.

### MARVIN JONES GETS PEN

Washington, May 12.—Representative Marvin Jones of the Amarillo district is the possessor of one of the pens with which President Roosevelt approved the farm bill at the White House Friday. The group was photographed with the President in the executive office.

The new farm bill, more sweeping than any measure of the kind that Congress has enacted, was piloted through the legislature shoals in the House of Representatives by M. Jones as chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture, and in the conference committee the burden of defending the measure with its proposals of farm relief, farm mortgage relief and currency inflation fell to Mr. Jones, and in which he was the administrator's spokesman.—Dallas News.

### MORTGAGE RELIEF BILL TO GIVE REAL AID HOME OWNER

Will Reduce Interest and Extend Time for Final Payments

Washington, May 20.—If you own a \$15,000 home with a \$10,000 mortgage on it, this is the way you would go about getting relief under the administration bill approved on Saturday by a Senate subcommittee. Although the bill is still subject to change the procedure will be about the same in its final form.

You, or the holder of your mortgage, may approach a Government agency to be created under the bill known as the Home Owners' Loan Cooperation and ask for refinancing.

If you are paying 6 1-2 per cent interest on your mortgage, but are unable to continue, the holder of it may agree to accept bonds issued by the corporation in exchange for the obligation.

### Would Reduce Interest.

He would only get 4 per cent interest, but it would be guaranteed by the Government and would be tax exempt. In return for the sure interest payments and tax exemption he might agree to accept \$9,000 in bonds for the \$10,000 mortgage.

In either case you would agree to pay the Government corporation over a fixed period of years at 5 per cent interest.

In addition the Government would advance you cash for taxes and repairs, if necessary, which would be added to your debt, provided total obligation did not exceed 80 per cent of the appraised value of your home.

If you are out of a job and temporarily unable to pay anything the corporation could give you a three year postponement.

Under these circumstances, in addition to any moratorium and any reduction in total agreed to by the holder of your mortgage, your annual interest payments would be reduced from \$650 a year to \$500.

### Can Save Equity.

If you own a \$15,000 home and have worked the mortgage down to say \$5,000, but are now out of a job and can not pay on that, the bill has a further provision to help you.

In this case the holder of your mortgage probably would not exchange it for bonds because your home is such good security that he would rather foreclose.

To prevent this the corporation could extend to you cash up to 40 or 50 per cent of the value of your home to pay off your debtor. You would turn the mortgage over to the corporation for security.

Instead of foreclosing immediately, the corporation then would give you time to get on your feet.

KINFOLKS PLANNING TO TAKE UP SUMMER RESIDENCE

Austin, Texas, May 21.—Word has just been received by the State Department of Health that Mr. and Mrs. Mosquito and Mr. and Mrs. Fly, with their kinfolks, are planning to take up their summer residence in the State. They state that, although many had died since last summer, they would soon have large families. Mrs. Mosquito raises from fifty to three hundred children at one time and only takes around two weeks to have full grown children. Mrs. Fly bragged that she and her husband could be ancestors to a million flies in one season.

Mosquitoes are responsible for the spread of malaria, dengue, and yellow fever. Malaria is spread by the bite of the Anopheles or malaria mosquito. Dengue fever and yellow fever are transmitted by the Aedes aegypti or Tiger mosquito. The best way to prevent these diseases is to destroy the breeding places of the mosquito. They breed in any standing water, therefore, you should drain,

ditch or fill such places, spray oil on water each week, too, or stock the water with surface minnows as they will eat the wiggle-tails. Houses should be screened.

Flies help spread typhoid fever, dysentery, diarrhoea, tuberculosis, anthrax and cholera. They breed, live and feed in filth. To prevent their increase all refuse should be disposed of at once garbage kept in covered containers, privies made sanitary and houses screened. Every neighborhood raises its own flies so that their number is an excellent index to the sanitary conditions. The State Health Department, County and City Health Officers are only too glad to assist in banishing this source of disease.

## SIDELIGHTS

By Marvin Jones  
Member of Congress from Texas

The emergency measure which has just been passed embodies the farm mortgage refinancing provisions as well as the currency program. It is frequently referred to as the most important and far-reaching legislation ever presented to the American Congress.

The Senate and House have now agreed on all of the provisions of the bill, and it has received executive approval.

Soon after the farm measure was sent to the Senate, I introduced the administration's farm mortgage bill and lead the fight for its adoption by the House of Representatives. It was adopted by an overwhelming vote.

Currency expansion measures were also pending in the House during this period and had been discussed by many members on the floor.

These measures were combined and the Thomas currency amendment added. The result of those various steps and combinations is one measure of tremendous importance to the farmer and to the nation in general.

In passing this combination measure, the Senate added eighty-five amendments. In order to iron out the difference in the measure as it passed the House and Senate, it was necessary for a joint conference committee to be selected to represent each body.

Because of the importance of this legislation, I felt greatly honored in being chosen to head the group of conferees from the House when the measure was thus taken up for final revision and adjustment by the two groups before its enactment into law.

The House and Senate both adopted the conference report which was the last step before executive approval. It was my privilege to be present when it was approved, and the President presented me with a pen which he used in signing the measure.

The farm relief section of the composite bill is admittedly an experiment, and is intended to be used only in the present emergency. Under its provisions the Secretary of Agriculture is given broad powers to administer several plans in an effort to bring temporary relief to the farmer while a permanent program is being instituted.

The mortgage refinancing provisions have been discussed in the press reports. The necessity of farm refinancing was recognized by the President, with the result that such a measure has been approved by Congress.

I believe that a controlled expansion of the currency will be a long step toward recovery, because it brings with it an increase in commodity prices and increased purchasing power.

The reflation, or expansion, amendment which has been added to the farm bill contains four major proposals, any or all of which may be used by the President for the purpose of increasing the commodity price level. The first relates to open-market operations by the Federal Reserve banks; the second provides for the issuance of Treasury notes within certain defined limits; the third relates to the acceptance of silver aggregating two hundred million dollars in payment of debts owed by foreign governments; and the fourth authorizes a change in the gold content of the dollar or the remonetization of silver.

With such a program as this in operation, accomplishing three important steps in the President's program of ultimate national recovery, I have every hope that the farmer will once more assume his proper place in our economic structure, and that America will be well on its way to better times.

## FARM NOTES

—By D. A. Adam, County Agent.  
The A. and M. Short Course will offer a new deal to the farm men, farm women, farm boys and farm girls of Texas this summer," states D. A. Adam County Agent. "The Short Course authorities are planning to have interested groups of farmers in overalls, club boys in jumpers, women and girls in aprons learning how to make all kinds of products under farm conditions.

"Under a tree will be a sorghum syrup mill going full blast with syrup expert and chemist on hand to show the working farmers how to sample, taste and treat their syrup to make it or to take the 'sting' out of the syrup, or any of the many little tricks necessary to producing a quality syrup.

"Toiling over yonder vat will be a group of interested farmers learning the art of tanning their hides (that have been thrown away heretofore) into quality leather that may be used for harness or a hundred other uses on the farm.

"Bent over a bench over there will be another group of interested farmers learning how to make their own harness from hamestrung to britchen; and seated over to one side will be women and girls stamping leather and learning the art of making saleable leather goods from hides tanned by the farmers.

"Down in the creamery, those boys interested in selling fancy country butter, will be giving the old churn another extra lick to make the butter come, while the women will be learning how to make a better quality of cottage cream of commercial ice cream.

"Over there in the textile mills amid the whirl and swirl of the looms women will be carding cotton, wool, and mohair, while farmers will be learning how to shear, tie and grade their wool, and just imagine some of those wool blankets made from your own wool!

"The poultryman and home industry workers will be drilling visitors in the proper method for killing, dressing, boning, and canning of chicken, down in the meats laboratory.

"Across the hall the meats men will be killing, cutting and curing meats while the women

will be canning some of the products.

Others will be making grape juice on a commercial scale in a small form plant set up especially for this farm course. Still in another room experiment station folks will be showing you how to process figs to keep them for months at a time, and how to process figs to keep them fresh. How to handle various kinds of fruit juices.

"This Short Course was designed for farm folks that want to know how to do things and are going someplace," stated the county agent. "There will not be an idle moment, as there will be an inspirational talk in the morning with most of the afternoon given to making things as outlined above, with the night filled with entertainment. Farm folks can't afford to miss the 'New Deal' in short course at A. and M. College on the last week in July, July 24 to 29th."

Poison Grain can be obtained at the County Agent's office for control of ground squirrels, during planting time.

Copper carbonate should be used for smut control in grain sorghums. This is a dry treatment, and a heaping tobacco can full to the bushel of seed will control smut for you.

Ceresan should be used to treat cotton seed, and 3 ounces to the bushel is the required amount. This has been successful in the control of rot and other fungous diseases.

Elmo Bryant, Leo Ross Bryant, Golden Benton, John Hanks, Cecil Galloway, Clarence Schreier, Roy McQuatters, James Halden, Edith and Virginia Cunningham; Arles, John and Jim Humphries; Roy Miller and Robert Hawkins, Wayman and Erskine Gordon have a total of 54 calves in the feed lot that were secured during the past two weeks by the County Agent for feeding out for the next Spring Show.

4-H Clubs have been re-organized at Spring Lake, Olton, Amherst Spade and Sudan, with a membership of two hundred boys.

**DOCTORS TO CARE FOR INDIGENT SICK; PLANS ARE GIVEN.**

Two plans for the caring for the indigent sick in this county have been drawn up by the Lamb County Medical association and was presented to the county commissioners in a meeting early last week.

One of the plans drawn up by the association would call for the county to contract to pay the association a set sum of money each year and this would be distributed between the various doctors according to the amount of services they render in connection with indigent cases.

The other plan calls for the commissioners court to set a fee to be paid by the county to the attending physician in all indigent cases.

Following is a resolution signed by 13 Lamb county physicians in connection with the steps the association is taking in an attempt to collect medical fees:

That we, the undersigned physicians of Lamb county, State of Texas, wish to call attention to the responsibility of the community for the care of the indigent sick (the county's pauper poor.) a responsibility which has heretofore been foisted on the shoulder of the individual doctor. That the doctor is no more under obligation to give free medical service at his own time, expense than other individuals are to give on demand food, drugs and fuel required to sustain life, but which the community provides when needed. That the county, which pays regularly the expense incurred by distant hospitals for the treatment of a few cases, should pay as well the expenses of all local physicians for the treatment of a vastly overwhelming number of charity cases (pauper poor). That a committee be elected to meet with the Commissioners of Lamb County to discuss this need and the means of correcting it.

That in the case of those who are not indigent that is all other cases, and hence have come without the authority of the proper county officials, all office visits and other charges of only a few dollars must be paid in cash or its equivalent; That on charges of larger amounts a substantial initial payment at least must be forthcoming and the remainder covered by notes of adequate security. That each of these signed below will refuse cases who apparently do not attempt in good

faith to pay their bills to us or to any other doctor. Let the public be advised: That there is no law or statute that a doctor has to take cases of any kind that may happen or in any way call for his services.

That a copy of these resolutions be presented to the commissioners of Lamb county and to every newspaper published in the county. That we regret that the practice of neglecting or refusing to pay the doctor has developed within the community to the extent that we are forced to adopt such a policy toward the public, having found, to our sorrow, that we cannot depend on the words, "I promise to pay."
